On January 1, 1926, less than a year after the Nassau County Police Department was created, the Second Precinct was formed with its stationhouse in Syosset. It began with a complement of 26 men. Today, its total strength is 257 members. Open House for the



volved in the nation - wide Pat-terns of Performance, an evaluation program for Lutheran Elementary Schools.



Board Adopts Gross Budget Tax Rate, \$9.84

The gross budget adopted by the Hicksville Board of Education at a public meeting held on Tuesday. August 26, totalled \$18,869,155, resulting in a

school tax rate of \$984 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

To be specific, he might recall that the many educators who served as Trustees not only had served as Trustees not only had nothing to gain in terms of busi-ness dealings but who were im-peccable in terms of allowing members of their family from serving in the school family even though the law does not prohibit it entirely. Mr. Johnsen may find more fertile ground when he addresses himself to Trustees throughout the state who vote on contracts, tenure, and promotion of members of their own family.

After nine years on the Board After nine years on the board, Mr. Johnsen certainly should realize the ludcrousness of his statement regarding the lack of contribution by professional edu-cators to the field of curriculum. He certainly was aware that cur-

riculum was under the aegis of the Superintendent and that any intrusion into this field by a so called ing Board member would have been severly criticized by those who share his very philosophy. Secondly, Mr. Johnsen conveniently forgot to mention that there never existed a standing committee that dealt specifically with curriculum of board members.

Finally, not only do I suggest that the voters of Hicksville knew workshelmingly, reelected Mr. Kershen, a professional edu-cator, but that educators on a Board may be more valuable that many kinds of business and aly people. The best interests of the taxpayer and parent are best prepresented by those who truly understand the working of curriculum and daily instruction. 


