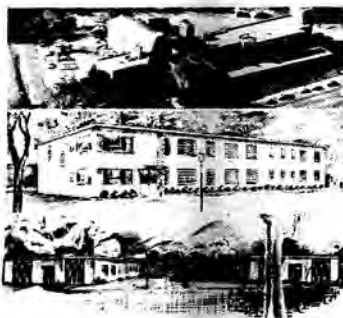
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To Attend Board of Ed. Convention

Cornelius J. McCormack, president of the Hicksville School Board, has announced that two members of the school board will attend the 49th annual convention of the New York State School Boards Association in Syracuse on Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday, October 27-29. Whitney M. Young, executive director of the National Urban League, will be the featured speaker at the Sunday evening general session.

These local school officials will be among the 4,000 men and women who will be meeting to discuss their responsibilities as school trustees. They will hear nationally known speakers; view an exhibit of current educational products, equipment, and services; confer with government officials; take part in the association's business; and discuss mutual problems with the other school board members.

Representing nearly 800 school districts, these school officers come from all parts of the state annually to take part in the largest school meeting of its kind in the country. This year, their activities will be directed toward the theme, "Let No Man Die Ignorant".

The following members of the board will attend the Syracuse meeting: Mr. Harry Kershen, Mr. William J. O'Donnell. In addition, Donald F. Abt, Superintendent and Joseph Catalano, School Attorney will attend.

Hicksville School Board members who have attended these conventions in previous years are agreed that this convention presents the best opportunity to learn from other school board members how to meet and solve local problems.

State agencies will be represented by more than 100 consultants who will be on hand to discuss local problems with the school board members. Among those represented will be the State Education Department; Departments of Audit and Control, Civil Service, and Health; State Retirement Systems, Public Service Commission, Office for Local Government; and the Public Employment Relations Board.

The New York State School Boards Association, with offices in Albany, represents the elected or appointed school board members responsible for the education of over 3,396,000 public school children in the State of New York.

The sergeant is now at Finley as a member of the Aerospace Defense Command.

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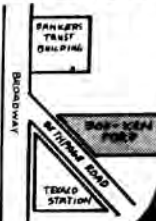

- The Veterans Administration advises us that children of deceased servicemen could be eligible for pensions even though their mothers are not.

The circumstances that would make the children eligible are:

1. The un-married widow may be ineligible because her income exceeds limits set by law.
2. When the widow receiving a pension for herself and children remarries, she loses her personal eligibility for a pension based on her husband's death.

Minor children, however, may continue to receive pension payments in either case, even though they live with their mother, the VA said. Their personal eligibility is limited only by their personal income.

If a child's income is greater than \$1800 per year, no pension will be paid, but the child's own earnings are not counted. Interested persons seeking more information on this type benefit can get same by contacting the Veterans Administration or the Nassau County Veterans Service Agency, 320 Old Country Road, Garden City. Any one of the counselors there will be more than glad to help you.

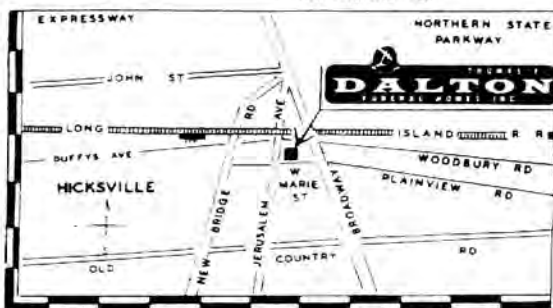
