Marino To Run For State Senate

Nassau Republican Chairman Joseph M. Margiotta this week announced that the Republican Executive Committee from the Third Senatorial District has designated Ralph J. Marino as the candidate for the State Senate seat currently held by Henry M. Curran. Curran announced that he would not be running for re-election. Marino, a 40-year-old attorney from East Norwich, is the majority leader of the Oyster Bay Town Board.

Margiotta praised Marino as a "man who knows the district and its problems from top to bottom. He is well known to the voters of the 3rd Senatorial District and we expect him to be a big winner and worthy successor to Senator Curran," Margiotta said.

Marino's name will now be submitted to the GOP's committee on vacancies for the Third Senatorial District, which must file an affidavit with the Sec-

retary of State by May 21st replacing Curran on the ballot with Marino.

In a joint statement the three Assemblymen from the district, Joseph Reilly, Martin Ginsberg and Francis McCloskey said, "we unite in supporting Ralph J. Marino, for his experience in government, knowledge of the district and proven vote getting ability make him the strongest possible Republican candidate. He will win big and he will serve well." Reilly and Ginsberg added that they did not seek the nomination for they are confident of the Republicans taking control of the Assembly this Fall, and their seniority in that house will put them in a position to better serve their constituents. McCloskey does not reside in the 3rd S.D.

Marino was elected to the Oyster Bay Town Board in 1965. In 1967 he narrowly lost in his campaign to unseat Democrat supervisor Michael Petito. He was named Board Majority leader in September 1967. An Army veteran, he is a graduate of Syracuse University and Fordham Law School. He is married to the former Ethel Bernstein and they reside with their three children, Judy 12, Jimmy 10, and Bobby 3, at 29 Gilbert Court, East Norwich.



New Budget Vote Set For June 26

Anticipate Lower Tax Rate

The Hicksville Board of Education has set June 26 as a tentative date for a second budget vote.

The board decided at a special meeting May 15th to definitely hold another budget vote, although nothing has been determined yet on what will be submitted. There will be an open board meeting Thursday, May 23, at 9 p.m. in

the senior high school cafeteria to determine what changes, if any, will be made in the \$17,-310,000 budget which was defeated.

Three recent developments have made the tax rate picture a little clearer. At the time of the first budget vote, the board could only present a wide range of tax rate estimates because of the unsettled state aid issue in Albany.

Now that the Legislature has

passed the \$760 state aid ceiling, the tax increase based on a \$17,310,000 budget can be estimated at \$1.96 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

In addition, the Legislature passed a high tax, low wealth "hardship" bill which will give Hicksville an added \$132,000 in aid. Combined with the \$125,000 to be realized from the sale of the Nicholas Street School, the \$1.96 can be decreased by 25.7 cents.

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
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Letter To The Editor

the difficulties in coming to my decision to decline the nomination for this office for the next ensuing election . . . and it is almost impossible to put into words the conflicts of conscience that mandate my conclusion. An individual's prime obligation in life is of necessity his family. I have been fortunate in having four children who run a wide gamut of ages . . . a son in the Navy Air Force . . . a son soon to enter the University of Miami and two younger ones at home. If I am to fulfill my obligation as a parent I will only find the time to do so by

detracting to a great extent from my responsibilities as a legislator, this would be an injustice to the people who have elected me."

"I will be forever grateful for the honor that I have enjoyed for the past eight years. . . . I have tried to do my best and hope that I will leave behind me some record, no matter how small, of accomplishment."

"My term of office will expire on December 31st of this year. I will continue to serve in this office until that time and I will continue to devote my energies to the end in the same fashion as I have done before."

"Finally, I wish to state that no man, once having tasted the bitter and the sweet of public office ever really leaves public life, nor does he lose interest

the welfare of the people he has served. For this reason, I will continue to maintain my interest in the affairs of state and I am prepared to lend my efforts, wherever and whenever I can, to achieve the nomination and election to the presidency of our Governor Nelson A. In addition to other requirements that might be imposed by the Town Board each application for change of zone, special use permit, or modification of restrictive covenants or modifications of conditions imposed by resolution resulting from a public hearing submitted to the Town Board, or to the Board of Appeals in the case of variances and other special uses, shall include an affidavit to be executed by all owners of record, contract vendees, lessors and lessees, contract lessors and contract lessees, holders of any interest and contract holders of any interest except as otherwise provided in sub-section III below. Said affidavit shall set forth the following:

a) If the affiant is an individual he shall set forth his name, residence and age.

b) If the affiant is a partnership joint venture or other business entity, except a corporation, it shall set forth:

1. name and address of the business entity or partnership.
2. date established or created
3. where created or established
4. names and residences of all parties in interest showing the nature and extent of the interest.

c) If the affiant is a corporation it shall set forth the following:

1. name and business address of the corporation
2. method of incorporation
3. name and residence of each officer, director and shareholder as of the date of filing of application.
4. name and address of all persons to whom corporate stock has been pledged and with whom any agreement has been made to pledge the said stock.

d) All affiants shall set forth the name and address of all persons, individuals, partnerships and/or corporation, who are the holders of any instrument creating an encumbrance upon the property which is the subject of the application and shall also state the nature of such encumbrance.

e) All affiants shall state to the best of his knowledge that no person mentioned in his affidavit is a town officer or employer, or is related to a town officer or employee, or, if such not be the case, the affiant shall state the exceptions in full detail.

11. In the event that there is any change in any matter set forth on any affidavit submitted hereunder prior to the time a certificate of occupancy is granted to the subject premises, the affiant affected by such change shall file a supplemental affidavit within 48 hours after such change has occurred giving the full details thereof. The new party introduced by said change, if any, shall, within 48 hours after such change has occurred also file an affidavit in compliance with the requirements of this sub-section and shall thereafter be subject to all the requirements set forth in this sub-section.

111. Corporations listed in a stock exchange or sold over the counter under regulation of the Securities and Exchange Commission, lending institutions licensed or franchised by the State of New York, and public corporations are excluded from the provisions of this Section.

All persons interested shall have an opportunity to be heard upon the said proposed ordinance amendment at the time and place aforesaid.

The existing ordinance is on file in the Office of the Town Clerk and may be examined during regular business hours by any or all interested persons.
