## School Board Dist. 17 Hicksville

At Tuesday night's School Board meeting, William Granville was appointed elementary assistant principal for the 1969-70 school year. The school which he will be assigned will be decided later by Administration.

The Board also gave Administration the authority to begin recruiting for an elementary assistant principal at Woodland Ave.

Approval was given for the Recreation Department Recorder Consort group to perform at Oneonta State College in October. All expenses for the 15-18 musicians and chaperones will be paid by Oneonta State.

The Board discussed with the Community Relations Advisory Committee their submission of by-laws for

Board approval. It was decided that the by-laws not be accepted as Board policy but rather set up rules and regulations of operational procedure. These regulations could then be considered for adoption as Board policy. These regulations will be drawn up jointly by Community Relations members, Thomas Nagle, School Board liaison with the committee, and Joseph Catalano, School Board attorney.

The Board voted to increase superintendent Donald Abt's salary to \$31,000 for the period July 1, 1969 to June 30, 1970. For the four remaining years of Mr. Abt's 5-year contract his salary will be negotiable each year. Each year's salary will be set at a figure not less than the previous year's sum.

## Hicksville Parade & Tournament

On September 1, the Hicksville Fire Department will hold its 41st Annual Labor Day Parade and Tournament at the Mid-Island Shopping Plaza in Hicksville. The Parade will start at 9:30 a.m. followed by the Tournament at noon.

There will be over 50 Fire Departments and marching bands from the New York area as well as from distant areas such as Clinton and Westbrook Con-

necticut, Henniker, New Hampshire and Mount View, New Jersey. These fire departments will also bring with them various pieces of fire apparatus such as pumps, light trucks, rescue vans, aerial ladders, ambulances and possibly some antique equipment from days passed.

One of the pieces of fire apparatus to be featured will be the newly acquired 85 foot bucket ladder truck of the Hicksville

Fire Department. Few fire departments in this area have a truck of this magnitude. See it raise the flag of our country to its full height during the playing of the National Anthem.

Seats will be available in the grandstand area. 75 cents for adults and 25 cents for children. The refreshments will be in abundance, frankfurters, corn, cold beer and soda as well as coffee and cake.

a particular type of music and instrumentation. For instance, the dark green strip on the top of an album indicates it's an orchestral work - an orange one means popular music such as jazz, yellow-musical comedy, red - operatic, light blue - folk music, etc. The albums were then put in bins as in a record store instead of, as previously, being shelved

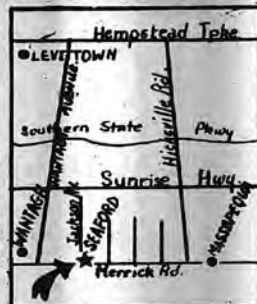
