AMENDMENTS TO THE HICKSVILLE PARKING ORDINANCE

RESOLVED, that the Ordinance regulating parking in the hamlet of Hicksville, Town of Oyster Bay, adopted October 19, 1948, be and it hereby is amended as follows:

- Section 1A subdivisions 4, 5, 6 and 10 shall be **RESCINDED**.
 - 4. Old Country Road - One hour Parking 8 AM to 6 PM Except Sundays and Holidays - north side - from the west curb line of Broadway, west for a distance of 186 feet.
 - 5. Old Country Road - One Hour Parking 8 AM to 6 PM Except Sundays and Holidays - south side - from the west curb line of Broadway, west for a distance of 200 feet.
 - 6. Old Country Road - One Hour Parking 8 AM to 6 PM Except Sundays and Holidays - both sides - between the east curb line of Broadway and the Railroad crossing.
 - 10. Old Country Road - One Hour Parking 8 AM to 6 PM Except Sundays and Holidays - north side - starting at a point 186 feet west of the west curb line of Broadway, west for a distance of 240 feet.
- Section 1A shall be amended by adding subdivision 19 to read as follows: **ONE HOUR**

LEGAL NOTICE

PARKING 8 AM to 6 PM EXCEPT SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.

- 19. Old Country Road - north side - One Hour Parking 8 AM to 6 PM Except Sundays and Holidays - starting at a point 60 feet west of the west curb line of Broadway, west for a distance of 530 feet.
- Section 5 subdivision 4 shall be **RESCINDED**.
- 4. Old Country Road - No Parking 7 AM to 7 PM Except Sundays and Holidays - both sides - from Mead Avenue to Lee Place.
- Section 6A subdivision 6 shall be **RESCINDED**.
- 6. Notre Dame Avenue - north side - No Parking Loading Zone - starting at a point 30 feet east of the east curb line of Broadway east for a distance of 95 feet.
- Section 9 shall be amended by adding subdivision 33 to read as follows: **NO STOPPING 7 AM to 5 PM SCHOOLDAYS**
- 33. Old Country Road - south side - No Stopping 7 AM to 5 PM Schooldays - starting at a point opposite the east curb line of Lee Place west for a distance of 150 feet.
- Section 9A subdivision 23 shall be **RESCINDED**.
- 23. Andrews Road - north side - Two Hour Parking - starting at a point 400 feet

east of the east curb line of Bethpage Road east for a distance of 1500 feet.
Section 9A shall be amended by adding subdivision 42 to read as follows: **TWO HOUR PARKING 8 AM to 6 PM EX-**

Hicksville on the road to greater interest in the sport and was a rewarding experience for coach Roberts.

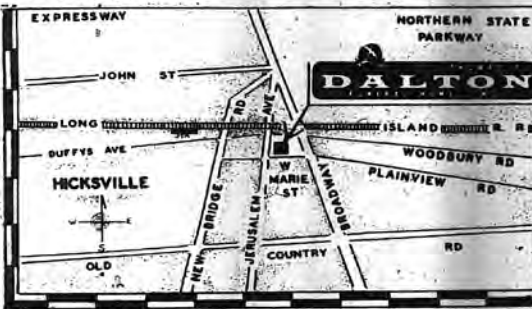

Robbins Lane Signals Slated For Automation

A project costing \$125,000.00 is slated by Nassau County this Spring for the automation of traffic signals at ten intersections. The project, which should take about a year to complete, was announced by County Executive Eugene H. Nickerson.

The traffic signal installation at Robbins Lane and Birchwood Park Drive is one of those slated for automation.

Mr. Nickerson stated: "These signals respond to the presence of a vehicle rather than merely changing on a set schedule. This means that drivers on the main roads will no longer be required
