A business man himself, Dudley made a special plea to business, professional, and industrial leaders of the state to take an active part in conducting the business of their own local schools by being candidates for the school boards. He urged the same business leaders to encourage their employees to familiarize themselves with the needs of the schools and the services which they offer so that they, too, might take more active leadership in their public schools.

Dudley concludes that "Good schools are good business for everyone. Quality merchandise isn't cheap, but in the long run it is more productive than a shoddy product."

We have been dismayed by those who advocate civil disobedience and violence as ways of building a better nation. We have been disheartened by the inability of law enforcement agencies in preventing, and their delay in controlling, mass violations of law. If we want to reverse the tide of crime and lawlessness, there is no escape from personal involvement. (There is no right way to do the wrong thing).

Kiwanians have been alert to the need of conservation of human and natural resources throughout our history, but we are not mastering the concern. Each year thousands and thousands of our citizens die needlessly from accidents. Each year the problems of air and water pollution are intensified, and the needs of man come closer to the available supply of minerals, land, and water resources. We must get personally involved in programs to prevent ACCIDENTS, Reduce waste of resources, and prevent pollution of our Air & Water.

To the Editor:  
After an intensified effort at communicating with the School Board via personal appearances, letters and phone calls, Fred Goldberg personally assured us that their attorney would cooperate with us toward filling a petition on "Transportation" that would be acceptable to the Board. Mr. Catalano, School Bd. Attorney, cooperated fully, and we are grateful to him.  
We then submitted this petition,

containing 400 over the required 200 signatures, to the District Clerk 3/20/68, all according to the instructions of THEIR attorney. All 600 persons petitioning the Board that the following question, in substance, be placed on the voting machine for the coming district vote:  
"Shall the expenditures...and...necessary taxes...be authorized by the voters, regardless of the actions of the Board of Edu-

cation, or the voters, on submissions...of the budget, as a whole, for the fiscal year 1968-69, to insure the voters substantially the same transportation for ALL their children as was provided the previous fiscal year 1967-68?"  
The intention of this question was obviously to allow the voters to safeguard transportation in addition to not unduly influencing their vote.

At the 4/3/68 School Bd meeting, despite the favorable opinion of their own attorney, 6 board members (Goldberg, Silver, Jackson, Nagle, Kereshen and Starbarger) voted against, while Mc Cormack, alone, voted in favor.

As of last year, this the fourth petition submitted to this Board by our organization - ALL HAVE BEEN DENIED. Under Sec. 10.2, Article of the policies (or by-laws) of our OWN HICKSVILLE SCHOOL BOARD, you will find, in part, the following:

"Upon petition signed by at least (200) ... qualified voters... a question of proposition submitted... in such petition... lawfully presented... Shall be placed upon the ballot..."

We have been patient in this struggle, forever hoping that our School Board would eventually respond dutifully and equitably to the needs of the people. The decision rendered by Commissioner Allen last year on a similar action by this School Bd., which we had appealed, was academic (vote already held), and was not based on the merits of the case. We then withdrew our other action in the Supreme Court, rather than risk disrupting the

routine of the last fall term. In the meantime, our membership continued to multiply in a direct ratio to the additional inequities perpetrated on the people by our present School Board. This year we are stronger, more experienced, and more determined to renovate our School Board so that it will, again, reasonably represent the community.

At this writing, with the element of time now on our side, dual appeals are being prepared by our attorney, Mason Hampton of Lynbrook, for filing with Com. Allen, and the Supreme Court. Also, a report of this latest unbecomable decision by the School Bd. which indicates a clear violation of THEIR OWN BY-LAWS, with other details, may be forwarded to other authorities for a proper disposition if warranted.

In addition, our organization will definitely present, endorse, and support a complete slate of candidates for the School Board - to be announced soon.

## Plan to Move Police Station

County Executive Eugene H. Nickerson has announced approval of plans prepared by the Department of Public Works for a new station house for the Second Precinct, Nassau County Police Dept. The estimated cost of the project is \$600,000. If approved by the Board of Supervisors, construction is expected to start later this spring and be completed in nine months.
