## 3 Special Questions On School Ballot

Voters of Hicksville School District in addition to voting upon a record breaking school budget, expenditures for the public library and the election of trustees to fill vacancies on the School and Library boards next month will also be asked to decide on three special questions.

One calls for expenditure of \$68,000 to implement the recommendations of the County Fire Marshal in regard to certain work on school district buildings, another is for expenditure of \$2,500 to purchase a school bus, and the third on permission to sell Nicholai St. School (and property) to an unnamed purchaser at an unnamed price.

The Board has not acted affirmatively upon a recent petition asking for a separate vote on a \$627,962 proposition for student transportation which the sponsors had hoped would possibly provide transportation for private and parochial students even in the event that the budget was defeated and the district went on "austerity". Under "austerity" such transportation is eliminated.

## 6 Candidates File For 3 Positions

Six candidates have filed nominating petitions for three vacancies on the Hicksville Board of Education.

They include James V. Yorks and Theresa Tisdell as candidates of the "League for Intelligent Financing of Education". They will be opposing John McManus and William J. O'Donnell, not formally joined as a team, and the TEACH candidates of incumbent Marvin Goldberg and Evelyn Silver, who are running together for re-election.

TEACH currently holds a voting majority on the Board. Mrs. Tisdell has been active in school district affairs and Yorks is a newcomer to the scene.

McManus held office on the Board for a time by appointment. Yorks and Tisdell claim thru Charles Fets, president of LIFFE, they are "the only candidates that have publicly declared them-

selves opposed to the just-completed school district budget.

Fets said his candidates "firmly believe that education is not the exclusive product of the schools, but a balanced and sensible blend of the home, school and community". (McManus statement)

John J. McManus Jr. has filed for the seat held by Evelyn Silver, whose term is expiring. He has resided at 63 Latham Lane for 14 1/2 years and has four children, two of whom were graduated from Hicksville Sr High school. The oldest is serving with the Air Force in Thailand and a second attends Nassau Community College. Another child is in Hicksville Junior High and the fourth at Our Lady of Mercy.

Graduated from Brooklyn Technical High School, he at-

## O'Donnell Cites Discord, Move to Oust Donald Abt

William J. O'Donnell of 116 Dartmouth Drive, Hicksville, a candidate for election to Hicksville School Board said this week:

"I recently suggested that trouble was brewing between a majority bloc on the Hicksville Board of Education and the Superintendent and other administrators."

"Further evidence of this discord was shown at the Board of Education meeting of April 10, when the subject of the Superintendent's contract again came up for discussion.

"During the several discussions Mr. Kerush mentioned that the Board has received petitions and letters from the professional staff at all levels supporting removal of Mr. Abt's contract. These letters obviously were in addition to those of the Hicksville Alumni Association and the P.T.A. Council, which also inquired as to the status of negotiations with Mr. Abt.

"Mr. McCormack moved to substitute his motion to negotiate Superintendent Abt's contract. Although Mr. McCormack's motion was seconded, it was agreed to hold the vote until Mrs. Silver arrived. When she did arrive, the motion was defeated by the same 4-3 combination that has plagued the district for two years. Again Goldberg, Silver, Kerush and Sternberger still persisted and refused to discuss the Superintendent's contract.

"Mr. Goldberg finally stated that he had doubts about renewing Superintendent Abt's contract. This is the first time he said it publicly - or was it a Freudian slip? He continued by saying that negotiations with the Superintendent will take place in June of 1968. That's an interesting choice of dates. It is one month after the May election for Board candidates. Both Mr. Goldberg and Mrs. Silver are asking to be re-elected to the Board. They have the support of TEACH. What is interesting is that after working three years with the Superintendent, he can't come to a decision on the Superintendent until June. It would appear that Mr. Goldberg and Mrs. Silver prefer to

be re-elected before they decide not to rehire the Superintendent. Are other administrators also on their lists after election? O'Donnell asked.

"Mr. Jackson suggested to the Board that since the four votes of Goldberg, Silver, Kerush and Sternberger did not support negotiating to continue Mr. Abt as Superintendent, the Board should then advertise for a replacement. He moved the motion. The motion was defeated 7-6. Mr. Jackson indicated he had made his point. I suspect that point is the same as mine. Evidently the four do not have the courage to make a decision before the election.

"I am a candidate for the seat on the Board now occupied

Abt which has been repeatedly tabled at recent meetings. Advocates of Abt, popular and well-known administrator of the Hicksville school system, charge that board majority is using delaying tactics, waiting until after the annual meeting and trustee elections in May.

In my role as secretary, it has come to my attention that various professional and non-professional groups have written letters of endorsement on the behalf of Mr. Donald F. Abt, urging you to consider his outstanding qualities as administrator and educator when voting upon his employment contract. On these two qualities, alone, I do not feel proud to add my name to the long list of supporters for his continuance as Superintendent of this school district.

## About Experience

To the Editors:

A recent TEACH flyer supporting Marvin Goldberg and Mrs. Evelyn Silver stresses their experience on the Hicksville Board of Education. This experience amounts to five years between them and they believe it is significant. Why do they ignore the Superintendent's 16 years of successful experience in Hicksville? For that matter it seems the Superintendent's experience is almost twice that of all the experience of the majority bloc of the Board that seemingly is trying to replace him. I would also submit that if experience is so important, my 24 years as an active officer of P.T.A. plus fifty (50) years of Hicksville education accumulated by my children would tend to make Mr. Goldberg's and Mrs. Silver's experience look insignificant by comparison.

Both Mr. Goldberg and Mrs. Silver state that they helped formulate a merit system for teachers. Evidently until they arrived on the scene our personnel were not meritorious. Was this same meritorious system of Mr. Goldberg and Mrs. Silver responsible for the loss of seven of our ad-

ministrators last year? Was it this same system that was used last May by the Board to release Mr. Curran, our former social studies supervisor? Unfortunately, this majority bloc sacrificed Mr. Curran to save face, regardless of the merits of his case. The social studies supervisor not only had the recommendation of the Superintendent but also the endorsement and recommendation of Dr. Erlig Hunt and other staff members of Columbia University. Dr. Hunt, by the way, wrote the social studies section of the Flanagan Report and also serviced this district as a consultant. What is this mysterious competence Mr. Goldberg and Mrs. Silver claim, that it not only is superior in their opinion to our own administrators, but university professors as well?

Let us examine what Mr. Goldberg and Mrs. Silver indicate in their TEACH flyer needs to be done. First they claim that they wish to eliminate the double threat of irrefragable budget chopping and extremism in school affairs. Apparently if you don't agree with Mr. Goldberg and Mrs. Silver you must be an extremist. Do they plan a purge of all who disagree by eliminating them?

They also claim that they wish to involve the professional staff in defining educational goals. Our recollection is that both Mr. Goldberg and Mrs. Silver did just that during 1966-67. They held large meetings with supervisors, principals and central administrators, and heard reports from these groups as they explained their budgetary needs to implement the Flanagan Report. The Goldberg-Silver bloc encouraged these people to put their needs in the 1967-68 budget. The staff did this enthusiastically. When the budget containing these needs was presented to the same Board, it showed an increase of over one million dollars. But after this staff involvement, what did the Goldberg-Silver majority bloc do with it? They "chopped it irresponsibly" by not really examining the requests intelligently. They went even further by cutting back funds from the regular budget. We don't call this proper staff involvement, we call it staff demoralization.

Mr. Goldberg, Mrs. Silver and TEACH also claim that we need to implement professional surveys (Flanagan Report, State Survey, Booz, Allen Report). We have read and are familiar with the Flanagan and Booz, Allen Reports. However, although we were aware of the State Survey having been conducted, we were not aware of its receipt. Surely Mr. Goldberg and Mrs. Silver would not recommend implementing something not received therefor, we must conclude that a report has been received from the State. Why isn't it available to all the people? Why can't we as candidates read it? Or is it only available to Mr. Goldberg, Mrs. Silver and TEACH?

The TEACH bloc of Mr. Goldberg and Mrs. Silver then states we must "consider the need of all children, not prestige programs for a privileged few." Evidently the privileged few are not children in the eyes of the Goldberg-Silver bloc since they are not included among all children. It is a shame that Mr. Goldberg's narrow interest bloc doesn't share the district's concern for

the few that are emotionally disturbed, physically handicapped, brain injured, hard of hearing, college bound, commercially bound, and vocationally bound. We don't believe such programs are meant to find prestige but instituted to help children. How can Mr. Goldberg and Mrs. Silver callously call them a privileged few?

Mr. Goldberg and Mrs. Silver now want to increase aid to decrease the tax burden on the homeowner -- or so they say. The school tax increase next year is close to \$2 per hundred dollars of assessed valuation. Is this what Mr. Goldberg, Mrs. Silver and TEACH mean by decreasing our burden as homeowners? Either they never before have been sincerely interested in reducing the taxpayer's burden, or they have been failures during the last five years on the Board. An increase of \$120 for school taxes next year is not indicative of their concern, or, in my opinion, their sincerity.

Finally, the flyer of Mr. Goldberg, Mrs. Silver and TEACH capitalizes one of their "conclusions" -- "School Board Members Are Not There to Rubber Stamp Administration..." Does this statement imply that "rubber stamping" of administration will be eliminated, while Mr. Goldberg, Mrs. Silver and Mr. Kersten continue to rubber stamp the vested interest group supporting them?

Let's get back to educating our children. We ask that you support our candidacy by voting on May 8th and returning, confidence, and progress to our Hicksville schools.

## Consulting Firm Examines Library

In 1967 the Board of Trustees of Hicksville Public Library engaged Rothines Associates, a library consulting firm, to examine the library structure, fiscal policy and management, work methods and organization and standards of library services in comparison with national standards published by the American Library Association. The extent to which the library used the Nassau Library System and other outside services was also a subject of the report. The report has been completed and copies are available for inspection at the public library. Taxpayers are invited to read it and comments are welcome.

A number of conclusions and recommendations were presented to the Library Board. While library services, management and staff were described as "capable and excellent," the normal development of the library was found to have been impeded through lack of sufficient funds for several years. Personnel and book budget provisions were declared insufficient to continue serving the needs of a relatively well educated and sophisticated community at a high level. Some of the basic services such as the popular reading collections and a few non-fiction areas including sports and hobbies need to be augmented immediately since priority had been given to sustain the reference collection in a time of stringency.

Accordingly, it was recommended that the library's book budget must be substantially increased to meet the demands for new materials. A book budget of \$70,000, representing an increase of \$27,000 was advised. Personnel practices were characterized as essentially strong with some structural changes suggested. A shortage of personnel, particularly in the area of public services, was noted and it was recommended that one clerk and two full-time professional positions be added to the staff.

The report stated that a public relations program emphasizing the value of the library to the community should be considered. It indicated that the

current material being distributed was, due to lack of funds, insufficient in quantity. The Board directed the administration to institute a policy of systematic general mailings giving information on the role of the library in the community and emphasizing the material and services offered but not generally known.

The Director and Library Board have taken cognizance of the Rothine Associates report in the proposed budget for 1968-1969 and while considerable study must still be made and programs developed, some of the basic library problems were critical enough that immediate action is necessary. Accordingly, requests are being made in the budget for three new staff members, \$17,000 increase in books and an additional amount for public relations. Although the requests made are still below the survey's recommendations, the Board felt that this must be done as a minimum effort in 1968-69.

One of the finest relationships in the world is about to go "off".

The home town butcher has long been the housewife's friend, confidante and cooking instructor. In addition to purveying prime ribs or beef for stew, as the budget allows. But also, he is destined to follow the cracker-barrel grocer; the village smithy; and the little shoemaker, into oblivion.

My prediction is based on one of the best authorities--Tom Braun whose family have been butchers in Hicksville since 1857 when his grandfather, William Braun was born here.

His father, Fred Braun was born in Hicksville too in 1894 and they lived in a house located at the corner of Bethpage and Woodbury Roads.

William Braun and his brother-in-law, Henry Stolz were partners in a meat market at 102 Broadway in a building owned by the Stolz family. Then, each with budding families and responsibilities, separated and William Braun opened his butcher shop at its present site at 77 Broadway in 1896. It subsequently passed into the hands of his sons, Fred Braun and William Braun, Jr.

Tom Braun, the present owner, aside from being a fine gentleman and good business man, is a veritable fountain of historic information about this town. Most people think of Long Island as "potato country". But back in the early 1900's the Heinz pickle factory was located here as was the McGuire plant on Duffy Avenue. About 1920 there was a "pickle crop blight" and the processing plants moved away; closer to another source of supply.

Tom has a collection of antique butcher implements which every so often he displays at the store. There is an old map of Hicksville on the wall and old photographs. Some of the photos were reproduced recently from glass negative plates unearthed in old buildings demolished in the name of progress.

One of his finest possessions is the sleigh the family used to drive to the wholesale markets in Jamaica and New York back in the days when snowstorms made that kind of conveyance the only way to get where you had to get in order to keep Hicksville housewives supplied with fresh meat and poultry.

Tom has five children, two of whom are boys, ages 8 and 9. At this point he doesn't believe his spaceminded youngsters will find anything romantic or adventurous in the butchering business. Comes the day when Tom decides to retire, the Braun Market will fade into the past and I hope that day does not arrive until my needs for his products and services, has past, too.

Tom Braun is a friendly, cooperative, articulate gentleman and his store is a welcome change from the regimented meat departments of the super-markets which are slowly putting his type of store into the fond-memory category.

My stop at Braun's market on Saturday morning is not a shopping chore. The pace is leisurely, the percolator is filled with coffee and an array of buns and Danish sweet rolls tempt the "I'm dieting" housewife.

Imagine, some young home-makers have never seen a butcher smile! Stop in at Braun's. You'll get what you pay for and more--friendliness, nostalgia and people who really take a moment to "pass the time of day". All this; and real sawdust on the floor!...

**Patrons Can Halt Offensive Mail**

Mail patrons offended by pandering advertisements can now take steps to curb such mail. Hicksville Postmaster Ralph G. Cascardo said this week in announcing plans for administering a new law which gives each family the right to decide that an ad is "erotically arousing or sexually provocative". When an advertisement sent through the mails is offensive on these grounds, a postal patron can now ask the post office to direct the mailer to send no more mail to him and to remove immediately the patron's name from all mailing lists he owns, controls or rents.

To assist patrons, the Post Office Department has published a brief pamphlet - "How You Can Curb Pandering Advertisements" - which is now available at the Hicksville, Plainview, Old Bethpage post offices. In addition to explaining how the law works, the pocket-size leaflet contains a form letter one can use when sending his complaint to the post office.

Postmaster Cascardo said: "This new law should give some protection to American families offended by advertisements they believe to be morally harmful, particularly to their children."

AMENDMENTS TO THE ORDINANCE RELATING TO EXCAVATION & REMOVAL OF TOPSOIL, SAND, GRAVEL & OTHER EARTHEN MATERIALS  
RESOLVED, that the Ordinance Relating to Excavation & Removal of Topsoil, Sand, Gravel & Other Earthen Materials, adopted October 13, 1958 and amended December 26, 1961, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

# LEGAL NOTICE

Amend Section 2 - Exceptions, Subdivisions D & F to read as follows:

(G) The moving of trees, topsoil or other earth, sand or gravel from one part to another of the same premises where necessary to farming, landscaping or to the construction of a building for which a building permit has been obtained providing however, that less than ten percent (10%) of the total acreage is disturbed. In the event, the removal, that such moving shall result in or provide for the establishment of new reduced grades or elevation, or affect an area of the subject premises, in either event, to the extent of ten percent (10%) or more of the total acreage of such plot, there must then be compliance with all of the provisions contained in this ordinance. It shall be the sole responsibility of the respective owners of property to provide ample proof which shall be acceptable to the Town Board proving conclusively that the removal of trees, topsoil or other earth, sand, gravel or other materials from the area of the property to be utilized for the construction of a building or for farming or landscaping, does not comprise ten percent (10%) or more of the total acreage of such property and any and all violators of this Section of the ordinance shall be dealt with according to law as specified in Sections 9 and 10 of this ordinance.

(O) Removal of trees, topsoil, or other earth necessary for the actual business of operating a nursery, farm, or sod farm, providing however, that this exception shall not apply to the construction or preparation of land to establish the business of a nursery, farm, or sod farm which requires the disturbance or removal of trees, topsoil, or other earth, sand, gravel, or other materials from said premises in terms of area, grade or elevation if such disturbance affects ten percent (10%) or more of the area of the subject premises. In the event, therefore, that such disturbance or removal shall result in or provide for the establishment of new reduced grades or elevation or affect the area of the subject premises, in either event, to the extent of ten percent (10%) or more of the total acreage of such plot, there must then be compliance with all of the provisions contained in this ordinance. It shall be the sole responsibility of the respective owners of property to provide ample proof which shall be acceptable to the Town Board proving conclusively that the removal of trees, topsoil or other earth, sand, gravel or other materials from the area of the property to be utilized for the construction of a building or for farming or landscaping, does not comprise ten percent (10%) or more of the total acreage of such property and any and all violators of this Section of the ordinance shall be dealt with according to law as specified in Sections 9 and 10 of this ordinance.
