Pays to Shop Locally

Business Down, Plaza Wins Tax Reduction

The impact of a thriving retail business district upon the individual homeowner's tax bill was brought forcefully to the attention of the community last night (Wed) by Horace Z. Kramer, vice chairman of the Nassau County Board of Assessors, at a meeting with the Hicksville Board of Education. He disclosed the generally unknown fact that Mid Island Shopping Plaza had won a new million dollar reduction in tax assessment prior to May 1 by settlement of an accumulation of seven years action.

"It was our judgment that if we went to court, the reduction could have been as much as a million and a half dollars," Kramer commented.

At one point he noted that it pays to support businesses in the school district because if stores are vacant the property owner is able to earn a reduced assessment which increases the tax load on other taxpayers.

Specifically in the case of Mid Island Plaza, he noted that while the shopping centre cost \$16 million to build it has a current net market value of \$11 million which was arrived at by determining the gross income and deducting the reasonable expenses and taxes paid to provide a net yield figure.

He said the Board of Assessors found the highest income for the Plaza, before taxes, to be \$1,420,000. Payment of \$580,000 in taxes left a net value of \$11 million. The current tax assessment of the shopping centre he indicated, based on the equalization rate as fixed by the state, to be \$3.3 or 3.4 million. It had been set at \$5.5 million and has now been reduced to \$4.7 million, which he said, is not a replacement cost figure.

Kramer expressed the opinion that the Mid Island Plaza problem was the lease held by Gertz which is for a 40-year period at a rent which he described as the lowest of any department store on the Island. The Gertz lease allows it to veto any similar dept store in the Plaza and commented that Gertz "is not a good enough shopper draw". He added that Roosevelt Field shopping centre had problems until it had both Gimbel's and Macy to draw shoppers and then the small stores "began to survive."

"The Mid Island Plaza, in the judgment of every appraiser that I know," Kramer continued, "will not really be a successful shopping centre realizing the highest and best use of that property until it gets another store in there, hopefully one that has a better draw than Gertz. There has been talk that such a thing is going to happen. There has also been talk that they are going

to enclose their Mall, like Walt Whitman's."

If they can get Gertz to accept another dept store, he felt there is a possibility of a much higher assessed valuation on the Mid Island Plaza property.

He reported that the LI Lighting Co. is on the assessment rolls for \$4.7 million and there has not been a reduction in the last several years. "In fact I think there is going to be another \$120,000 added to the LILO for the May 1st assessment roll," he said.

Kramer said that according to his records the Hicksville School District tax is 22nd from the highest in Nassau County.

Bank Structure Coming Down

Wreckers began the demolition of the old Long Island National Bank building at Broadway and Herring Place this morning (Thurs.), smashing out the windows. The structure is largely constructed of quarried stone. It is the last remaining structure on the west side of Broadway from the LIRR to Old Country Rd.

Regarding the importance of shopping at home and the relation to taxes on homeowners of the District, he said "going out of town to save \$5 on a bike or even \$25 on a tv set may appear to be a saving but if the property is vacated because a store goes out of business and the owner comes in for an assessment reduction which has to be given because on an income basis, you may be paying more in local taxes than what you saved on the bicycle or tv set."

His other comments included those: present assessments are about one-third of market value on homes, he holds no hope for reducing the cost of government and in Nassau where the reliance upon property taxes accounts for 85% of the revenue for government (compared to 40% in New York City), the burden upon the property owner is too great. Other sources of revenue to support the cost of government must be found. "We must diminish the reliance on property taxes."

Regarding the Levitt homes in Hicksville School District (of which there are about 3000) Kramer said the average house sells for about \$17,000 and is assessed for \$3000. The Levitt homes that is improved will go up as far as \$5000 and that house will bring \$20,000 on the market. "There is an awful lot more resale of Levitt homes than any other single development home in this County. The Levitts"

Name Employees' Fair Relations Bd for Town

A three-man, bi-partisan Public Employees' Relations Board was named this week by the Town Board, according to Councilman Ralph J. Marino, Majority Leader.

Marino said the Board, composed of attorneys Joseph P. Doyle of Plainview and Anthony F. Corrieri of Hicksville, and union official George Boylan of Hicksville, will endeavor to "promote harmonious cooperative relationships between Town Government and its employees" under Local Law No. 8 adopted November 21, called "Town of Oyster Bay Public Employees'

Fair Employment Law".

Doyle, 46, is a graduate of St. John's University and New York Law School and has practiced before the National Labor Relations Board and other administrative agencies. He is a member of the National Labor Panel of Arbitrators, American Arbitration Association.

Among his past duties are negotiation of collective bargaining agreement with five unions in the graphic arts field and day-to-day administration of the contracts including grievances and arbitration. He has extensive experience in legal-labor rela-

tions negotiations.

Corrieri, 52, is a graduate of the City College of New York and St. John's University Law School. He was formerly with the Veterans Administration (chief attorney's office) as field investigator before starting his general practice of the law.

He is associated with the law firm of George Morton Levy and has been counsel for the Hicksville Fire Department for the past ten years and attorney for St. Stephen's Evangelical Lutheran Church for fifteen years.

Boylan, 41, has been an active member of Local Lodge No. 5 Boilermakers for the past 20 years and its business manager for the past six.

Boylan is a member of the New York City Boilermakers negotiating committee; a representative of the New York City Blacksmiths; a delegate to the Building Trades Councils of New York City and Westchester and an executive board member of the Nassau-Suffolk Building Trades Council. He is also a delegate to the AFL-CIO Executive Council representing the International Brotherhood of Boilermakers, Iron Shipbuilders, Blacksmiths, Forgers and Helpers.

The initial appointments will be Doyle, who is the chairman - six years; Corrieri - four years and Boylan - 2 years to stagger the terms. All ensuing appointments will be for six-year terms.

VETERANS BENEFITS: The President's recent special message to Congress to extend a new and unique form of veterans preference for government jobs for Viet-vets and a wide range of new benefits and services for all veterans got quick response from the House Committee on Veterans Affairs. The message just hit Congress when the committee announced plans to hold hearings on GI Loans of the proposal.

Some of the proposals are: Increase the maximum guarantee to \$10,000.

Extend vocational rehabilitation benefits to service-disabled veterans being trained on a part-time as well as a full time basis.

A surprise move by the President called for expansion of the national cemetery system.

The President urged Congress once again to pass legislation on: Increasing Servicemen's Group Life Insurance (SGLI) and to protect the veteran against disproportionate pension losses that could come from a result of increasing other income such as pension.

The most far reaching proposal was the one giving additional incentives to veterans who agree to take public service jobs in deprived areas.

County Recalls 75 Automobiles

A total of 75 county-owned automobiles presently assigned to Nassau County departments and agencies will be recalled as part of a vehicle retirement plan announced by County Executive Eugene H. Nickerson.

The plan, which is based on an efficiency study conducted by the Office of Administrative Services, will accomplish a savings this year of \$110,000 and gross savings over the next five years of \$320,000, it is claimed.

Of the 75 vehicles to be recalled, 50 will be sold and the remaining 25 assigned to common car pool for day-to-day County use.

Part of the retirement plan calls for the replacement of 67 heavy-type automobiles by lighter models when the heavy cars which are in current use reach the trade-in point. Operating savings achieved as the result of this switch will average \$24,085 per year over the next four years and \$38,190 per year thereafter.

Difference in cost to the County between a heavy car and light car over a five-year, 50,000-mile period is \$570 per year, according to the study.

Would Increase Income Ceiling

Assemblyman Stanley Harwood has introduced legislation this week in Albany that would liberalize tax exemptions for senior citizens and enable a greater number to qualify for exemptions. The measure calls for changing the income ceiling from \$3,000, as established by a State Law passed in 1966, to \$6,000.

A companion measure introduced this week by the Assemblyman would require the State to reimburse local municipalities for lost revenues for such tax exemptions.

Both measures are supported by Nassau County Executive Eugene H. Nickerson who said, "Present law governing senior citizens' tax exemptions is unrealistic because the combined income of an elderly couple may not exceed \$3,000. The number of persons who qualify for such tax exemptions under this law is minuscule."

Harwood said that he offered the proposed law to reimburse tax districts because local governments, whose sole source of revenue is the property tax, are overburdened by State-mandated exemptions.

"What is Alcoholism?" was the Hicksville Kiwanis Club subject recently for Superintendent of Jones Institute William R. Peters. A retired U.S. Naval Reserve Officer and a retired U.S. Probation Officer he has specialized for the past 30 years in Social and Correction work. He has been dealing in Alcoholism since the beginning of AA in 1940 and has attended over 160 meetings held at the Meadowbrook Hospital on alcoholism. The "alcoholic" can be classified into four major categories, he said:

1. The Classical Alcoholic, who alleges to suffer from an addiction of the body or a compulsion of the mind, (estimated at 5% of the alcoholic patients).
2. The Symptomatic Alcoholic, whose drinking is a sign or symptom of an underlying psychological or emotional illness, (estimated at 15% of the patients).
3. The Purposual Alcoholic, who drinks to achieve a specific purpose or effect and, having obtained it, can totally abstain without any difficulty, (estimated at 5%).
4. The Reactive Alcoholic, who turns to the use of alcohol for its sedative or tranquilizing effect as a means of alleviating tension due to the problems or situations encountered in daily living, which in itself is totally acceptable procedure in our culture but who differ from the non-alcoholics in that their drinking impairs their ability to function in a normal and acceptable manner in their environment (estimated at 70 to 75% of the alcoholic patients).
