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## Do We Outspend Jackie Onassis? No!

Today we live in an interesting, if hectic, society. We are constantly bombarded with news, minutes after the events occur. The impulse to be informed on a global scale grips us so tenaciously that we listen spellbound to car radios and stare in fascination at the magic eye on the world, news in half-hour containers. Intermittently we are subjected to commercials that are designed to sell an idea and product in a half minute - usually accompanied by an escalation of noise and excitement.

Our psychological intake system seems to be so conditioned by the instantaneous - communication media that we accept products and points of view emotionally without examining the detail or reaching a conclusion based on reason. Such conclusions are convenient - they take less time and effort. They sound right. But are they? Let's examine the theory in Hicksville.

Recently, 10,000 flyers were distributed in Hicksville with this headline:

"DO WE OUTSPEND JACKIE ONASSIS?" The article continued:

"Dividing last year's approved budget of \$17,099,490 by the public school total enrollment of 11,907 pupils (Sept. 1968), proves that our planned total cost for the year was \$1,436 Per Pupil!! (Source: Administration) John F. Kennedy Jr, son of the late President, entered the 3rd grade of the

Collegiate Private School (LI Press \$21,680). In this school the faculty pupil ratio is 1 to 9, and the median total cost - tuition and extras, grades 1-12, for the year was \$1,438 PER PUPIL!!! (Source: 1968 sergeants (sic) - Pvt Schools

QUESTION: DOES IT MAKE SENSE TO HAVE A PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM IF MANY PRIVATE SCHOOLS, ALREADY, DO IT FOR LESS MONEY??"

Today, when problems of society are falling onto people as personal calamities (e.g., taxes), one might say - "That's right" - without thinking further, without examining the facts.

The Collegiate School is a well known boys' private school, Grades 1-12. It enrolls approximately 500 boys of many different nationalities who are admitted on the basis of achievement tests and aptitude. They must show an ability to handle college preparatory work. In brief, it is a selective school. Our public schools educate all children. No examination for admission is necessary.

Private Schools 1968, by Porter Sargent, does state that the tuition for Collegiate School runs from \$975 to \$1550, plus from \$150 to \$250. No median is published in Sargent's book. Interesting enough, the 1969 edition of Private Independent

Schools (published by Bunting & Lyon) shows that the tuition for this year is from \$1100 to \$1850. This ..... is almost a 20 percent

increase for some grades over the last year.

"Do We Outspend Jackie Onassis?" Mrs. Onassis has two children - a boy 8 and a girl 11. Let us assume for a moment that she spent an equal amount on the girl's education as she did for the boy at Collegiate. Using the mysterious "median" figure of \$1438 each from the leaflet, it would mean that in 1968 Mrs. Onassis' education bill had to be at least \$2876.

Assume for a moment that Mrs. Onassis lived in Hicksville in a house assessed at \$6000 and that her two children attended public school. What would her educational costs be for the two children for 1968-69? Answer - \$504.30.

Jackie Onassis' bill in private school - \$2876.00  
Jackie Onassis' bill in Hicksville - \$504.30

Now perhaps we can answer the question begged - "Do We Outspend Jackie Onassis?" The answer is No!

The second inquiry proposed by the leaflet was:

"QUESTION: DOES IT MAKE SENSE TO HAVE A PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM IF MANY PRIVATE SCHOOLS, ALREADY, DO IT FOR LESS MONEY??"

The answer must be Yes! We need the public schools. One has but to subtract the two costs in the former comparison to realize that Mrs. Onassis would have saved \$2371.70 if her children attended Hicksville Public Schools.

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# Hicksville School Board Candidates

In addition to voting on budgetary items June 10, Hicksville residents will be deciding on three School Board candidates. The three seats up for election are those currently held by Cornelius McCormack, Harold Sternberger and Harry Kershen.

Cornelius J. McCormack has served on the Hicksville School Board for nine (9) years and now holds the position of President of the Board. Mr. McCormack has lived in Hicksville for 19 years and has 4 children, 3 of whom are graduate teachers, the youngest attending Holy Trinity Diocesan High School, M.V.R. Mr. McCormack has been employed by the United States Lines Company for 37 years, as Manager of Operations. He is a past President of the Civic Association and the Holy Name Society of Holy Family Church. He also serves on the Holy Family School Board. Mr. McCormack was a swimming and track coach for C.Y.O. and a former Little League coach. He was an Area Leader for the Boy Scouts' Finance Drive. Mr. McCormack is running as an independent candidate.

Opposing Mr. McCormack and running as a candidate of the League for the Intelligent Financing of Education (LIFE) in Hicksville is James V. Yorke. Mr. Yorke has been a Hicksville resident for 10 years and four of his six children attend public schools in this district. Mr. Yorke has been a teacher for 15 years and now teaches in Lynbrook. He is a member of the Holy Name Society at St. Ignatius Loyola Church. He is also a member of the Council for Basic Education, Washington, D.C. and Mensa of Long Island.

Harold Sternberger is seeking re-election to the School Board as an independent candidate. Mr. Sternberger has resided in Hicksville for over 14 years and his two children are attending Hicksville High School. Mr. Sternberger was elected to the School Board three years ago and previously served on the School Board Advisory Council. He is a past officer of the Old Northwest Civic Association, a member of Burns Avenue and Junior High PTAs, a committeeman for one of the local Cub Packs and a 4-H leader. Mr. Sternberger is the Chief Management Analyst for the County of Nassau. Among his other activities, he is a founder and past officer of the Long Island Chapter of the American Institute of Industrial Engineers and a past member of the Society of American Value Engineers. Mr. Sternberger taught a course in the Hicksville Adult Education program for eight years and was an evening instructor at Hofstra University for six years. He is a member of Temple Beth Torah.

Thomas Muratore is opposing Mr. Sternberger. Mr. Muratore is a LIFE candidate. He has been a resident of Hicksville for 16 years and has two children in the public schools here. Mr. Muratore is a Deputy Sheriff for Nassau County. He is a member of

Council 2550, Knights of Columbus and C. Wagner Post, American Legion. He is also president of Holy Name Society at St. Ignatius Loyola Church.

Another candidate seeking re-election is Harry Kershen, an independent candidate endorsed by LIFE. Mr. Kershen has lived in Hicksville for 16 years and has three children attending public schools in this district. Mr. Kershen is a past Secretary of the Board of Education and served on the Adult Education, Budget, and Community Relations Advisory Committees. He has been a School Board member for three years. Mr. Kershen is a teacher and a consultant to the State Education Department. He is a past trustee for Temple Beth Avodah.

Lawrence I. Wolfson is the candidate running against Mr. Kershen. Mr. Wolfson has lived in the community for 10 years and has two children attending Hicksville public schools. He is an attorney and accountant and teaches a course, in the Hicksville Adult Education program. Mr. Wolfson served on the Budget and Community Relations Advisory Committees for the Hicksville School Board. He is a member of the Knights of Pythias, a Committee Chairman for Cub Scouts, and has been a co-manager and coach of the Hicksville American Little League. He is treasurer of Community Reform Temple and past president of the Mens' Club. Mr. Wolfson was also one of the founders of Y.E.S. (Youth, Education, Scholarship.) 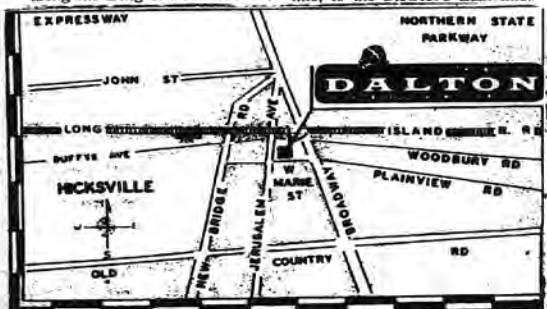

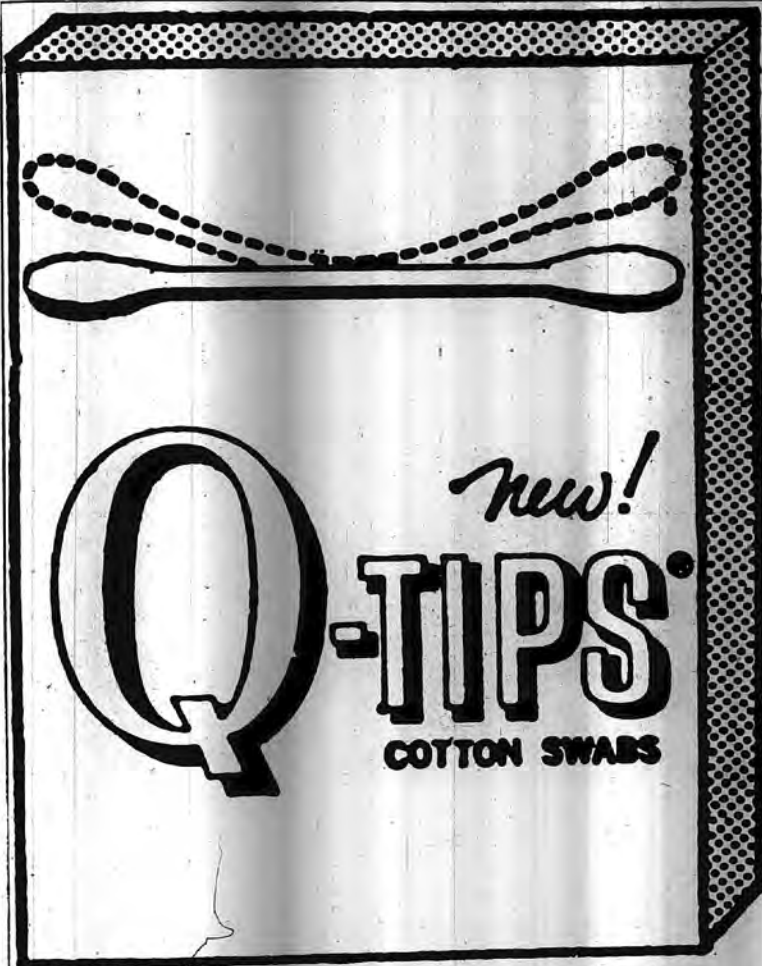

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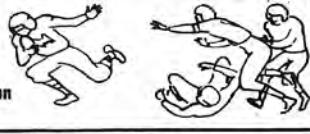
