Dr. Youdelman recognized the signatures as those of Harvey Turnure and J.B. DuBose, Cashier and President respectively at the time this historic bill was issued in 1917. Dr. Youdelman's family owned the building in which the bank opened at 89 Broadway, Hicksville, 1917. Mr. Godfrey is the Senior Director in point of service having been a Director of the bank since January 14, 1936. Mr. Carroll has been a Director since January 14, 1941.

Roncallo New Leader

Recently Nassau County Comptroller Angelo D. Roncallo unanimously was elected as Republican Chairman of the Town of Oyster Bay, succeeding Michael M. D'Auria.

Roncallo, a 40-year old attorney from Massapequa, was chosen for the post at a meeting of the 392-member Town GOP Committee held at the Holiday Manor in Bethpage.

In accepting the Chairmanship, Roncallo said, "I tell you tonight that as a public official of Nassau County, I am aware not only of political responsibilities but also have full knowledge of governmental responsibility. The interest of our citizens has heightened and intensified with a tremendous surge and they are watching with a new vigilance, the actions of our elected officials and our elected officials and our political officials."

Roncallo was elected Nassau County Comptroller in 1967 after serving as an Oyster Bay Town Councilman from 1965-1967. He is a member of the Nassau County Bar Association, Catholic Lawyers Guild, Massapequa Chamber of Commerce, Bishop's Catholic

Law Committee, Veterans of Foreign Wars and Knights of Columbus. He has served as Exalted Ruler of the Elks and is a Past Venerable of the Sons of Italy.

He is a graduate of Manhattan College and Georgetown Law School. He has been a Republican Executive Committeeman from Massapequa since 1954. He resides with his wife, Priscille, and their five children at 226 Toronto Ave., Massapequa.

D'Auria, a former County Court Judge, is a resident of Plainview. He had served as Town Chairman since December 1965. He has been endorsed for a State Supreme Court Judgeship by the GOP Executive Committees from Nassau's three Towns and two Cities and Nassau County Republican Chairman, Joseph M. Margiotta has announced that he is slated to receive bi-partisan endorsement.

"I do not feel that it is proper for a judicial candidate to be in a position of political leadership," D'Auria said. "Therefore, this is the appropriate time for me to step down. Angelo Roncallo is a proven leader and in my opinion he will be an outstanding Town Chairman."

Town Board Moves To Form Committee To Guide Hicksville

The formation of a 12-member Hicksville Citizens Advisory Committee for transportation and Development has been announced by Oyster Bay Town Councilman A. Carl Grunewald. A Town Board resolution adopted on June 25 officially created the group. The names of the members will be announced in the very near future.

"Recently completed and proposed road widenings in Hicksville, together with plans of the Metropolitan Transportation Authority, will be changing the face of Hicksville," Grunewald

said. "We want to make sure that any changes are acceptable to the community—we won't allow Hicksville to become another Jamaica."

New York State is presently widening Newbridge Road and Broadway. Nassau County recently completed the widening of Old Country Road in Hicksville. In addition, the M.T.A. has mentioned plans to make Hicksville an express stop on the Long Island Railroad, and Nassau County has proposed a transportation hub in Hicksville.

"Properly planned," Grunewald

said, "these changes can benefit Hicksville. However, we must act early to prevent the possibility of any honky-tonk type development. Also, the Town Board will have to make plans for off street parking along the paths of the widened roads."

Grunewald said that the citizens committee will work with the Town Board, Nassau County and the M.T.A. to establish the best type of future development, with the needs and desires of the community their main consideration.

The appointment of a district clerk was postponed, for further consideration. Joseph Catalano was appointed as acting district clerk.

The regular meetings of this Board were scheduled for the second and last Tuesdays of each month, but the last meeting in December was cancelled.

The district treasurer was bonded for \$400,000.00.

The Long Island National Bank and the National Bank of North America were designated as the district's depositories.

Library Board to Meet

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Hicksville Public Library will be held on Wednesday evening, July 10th at 8 p.m. at the public library.

The Mid Island Herald and the Mid Island Times were appointed as official newspapers for the district.

The Board reviewed its membership both in the New York State School Boards Association and the Educational Council.

The Board adopted the policies of the previous Board.

Dr. Carey Tenders Resignation As Supt. Of Jericho Schools

In order to accept a Professorship in School Administration at the City University of New York, School Superintendent Thomas F. Carey has tendered his resignation, effective September 1st. Listed below, in its entirety, is the letter which Dr. Carey submitted to the Jericho Board of Education announcing his intention.

Gentlemen:

It is with a sincere feeling of regret that I hereby tender my resignation as Superintendent of the Jericho Public Schools to be come effective September 1, 1968.

I have accepted an appointment to a full professorship of educational administration at the City College of New York beginning in the Fall semester.

While reluctant to leave Jericho, a significant opportunity exists to render meaningful professional service as part of the comprehensive commitment that CCNY has to the public schools and community in Harlem. The impending decentralization in the city schools, the revised requirements to prepare administrators, and the rise of independent school boards in the city represent areas of educational challenge which are integral parts of this new assignment.

During this period, I have witnessed dedicated members of the teaching and administrative staff consistently and willingly undertake, in the interest of children, projects and assignments that would have stag-
