Hicksville Board of Education Sets Tax Rate For 1968-'69

Based on the austerity budget mandated by prior votes of the people, and the fact that on Tuesday August 27 the voters of District 17 decided favorably on Proposition 2, and voted down Propositions 1 and 3, the Hicksville Board of Education has set the school tax rate for the 1968-'69 year at \$8.084 for each \$100 of assessed valuation. The rate for the first half will be \$4.042.

Total assessed valuation for this district is \$105,246,498. The gross budget for all purposes, including the library is \$16,711,961.50. The gross tax levy, including the library is \$8,508,126.89. The difference between these two figures is made up by other revenues received by the district, from State Aid, Federal Aid and other miscellaneous revenues.

The cafeteria service of Hicksville School District 17 will NOT be available on Sept. 4th when school reopens this year. In all probability it will reopen in late September or early October.

Marching units, bands, and the latest fire equipment will parade starting at 8:30 a.m., south on Jerusalem Avenue, east on Old Country Road to Carl Street and then north on Broadway to Mid Island Plaza. Leading the parade will be chairman and grand marshal, Sherwood Heidel, ex-Captain of Hose Company #4.

Marching with the man of Hicksville will be the Ladies Auxiliary, who, again this year won the New York State Marching Championship at Syracuse, last week.

The Fifth and Sixth Divisions will contain units from Clinton and Westbrook, in Connecticut. Westbrook plans to have their 1916 Model T Ford and three miniature gasoline-powered fire trucks. In the parade, for the first time in New York State.

At 12:30 p.m. the firemen will change uniforms and compete in the tournament at Mid Island Plaza. Awards will consist of 90 trophies, donated by merchants and friends of the Fire Dept. The North Bellmore Rinkys-Dinks, who won the New York State Championship last week at Syracuse, will also be competing.

LILCO Nuclear Power Station

Long Island Lighting Company today unveiled what Long Island's first nuclear power station is expected to look like. In presentations before meetings of residents of Wading River and Shoreham, LILCO displayed an architect's drawing of the proposed plant and reviewed steps the utility was taking leading to the start of its construction.

Site for the \$127 million electric generating plant is a 210 acre plot on Long Island Sound in the Town of Brookhaven, in Shoreham - Wading River area. Subject to the review and approval of the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC), LILCO expects to begin the plant's construction in 1969 with commercial operation scheduled for 1973. The Company had previously announced that an application for permission to begin construction was filed with the AEC this past May 15th.

Meetings held by LILCO for local residents are part of an informational series designed to keep the community up-to-date on the progress of the Shoreham Nuclear Power Station. At the latest session, the company reviewed preliminary site preparation work that is scheduled to begin in September. Permission for this work has been received from various federal, state, and local agencies.

An important part of the site preparation work is the construction of an intake canal and two rock jetties in connection with the plant's circulating water system. In addition, the LILCO work will include the construction of a new beach for use by Town of Brookhaven residents.

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Dear Friends:

It's true that there was initial disappointment in the ranks of those District 17 voters, when Propositions 1 and 3 went down to defeat, last Tuesday evening. (for accurate figures see page one of this week's Hicksville edition of the MID ISLAND HERALD). However, it wasn't long...possibly less than an hour, after the final figures were known, that a group of interested citizens came up with several suggestions of an adult and a teen-age volunteer group to assist our library, so that, for this year at least, their efforts may to some extent, close the gap caused by the library budget defeat....And, another group seem to be anxious to become active in the school district ranks. A group whose moderate, common sense approach to our school's financial problems, may appeal to many more than extremists on either side when the facts become known. More on both these groups later.

Both these groups feel, as we do, that the problem, simply stated is that we are taxing a necessity beyond its capacity in order to raise school tax dollars. As a result, two groups are being hurt the most....the family with young children who are struggling to meet their obligations and raise a family....and those older citizens who are on a fixed income and are finding it well nigh impossible to maintain their homes on limited funds.

All school boards, civic groups and leaders should be directing their efforts towards convincing our legislators that some other system of taxing is necessary to support the expanding high cost of educating our children.

Some of our legislators have been considering a County sales tax. Another suggestion, which comes from a Suffolk editor, calls for an income surcharge earmarked for education. He feels that it is fair and equitable. If one family on the street has an income five times greater than the next family - even though both houses are assessed at identical figures - the man with greater income pays the bigger share, he suggests. Everyone of us knows, he continues, of cases where a retired couple lives alongside of a working couple in identical houses. Yet the retired couple pays as much in school taxes as the working couple. Under the suggested system of income tax surcharge for education, the working couple would pay more. This editor feels that the system of raising school tax dollars from assessment of homeowners is no longer logical. It is a system that went into use hundreds of years ago, when owning property was the only means of determining wealth.

The continued use of real property as a tax base to support the mounting costs of good education MUST be looked into now, and corrective action taken as soon as is humanly possible. Let us hear from you, if you have any concrete, constructive workable suggestions on this problem.

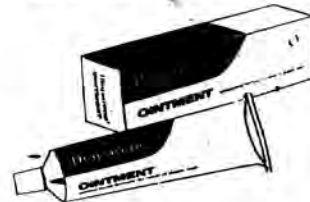
New Crossing Guards

---then we will have long-range ramifications affecting only our children and we will not be educating people for the purposes of becoming better human beings and preparing them for the achievement of a good life.

The dredging of a new inlet at the end of the Amityville channel is the answer to improving the navigational waters of the Town of Oyster Bay in the Great South Bay and to the eel grass problem, according to Gus Coletti, Democratic Candidate for Town of Oyster Bay Councilman who is seeking the seat now held by Philip Healey of Massapequa.

Coletti charged that the eel grass nets that his opponent had advocated and gotten through the Town Board as well as the eel grass catcher and thrasher were merely "sops" to the voters, but no solution to the eel grass problem. He said that this was a "waste of taxpayers money". He said that the dredging of a new inlet could be financed through Federal and State funds as well as a cooperative effort between the Town of Oyster Bay and the Town of Babylon.

"All one has to do is to look at the waters of the existing inlets to see what a greater flow of water will do. It has a flushing effect; the inlet would take away stagnant conditions in the canals as well. In time, the Town of Oyster Bay would attract the fishing industry with its charter boats such as other areas.

"My opponent said that with his measures against eel grass, that by September 1, 1968 90% of the eel grass problem would have disappeared. This is not true."

At the same time, Coletti said that the TOBAY Marina could be improved by placing an ice machine and a milk machine for the convenience of boaters at the marina. He also advocated that a playground be constructed there since many boat owners have small children who get on and off boats at the dock for amusement, which is a safety hazard, according to the Democratic candidate.

Leave The V.A. Alone

From time to time various government agencies attempt to strengthen their status by trying to take pieces of the veterans program. In the past, attempts were made to remove the veterans housing program, another, to remove the vocational rehabilitation program and there have been several attempts to break up the Veterans Administration hospital and medical plan.

The latest bid comes from the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, who recommends that he be designated as the President's advisor on Federal health policy and programs. It is then proposed that the President rely on his advisor to co-ordinate Federal activities. This action by the head of HEW was bitterly opposed by the chairman of the House Committee on Veterans Affairs and his members, other members of Congress and veterans organizations. Commander in Chief of the VFW, Joseph Scerra deplored this move by stating: "Our organization has witnessed a long line of attempts to have the Veterans Administration dismembered and absorbed by other government agencies. This recommendation is the latest and boldest attempt to accomplish such a purpose. The Veterans of Foreign Wars will be extending its every effort from now to have this recommendation rejected."

We, the members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States say, "The Veterans Administration is not a political grab-bag. LEAVE IT ALONE."

Sheriff Maher Favors Stricter Gun Control

Nassau County Sheriff Joseph F. Maher today said he favors the "strictest possible gun control laws as an indispensable tool of law enforcement agencies".

The Sheriff said he has been asked by several civic groups in recent speaking appearances for his views on the gun control issue.

"I wholeheartedly favor the strictest possible gun control

laws as an indispensable tool of law enforcement agencies", Maher said in a statement issued from his Mineola office.

"Preferably, such legislation should be enacted by Congress to provide nationwide uniformity. If that cannot be achieved, and there seems to be a reluctance on the part of a great many congressmen and senators to enact really effective laws, the

Power Windows Can Be Dangerous

Owners of cars with power windows were warned today against leaving unattended children in them because of the risk of injury or death. The Greater New York Safety Council said there have been cases of loss of fingers, broken bones and fingers, and death by strangulation caused by children playing with the power switches.

Edward A. Fitzgerald, director of the Safety Council's traffic and transportation division, said that only a few of the current car models were designed so that the power windows can not be operated when the ignition was in the "off" position. But, he said, a "simple and inexpensive" modification of the wiring by a qualified mechanic can make any car foolproof in that respect. He advised also that purchasers of new cars request their dealer to make this adjustment if the model lacks the safety feature.

Meanwhile, he said, small children should not be left unattended in cars where they can operate the power windows. Declaring that children often played with the switches, Mr. Fitzgerald said the number of such accidents are increasing. In extreme cases, he said, death had been caused when a child turned on the switch while another youngster had his neck out the window.

"As with all other motor vehicles," he declared, "cars with power windows should be locked when not in use. This not only reduces the chances of theft, but prevents curious youngsters from entering them and injuring themselves with power windows cigarette lighters and other equipment or by releasing the brakes."

New York State Legislature should certainly do the job.

"I favor licensing of all gun owners and dealers and registration of all firearms, so that police and other law enforcement agencies can keep track of weapons. If stolen weapons are used in crimes, it is essential that police know their origin."

"I would favor a complete ban on mail order sales of all firearms and ammunition of all sizes. I would prohibit the sale of firearms and ammunition to minors and to anyone with a police record or a history of mental illness, and restrict the sale of ammunition to license holders."

"I am encouraged by the fact that political candidates here in Nassau County are joining in the fight for strict gun control laws, although I believe it is illogical to advocate licensing of gun owners without requiring the registration of weapons, as Assemblyman Margiotta the County GOP Chairman - and his colleagues have done."

"I would also hope that all county law enforcement officials would take a strong public position in favor of gun control."

"Some years ago, I served as a special assistant to the U.S. Senate Rackets Investigation Committee in Washington, when the late Senator Robert F. Kennedy was its chief counsel."

"The need for effective gun control was a subject frequently discussed then and I can think of no more fitting memorial to Robert Kennedy than to have such legislation enacted by the state he served so well as United States Senator."

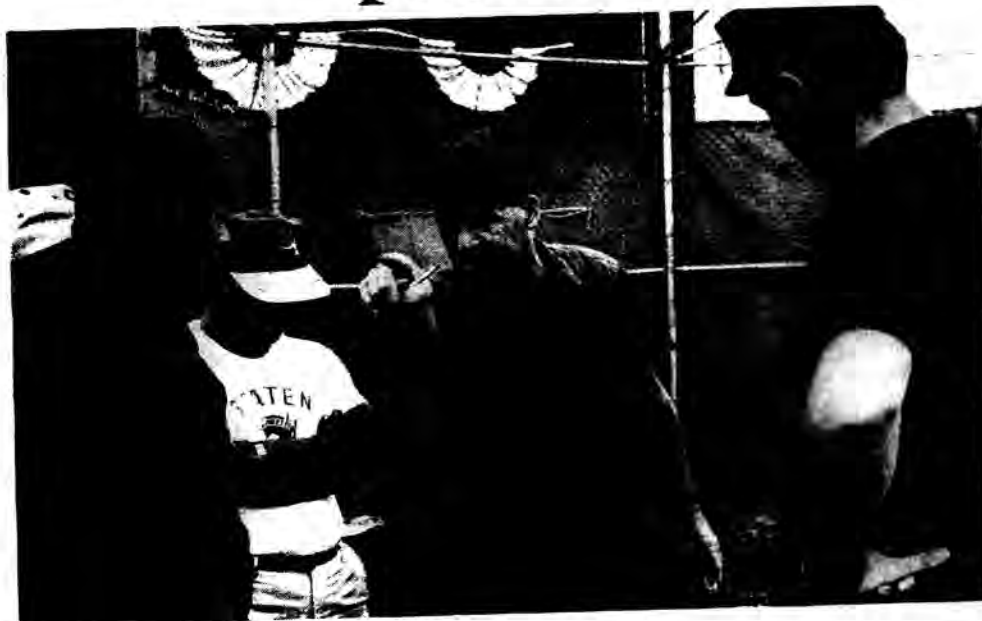

b) The duties of such committees shall be limited to studying in general the problems in their particular fields of activity and to make special studies of any particular problems referred to them by the Board of Directors and to report to the Board of Directors their finding and recommendations. Section 3. The majority of any committee of the Association shall constitute a quorum for the

transaction of business. Section 4. The President shall have the power to fill vacancies in the membership of any committee.

ARTICLE VIII MEETINGS

Section 1. Two (2) regular membership meetings shall be held during each calendar year.

Section 2. The first of such regular membership meetings shall be considered as the annual meeting and shall be held during the month of May of each year but no later than the 31st day thereof, the exact date, time and place to be fixed by the President. At that meeting, the Officers and Directors shall be elected, the annual reports of the Officers, Board of Directors and Committees shall be submitted and such other business

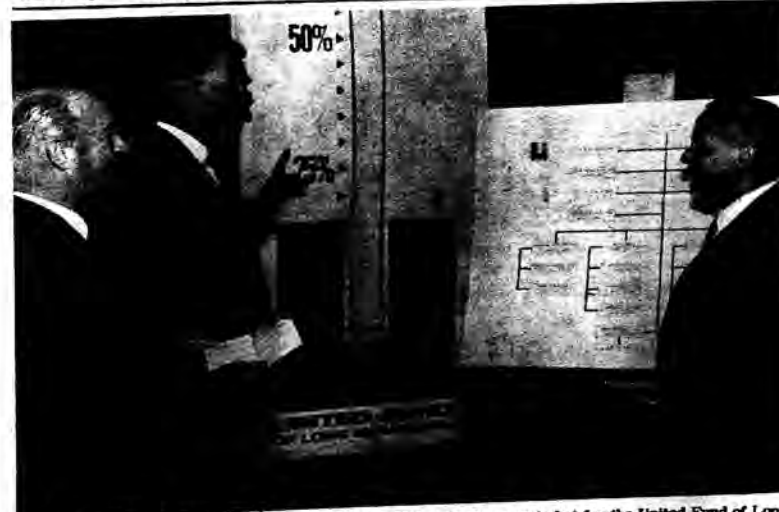
