LIBRARY NOTES

Mr. Kenneth Barnes, Director of the Hicksville Public Library, has announced that the library will have an information center at the Mid Island Plaza from Monday, May 26th through Saturday, June 7th. Mr. Robert Gring of the Merchants Association of Mid Island Plaza helped arrange for the library to use one of the stores at the west end of the plaza.

The information center will feature displays of library materials on travel, such as guides and maps. Career and vocational material will also be displayed. The center will be manned by the regular staff of the library assisted by members of a newly formed group of young adults from Hicksville High School who are concerned about

their library. If you have any questions about the library that you would like to have answered, or if there are any suggestions you would like to make about library service, please feel free to drop in at the center and have a talk with one of the staff members.

The information center will be open from two in the afternoon until eight o'clock in the evening, so plan to stop by and pick up a free vocational pamphlet, map, bookmark, and library budget information. In order to be able to vote for the library budget, you must register this Saturday, May 24th from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Administration Building on Division Avenue. The voting will take place Tuesday, June 10th from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Traffic Changes In Hicksville

Changes in the existing traffic pattern on the section of Old Country Road between the Wantagh State Parkway and Levittown Parkway in Hicksville will be introduced during the week of May 26 to 30 by the Division of Traffic Engineering in cooperation with the Accident Prevention Bureau of the Nassau County Police Department.

The changes involved are:

1. Eastbound Old Country Road traffic intending to head north on Wantagh Parkway will have to use the loop ramp on the southeast corner of the intersection rather than turning left into Duffys Avenue and then entering the Parkway.

2. Eastbound Old Country Road

traffic intending to head east on Duffys Avenue or north on Charlotte Avenue to West John Street will now turn left at Charlotte rather than at Duffy's Avenue.

3. Westbound left-turns at Old Country Road and Apex Lane will be prohibited. The recommended alternate route is Levittown Parkway to Access Lane.

Rubber guides and pavement markings will be used to prevent eastbound Old Country Road traffic from making the left turns into Duffy's Avenue.

By reducing the number of left turns in this heavily travelled area a reduction of accidents and improvement of traffic flow should result, according to traffic experts.

Nassau County Executive Eugene H. Nickerson today announced that the County of Nassau will again host the Memorial Day Services presented by the United Veterans Organization of Nassau at Dwight D. Eisenhower Park on Sunday, May 25. Letters have been sent by County Executive Nickerson and Alphonse J. Villari, president of the U.V.O. to all veterans groups inviting them their auxiliaries, junior

units, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts Units to attend with their colors. Assembly will be at 10 a.m. at the Veteran's Memorial in the park, which was formerly called Salisbury Park and renamed last month in honor of the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower. The County Executive will deliver a brief address. In case of rain the service will be conducted in the Salisbury Club.

The Nassau County Lacrosse Championship Tourney gets underway Friday.

Hicksville will meet Mineola on the Mineola field STARTING AT 4:30 P.M.

The winner advances to the second round at Manhasset against Manhasset, Tuesday at the same time.

The Hicksville J.V. Lacrosse team upset Herricks 6-1, Wednesday afternoon, and claimed the divisional championship for the third year in a row.

Coach Joe Umbria's team finished with a 8 won 2 lost record.

Bob Rogers tallied the first goal and Tony Giacomaggio broke a 1-1 deadlock at 9:55 of the first period. Rogers scored in the second period.

Dean Lewis counted twice to extend the lead and Giacomaggio closed it down in the fourth period.

Captain Paul McGowan stood out defensively as Hicksville worked against 13 penalties to two in the first 38 minutes.

As the Herald goes to press a slim, slim hope still remains that Hicksville will be in 1969 baseball playoffs.

The comets completed their schedule with a 7-5 record. Plainesville and Clark each had 7-3 and in the demanding league MacArthur, the defending County champion, had 6-4.

Hicksville needed a long short parlay. Farmingdale had to beat MacArthur just once and either Plainesville or Clark had to sweep the two game finale these teams had with each other. A Plainesville-Clark split in the final games would leave Hicksville on the sidelines.

Should the Division end in a three way tie for second place every team would be involved in the playoffs which get underway this Tuesday.

As Hicksville concluded its season Gary Jackson gave it a big effort to win a playoff berth outright but the hitters failed him again as MacArthur won 3-2. Jackson suffered much the same fate in a 1-0 loss to Herricks.

Bob Rogers pitched a two hitter against MacArthur the next day and won 3-0. That kept some hope for the Comets alive. Hicksville only got one hit off the bat of Dennis Petalis but took advantage of walks and errors to scramble wildly about the bases for its run.

In a non-league encounter with a young Jericho team Steve Marlow allowed just three hits as the Comets won 4-0.

It was a fine scoreless duel for six innings until Doug Bressch, Danny Petalis and Mike Glibowski unloaded the lumber for all the runs.

On the season Hicksville had an overall record of 13 wins and 6 defeats with three non-league games left on the card.

It was a four goal burst for Clint Brown, reputed to be a

prime candidate for quarterback Hicksville's 1969 football varsity, that carried the Junior Varsity Hicksville Latrosse team to a 7-4 win over Farmingdale. The win avenged a previous upset at the hands of the Dalers.

It brought the Hicksville JV record to 11-4 overall and 7-2 in the league. Bob Rogers (different then the baseball pitcher), Charlie Inducci and Dean Louis scored the other goals for the Orange and Black.

Goalie Larry Genna wasn't going to allow any late rally by the Dalers to spoil the day for the Orange this time. He was alert all the way and when the defense faltered he was there to kick out the Daler shots. In all he made 17 saves on the afternoon.

Our spies inform us that our town's name gets considerable mention in the press down in Louisville, Kentucky.

Some of it pokes a little fun at the name itself, which of course we are all used too, but the main frame of reference is the ability to produce baseball players.

Chris Coletta is leading the league in batting for the Louisville club and he has developed considerable press and fan following.

He was an outstanding athlete for Hicksville High School and won All-Scholastic honors in Football, basketball and baseball in his Senior year.

Upon graduation he was signed by the Boston Red Sox and it has been a long struggle for him. He has always been just on the point of breaking into the major leagues but the nod has never come. He had been playing for Pittsfield before being brought up by the Triple A.

Many reasons are advanced. The abundant talent that the Red Sox have acquired in recent years is one of the principle drawbacks and the construction of Fenway Park is another. It just is not made for a hitter on the style of Chris.

The major leagues have shelved out a quarter of a million dollars in bonus payments to Hicksville players in the last decade. The best hope that Hicksville has to gain a major leaguer is Chris.

Aside from being a first class athlete, Chris is remembered as a first class gentleman. It is often when talking about baseball players from Hicksville that those who know him still express such regard and good wishes that he makes the top.

His family has moved to Rhode Island but he still comes out straight with reporters that he played his baseball in Hicksville, Long Island.

(b) the word "vehicle"
shall mean any device by
which any person or property
may be transported upon a
highway, except those
operated upon rails or tracks.

(c) the word "person"
shall mean and include a
natural person, firm,
association, co-partnership
or corporation.

(d) the word "operator"
shall mean and include every
individual who shall operate
a vehicle as the owner
thereof or as the agent,
employee or permittee of the
owner.

(e) the word "park"
"parking" or "parked" shall
mean the stopping of a motor
vehicle or motorcycle upon
any public highway and
leaving such motor vehicle or
motorcycle unattended by a
person capable of operating
it for a period longer than
necessary to load or unload
passenger or freight.

Section 2.

Parking meter zones are
hereby designated and
established as being those
streets and parts of streets
upon which limited parking is
now permitted under

authority and by virtue of all
limited parking ordinance
now effective, and the
parking limits and
restrictions hereinbefore
provided are hereby in-
corporated in this ordinance
for all uses and purposes
applicable to the conditions,
terms and enforcement
hereof, and such other
parking meter zones as may
