# LIBRARY NOTES

The Hicksville Public Library revised its record collection a few years ago. We wanted to make it easier for the "browsing" borrower to see at a glance the different types of music which might interest him. To do this a color code was devised, each color indicating a different area of music, making it possible for a borrower to immediately identify

a particular type of music and instrumentation. For instance, the dark green strip on the top of an album indicates it's an orchestral work - an orange one means popular music such as jazz, yellow-musical comedy, red operatic, light blue - folk music, etc. The albums were then put in bins as in a record store instead of, as previously, being shelved

as books. So with quite a bit of work but very little cost a page was taken out of the book of merchandising (to use an appropriate analogy), and it has been very successful. In fact, many libraries since have patterned their record collection after this one.

There are almost 2000 different

after this one.

There are almost 2000 different works in the Hicksville Public Library collection, from the classical standards with which everyone is familiar, to some lesser known, but equally excellent works of the past. The present is represented with popular music of both the jazz and folk idiom and the modern classical masters. Both popular and classical disciplines are and classical disciplines are recognized as equally valid ex-pressions of musical art.
