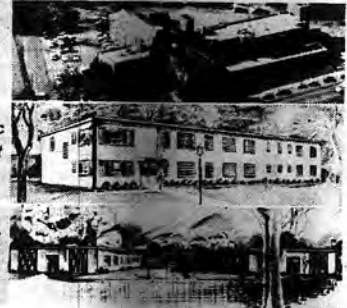

Completes SSTP

Wayne Steruberger, a student at Hicksville H.S. has successfully completed the Secondary Science Training Program (SSTP) at Stevens Institute of Technology. Our Police Commissioner Urges Safety Measures

Police Commissioner Francis B. Looney urged residents to help make the summer season a safe and crime-free season.

"The summer," Looney said, "is a time when more young people are out of the home and on the roads; when more homes are unoccupied because of day-trips and vacations; when more people are involved in activities that can result in danger; when more young people find time hanging heavy. It is a time, generally, when accidents and crime problems mount."

He urged attention to small details designed to safeguard life, property and freedom.

"Our first thought," he said, "is that parents know where their children are and with whom they spend their time. Regardless of the age of the child, there are dangerous places, dangerous persons and dangerous activities."

"One of our major concerns is the increased involvement of teenagers with narcotics and drugs, and we are concerned lest summer boredom find an outlet in this area. It might be well for youth-serving agencies in each community to develop positive programs to combat negative attitudes and behavior."

Looney asked the public to exercise courtesy and patience on the highways, waterways, beaches and parks during the summer.

"Whatever your plans," Looney added, "whether you take an auto trip or stay home; whether you swim at a beach, or picnic in a park; whether you go fishing or boating, you can make this a safe summer by guiding all your activities with care, thoughtfulness and courtesy."

He warned drivers to beware of the greatest killer on the highways... **SPEED.**

Bathers were advised not to extend themselves beyond the limits of their skills and to obey the orders of lifeguards. Picnickers were cautioned to use care in starting grill fires and to keep knives and other sharp instruments beyond the reach of children.

Looney asked residents who are planning to leave their homes unoccupied for an extended period, to help police safeguard their property.

He called upon the public to follow a simple two step operation that will help prevent burglaries in the home and in the community.

"The first step," he said, "is removing the profit from burglary. Profit for a burglar comes from the cash and easy-to-deposit jewelry found in a home. Cash and jewelry in the home should be hidden and locked securely."

"The second step, is to eliminate the opportunity for burglary. Be your neighbor's keeper. Keep your eyes open for strangers around your neighbor's home; note license numbers when you can; call police as quickly as possible. You and your neighbor working together can eliminate burglaries."

Residents were advised when leaving home for the day or evening to lock all windows and doors, and leave a light burning at night. Close and lock your garage door. Don't leave notes explaining your absence, or leave a key any place. Don't leave a ladder where a burglar can use it to gain entry. When you leave home for an extended period, notify police, so they can check your home. Stop deliveries of mail, milk and newspapers. Ask a neighbor to remove circulars from letterbox, and keep an eye on house and property. Eliminate as much as possible the indication that you are absent.

Notify police immediately if strangers, young or old ring doorbells, and ask vague or strange questions; persons without credentials ring doorbells, seek employment, or attempt to gain admittance to your home to solicit or sell; strangers who seek information about your family or neighbors, or their whereabouts; the presence of suspicious persons or cars in your neighborhood.

The Hicksville School Recreation Department opened its summer program on Tuesday, July 1, 1969. Morning playgrounds for children and evening activities for all are underway. Special events, trips, filmmaking, golf, tennis, concerts,

swimming dances, conditioning, and other activities are featured.

Hicksville Recreation is your organized community recreation department governed and supported under the auspices of the Board of Education. The program entitles the district to \$15,000 of support from the Town of Oyster Bay. This office is responsible for year-round programming of directly led activities, assignment of community groups to school facilities as well as consultation and coordination with such groups.

The program had to be suspended during the past two summers due to austerity conditions. However, it is now in full swing. The department was initiated in 1958 and has presented a variety of activities that have included social, cultural and athletic leisure pursuits.

A Message From Our Postmaster

The parcel post weight limit will be raised to 40 pounds for shipments between first-class post offices after July 1, Postmaster Ralph G. Cascardo announced today.

The maximum parcel post weight limit will be increased from 30 pounds on shipments between the larger post offices in the third through eighth parcel post zones. (More than 150 miles.) On packages sent locally and to offices in parcel post zones one and two, the ceiling has been 40 pounds. The maximum size of packages sent between all first-class offices remains 72 inches in combined length and girth.

The size limit on parcels sent to or from smaller offices, rural or star routes, military post offices, and all Alaskan and Hawaiian

post offices stays at 70 pounds, with a combined length and girth of 100 inches, Postmaster Ralph G. Cascardo added. Public Law 89-593, enacted September 20, 1966, authorized the postal service to increase weight and size limits on shipments between larger cities. On July 1 of 1970 and 1971, the length and girth limits are scheduled to rise to 78 and 84 inches, respectively, on shipments between first-class post offices.

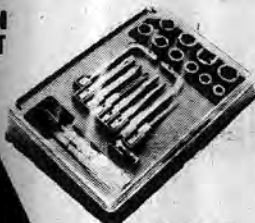

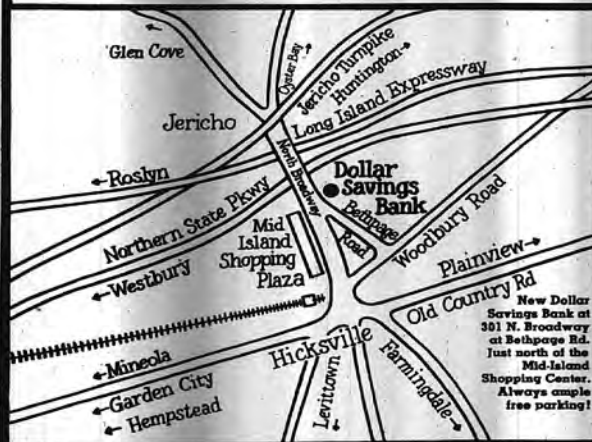

Teamwork Assists In School Budget Passage

With the largest voter turnout in the history of the school district, the Jericho School Budget for 1969-1970 was resoundingly passed on its third vote. The \$6,984,318 budget (trimmed by \$20,000 after the second vote) was approved 1772 to 955 on June 25, raising the tax rate to \$9.25 for each \$100 of assessed valuation, thereby avoiding an Austerity Budget.

The Jericho Education Committee of the Birchwood Civic Association, along with PTA's and other Education Committees, was instrumental in making phone calls, in sending out flyers, and in putting up signs, urging residents to vote. I would like to thank the following people on the Committee: Bernice Baiman, Arline Locker, Milton Mensch, Sam Saitz, Marie Genna, Honey Geyer, Ruth Kip-

pleman, Roz Eismann, Bea Felsler, Betty Goldstein and all their helpers, for making telephone calls; special thanks to Milt Mensch for writing and printing the flyer; apologetic thanks to Sara Herskowitz for lettering two beautiful sheet signs, and to Steve Shimberg and Elliot Marshall for putting them up, even though the signs mysteriously disappeared after one day.

The large voter turnout was gratifying, but it is unfortunate that the same number of people did not come out to vote the first time, thereby saving the district approximately \$2,000 in expenses for the two additional referendums. Let us hope that residents now realize the importance of exercising their right to vote.

Mailbox Vandalism

Earlier in the week, someone threw a large firecracker into the collection mailbox at the corner of Birchwood Park Drive and Millpond Street, East Birchwood, blowing off its lock and causing other damage. However, the contents of the box were untouched, according to Mrs. Signe Halleran, Postmaster of Jericho. While instances of junk and dirt being thrown into boxes are common, this was the first incident of this nature.

The mailbox will have a new lock installed and will be repaired and repainted. It will probably be replaced at the same location.

In line with re-anchoring this particular mailbox, Mrs. Halleran mentioned that, as a result of the repairs currently being made to the curbing and sidewalks in the East Birchwood community, many of the area's mailboxes have become unsecured. Anyone noticing boxes in this condition are requested to notify the Jericho Post Office. At the same time, Mrs. Halleran requested that residents report immediately any person seen tampering with postal department mailboxes.
