Letters To The Editor

Dear Mr. Noeth

The staff of the Hicksville Public Schools wishes to commend The Mid-Island Herald for its editorial entitled, "The 5% Vote". The article was accurate and to the point.

We are not only educators, but as citizens ourselves, we, too, understand the feelings of the taxpayers regarding the increased taxes that are coming to us from all levels of government. Therefore, we urge the voters of Hicksville, as stated in the editorial, to take a rational approach to the problem and to set their priorities.

The school district is one of the last governmental structures in this country wherein the person who spends a tax dollar gets a full dollar's worth of value. This tax dollar is not sent in a decompression tube to Albany or to Washington, but stays right here in our own community where it is not decompressed or shrunk but keeps its full dollar value.

Again, referring to priorities, the editorial dramatically pointed out that the voters were really exercising their right of approval or disapproval on 5% of the total budget. It is at this point that we urge the public to establish a priority which will provide textbooks for elementary children, library books, instructional supplies and equipment, interscholastic sports, some transportation, recreation, cafeterias, and non-instructional supplies and equipment. The lion's share of this 5% is made up of textbooks for elementary children, library books and instructional supplies and equipment. Without the elementary textbooks it will be impossible for us to continue our newly adopted science program in the elementary schools and our new mathematics and English programs. Last year we had no new library books and consequently lost \$37,000 in federal aid for the purchase of additional books. Should the voters reject this budget, we will again lose our library books and the additional federal aid. Each of the 12,000 children in our district are individuals of varying abilities. To help educate these youngsters, we need modern instructional supplies and equipment.

The approval of the budget is therefore an investment in the future of the district's 12,000 children. There can be no doubt in any one's mind that a good education is an absolute must in times such as ours. Our youngsters leaving the public schools will be competing with other youngsters all over the country for jobs in industry, and for seats in the college classroom. The one with the best education will get those jobs and will get those empty seats in the college classrooms. All else will make little difference, except your youngsters' education.

Again, we would like to compliment the editorial staff of The Mid-Island Herald and urge you to invest in your child's future by approving the school budget on June 26.

To the Editor:

The Hicksville Library Board is re-submitting the budget that was presented on May 8. No cuts have been made in the budget, because the library has not operated with a budget as submitted since 1965.

The library in Hicksville has, in our opinion, functioned well for the community. At a cost to most taxpayers of less than \$15.00 per family a year, we have developed one of the finest collections of books and general reference material to be found in Nassau. The damage resulting from successive budget deficits has been severe as our purchases have been sharply curtailed for the past year. If we suffer another budget defeat we will be forced to cut back our book budget to slightly over half of what the community needs to maintain minimum standards. In addition, opening hours may be cut and badly needed staff will not be available. The depressing fact is that all of the unfavorable votes over the past several years has cost your library dearly while saving a few cents a year for the taxpayers.

A library must serve the people efficiently. We have not taken it for granted that, in spite of our low tax rate and superior collection, we have done so and have constantly sought to examine our methods and procedures. We cannot improve, however, unless we receive a reasonable working budget. A good library is vital to the hundreds of junior, high and high school students that we serve weekly; it is important to the business and professional people of the community; it is a necessary source of information for the informed adult. May we have your support?

Nassau Police Commissioner Francis B. Looney asked motorists to be watchful of youngsters in the streets now that schools are closing for the summer vacation.

"More youngsters will be on the streets," he said, "either a-foot or on bicycles, and they will be engaged in play activities throughout the day and into the evening. Use extreme caution when passing playground areas and be watchful for youngsters darting from between cars or from behind ice cream trucks."

During 1967, 21 pedestrians and 5 bicycle riders were killed in accidents.

Looney urged parents to instruct their young children in safe practices while crossing streets and to insist on compliance. He also asked at the same time that bicycle riders learn safe riding habits.

"Bike riders," he said, "have to learn that they are bound by traffic regulations and must obey all traffic regulations."

Jericho School Budget Passes On Second Vote

On Wednesday, June 12th, the voters in our school district approved the \$6,178,506 School Budget by 1,071 to 973. The budget, which had been defeated in May for an increase in the tax rate to \$8.29 from the current \$7.22.

The Board of Directors of the Birchwood Civic Association had recommended that the budget be passed as it was felt that the budget was prudent and relative to our community requirements.

The Jericho Education Committee of the B.C.A. had taken a "realistic close look at the 1968-1969

Jericho School Budget. In this budget were literally hundreds of items. Item by item, each was studied by four members of the Board of Directors of the Birchwood Civic Association—plus two representatives of the Jackson P.T.A.—plus representatives of just about every organization in the school district, from Citizens for Better Education to the Old Westbury Taxpayer's Association.

At the invitation of the School Board, this Citizens Advisory Committee, had the opportunity to study and discuss the entire budget and considered a multi-

tude of possible budget modifications and reductions. As a result of these study sessions, the budget, as presented by the School Board, reflected reductions amounting to \$125,000. Our representatives and others on the committee concurred that further deletions would seriously affect the quality of instruction.

That our money in the past has been spent well is attested by the acceptance of Jericho-educated youngsters into the finest colleges. It's also attested by the increasing property values here; our school system has a growing reputation for excellence.

There is one sad commentary—the lack of interest on the part of approximately 70% of the qualified voters in our district. Only 2,044 residents of the possible 7,000 eligible took the time and trouble to vote.

have received a great deal of information concerning the budget and the cumulative effect on library services from the successive budget defeats suffered since 1965. Another defeat would certainly cause further cuts in the book budget of the library and perhaps curtail the library's hours of availability. All aspects of ser-

vice will suffer - reference for young people, the supply of current books, meeting room facilities and special programs for adults and children. There will simply not be enough money available to perform the minimum services required. Furthermore, much of the important material that the library cannot purchase will probably never be added leaving permanent gaps

in the book collection.

The importance of participation in the referendum of library borrowers and supporters cannot be over-estimated. The individual who registers and votes for the library program will insure the community of maximum use of this vital service. The additional cost of \$4 per \$100 of assessed valuation will enable the library to acquire nearly twice the number of books that could be purchased on an austerity budget. The damage that will be done to the library function by another budget defeat is out of proportion to the cost.
