Herald Report School Board Dist. 17 Hicksville

The Hicksville School Board met Monday, March 31 and set the 1969-70 budget figure to be presented to the public May 7, 1969 for their vote. This figure is \$17,863,155—but the public must bear in mind that this does not include any of the employees' salaries or benefits which are still being negotiated. This new figure represents an approximate tax increase over the 1968-69 budget of 64½¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation.

The major portion of this tax increase is due to increased tuition for BOCES (Board of Cooperative Educational Services.) The BOCES costs, which fall under sub-code 299 of Code 200 were set by the Board at \$1,221,400. Approximately seventy-seven percent (77%) of this amount will be reimbursed by the state during the 1970-71 school year. Handicapped and vocational education students of Hicksville are educated through the BOCES program.

At Monday's meeting, Mr. George Jackson moved that \$17,000 be restored to Code 200. The Board's previous action in

deleting this money had caused public concern over the removal of two assistant principals from elementary schools with a population of under 700. Also, positions for five clerks in the elementary schools and two clerks in supervisors' offices were, in effect, deleted from the 1969-70 budget. Mr. Jackson's motion passed and there is now money in the budget to retain these employees.

Mr. Harry Kershen moved that Code 500 (Transportation) be increased by \$900 to provide transportation of handicapped children to the Town of Oyster Bay recreation program this summer. Since this matter is still being investigated by Mr. Harold Sternberger and the T.O.B. officials, the motion was tabled until Mr. Sternberger reports his progress to the Board.

Mr. Tom Nagle moved that the budget vote be delayed until June, but lacking a second, the motion failed. The budget vote is scheduled for May 7. The public hearing will be April 22, with registration set for April 26.

Salisbury Park To Become Dwight D. Eisenhower Park

The official name for "Salisbury Park" as adopted by Resolution of the Board of Supervisors in 1944, on April 21st, will officially become Dwight D. Eisenhower Park.

Hempstead Presiding Supervisor Ralph G. Caso, at a meeting

of the Board of Supervisors in Mineola, Monday, appraised County Executive Eugene H. Nickerson of the unanimous sentiments of the Board of Supervisors. He subsequently announced that the appropriate ordinance renaming the County's

central park facility will be introduced by him on April 21st. "It is most appropriate" declared Supervisor Caso, "that a park dedicated to the memory of Nassau County's war dead should be renamed in honor of the late President Eisenhower".

Supervisor Caso referred to the dedication of the park in October, 1949 and to the bronze plaque at the park which reads as follows: "Nassau County Park, Dedicated by the people of Nassau County in memory of those who gave their lives in defense of our Country to us their memory is an inspiration and to the future its Hope".

It was during the period of mourning for the late John F. Kennedy that Nassau County Executive Eugene H. Nickerson proposed to the Board of Supervisors the "John F. Kennedy Educational and Cultural Center".

The County Executive's recommendation was unanimously adopted by the Board of Supervisors which alone has the right to name County buildings, parks and facilities.

School Budget Completed

On March 31, 1969 the Board of Education completed its proposed 1969-70 school budget. The budget adopted is in the amount of \$17,863,155. This represents an increase of \$760,665 over last year. This indicates approximately a 65 cent increase per \$100 of assessed valuation, for 1969-70. The tax estimate does not include costs arising from negotiations. These negotiations are still in progress. The largest part of the increase is due to the rise in tuition cost, and increased enrollment for vocational education at BOCES.

Board of Ed Meets April 8

The Board of Education of Hicksville School District 17 will hold a meeting on Tuesday, April 8 beginning at 8 p.m. in the conference room of the administration building on Division Avenue.

Among other matters to be taken under consideration will be relocatable classrooms. Mr. Telesca of W.F. Farley Company will be present at 8 p.m. to discuss in detail the relocatable classrooms.

Other matters to be acted upon will be: new library books; replacements for Sabbatical Leave; payment of teachers eligible for advancement on salary schedule and a presentation of film of recital of recorder ensemble.

The item of policy matters is also on the Board's agenda.

Organizational Calendar

Two important meetings are on the calendar of business for the month of April. On April 14 the nominating committee will submit the names of the members they select for the slate of officers for the 1969-1970 year.

Then on April 28 the meeting will consist of nominations of names submitted by the committee and any other names of members that may be brought, before the membership and then voted on. As a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars it is important that

you try to attend either the April 28 meeting, or both, if at all possible.

Service Officer Report

It is said that we are a grateful nation. The justification of this statement is reflected in this country's service to its veterans.

Recently, in a year end report on various programs operated by the Veterans Administration new legislation and expanded service brought these items to the eyes of the public.

1. The growth of America's living veteran population has risen from 26,067,000 to 26,644,000 during the year, including an increase from 1,858,000 to 2,749,000 in the number of Vietnam era veterans.

2. The payment of 4.5 billion dollars in compensation and pension benefits to 4.6 million veterans and survivors.

3. Restructuring the 2 billion dollar a year pension program for non-service-connected totally disabled veterans and widows who meet the income limitation.

4. Guaranteeing the 7 millionth GI home loan, bringing to nearly 72 billion dollars the value of these guaranteed VA loans since 1944.

Last year was also marked by new and expanded legislation on veterans laws passed by the second session of the 90th Congress. Among the new laws were:

1. Raising income limitations for all pensioners and monthly payments for 1.2 million beneficiaries beginning January 1.

2. Increasing disability compensation payments effective the first of the year for nearly 2 million service connected veterans rated with a 100 per cent disability.

3. Hiking the VA home loan guaranty maximum from \$7,500 to \$12,500.

4. Liberalizing post-Korean GI bill education and training benefits, and for the first time in history, granting the widows of those who died and the wives of veterans who are totally disabled as the result of military service up to 36 months of VA educational assistance.

Yes, the United States is a grateful nation that takes care of her veterans. Compare her generosity with that of the Soviet Union who pays her soldiers in the vicinity of \$11 a month.

Take Your Stand

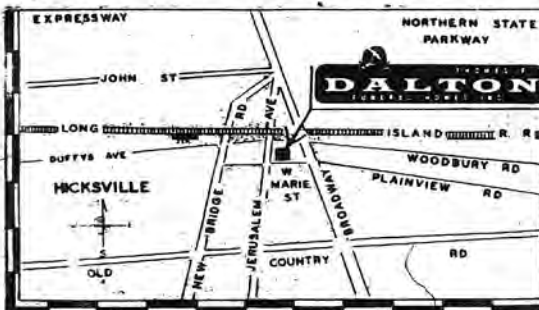

"The wholesome aspects of a million youngsters taking part in a program that cultivates beneficial experiences of coordinated teamwork and good sportsmanship is a highly

complimentary reflection on the spirit and contagious enthusiasm of the parent.

"Every parent of the boy who plays Little League Baseball has a responsibility to do his or her part. Ideally, who but the parent has more at stake and is more acutely motivated?

"Primarily, the parents should know Little League Baseball well and be fully aware of what exposure to Little League means to the boy. They should take an active and discerning interest in the unique appeal of Little League which sets it apart from all other youth programs of its kind, and be knowledgeable of the potential beneficial experience to the boy. It is essential to become informed and learn about the policies, practices and the rules

by which Little League functions.

"The challenge of the future is directed to the parent, his or her willingness to exchange time and effort helpfully and correctly for the benefits of Little League to their child.

"Too few parents avail themselves of literature and material about Little League which can be obtained through local league sources or directly from Little League Headquarters. Regular meetings of the local league are important sources of information. It is always a satisfaction for the active personnel of the league to occasion get-togethers with parents, who should make a point of attending meetings.

"Parents should turn out for Little League games and support the league's activities. Youngsters who play Little League are at an impressionable age and sensitive to parental reaction.

"Some parents find it easy to excuse non-participation. It is an erroneous notion that unless a parent has qualifications as a coach, a manager, an umpire or for some kind of administrative capacity, he cannot be accommodated in the constructed membership of the league.

"For every new Little Leaguer there must be resources and volunteer help to carry him forward. Little League offers a beneficial climate that extends not only to the children, but to parents, families and communities as well.

"Little League should be a happy family experience. Making it that way, through intelligent and unselfish participation, best defines the role of the parent.

"In the broad sense Little League is a training activity for adults, as well as for boys, and it can not be emphasized too strongly that parents who usually comprise a majority of spectators have a responsibility to respect the volunteer status of other adults whose willingness to help make Little League possible. It is always in order to applaud a good player or an outstanding feat of baseball skills. But it is a deplorable exhibition of incivility or plain ignorance to boo a youngster who is learning to play the game or his league leaders who are trying to help him."

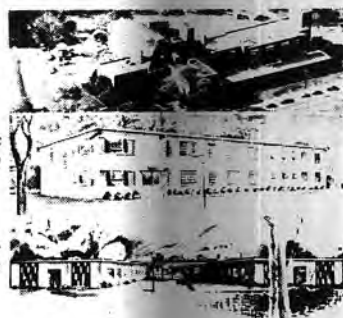

Killed In Vietnam

War struck home again last month when a Hicksville youth was killed in action during the heavy fighting in the Mekong Delta on February 22. On March 5 religious services were conducted at Trinity Lutheran Church by the Rev. Edward H. Stammel, who delivered a most emotive eulogy. Interment took place at the Long Island National Cemetery, Pine Lawn, with full military honors.

After graduating from the Hicksville Senior H.S., Class of 1966, Carl Noel Kozma began his ministerial studies at Concordia College, Bronxville, N.Y., fulfilling a long held desire to dedicate his life to the service of God, as expressed when at 13 he was confirmed at Trinity Lutheran Church.

But Carl felt he had to do much more for his country before entering the ministry; and, therefore, exempted as he was from military service, he enlisted in the U.S. Army. He went through his basic training at Fort Gordon and at Fort McClellan, Georgia, going on to finish OCS at Fort Benning, where on February 1st, 1968, he received his Commission. Lt. Kozma was later sent to Ford Ord, California, and during his roster of duty there, he received severe injuries in an accident which would have prevented him for active combat duty overseas. Carl again felt it was his duty to serve his country in time of need, and volunteered for combat duty in Vietnam, time and again declining medical deferment. On January 21, 1969 he arrived in Vietnam. A month and a day later he was killed.

Lt. Kozma was the son of Alexander and Libertad Kozma, longtime residents of Hicksville. Mr. Kozma is employed by the Manitowoc-Forsythe Corp. of L.I. City, and Mrs. Kozma is a member of the Hicksville Senior H.S. Faculty, where she has been a Spanish Teacher for many years.

Besides his parents, Lt. Kozma leaves his young bride, Julianne, whom he married last October, and who expects a child by next July; his sister, Margaret; his paternal grandparents Alexander and Vera Kozma; and his maternal grandparents Henry and Josefina Torres.

Carl N. Kozma was a well known youth in Hicksville. He was active as a Sunday School teacher, in Scouting, and many other activities which always emphasized his total involvement with his fellow men. Among his many virtues—gentleness, humility, and a youthful sense of humor, his greatest asset was his deep sense of responsibility and commitment to his duties as an American. His life was to be dedicated to the sowing of love. It was ended by the tragedy of hate, which is war.

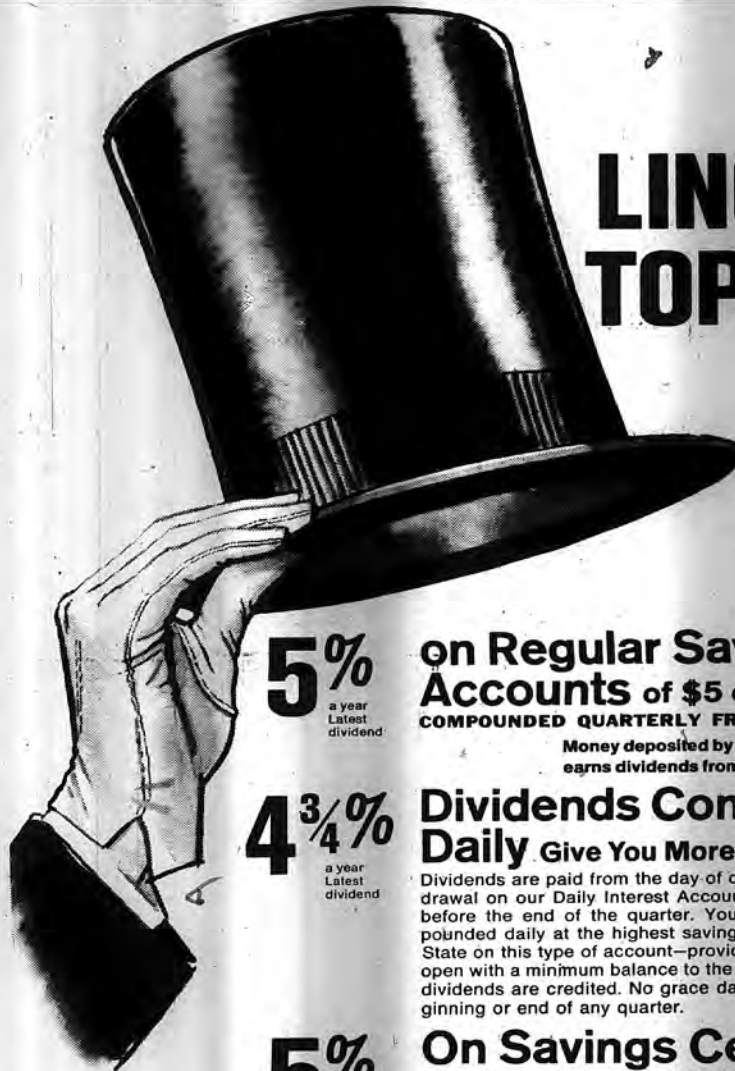

The Regional Association made its first major, if unsuccessful, thrust into the Nassau-Suffolk region last week with its session at Hofstra University. The New York city oriented RPA has been trying for years to convince Nassau officials to give greater power to the Coun-

ty at the expense of the Towns and Villages. Special emphasis was always placed on zoning. RPA planners reasoned that with zoning powers, which are the very essence of home rule, out of the hands of the Towns and Villages the County could pro-

ceed with little or no public opposition to introduce all kinds of dwelling units into suburbia. Under former County Executive A. Holly Patterson this RPA plan got short shrift even though Patterson took advantage of whatever ideas or programs the city planners had that were applicable to County, Towns or Villages regarding water supply, transportation etc. The situation changed rapidly when Eugene H. Nickerson became Nassau Coun-

ty Executive. New impetus was given to the RPA by Nickerson who frequently supported their plan to give the County zoning powers. This put the County Executive at odds with Town and Village officials striving to maintain Nassau as a showcase of suburban living balanced with properly planned commercial and industrial properties. This all adds up to the fact that the situation is much more serious now than ever before.

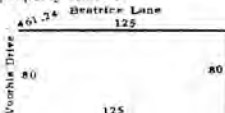
