Charles Wagner Post Selects S.J. Grilli As Boys State Candidate

Stephen J. Grilli, a junior of Hicksville High School has been chosen by Charles Wagner Post #421 The American Legion as a candidate to Boys State to be held at State University of New York at Morrisville from June 23rd to 29th. Boys State is a program of education in operation, a government in which each boy participates in the practical functioning of local, county and state government. Here boys become acquainted with the rights and privileges of a citizen and they have instilled in them a deep sense of the duties and obligations which citizenship entails.

Stephens first contact with The American Legion came when he graduated from Burns Ave. School and was selected as a recipient of The American Legions School Award. This award is made "in recognition of the possession of those high qualities of Courage, Honor, Leadership, Patriotism Scholarship and Service which are necessary to the preservation and protection of the fundamental institutions of our government and the advancement of society."

Stephen has compiled a composite average of 92% in accelerated programs in mathematics, history, science and foreign language. On May 27th he was inducted into the National Honor Society. He is active on the Student council and most recently served on a special committee

First Issue Five Dollar Bill On Display At L.I. Nat'l

A historic first issue five dollar bill, bearing the number "1" and dated October 8, 1917, will be on special display in the Main office in Hicksville, of the Long Island National Bank. It was announced today by William E. Koutensky, president.

This bill bearing the likeness of Benjamin Harrison was issued by the Long Island National Bank at a time when the Federal Government permitted national banks to issue national currency in local areas. Money so issued by the banks was secured by U. S. Bonds deposited by the banks with the Treasurer of the United States.

This bill, the first one issued, was presented to Mr. Koutensky by Mr. Charles Stoll of Dix Hill, Huntington, in memory of his daughter, Ruth L. Stoll Short. The number 1 five dollar bill was given her in 1919 as a gift by the then President of the bank. It was preserved by her as a memento, during the remainder of her life.

Mr. Stoll, a well-known Hicksville attorney and noted champion of water conservation for Long Island, was a director and organizer of the Long Island Na-

national Bank when it was established in 1917. President Koutensky, who has spent his entire career developing the bank, has invited the

public to visit the display. He said that a free gift will be given to any one who can identify the signature of the president or cashier of the bank on the bill.

The 5% Vote

On May 8 our community defeated both the proposed school budget and the library budget. Our estimated tax increase for each \$100 of assessed value was to be \$1.96 for the school tax and for the library it was to be an increase of 5¢ per hundred.

The recent brochures indicate that another vote is scheduled for the school and library budgets on June 26 between 10 A.M. and 10 P.M. in the local schools. The school budget of \$17,310,000 has been reduced by \$50,000 in this manner:

This reduction of \$50,000 and the additional revenues from the sale of Nicholas Street School and the high tax and bills will reduce our proposed school tax increase by 30¢. The increase now before us is \$1.66 per hundred.

THE HERALD noted with interest the statement in the letter in the school district's new brochure. It indicated that the people really only express their vote on 5% of the total budget. The pie graph on the back of the same brochure reveals this same idea more dramatically. The contingent expenses (required expenses as determined by the Board of Education to provide an educational program, protect its property and maintain the health and safety of children) do absorb 95% of the budget. These contingent expenses indicate that 77% of the costs are for salaries and fringe benefits to all our employees. The annual payments on the principal and interest are long range commitments. These are contingent expenses. They amount to 7% of the budget. The cost for light, fuel, water, telephone, cleaning and other contractual items add an additional 8% and are also contingent expenses. Tuition, representing the last contingent expenses, in the proposed budget, amounts to 3%.

All the contingent expenses are within the authority of the Board of Education in order that the Board may meet its responsibilities. The non-contingent items may not be purchases by the Board. Only you the people can approve the purchase of these items and services. The same graph reveals that these items represent 5% of the budget. But what are the items that we control directly? The brochure's letter from the Board of Education spells them out for us. They are textbooks for elementary children, library books for all school libraries, instructional supplies and equipment. We are deciding in this 5% vote whether or not we want our children to have the books, supplies and equipment we had when we attended school. What else is included in these non-contingent expenses that we decide whether or not our children may have? The letter lists interscholastic sports, some transportation, recreation, cafeteria and non-instructional supplies and equipment. When THE HERALD inquired as to the kind of transportation, it was learned that it was for some handicapped children and students attending non-public schools more than 10 miles from their homes. We are asked to spend \$6325 in order to keep our 10 cafeterias to service 12,000 students for 180 days. This is our prerogative also in our 5% vote. Finally there are interscholastic sports and recreation left to our discretion. THE HERALD

remembers Hicksville supporting our interscholastic sports financially -- and in spirit -- since 1924. We must ask ourselves if our children today should not have the same advantages as Hicksville's previous graduates. In much the same fashion, for at least a decade, we have supported recreation.

It is evident that we the people control in our 5% vote the heart and bloodstream of education. It is evident that our children need books, supplies, etc. Let us exercise our responsibility for the 5% we control by approving the proposed budget. THE HERALD urges a YES vote on the school budget-Proposition #1.

We also urge your support of Proposition #3. This bus will cost us 10% of its value and will pay for itself over and over again in state aid for the children it will transport. The Herald urges you to vote YES on Proposition #3.

Finally we believe the district should consider the hardship we have placed on our Public Library. Since 1965 the Library has been forced to exist on the same budget. We are all aware that costs of all living have increased since 1965. It is not just to expect one service to maintain itself on a fixed sum when supplies, books and personnel costs rise. THE HERALD asks you to vote YES on Proposition #2 - the Library Budget.

MEMBERSHIP: Several inquiries have reached national headquarters concerning eligibility of servicemen serving in Thailand for membership in the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

A veteran of Thailand service is eligible to become a member if he meets the following requirements:

1. Citizenship.
2. Honorable service outside the continental limits of the United States with the armed forces of the U. S.
3. Service entitling the applicant to the award of a recognized campaign medal.

The Vietnam Medal is awarded to all members of the U. S. armed forces serving in Vietnam and contiguous waters or air space, thereafter, after July 3, 1965, and before terminal date when announced, and if they meet the following requirements established by the Defense Department.

- (1) Be attached to or regularly serve for one or more days with an organization participating in or directly supporting military operations.
- (2) Be attached to or regularly serve for one or more days aboard a naval vessel directly supporting military operations.
- (3) Actually participate as a crew member in one or more aerial flights into air space above Vietnam and contiguous waters directly supporting military operations.
- (4) Serve on temporary duty for 30 consecutive days or 60

nonconsecutive days in Vietnam or contiguous areas, except that time limit may be waived for personnel participating in actual combat operations.

U. S. forces stationed in Southeast Asia yet outside Vietnam (i. e., Thailand) are therefore eligible for this medal when one of the above criteria is met.

Under the above circumstances eligibility must be determined by the Post on a case-by-case basis.

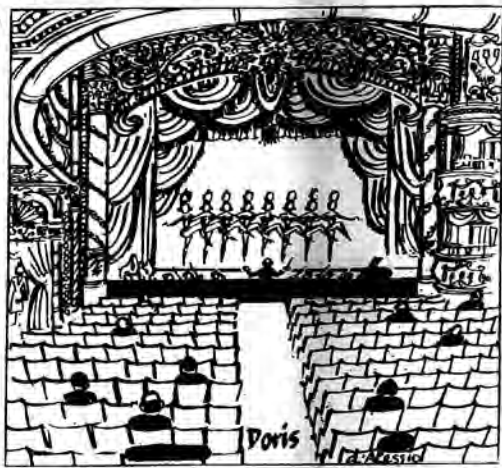
