Al Tuesday's meeting the Hicksville School Board approved the following appointments:

Erwin Rozran, Administrative Assistant - effective July 1, at \$22,000 per year. This is a twelve-month position.

William Claude Dukenfield is coming to the Hicksville Public Library! In case this fact does not create interest, may we go on to say that this is the real name of W. C. Fields. Good old W. C. is coming to the Hicksville Public Library Wed-nesday, July 16th at 8 o'clock.

Bulbous nose, grating cantankerous voice disposition, mordant wit, blustering manner - these are unlikely ingredients for popularity, but they are what people remember most fondly about W. C. Fields. The

audiences loved unlovable Fields emphathically because they understood that in his funny, twisted implacable way, he was eternally fighting the same enemies fighting the same enemies they were. For whatever reason, people did love him, and the Fields films still play to capacity houses today. The Fields name is still a household word.

After a fabulous career in vaudeville and musical comedy, W. C. Fields devoted the last two decades of his life to the making of motion pictures. The world of W. C. Fields

was a planet all of its ow For him, inanimate ob jects seemed to have a life and will all their own. He made the best of a bad business: what is easy for us - picking up a bag of golf clubs or moving a chair was horribly difficult for him. Small children, suspenders, dress shirts, ties, cigar boxes, bass fiddles, telephones, foods all were his sworn enemies. He moved through the world with a feeling of wariness for his surroundings and a hastily assumed air of non-chalance, confident that he would in the end, prevail.

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
