Dairy Store Conditions Remain Unchanged

The Dairy Store of Milton Sobel has summons to answer on seven different counts, returnable to the Fourth District Court on Sept. 10th for arraignment purposes which means to plead guilty or not guilty.

The seven different violations of Town of Oyster Bay ordinances are:

(1) Violation of Article 1, Section 6, subsection 2A of the Building Code. Operating without a Certificate of Occupancy.

(2) Violation of Article 1, Section 4, subsection 1 of Building Code. Alterations have been made to the building without obtaining the necessary permit.

(3) Article 8, Section F 1 of Building Zone Ordinance. A wholesale business is not permitted in a Business F zone.

(4) Article 13 Section K4 of Building Zone Ordinance. Signs have been erected without first obtaining the necessary permits.

(5) Article 1, Section 2, subsection M. Violation of unnecessary noise ordinance.



(6) Violation of Sanitary ordinance, Section 6, subsection 9, in that sufficient waste containers have not been provided for the facility of waste material.

(7) Violation of Sanitary Ordinance, Section 6, subsection 7, in that the premises are not kept in a clean and orderly fashion.

On Sept. 10th, if the plea is guilty, there can be a

\$50. fine on each count. If the plea is not guilty then the Judge sets the date of trial. A spokesman for the Building Department of the Town of Oyster Bay said that in this event they will press the Town Attorney for a date as soon as possible. They also stated that as of HERALD press time (Sept. 4th) no attempt had been made by the accused to apply for permits where required.

New Second Precinct

The new colonial type precinct headquarters is located on Jericho Turnpike and Crossways Park Drive, Woodbury. It controls police activity in Hicksville, Jericho, Syosset, Woodbury, East Norwich, Oyster Bay, Bayville, Lattingtown and Lo-

cust Valley.

On January 1, 1926, less than a year after the Nassau County Police Department was created, the Second Precinct was formed with its stationhouse in Syosset. It began with a complement of 26 men. Today, its total strength is 257 members.

Open House for the public will be held at the Second Precinct Stationhouse on Saturday, September 20, from 10:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. The public is invited to tour the facilities of the new Stationhouse.

Dear Mrs. Noeth:
It is sad but not surprising that my former colleague Mr. Herbert Johnsen still clings to his old prejudices regarding professional educators who serve on Boards of Education.

Mr. Johnsen's letter calling for Mr. Kershen's resignation is, in fact, an insult to the democratic process and people of Hicksville who knowingly reelected Mr. Kershen to our Board of Education.

Mr. Johnsen, a distinguished trustee for 9 years, is also fully cognizant of his moral standards above and beyond the legal requirements of state law, cannot sit well the numerous educators past and present who also labored honestly for good education.

In fact, to carry Mr. Johnsen's "holier than thou" attitude to an

extreme, might one not also question business people like himself from serving on Boards of Education when they may come in contact with millions of business vendors who do millions of dollars worth of business with our school district?

To be specific, he might recall that the many educators who served as Trustees not only had nothing to gain in terms of business dealings but who were impeccable in terms of allowing members of their family from serving in the school family even though the law does not prohibit it entirely. Mr. Johnsen may find more fertile ground when he addresses himself to Trustees throughout the state who vote on contracts, tenure, and promotion of members of their own family.

After nine years on the Board, Mr. Johnsen certainly should realize the ludicrousness of his statement regarding the lack of contribution by professional educators to the field of curriculum. He certainly was aware that cur-

riculum was under the aegis of the Superintendent and that any intrusion into this field by a so called lay Board member would have been severely criticized by those who share his very philosophy. Secondly, Mr. Johnsen conveniently forgot to mention that there never existed a standing committee that dealt specifically with curriculum of board members.

Finally, not only do I suggest that the voters of Hicksville knew what they were doing when they overwhelmingly reelected Mr. Kershen, a professional educator, but that educators on a Board may be more valuable than many kinds of business and lay people. The best interests of the taxpayer and parent are best represented by those who truly understand the working of curriculum and daily instruction. **AFTER ALL, THAT IS WHAT A BOARD OF EDUCATION IS ALL ABOUT!**

AMENDMENTS TO THE PLUMBING CODE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY
BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that the ordinance known as "The Plum-

bing Code of the Town of Oyster Bay" be and the same hereby is amended as follows:

1.91 The term Master Plumber as used in this Section means a person who has satisfied the Board that he possesses the qualifications hereinafter set forth, passed the prescribed examination and been duly

Hicksville School Board Adopts Gross Budget Tax Rate, \$9.84

The gross budget adopted by the Hicksville Board of Education at a public meeting held on Tuesday, August 26, totaled \$18,869,155, resulting in a school tax rate of \$984 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

This figure was arrived at as follows: \$8.406 from the old tax rate, plus 41 cents covering increases in the budget adopted by the voters last May. To this was added 90 cents as a result of the recently concluded negotiations pursuant to law. These negotiations embraced all district personnel excepting cafeteria people. Furthermore, 12 cents was added to cover approximately 75 additional students who will attend BOCES vocational training courses.

"It should be borne in mind that the costs for students attending the BOCES vocational program are reimbursable in accordance with the district's state aid ratio in the year following their outlay," said a spokesman for the administration.

AMEND Section 4.2.1 to read as follows:

4.2.1 Any person desiring a Master Plumber's License shall make application in writing and submit therewith two (2) photographs of the applicant, approximately 1 1/2" x 1 1/2", taken within the past thirty (30) days, to the Plumbers Examining Board said Board shall arrange and conduct an examination as to the competency and qualifications of each applicant within six (6) months of the date of said application, except that applicants who either (a) maintain a principal place of business within Nassau County and are duly licensed as Master Plumbers by a municipality within Nassau County with which the Town of Oyster Bay has entered into a reciprocity agreement, or (b) maintain a principal place of business within any other municipality in the State of New York and are duly licensed as Master Plumbers by such municipality and such municipality has entered into a reciprocity agreement with the Town of Oyster Bay, shall be exempt from the examination requirement, but shall submit the prescribed application, together with a certificate of competency

and a certified copy of a currently valid Master Plumber's License.

RESCIND and DELETE the present Section 4.2.4 in its entirety and substitute in place and stead thereof a new section 4.2.4 to read as follows:

4.2.4 Each applicant for a Master Plumber's License, except as may otherwise be provided by reciprocity agreement with other municipalities, shall pay a fee of \$125, as set forth below:

- a) \$25, as a non-returnable filing fee for each examination.
- b) \$100, upon issuance of a Master Plumber's License.

AMEND Section 4.2.5 to read as follows:

4.2.5 All licenses shall expire on December 31 of the year in which they have been issued. Licenses may be renewed without examination upon payment of an annual renewal fee of \$25, provided, however, that application for renewal is made prior to January 1 of the year following set expiration date or such other date as may be established from time to time, by resolution of the Town Board.

RESCIND and DELETE the present Section 4.2.6 in its entirety.

RESCIND and DELETE the present Sections 4.6.1 and 4.6.2 in their entirety and add in place and stead thereof, a new Section 4.6.1 to read as follows:

4.6.1 PUBLIC LIABILITY AND PROPERTY DAMAGE

INSURANCE. Every applicant shall, prior to the issuance of a Master Plumber's License, or a renewal thereof, obtain public liability insurance and file a certificate thereof with the Building Department, which shall protect him from claims for damages for bodily injury, including death, as well as for claims for damages to property.

The limits of said policy shall be not less than \$100,000 for all damages arising out of bodily injury to one person and a limit of \$300,000 for all damages arising out of bodily injury in any one accident. The policy shall also provide for a limit of not less than \$50,000 for property damage. Said insurance shall remain in full force and effect throughout the license period and shall provide that cancellation or material modification to such policy shall not be made unless at least fifteen (15) days prior written notice thereof be given by registered or certified mail to the Town of Oyster Bay Building Department Manager. These amendments to be effective January 1, 1970.

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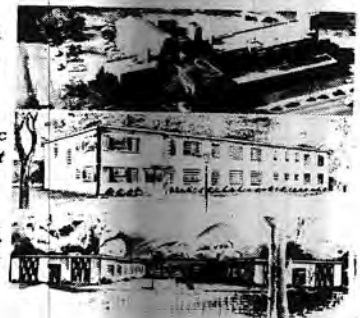

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that the ordinance known as "The Electrical Code of the Town of Oyster Bay" be and the same hereby is amended as follows:

- AMEND Section 1.1.7 to read as follows: 1.1.7 Unless otherwise provided for herein, all electrical wiring and installations in the Town of Oyster Bay shall be installed, altered or removed only by or under the supervision of a Master Electrician.
- AMEND Section 2.1.5 to read as follows: 2.1.5 Master Electrician means a person who has satisfied the Board that he possesses the qualifications

Applicants exempt from taking the examination shall, however, submit the prescribed application, together with a certificate of competency and a certified copy of a currently valid Master Electrician's License.

AMEND Section 6.1.1 to read as follows: 6.1.1 Each applicant for a Master Electrician's License, except as may be otherwise provided by reciprocity agreement with other municipalities, shall pay a fee of \$125, as set forth below:

- a) \$25, as a non-returnable filing fee for each examination.
 - b) \$100, upon issuance of a Master Electrician's License.
- AMEND Section 6.1.2 to read as follows: 6.1.2 Each applicant for examination for any other class of license shall pay a fee of Fifty (\$50.) Dollars as set forth below:

a) \$25, as a non-returnable filing fee for each examination.

b) \$25, upon issuance of a license.

AMEND Section 6.1.3 to read as follows:

6.1.3 All licenses shall expire on December 31 of the year in which they have been issued. Applications for renewal of licenses shall be filed, during the month of December of each year, with the Examining Board, together with such verification of the electrical work performed under the authority of the prior license as the Board may require to determine the continuing competency of the licensee. The annual renewal fee for a Master Electrician's License shall be Twenty-five (\$25.) Dollars and for all other classes of licenses Ten (\$10.) Dollars. Fees shall be payable at the time of filing of the application.

AMEND ARTICLE VI by adding thereto a new Section 6.1.4 to read as follows:

6.1.4 Any licensee who fails to properly file his application for renewal prior to January 1 of any year, shall be required to reapply, be re-examined and pay the fees as set forth above.

AMEND ARTICLE VII, Section 7.1.1 by rescinding and deleting it in its entirety and substituting a new Section 7.1.1 to read as follows:

issuance of a Master Electrician's License, or a renewal thereof, obtain public liability insurance, and file a certificate thereof with the Building Department, which shall protect him from claims for damages for bodily injury, including death, as well as for claims for damages to property. The limits of said policy shall be not less than \$100,000 for all damages arising out of bodily injury to one person and a limit of \$300,000 for all damages arising out of bodily injury in any one accident. The policy shall also provide for a limit of not less than \$50,000 for property damage. Said insurance shall remain in full force and effect throughout the license period and shall provide that cancellation or material modification to such policy shall not be made unless at least 15 days prior written notice thereof be given by registered or certified mail to the Town of Oyster Bay Building Department Manager.

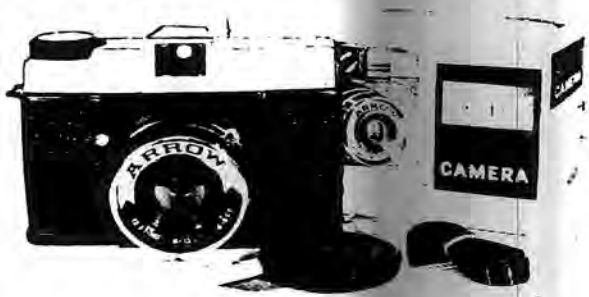
