Voters approved our \$17,773,155 school budget, 3,526 to 3,266. This budget will raise the currect tax rate of \$8.40 to \$8.97. Approved was a library budget of \$345,171.56, which will raise the library tax rate to 33 cents. The vote on the library proposition was 4,209 to 2 545

For a five-year term on the library board, incumbent Mrs. Ruth Aaron defeated Frank Zindulka, 3,028 to 2,799.

D. in Romantic Literature from St. John's University, and an M.S. in Educational Ad-ministration from Hofstra University.

Lawrence's Sons and Lovers, Barrister, and authored two forthcoming books: The Dam-nation of Rafael Buonagente and The Political History of Medieval Ireland, 1110-1616.

School Crossing Guard positions are now open to qualified women, it was announced today by Nassau County Police Commissioner Francis B. Looney. About 100 women will be appointed to fill new school Crossing openings, and vacancies due to resignations, retirements and deaths. Women, 21 to 42 years old, who are t least 5' 2' till, may apply for the openings by personally contacting the commanding officer of their local Nassau County Police precinct. Appointees will receive training and uniforms in August or early September. They will assume their duties when the Fall school term begins.



Section 270.00 of The N.Y. State PENAL LAW Prohibits the Sale, Distribution And Possession of Fireworks

Definition of "fireworks": The term "fireworks," as used in this section, is defined and declared to be and to include any blank cartridge, blank cartridge pistol, or toy cannon in which explosives are used, firecrackers, torpedoes, skyrockets, Roman candles, bombs, sparklers or other combustible or explosive of like construction, or any preparation containing any explosive or inflammable compound or any tablets or other devices commonly used and sold as fireworks containing nitrates, chlorates, oxalates, sulphides of lead, barium, antimony, arsenic, mercury, nitroglycerine, phosphorus or any compound containing any of the same or other explosives, or any substance or combination of sub-

stances, or article prepared for the purpose of producing a visible or an audible effect by combustion, ex-plosion, deflagration or detonation, or other device containing any explosive substance

PUNISHMENT: Any person who shall be convicted of the misdemeanor, herein defined, of offering or exposing for sale or possessing, selling, fur-nishing, using, exploding, or causing to explode, any fireworks, may be punished by a fine of not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each offense or by imprisonment for a period not exceeding ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment.
