On the 25th of May the march will assemble at Marie, Nicholas and Cherry Streets, off Jerusalem Ave. Promptly at 1 o'clock the march will go south on Jerusalem to Old Country Rd., east to Park Ave., North to east Marie St. and west to Marie St. to the firehouse for the grand finale at the main firehouse where a great block party will take place.

The motorcade will cover more territory than the foot parade starting from the parking field east of the firehouse on Marie St., roll east on Heltz Pl. to Bay Ave., north on Bay to East John St., west on John to Myers Ave., north to Nevada St., east to Bethpage Rd., south

to Woodbury Rd. to Cliff Drive, south to Plainview Rd., to New South Rd. to Mineola Ave., west to Bway, Bway to Farm Lane to Lee Ave., South to Dean St. to Jerusalem Ave., south to Spindle Rd. west to Newbridge Rd. to Levittown Pkwy, west and north to Old Country Rd. west to Charlotte, north to Duffy Ave., east to Newbridge Rd., south to Marie St., Nicholas St. and Cherry St. to join marching contingents.

Organizations are being invited to have floats in the motorcade and to register their intentions with the committee.

Hicksville Board of Ed. To Resubmit Budget

At a special meeting held Wednesday evening in the Administration Building, the Board of Education of Hicksville School District 17, accepted with regret the resignations of its former president Marvin Goldberg and member Evelyn Silver, who were defeated in last week's election. The Board then appointed John McManus and William O'Donnell to take the places vacated by the Goldberg-Silver resignations, for the "lame-duck" session of May and June, until the annual reorganization meeting which takes place each year during the first week in July. At that time the new terms won by both McManus and O'Donnell by resounding majorities, will begin. Vice-president Sternberger conducted last night's meeting.

The Board of Education set a meeting for Thursday evening, May 23rd, in the High School cafeteria, "to set the format of the budget," which they voted to resubmit for another vote with the following schedule: June 12

Budget hearing at Hicksville High School.

June 22nd Additional registration

June 25th Vote on the budget. Further details will be made public as they are set up.

The Board voted to distribute students as follows:

1. That Lee send 5 thirdgrades to Dutch; Park sends 2 third grades to Dutch; Old Country sends 2 third grades to Willet.

2. The Burns Avenue section in Willet will return to Burns.

3. Kindergartens go on a 2 hour sessions.

This plan will provide the minimum number of students being transferred.

This plan conforms with the recommendations, administration, of the principals, supervisors and teachers association.

A request by the Hicksville Classroom Teachers Association that the Board approve the closing of schools on Friday, May 24th was denied.

Dinner Set For May 23

Nassau County Republican Chairman Joseph M. Margiotta announced today that Perry B. Duryea, the State Assembly's Minority Leader, would be the featured speaker at the county GOP Committee's \$100-a-plate dinner on May 23.

Margiotta noted that Duryea is being prominently mentioned in Republican circles as a future candidate for governor. "Perry Duryea is a leader of men and has great courage," said Margiotta. "He has shown the type of ability which would make him a serious contender for consideration as a candidate for governor in the future. He has demonstrated outstanding leadership ability as Minority Leader."

Margiotta said that state Republicans are "very hopeful" of recapturing control of the Assembly this year and added that this would mean that Duryea would become Speaker. "He has the unanimous support of the Republican members of the Assembly," said Margiotta, an assemblyman from Uniondale and leader of the Nassau legislative delegation in Albany.

Duryea, 47, is from Montauk and has represented the First Assembly District at the eastern tip of Long Island since 1960. He has been minority leader of the Assembly since 1968. He was Vice President of the State Constitutional Convention in 1967. He is also President of the Long Island State Park Commission, the Bethpage State Park Commission and the Jones Beach State Parkway Authority. He is a member of the New York State Republican Committee and an Executive Member of the Suffolk County Republican Committee. A licensed pilot and avid flier, Duryea usually flies his own plane to and from Albany and also to his speaking engagements. A graduate of Colgate University, he holds an honorary doctorate from Adelphi University. He is married and has two children.

Margiotta said that the dinner would be held at the Garden City Hotel on May 23 at 7:30 P.M. Lieutenant Governor Malcolm Wilson has announced that he will attend the dinner. Dinner Chairman Salvatore Milone has predicted a record turnout for the event.

Four members of Jericho High School's team of mathletes were among the students honored at the Nassau County Interscholastic Mathematics League's 13th Annual Awards Presentation. The event was held at MacArthur High School, Levittown, the evening of May 8th.

Twelfth grader Bruce Steiner received the Gold Pin which is awarded contestants who score 12 or more points. He also received awards for placing number four in Nassau County and being number one on the Jericho team.

Eleventh grader Ronald Irving earned the Silver Pin which is given contestants who score 6-11 points.

Eleventh grader Ira Goldman and tenth grader Martin Schell both qualified for the Felt Emblem that is awarded for scoring 3-5 points.

Alan H. Arnold, teacher of string instruments in the Jericho Public Schools, has been awarded a summer scholarship for study at the Performance Institute of the

Oberlin College Conservatory of Music. He is one of approximately 200 candidates selected from several thousand applicants for the scholarship.

The Jericho High School P.T.A. Youth Employment Service is now registering students for work during the approaching vacation season. The program, which is in its second year, placed more than 50 students in jobs last summer.

Apathy Defeats Jericho Budget

With less than 1600 out of approximately 7000 eligible voters in the Jericho School District exercising their rights, the School Budget was voted down 827 to 766. Mr. William Mayhew was re-elected to the School Board with 829 votes to Mrs. Charlotte Cashlon's 754. In an uncontested seat for the Library Board, Mrs. Florence Irving was re-elected with 1192 votes.

The defeat of the budget leaves three alternatives: it can be re-submitted to the voters unchanged; it can be altered and re-submitted; or an Austerity Budget can be adopted by the Board, which would eliminate textbooks, school supplies, lunches and sale of milk, interscholastic sports, after-school activities, the summer recreation program, and transportation for children living less than two miles from their school.

At a special meeting of the Board of Education held on May 9, 1968, the Board discussed the alternatives at length, and decided to re-submit the school budget in the amount of \$6,178,506, since they did not feel that they could make any further cuts without seriously impairing the educational program of our children. The date for the re-vote has been set for June 12, 1968, between the hours of 2 PM and 10 PM.

Jericho Library To Begin Construction

The Jericho Library Board voted on May 5th to proceed with construction of the Library's permanent building. The Board made this decision after final notification from Albany confirmed that the cut-back in Federal funds would deny Jericho its expected Grant.

Several factors led to the Board's decision. First, construction costs have risen this past year at a rate of 8% rather than the normal 3 or 5%. Any further delay in building will wipe out existing estimates which are based on a normal two year period. Second, the Jericho Library has shown the most rapid growth in circulation of all the libraries in Nassau. Present temporary space, already strained to the utmost, cannot possibly meet the huge demands of the community. Further, the Library is utilizing four separate locations to give its various programs and services to the community.

Offsetting the loss of Federal funds are other positive factors. The recent addition of more taxable property to our District has resulted in a lowered Library tax rate, from 12¢ to 11.3 cents. The tax cost of the Bond Issue for the new building has been similarly lowered, from 6 cents to 5.7 cents. Also, the Library Board plans to pursue outside funds as follows: An application will be sent to Albany for State funds which are occasionally allocated to Library districts. This can be done while a building is in progress, whereas we could not have applied for and received Federal funds if construction had begun. And, the Library Board has joined with the other Districts that have been denied funds in petitioning to receive Federal funds retroactively should they once again be made available.

It is hoped that the Jericho Library will be in its permanent home on Merry Lane by the fall of 1969.

The parking stickers, which are sold annually to about 25,000 residents, are good for all of the town's beaches.

Town beaches will open officially on May 30. The parking stickers are issued by the gate attendants at the various beaches upon presentation of proof of residency.
