## Nassau GOP Chairman Margiotta Announces Judgeship Agreement

Nassau County Republican Chairman Joseph M. Margiotta announced today that the Hempstead and North Hempstead Executive Committees have unanimously agreed to give bi-partisan backing to five judicial candidates in the November elections.

Margiotta said the committees voted to accept bi-partisan endorsement for two sitting State Supreme Court Justices, Howard T. Hogan, Farmingdale, and Sol Wachtler, Kings Point, both Republicans. Margiotta added that both committees endorsed former GOP County Court Judge Michael M. D'Auria, Plainview, for the Supreme Court seat to be vacated by Justice Manuel Levine, who is retiring at the end of the year.

Margiotta said that the two committees endorsed the candidacy of District Court Judge Beatrice Burstein for the new Family Court post recently created by the State Legislature. He said the endorsement followed consultations with the Nassau Democratic leadership aimed at reaching an agreement at bi-partisan backing for sitting judges. "We have long hoped that we could spare sitting judges who have distinguished themselves on the bench from the necessity of time-consuming and costly election campaigns," said Margiotta. He added that the Hempstead and North Hempstead Executive Committees also voted to give bi-partisan endorsement to a Democratic candidate to be selected as a replacement for State Supreme Court Justice William R. Brennan, Jr., who is retiring. Margiotta noted that the Oyster Bay Executive Committee is expected to consider the matter at its next meeting on June 12.

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# Dear Sheila:

As we went to press we were able to bring you the results of yesterday's budget vote in School District 17, Hicksville (see page one). Sad to say, it went down to defeat, as did the Library budget. As we pointed out editorially, this vote only affects 5% of the entire budget and covers many important programs for the children and young people of our community. It is disheartening to those dedicated parents and educators who recognize the importance of that last 5% to our young people, to see the budget go down because of a general revolt against high taxes in all areas of government. Instead of making our children the whipping boys for our resentment against high taxes, why don't we take these high tax matters up with our elected officials... they are the ones who may be able to come up with more realistic tax programs... or, at least, if we made them aware of our wishes, they would be able to represent us in the Senate and Assembly of our State and Nation, more realistically. This is not to put all the blame for high taxes on their shoulders... we must ourselves recognize that we HAVE TO PAY for today's public services at today's prices... there is actually no choice.

The Board of Education of our District has several alternatives at present. One would be to do nothing and operate on an austerity budget (which of course they will have to do by law after July 1st, at least temporarily) secondly, they could elect to have you vote on the items included in that 5% above the austerity budget, item by item, so that you could express your desires in this fashion, or, lastly, they could resubmit the budget in its entirety, changed or unchanged, as soon as possible. Only the Board, when they meet in the near future, can say which way is the wisest step to take next.

As you read this, I'll be leaving Nassau Hospital to spend the summer convalescing in our home in Stony Brook (although we like it out there during the warm summer months), but, street widening or not, Hicksville is and always will be my home...and in the Fall, when I'm feeling better, I'll be back with you. In the meantime, you can always reach me by message at my office at 181 Old Country Road (WE 1-1400) And THE MID ISLAND HERALD and THE PLAINVIEW HERALD will be coming to you each week with all the local news in depth, and, of course, this column.

So, keep that news coming in.

## Unlicensed Dogs

The Oyster Bay Town Clerk's office has issued 824 summonses to delinquent dog owners, in accordance with the State Agricultural and Markets Laws requiring the issuance of summonses to unlicensed dogs.

Town Clerk William B. O'Keefe said the summonses will be issued periodically until the entire list of 4200 delinquent dog owners have been notified. There are about 28,000 dogs in the town.

On each summons there is attached a note from O'Keefe stating that the court action will be discontinued if the required fees of \$5.25 for female dogs and \$2.25 for male or spayed female is paid at the town clerk's office before the return date of the summons. The penalty of \$10 is prescribed in the law for keepers of unlicensed dogs.

Successful applicants will be appointed to the rank of Patrolman and receive a starting salary of \$8,953 including holiday pay, which increases yearly to \$9,916 in the fifth year.
