## Hicksville Women Killed By Bus

In one of the worst accidents of its kind in Hicksville for several years, two Hicksville residents on their way to church at 6 a.m. on the morning of March fourth were killed by a Mid Island Transit System bus on the corner of East Marie Street at Bay Avenue.

Rose Repetti of 53 Thorman Avenue, Hicksville was pronounced dead on arrival at Meadowbrook Hospital and Alessandro Quaresimo of 50 Heitz Place, Hicksville was pronounced dead at 4 p.m. at Meadowbrook Hospital.

It is the 2nd of its kind on the East Coast - it supplies its own electric power and can carry three men in the bucket on the end of the ladder - the bucket is equipped with breathing air for the men plus two five hundred per gallon a minute nozzles direct from the

pump. It has several hundred feet of portable ladders mounted on its sides for lower work and for roof ventilation. It was purchased in 1968 by the Board of Fire Commissioners with reserve funds when Medard Ofenlock was chairman.

The high finish of three Hicksville wrestlers in the Nassau County championships, was a gratifying achievement for coach Steve Tomani and an equally proud accomplishment for the school.

Richard Kowalchuk, in the 157-pound class, and Bruce Hirschfield, at 96-pounds, finished third in a field of sixty schools.

Sophomore Kirk Jurgelovich worked very hard and won fourth place in the 130-pound group.

It was a high point in the sport for Hicksville to have three boys in the semi-finals. They were all defeated, but sounded a warning that the Comets will have to be reckoned with in "70."

The end to the 19 match unbeaten streak of Rich Kowalchuk came like a thunderclap in the semi-final round. Rich was the aggressor in the match and he built up a 4-1 lead in the first period. He continued to pursue his opponent in the second period but became overzealous and lost his balance. He fought off the pin but finally bowed at 2:59 of the period.

It is the measure of the young Hicksville Junior that he came back in the consolation match and defeated Russ Poore of East Meadow, 1-0, in overtime.

In winning his third place honors, Hirschfield decided Richard Libes of Jericho, 3-1.

Hicksville High's basketball season came to a sudden conclusion when Great Neck South rallied to defeat the Orange, 61-58, on the neutral boards of Carle Place High School. The defeat eliminated the Comets from the Nassau County playoffs in the opening round.

Hicksville opened a 20-10 lead in the second period. Personal fouls forced defensive star, Bob Rogers, to the sidelines and Great Neck took fire.

The Comets could have doused the rally with even the smallest success from the foul line, but with five one and one opportunities in the period failed. With a possible high harvest of ten free points, the Comets came off with absolutely none.

Great Neck forged into 31-27 half-time lead and stayed a breath ahead of the Comets the rest of the way.

The Herald has learned that Hicksville and Clark High Schools have an attractive gridiron date scheduled for next fall.

The team, under the direction of coach Ron Quanttrini, demonstrated sound improvement over the course of the season and wound up winning its last four games.

Leading scorer for the season was Brian Pinelli, who averaged 16 points per game. He was supported by Rich Moeller and Robert Malaby. Both averaged 10 points a piece. Their work in the backcourt was rated very high in league competition. Rounding out the starting five were Pete Gaffney and Mark Willey.

Others on the winning team were John Diaz, Guy Kowalski, Larry Cohn, Tom Rogers, Chris Hansen, Rich Wolf, Jim Seddon, Kevin Sheehan, Steve Martin and the manager of the team was Allan Goodman.

The annual awards for the year went to Rich Moeller, Best Defensive player; Brian Pinelli; Outstanding Rebounder; Robert Malaby; Best Free Shooter. Each received individual awards.

As related in an earlier issue of the Herald, a mid-season operation forced Steve Martin off the team and he was sorely missed.

Coach Martin Gensler paced the Junior High School 7th and 8th grade basketball team and the fundamentals should prove of value when the players make their bid for Athletic League contest.

# Fiction And Fact

Just got back from a fast mid-winter sojourn in Florida. Was forced to cut my stay short as I had advance warning of a big snow storm about to hit New York. Can't stand it when there's snow on Long Island and I'm not here to shovel it. So into the "yellowbird" and a landing at Kennedy just in time for the big blow. One unfortunate consequence of the storm before last was the cancellation of the film Tokani. It is not possible to hold films to show at a later date as these films are booked months in advance. They must be sent back to the booking office so they may be sent immediately to the next booking.

While in Florida I visited the following libraries: North Miami Beach, Miami Beach (main and north branch), Coral Gables (under construction), and Key Largo. I'm happy to say that residents of Jericho need not fear comparison with large libraries

housed in expensive Floridian-style buildings. The collection is everything and that is one thing those big expensive buildings do not have. In North Miami Beach I counted six copies of Osa Johnson's I Married Adventure (copyright 1940), multiple copies of eight different biographies of Robert E. Lee, no biographies of any of the Kennedys, one biography of L.R.J. (extremely biased with no counterbalancing viewpoint), nothing on Nixon. The fiction was generally of the mystery variety. In an area that is predominately Jewish the card catalog had no listing for Malamud, Roth, Salinger, or Singer. Norman Mailer was represented by one book, his first. The most popular writer of fiction according to the catalog is Emille Loring (very big with backward teen-agers) and Zane Grey. The whole excursion was a depressing one while at the same time an exhilarating one. I was depressed by the pitiful and pathetic collections housed in those beautiful buildings; exhilarated by the knowledge that people in Jericho would rise up in wrath if their library treated them to such shabby and shallow fare.

Speaking of buildings, ours that is, the Educational Facilities Planning Division of the State Education Department has approved the plans for the new Jericho Public Library. If all the red tape moves at its usual turgid pace then we can expect to break ground for the new building sometime this Spring. Normal building time is one year from ground-breaking time. This takes into account various strikes and equipment and materials shortages which normally hold things up. Tentative date for opening would be the Spring of 1970.

The House Plan Evaluation Committee has recommended that the House Plan be eliminated in the school by the end of this school year. Mr. David Nydick, the superintendent of schools, also felt the House Plan should be eliminated.

The Board of Education authorized in 1966 that Jericho become an autonomous junior and senior high school. A three year trial period would be used to decide whether the House Plan was to become a permanent feature in the school policy. Some of the objectives of the House Plan were making each student feel more important and the center of concern of all staff members; a closer interpersonal relationship between student and guidance counselor; and to encourage cooperative planning within a subject matter area as well as between subject matter areas.

When a poll was conducted with some of the senior high school student body, over 50% were dissatisfied with their house, 21% satisfied, and the remainder had no opinion. Finally, it was stated that "The House Plan Evaluation Committee recommends that the House Plan be eliminated July 1, 1969."

The Jericho Basketball team ended their season last Tuesday, February 25, with one of their most "astropedious" performances this year. Jericho had to beat Wheatley High School in this game to make the play offs. Jericho was trailing Wheatley in all four quarters until Alan Bogatch tied the score 42-42 in the last few seconds of regulation play. Four over-times had to be played to decide this very crucial game for Jericho. With only a few seconds left in the fourth over-time Wheatley pulled ahead and beat Jericho by the score of 55-53.

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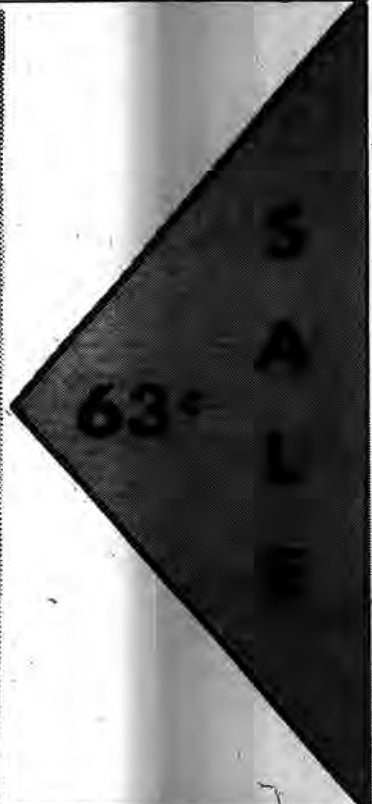

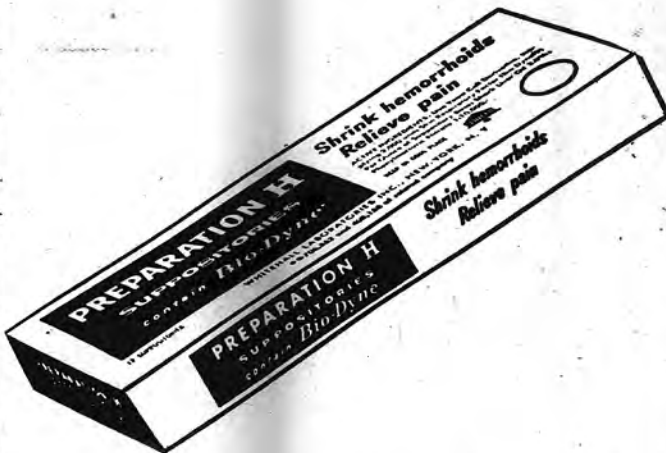

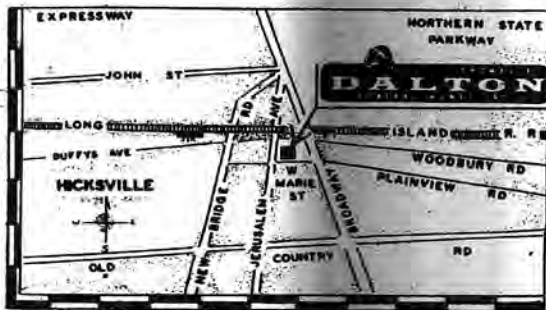
