Traffic Changes In Hicksville

Changes in the existing traffic pattern on the section of Old Country Road between the Wantagh State Parkway and Levittown Parkway in Hicksville will be introduced during the week of May 26 to 30 by the Division of Traffic Engineering in cooperation with the Accident Prevention Bureau of the Nassau County Police Department.

The changes involved are:

1. Eastbound Old Country Road traffic intending to head north on Wantagh Parkway will have to use the loop ramp on the southeast corner of the intersection rather than turning left into Duffys Avenue and then entering the Parkway.

2. Eastbound Old Country Road

traffic intending to head east on Duffys Avenue or north on Charlotte Avenue to West John Street will now turn left at Charlotte rather than at Duffy's

Charlotte rather than at Duffy's Avenue.

3. Westbound left-turns at Old Country Road and Apex Lane will be prohibited. The recommended alternate route is Levittown Parkway to Access Lane.

Rubber guides and pavement markings will be used to prevent eastbound Old Counctry Road traffic from making the left turns into Duffy's Avenue.

By reducing the number of left turns in this heavily travelled area a reduction of accidents and improvement of traffic flow should result, according to traffic experts.



will be required to park in violation of Section 86.7 of the Vehicle and Traffic Law, and upon entering said parking space .shall immediately deposit in said meter a five cent coin of the United States cent com of the United States for one (1) hour of legal parking limit and for a one cent coin of the United States for twelve minutes of legal parking. It shall be unlawful for any person to fail to park within said designated area, or fail or neglect to so deposit

or fail or neglect to so deposit the proper coin or coins. It shall be the duty of each traffic patrolman, or such other officer as shall be so instructed by the Nassau County Police Department, in his beat or district, to take the number of any meter at which any vehicle is overparked, as provided in this ordinance and the state vehicle tag number of such vechicle. the state vehicle tag number of such vechicle, and make complaint therefor in the District Court, Fourth District, Station Plaza, Hicksville, together with the length of time during which said vehicle is parked in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, as well as any other facts, a knowledge of which is necessary to a thorough understanding of the circumstances attending such violations.

Section 8. Any person, firm, association, co-partnership or corporation who shall violate or permit or allow anyone to violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine or penalty of not exceeding Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00).
