"NOTICE IS HEREBY ALSO GIVEN that a copy of the text of each and every resolution and proposition to be voted upon and of the detailed statement in writing of the estimated expenditures which will be required for the ensuing 1968-69 school year for school purposes, specifying the several purposes and the amount for each, which said resolution and propositions and statement will be voted upon on Wednesday, June 26, 1968 may be obtained by any taxpayer in the District at the office of the Principal in each schoolhouse in the District in which school is maintained, during the hours from 9 AM to 4

PM (prevailing time) on each day other than Saturday, Sunday, or holidays during the seven (7) days preceding June 26, 1968."

Whether or not you agree with us that sensible spending for education is a long-term investment in the future to be returned at a later date to all in the form of a higher standard of living. Whether or not you agree with us that we are all NOW reaping the benefits of other, prior educational programs paid for by the taxpayers of that day. We urge you to register, if you have not already done so (details in the school district legal notice) and vote!! To say the least it's your duty as an American.

Carmina Burana To Be Presented

On Friday, June 7, at 8:30 P.M. in the auditorium of the Holy Trinity Diocesan High School on Newbridge Road in Hicksville, the Recreation Department of Hicksville will present the combined forces of the Hicksville Community Symphony Orchestra, the Hicksville Community Chorus, the Hicksville Senior High School Chorus, members of the Hicksville Junior High School Eighth Grade Boys Chorus and soloists Stephanie Katz, soprano, Henry Niemann, tenor and William Golee, baritone in Carl Orff's Carmina Burana. This is a contemporary work using Latin and German poems and songs from a thirteenth century collection.

As an added feature on the same program, Stuart McDonald, an outstanding young violinist, will play the Saint-Saens Introduction and Rondo Capriccioso

with the orchestra. Also, the brass and percussion players from the orchestra will perform Fanfare for the Common Man by Aaron Copland. The entire program will be under the direction of Charles F. Gouse.

These two community groups were organized in 1962 under their present directors Charles F. Gouse and William Golee. Their memberships consist of former professional musicians, teachers, doctors, lawyers, engineers, housewives and many others from divergent backgrounds. In addition to providing a source of enjoyment and cultural benefit to the community, the orchestra and chorus offer valuable experience for local high school and college students contemplating careers in music.

"Golden School Days" At Hicksville Library

The Hicksville Public Library is fortunate in having a highly interesting display for the next three weeks, called "3 R's in Retrospect." An Exhibit On The Common School, on loan from the Nassau County Historical Museum.

These are artifacts from the "Common" or elementary school of the early and mid-eighteenth century.

It is very interesting to see the difference in teaching methods, even subjects. Geography is now called social studies, and encompasses more than the knowledge of borders, capital cities, population and products. In "Monteith's Object Lessons in Geography and Map Drawing," a teacher's handbook on display, the outline of the continents is compared to the outlines of animals. For instance, North America is a panther, South America is a head of a dog, Africa is an eagle, Europe is a spaniel and Asia a bear. Australia is a bat and New Guinea is of all things, a guinea hen.

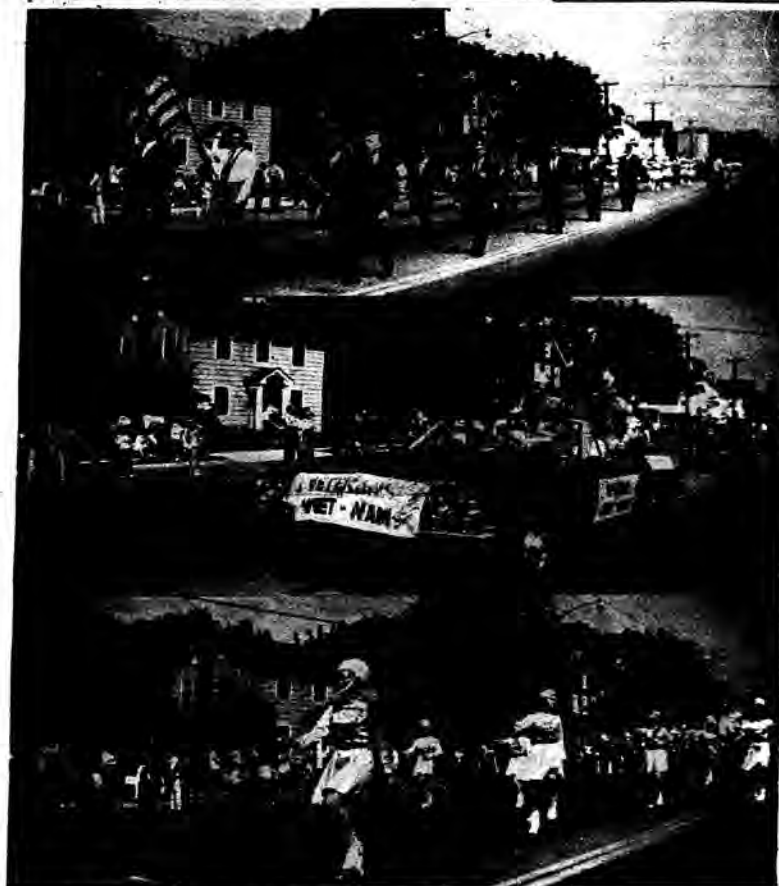
Pennmanship was very important and each child had a book of exercises he had to do and

do perfectly in his copybook.

The arithmetic student didn't learn "New Math" but he did have to learn shillings, pounds and what is called "Federal Money" which our own dollar system was called.

Part of the display is devoted to the teacher. An old engraving shows the young teacher being interviewed by the School Trustees, a frightening experience you realize looking at her. She knows she "has a good moral character," is a good speller, is a distinct and accurate reader, writes a good and plain hand, but can she make the pens? Each teacher had a sharp pen knife to cut quills for pens. That was a very important requirement. The teacher who was hired was fortunate as she earned the sum of \$10 per week as we see by a wage receipt, a good wage for those days.

This display is a traveling exhibit compiled through the cooperative efforts of Mrs. Betty Rice and Mrs. Elsie Leiber of the Nassau Library System, and the Nassau County Historical Museum of Salisbury Park.

Emergency Ambulance Service In Jericho Slated For Expansion

A few months ago, the B.C.A. Board of Directors discussed the possibilities of securing a second ambulance for our area. In addition, the question arose as to the effectiveness of the emergency ambulance service if and when the 2nd Police Precinct moved from its present location on Broadway to a new site out of the immediate vicinity.

The Health, Sanitation and Safety Committee, after numerous telephone calls and conversations with 2nd Precinct personnel and Mineola headquarters personnel, are now able to announce very satisfactory results.

Inspector Schuckman, the head of the Emergency Service Bureau in Mineola, revealed the following expansion program in a discussion with the writer.

In addition to the static ambulance now garaged at the 2nd Precinct, a second ambulance is going to be outfitted and should be in service in Jericho and its environs well before the end of this year. This second ambulance will operate out in the street, the same as a patrol car, monitoring radio calls but specifically for the purpose of responding to emergency calls for an ambulance.

Then, some time in 1969 (as it will come under next year's budget) there is to be a third ambulance operating out of the 2nd Precinct. This will be a sergeant's supervisory car, outfitted as an ambulance. It will contain the following equipment: full first aid; oxygen therapy unit (resuscitation); trundle stretcher; splints; doctor's kit containing drugs, etc.

Inspector Schuckman further revealed that there are eight static ambulances now in the Nassau County system -- one in each police precinct. Six new ambulances are coming through and, as mentioned above, the 2nd Precinct has been assigned one of these new machines. The Emergency Service Bureau recognizes that the rapid growth of the Jericho area these past few years makes it mandatory to have additional ambulance service.

All ambulances in the system are operated by police headquarters personnel. Therefore, when the 2nd Precinct moves to a new location, the new geographical location will not influence or change the operation of the emergency ambulance service.
