Herald Report of School Board Dist. 17 Hicksville

An important announcement from Tuesday night's School Board meeting: District Attorney of Nassau County, William Cahn, will speak to Hicksville parents about narcotics, Monday, June 16 at 8:15 P.M. in the Senior High School Auditorium. We urge all parents to attend. The information Mr. Cahn will give is important to all of us.

Dr. John J. Cadden was hired to replace Dr. Gerald Murphy, Assistant Superintendent for the Hicksville School District. Dr. Murphy left the district in March of this year. Dr. Cadden will be paid \$26,000, on a twelve-month basis, beginning with his employment, July 1.

The last day of school will be Monday, June 23. This will be a short session.

Farewell and thanks for a job well done were extended to Mr. Charles Ahern, Assistant Superintendent. Mr. Ahern will be leaving Hicksville this month to accept the job as Superintendent of the Oswego, N.Y. School District.

The Board then received election returns. Cornelius McCormack, Thomas Muratore and Harry Kershen were elected to serve on the Hicksville School Board for the next three years. Ruth Aaron was re-elected to the Library Board for five years. The school and library budgets passed. Both propositions for the relocatable classrooms at the Junior and Senior High Schools were defeated.

Hicksville Happenings Budgets Pa.

Voters approved our \$17,773,155 school budget, 3,526 to 3,266. This budget will raise the current tax rate of \$8.40 to \$8.97. Approved was a library budget of \$345,171.56, which will raise the library tax rate to 33 cents. The vote on the library proposition was 4,209 to 2,545.

Defeated by 3,716 to 3,005 was a special proposition authorizing \$114,500 for construction of additional rooms at the junior high school. Also defeated, 3,931 to 2,740, was a proposition authorizing \$135,500 for construction of additional rooms at the senior high school.

In races for three-year terms on the school board, incumbent Cornelius J. McCormack defeated James V. Yorke, 3,549 to 2,695; Thomas Muratore defeated incumbent Harold Sternberger, 3,832 to 2,303, and incumbent Harry Kershen defeated Lawrence I. Wolfson, 3,824 to 2,275.

For a five-year term on the library board, incumbent Mrs. Ruth Aaron defeated Frank Zindulka, 3,028 to 2,799.

From Superintendent of Schools Donald Abt and the Board of Education of Hicksville School District 17, came

following:

"Please accept our heartiest thank you for passing the school and library budgets for 1969-70.

Your Board of Education and our professional staff congratulate you for placing first priority on your children. The school budget submitted to you reflected the most economical financial projection possible at the time without sacrificing your child's educational opportunities.

We pledge to continue providing your child with a sound, modern education for a reasonable sum.

Again, thank you for your "Yes" votes.

In a statement to THE HERALD, Library Director Kenneth Barnes said, "The approval of the Library budget will make it possible to restore much needed library services and programs.

It was truly a vote for the community made possible by the cooperation of the newspapers, educational organizations, the library staff, student volunteers and our telephone squad of housewives.

The Board of Trustees, myself and staff, wish to express our heartfelt appreciation to all who contributed their time and efforts to their library."

New Asst. Supt. of Schools Appointed By Board Of Ed.

Dr. John J. Cadden, Dean of Faculty at Mercer County College, Trenton, New Jersey, was appointed Assistant Superintendent of Schools in Hicksville.

Dr. Cadden's career spans 19 years in education. He taught English in Bishop Loughlin High School, Brooklyn, N.Y., Junior High School 60 in Manhattan, and in the Levittown secondary schools, Division Avenue and Levittown Memorial. In 1954 he was appointed Director of Audio-

Visual Education in Levittown. While in this post he served as Consultant for Eye Gate House, and edited several series of educational filmstrips. In the following year he directed the first experimental educational television project sponsored by the New York State Education Department. In 1959 he was appointed Director of Adult Education.

In 1961 Dr. Cadden left the Levittown Schools to become Professor and Chairman of the

English Department at Nassau Community College, Garden City, where he founded and edited the Nassau Review and founded the American Writers' Festival. In 1967 he was appointed the first Dean of Faculty at Mercer County Community College, Trenton, New Jersey.

At various times Dr. Cadden taught in the Graduate Schools of Education at Hofstra University and St. John's University.

He holds a B.A. from Maryknoll College, an M.A. and Ph.D. in Romantic Literature from St. John's University, and an M.S. in Educational Administration from Hofstra University.

Dr. Cadden has co-authored a college text, Science and Literature, D.C. Heath, written A Critical Study of D. H. Lawrence's Sons and Lovers, Barrister, and authored two forthcoming books: The Damnation of Rafael Buonagente and The Political History of Medieval Ireland, 1110-1616.

He is a member of the Trenton Diocesan Board of Education and the Trenton Chapter of the American Red Cross, and holds memberships in several professional organizations.

Married to Phyllis Goss Cadden, he is the father of five children, Marian Rose 15, Kerry Ann 13, Sheila Marie 12, Nancy Patricia 10, and Kevin Patrick 5.

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School Guard Positions Open

School Crossing Guard positions are now open to qualified women, it was announced today by Nassau County Police Commissioner Francis B. Looney.

About 100 women will be appointed to fill new school Crossing openings, and vacancies due to resignations, retirements and deaths.

Women, 21 to 42 years old, who are at least 5' 2" tall, may apply for the openings by personally contacting the commanding officer of their local Nassau County Police precinct.

Appointees will receive training and uniforms in August or early September. They will assume their duties when the Fall school term begins.

A Nassau County Police School Crossing Guard begins at \$2.55 an hour and progresses yearly to \$3.75 an hour. A guard works at least four hours a day on a crossing in the vicinity of her home.

When the appointments are filled, the Nassau County Police Department will have 426 School Crossing Guards.

FCC PLANNING PAY TV AFTER JUNE 12

Rep. James G. O'Hara (Mich.) ... I am today introducing a bill (H.R. 11488) which is designed to protect American television viewers from the threat of a financial whirlpool—pay television—which could result in many American families running up bills of \$20, \$30, and \$40 a month to watch television.

Unless Congress acts quickly, there is a real danger that some of the television programs which we have enjoyed without charge will soon cost \$1, \$2, and \$3 each. Those of us who watch college and professional football games on weekend afternoons may have to pay for this entertainment.

"This will put a heavy burden on low-income groups, especially the elderly who have limited incomes and who rely heavily on free television for their entertainment."

"For this reason, I am introducing a bill which will prohibit the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) from authorizing pay television stations. The Commission decided last December that it will begin granting licenses for pay television stations after June 12. That decision is being appealed to the U. S. Court of Appeals in Washington. While the appellate court could rule against pay television, prompt action by Congress would be decisive."

"This year, NBC paid \$25 million to professional football to carry the super-bowl game which was seen on 204 million television sets. But NBC and the other networks would be

easily outbid if the 204 million TV set owners paid \$1 each for the game, bringing in \$204 million for the pay television network."

"With far greater revenue potential than the commercial networks, the pay television network could easily obtain the television contracts for the majority of college and professional sports and better TV 'specials.'"

"There is no question that pay television programs would be shown at prime-time viewing, making a deep impact at the same time that the commercial networks obtain their greatest advertising revenues. By showing their best fare at prime time, the pay television stations could gradually draw away the free-TV audiences leaving the commercial networks with smaller and smaller audiences and less and less advertising dollars to pay for programs now seen free."

"The Federal Communications Commission was obviously motivated by a deep concern for greater program diversification on television when it approved the pay television system. It is certainly hoped that the FCC selects another means to obtain program diversification."

CURB REPAIRS TO CONTINUE

Town Councilman Ralph Diamond advised that the repairs to the curbs and driveway entrances will continue until all streets in East Birchwood have been covered. Area residents have already noticed the concrete-pouring crews have branched out from Birchwood Park Drive to nearby streets. So, be patient, your street may be next.

Jericho School Budget

A lengthy, crowded, special meeting was held on June 6, called by the Jericho Board of Education, regarding re-submission of the Jericho School Budget. Many residents indicated that they did not want an Austerity Budget, but did want some token reductions on the original budget. After several hours, the Board adjourned for executive Session. The Board then announced that they had decided to re-submit the Jericho School Budget with \$20,000 removed, and to offer the \$20,000 worth of items as a separate proposition. The vote was set for Wednesday, June 25, 1969, from 2-10 PM, in the Jericho High School gymnasium.

At a subsequent meeting, held on Monday, June 9, 1969, the Board of Education decided to eliminate the second proposition, and to submit a trimmed budget for \$6,884,318 (which is \$20,000 less than the original budget) on June 25, 1969.

The original budget, which was defeated twice, would have added 99.9 cents to the present tax rate. The removal of \$20,000 will reduce the increase by 4 cents, so that the new tax rate will be \$9.25 per hundred. This is one of the lowest increases on Long Island.

Under the law, if a Board does

not have a budget by July 1, the start of the school fiscal year, it automatically must go on an austerity operation until the beginning of the regular school year in September, even if a budget is subsequently approved during the summer. On an Austerity Budget, the Board can eliminate all non-mandated items, such as bus service under two miles to elementary schools and under three miles to secondary schools; lunch program and sale of milk; textbooks and supplies in the elementary schools; interscholastic sports and after-school activities; and all summer programs, including the self-sustaining recreation program and summer drivers' education. All mandated items, such as salaries, employee benefits, debt service, insurance, etc., which account for the major portion of the expenses, would have to be paid on an Austerity Budget anyway, so the saving, even under Austerity, would not be enough to make up for the personal expense and inconvenience involved.

For your children's sake, as well as your own, it is strongly recommended that all residents of the Jericho School District vote YES for the budget on June 25.

Jericho Vamps Win New Master Award

The Jericho Volunteer Fire Department has won the Master Award given by the New York Daily News. Scoring its third win for an outstanding performance during an Easter Sunday fire at the Milleridge Inn, the crack Jericho Volunteer Fire Department retired the News Master Trophy. This award is given for outstanding fire fighting by the nearly 300 volunteer fire departments in Nassau, Suffolk, Westchester, Putnam and Fairfield counties.

The Jericho Fire Department had two previous wins; July 1966 for a fire at the Jericho stables, and again in September 1968 for a serious gasoline tanker fire on

the Long Island Expressway. At 2:30 p.m. on Easter Sunday, April 6th a fire broke out in the Milleridge Inn. The restaurant was crowded with holiday diners, many of them children. Heavy smoke quickly filled the restaurant and many diners became panicky. Several patrons and employees were overcome by the smoke and required artificial respiration and subsequent hospitalization. Jericho firemen quickly evacuated the restaurant and proceeded to attack the fire. In the words of Jericho Fire Chief Eugene Marmann "the men did an excellent job without regard to their own safety."

Eddie Ieda Chosen For Two All-Star Squads

Edward Ieda, Jericho High School Senior, has been honored by selection as a 1969 All-Star Baseball Player by the New York Daily News. Eddie, an outstanding Jericho athlete, and his coach, Thomas Valentine, were guests of the Daily News at the Yankee-Chicago double header on June 8.

Following the game, Eddie and Mr. Valentine were presented

with trophies. A dinner at the Stadium Club honored the teenagers selected in the News annual choice of top high school players.

In addition, Eddie was named to the All-County Baseball Team last week. The Nassau County coaches chose 32 High School players from among all the divisions in the Public School set-up.

Section 270.00 of The N.Y. State PENAL LAW Prohibits the Sale, Distribution And Possession of Fireworks

Definition of "fireworks": The term "fireworks," as used in this section, is defined and declared to be and to include any blank cartridge, blank cartridge pistol, or toy cannon in which explosives are used, firecrackers, torpedoes, skyrockets, Roman candles, bombs, sparklers or other combustible or explosive of like construction, or any preparation containing any explosive or inflammable compound or any tablets or other devices commonly used and sold as fireworks containing nitrates, chlorates, oxalates, sulphides of lead, barium, antimony, arsenic, mercury, nitroglycerine, phosphorus or any compound containing any of the same or other explosives, or any substance or combination of sub-

stances, or article prepared for the purpose of producing a visible or an audible effect by combustion, explosion, deflagration or detonation, or other device containing any explosive substance.

PUNISHMENT: Any person who shall be convicted of the misdemeanor, herein defined, of offering or exposing for sale or possessing, selling, furnishing, using, exploding, or causing to explode, any fireworks, may be punished by a fine of not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each offense or by imprisonment for a period not exceeding ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

A Letter To The Editor:

Dear Editor:

If our society is to be democratic and capable of weathering the test of time, it must be anchored to a strong foundation. This foundation will not crumble when composed of people with the freedom to seek out the truth, with the power to support analyze the facts, and with the responsibility then to act in a reasonable manner.

The Associations of the Secondary School Administration of Suffolk and Nassau Counties are concerned about the well being of our country. As educators, we have the duty to teach the truth based on logical patterns of thought and scientific research.

We believe that the American news media should fully enjoy the right of free expression. If the news media are to enjoy this right, they must assume their share of responsibility, a responsibility, we say, to disseminate the news as it is; to place things in proper perspective; to free stories from distortion and bias.

In carrying out our responsibilities educational leaders in our communities, we too are concerned with violence, immoral acts, student unrest, narcotic abuse and delinquency; but we believe that these types of

subjects are getting coverage out of proportion to their rightful place in the total news picture, and might even be causing an escalation of this type of problem for school and community.

We believe the time has come when the positive and constructive aspects of our society should be highlighted, or at least given equal billing. To this end we solicit the assistance of all news media, and challenge you to reassess and redirect your energies in light of the crisis our country currently faces.

Christina Sherri and John Villa for asking:

"What is chewing gum made from?"

Most chewing gum is made from rubber, mixed with other tree gums, to which sugar and flavoring are added. Chicle is a gum formed from latex, a milky fluid usually taken from the sapodilla tree, a large evergreen growing in tropical America. The sapodilla also produces a luscious fruit called the sapodilla plum.

Mrs. Roy Selway who asks: "Is the original 'David' statue by Michelangelo in the Academy of Fine Arts in Florence, Italy?"

The statue of the biblical David was commissioned by the city of Florence in 1501. When completed, it was installed at the Vecchio Palace where it stood until 1882. It was then removed to the Academy.

Debbie Myers who wants to know: "How can one tell a raven from a crow?"

A raven is almost twice the size of a crow when full-grown. A raven in flight alternates between soaring on horizontal wings like a hawk and flapping its wings, whereas a crow flies steadily with wings bent upward and downward. And a raven, while perched, can be seen to have shaggy feathers at its throat. The crow's throat is smooth-feathered.

Miss Leah Krider for asking: "Where are most of Florida's 'fantastic floating islands'?"

These floating islands, masses of vegetation that actually move about in the water, are located in Lake Griffin State Park, three miles north of Leesburg, in one of the largest lakes in central Florida.

Steve Thompson whose question was:

"Which bird flies the farthest round trip during its annual migration?"

The long distance migration record probably belongs to the Arctic tern, a sea bird which breeds within 8 degrees of the North Pole and winters in the Antarctic regions at the other extremity of the earth. To do this, the tern must fly about 12,000 miles in each direction.
