Net operating earnings for 1968 totaled \$12,879,802 compared with \$10,031,327 a year ago, an increase of 28.4%.

Earnings of Bank of North America prior to May 8, 1967, when it was consolidated with Meadow Brook National Bank to form National Bank of North America are not included. Earnings on average equity

capital amounted to 16.2% compared with 15.9% last year.

North America's statement as of December 31, 1968 showed total resources of \$1,709,661,496 compared with \$1,591,442,827 a year ago.

Deposits amounted to \$1,459,903,040 compared with \$1,392,985,845. Loans totaled \$1,086,466,043 compared with \$942,483,910. Capital funds were \$111,433,940 compared with \$100,297,236.

High School "Nursery"

What is a nursery doing at Jericho High School?

The Greenhouse at the Jericho High School has been a most productive home for fresh plantings and a valuable learning site. Since September the Science Department has held class demonstrations for ten sections of Regents Biology classes in the greenhouse, located off the court of the Senior High School.

A large number of individual specimens are maintained, in order to provide experimentation with a wide variety of plantings, from local annuals to semi-tropicals. Approximately 250 biology students have used the greenhouse for an experiment in vegetative propagation. Greenhouse products are also used throughout the school building, where fine specimens are displayed.

In order to maintain the greenhouse, two student assistants donate about five periods weekly to its care. Future plans for the greenhouse include the development of additional laboratory experiences, as well as the addition of shelf areas as plant material and student use increase.

Underprivileged Children's Christmas Party

In the true spirit of the holiday season, the White Hall Student Council and the Future Homemakers of America of the Jericho High School co-sponsored a Christmas Party for 38 underprivileged children from Freeport. The FHA collected and

wrapped gifts sufficient enough for each youngster to receive four or five warmly welcomed presents. With funds raised from a student cake sale, the White Hall Council purchased soda, ice cream, and a decorative sheet cake. Dr. Gene Sackrin, Chairman of the Foreign Language Department, donated candy canes. Wendy Chin played the organ and accompanied fellow student Guy Rochman while he told stories.

The assistance of Miss Nancy Smith, Miss Maureen O'Sullivan, and Miss Estelle Stern and the valuable guidance of Miss Beatrice McHale, Chairman of the Home Economics Department were appreciated by the guests and their hosts. The Freeport youngsters were extremely delighted with the party, the entertainment, and the good will of the Jericho students.

Audio-Visual

Learning Materials

How does Jericho make use of the latest audio-visual learning materials?

One current practice is the Instructional Materials Center in operation at the George A. Jackson School. The purpose of the IMC is to provide students and teachers with a spectrum of materials available in any given field of study. An A-V Squad of pupils aid in filling class requests for films, slides, tapes, records, charts, books and library resources - all coordinated and cross-referenced in order to provide complete and efficient use of materials needed for a unit.

A unique feature of the IMC,

located in Jackson's Room 12, is the original film-making project directed by Alvin Engel, fifth grade teacher. Mr. Engel and John Bolles, Jackson Principal, attended the December Board of Education meeting. At this time, Mr. Engel presented an original 12 minute film which he had shown at the New York State Audio-Visual Aids Conference. The film, highlighting the IMC procedures, included clever use of animation and special effects.

Mr. Engel conducted an Instructional Materials Workshop with his Jericho colleagues last year; during the 14 weeks of which the teachers explored and prepared many innovative uses for audio-visual aids.

The well organized Instructional Materials Center has resulted in greater use and originality of audio-visual learning devices, as well as provoking participation among students and faculty.

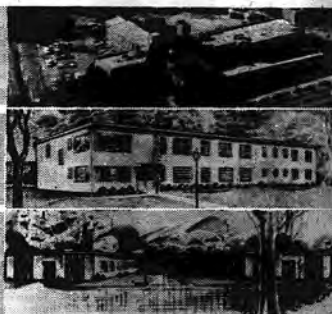
