100 Years of Fire Fighting

Hook and Ladder First to Organize

The formal kickoff of the observance of a century of organized volunteer fire fighting in Hicksville took place Saturday night at the 100th anniversary dinner-dance of Protective Hook and Ladder Co. 1 at the Huntington Town House. Throughout the year the volunteers of the entire department are observing the historic event, climaxing with a cavalcade and old fashioned block party on May 23.

Protective Hook and Ladder Co was incorporated by an act of State Legislature passed April 30, 1868. The incorporators were John T. Underhill, Stephen P. O'Hara, George DeLaugliette, William Freytag, Peter D. Hendrickson, William Cahill, F.C. Woodhorst, Henry Wollenhaupt, Adam Lauck, James O'Hara "and their associates".

By 1893 there were two more companies of volunteers which organized the present fire department, Co 2 started in 1892 and Co 3 in 1893. Today there are eight companies plus a rescue squad and bureau of fire prevention and inspection.

At the dinner-dance on Saturday night, Ex Chief Henry A. Gebhardt was honored for 57 years of service as a volunteer.

Retiring company captain Ernest Donner was presented with a plaque by Chief Gus Cotsonas. Flowers were given to Mrs. Donner and Mrs. Maguire, wife of Captain George Maguire.

B. Medard Ofenloch, former chief and captain and presently chairman of the Board of Fire Commissioners, was master of ceremonies along with Judge Francis Donovan.

Rings marking the 100th anniversary were presented to all members of the company. Guests also received tie clips and commemorative ashtrays. There were carriages for the women guests.

Among those present was Brother Eugene Sladish, SA, a Franciscan Friar from Graymoor, Garrison, N.Y., who is a former member of the company and now its honorary chaplain. Al Bianculli who was chairman of the century anniversary for Co. No. 1 is also chairman of the 100th anniversary committee for the fire dept. Ofenloch is co-chairman.

Teachers Reject Union 394 - 249

The Hicksville Classroom Teachers Assn by a vote of the teachers defeated the Federation of Teachers (AFL-CIO) 394 to 249 to determine the bargaining agent for the District teachers. The Board of Education had previously recognized the CTA but the State Public Employment Relations Board (PERB) ordered an election after the recognition was challenged when the union declined to submit to an election.

The Long Island Union Teacher, publication of the LI AFT Council of South Farmingdale, in a statement prior to the Hicksville vote said the pre-vote situation was "rocked by scandal after scandal".

Jerry Irwin, HCTA president, was quoted as saying the vote was "a clear mandate from the teachers indicating they want independence as opposed to a union-type organization."

96 NY Regents May Reveal Scholarships Budget Feb. 26

The New York State Education Dept. announced this week the names of those high school pupils who have won Regents College Scholarships this year. The number of scholarships awarded in Nassau County is 2239. The holder of one of these scholarships will be entitled to an annual award of \$250 - \$1000, depending on family income, for each of the four years while in attendance at any college in the State of New York approved by the Regents for this purpose.

Announced also were the names of those high school pupils who earned scores of sufficient quality in the examination to be ranked as alternates in each county of the State.

A further announcement included the names of pupils to whom Regents Scholarships for basic Professional Education in Nursing and scholarships provided for children of deceased members of the Armed Forces of the United States.

Hicksville High School received a total of 96 Regents Scholarships and alternate awards.

(Editor's Note - While the announcement from the School District said the names of Regents Scholars were given, none were included with the press release to the Herald.)

Charbonnet Shows Camera "How To"

The Hicksville Public Library will present a program Thurs., Feb. 28th at 8 P.M. on the use and operation of the camera. How to take good pictures and why the pictures taken do not always turn out good is something that puzzles most amateur photographers. Pierre Charbonnet, well-known professional photographer, will explain the cause and effect. He will also explain the uses and reason for different types of film for each photographic situation. Time too, will be spent on a critical analysis of lighting and composition on the photographic subject.

A meeting of the budget information committee of the Hicksville School District, appointed by the Board, may get the first public view of the 1968-69 district budget at a meeting called for Monday night, Feb. 26, in the Administration Building.

There are 19 members on the budget information committee with Trustee Harry Kershen as liaison Board of Education member.

The new gross budget is said to exceed \$16 million, about one million more than the 1967-68 figures. While preliminary work figures have been given to Board members, there have been no regular meetings of the Board on the subject to date. Preliminary work figures compiled by the Administration will be submitted to the Board of Education for adoption prior to the voting in May.

It is noted that in previous years the Board of Education by February had held several sessions on phases of the budget.

IRRESPONSIBLE CLAMOR

To the Editor:
A little while ago a brochure was left at my door, which made a comparison between the per capita cost of educating a child in the Hicksville Public Schools versus the cost in the average County private school.

Having been brought up in my father's private school until the year before college, and having taught thirty-one years in the Hicksville Public Schools, my thoughts on the subject may be relevant.

At the elementary level, the differences are not so great. It is in the junior and senior public high schools that the costs begin to mount. There is a reason for this.

I think it is fair to say that most private schools are geared to a college entrance curriculum, which greatly simplifies the curriculum and helps keep down the budget since this program requires fewer teachers and less equipment.

Originally, public schools were similarly planned. Over the years, however, they have become semi-vocational in response to the needs and demands of the community. They are now planned to serve those who go to

college and those who don't - with more of the don'ts than the do's. The aim of public schooling, especially in high school, is now to give as much of a start as possible in the special non-college fields (as well as college) so that graduates may be at least partially prepared to hold a desirable job. Hence the commercial courses, the shops (electricity, wood-working, auto-mechanics and metal). For the girls, there are home-making and beauty-parlor courses. These, of course, require special teachers, and the equipment for them is very expensive - much more than for straight college-preparatory courses with the possible exception of science.

I know of no private schools that gives their students the opportunities in music, art and physical education to equal those given in the better public schools such as Hicksville. Not only does the average student receive an enriched education because of this, but a considerable proportion of the gifted ones go on to make these fields their life work. Again, the necessary equipment in these departments is very expensive. In the Music Department I can speak with some authority, having helped prepare the

music budget for many years.

Now we come to the point. Do we wish the schools to give this semi-vocational preparation or not? If we go back to the 3 R's we can save money - in the short run. Is the present semi-vocational philosophy wrong or right? Do we or do we not want these services? What would happen to the facilities and equipment the school already has if these courses were scrapped? How much would we really save now that buildings have already been built and equipped for these departments?

We must make up our minds what we want the public schools to do for our young people, and ultimately for the townspeople who are and will be the graduates from the school system. If we do not want these services, we must weigh the results in the lives of young people in an era when there is a shortage of unskilled jobs, but openings for the educated and skilled. What will happen to the town if the non-

college preparatory graduates are not prepared for jobs - except at the two extremes: the unskilled and the college-oriented?

High taxes are a problem and a burden, but they are a result of expensive services. It is irresponsible to clamor for lower taxes and yet demand services. There is no excuse for waste in spending tax money, or in padded budgets - of course. But the basic problem is to decide what we want - what we must afford - and then to seek other ways to lower costs in less crucial areas, and to find new means for additional revenue.

It does not help, in my opinion, to vilify the Board of Education. What we need is to find what, not who, is to blame and work together for a common goal with more light and less heat.

DeGaulle Is Not Popular Here

Americans have just about had it with General De Gaulle, judging from the results of the recent National Bank of North America Community Opinion Poll.

Asked, "If General De Gaulle continues to attack U.S. policies, do you believe our country should consider retaliatory action against France?" 69.8% of area voters answered "yes", 30.1% "no" and .1% were undecided.

Other figures released this week by Charles Barvels, manager of North America's Jericho office, show that area voters strongly favor the proposed bill which would create a Federal-State-Local trusteeship to preserve the marshes and shoreline of Long Island; 86.7% in favor, 13.2% against and .1% undecided.

On the question of whether John Lindsay is doing a good job as Mayor, 56.6% felt he is, 41.5% do not and 1.9% weren't saying.

Finally, 32.0% of the voters believe that mediation and collective bargaining procedures available to all public employees under the Taylor Act are adequate, 43.3% feel they are inadequate and 24.7% apparently weren't interested.
