### Work To Be Done On Hicksville Roads

Oyster Bay Town Councilman A. Carl Grunewald said today that Hendrickson Brothers, Inc. of Valley Stream, is the low bidder on a Highway Department contract for work to be done in Hicksville.

Grunewald said Hendrickson Brothers submitted a bid of \$83,107 for the bituminous surfacing of portions of Ketcham, Clinton and Washington Avenues and adjacent areas in Hicksville.

"The Town Board has approved of this bid and authorized the Supervisor to enter into a contract," Grunewald said.

### Second Precinct Holds Open House

Open House Day at the new Nassau County Police Second Precinct Stationhouse in Woodbury on Saturday, September 20, was hailed as a huge success. When the tour day ended, 2,505 residents had visited the new precinct headquarters.

"I am gratified by this demonstration of public interest," Nassau Police Commissioner Francis B. Looney remarked. "It is an indication that the residents are interested in their police department. We look forward to a community - police relationship."

The new colonial type stationhouse is located on Jericho Turnpike and Crossways Park Drive, Woodbury. It controls police activity in Hicksville, Jericho, Syosset, Woodbury, East Norwich, Oyster Bay, Bayville, Lattingtown and Locust Valley.

On January 1, 1926, less than a year after the Nassau County Police Department was created, the Second Precinct was formed with its stationhouse in Syosset. It began with a complement of 26 men. Today, its total strength is 257 members.

#### VFW Born

We were born on September 29, 1899, when Spanish American War Veterans, the first of the foreign service medal groups, met in Columbus Ohio and founded the "American Veterans of Foreign Service."

Then others followed and the amalgamation of State organizations in Colorado, Ohio and Pennsylvania, fifteen years later, formed what we are known today, the Veterans of Foreign Wars of The United States.

On May 26, 1936, we were granted a charter by Congress (Public Law 74-630) and avowed that:

"The purpose of this corporation shall be fraternal, patriotic, historical and educational; to preserve and strengthen comradeship among its members; to assist worthy comrades; to perpetuate the memory and history of our dead; and to assist their widows and orphans; to maintain true allegiance to the government of the United States of America, and fidelity to its Constitution and laws; to foster true patriotism; to maintain and extend the institutions of American Freedom; and to preserve and defend the United States from all her enemies, whomsoever."

Today, seventy years later, the application of these avowals continue to be the work of this organization. Since 1899 we have grown into an organization with approximately 1,800,000 overseas veterans as members. Present and former members include President Richard M. Nixon and former Presidents Lyndon B. Johnson, John F. Kennedy, Dwight D. Eisenhower and Harry S. Truman.

As we observe our 70th anniversary, we want to assure the members of this community, we will continue to take an active part in its activities to help promote responsible patriotism and bring about good citizenship.

Hicksville's football prestige is in direct peril as the Orange and Black starts its 45th gridiron campaign, at home, this Saturday, 1:30 p.m. against Levittown Division.

The facts are strong and clear. Division has tarnished more than one Hicksville campaign in recent years.

Over a five year period Division has administered three of the five defeats suffered by Hicksville. The 1967 21-13 upset ruined the Orange's unbeaten season and prevented a second straight Nassau County Championship. Last season Hicksville repulsed the Dragons on the eight yard line late in the third quarter but the 13-8 Comet victory only dulled the luster of a banner 7 won and 1 lost record.

In an attempt to blunt the tenacity of the Division effort against Hicksville the game was moved from the final on the schedule to the first.

However shifting the attitude from Division's nothing to lose outlook has only resulted in establishing an everything to gain proposition.

Deep in experienced veterans at every position, Levittown now counts heavily on using the Hicksville contest as a springboard to its greatest season and resulting acknowledgement.

They are convinced in Levittown that they are going to win it. And win it big!

This contest is regarded as the toughest on the Hicksville schedule aside from the finale against East Meadow.

There is also disquieting undercurrent that the Orange and Black has too far to come to be ready for it.

Hicksville has a small team. It has plenty of speed but the question of beef to spring it is unanswered.

The front ranks are capable but the backup material is exceedingly thin.

The club has had a rigorous scrimmage tuneup as Coach Jim Grantham sought the best line on his young group.

Gloom does not prevail. After all Hicksville completed an undefeated Junior Varsity season last year. In 1967 the Hicksville JV team defeated Division 7-0 in the last contest. It broke a seven game winning streak for Levittown. Last year the game ended 0-0.

One good factor is that the Hicksville players know Levittown can be handled.

To complicate matters Hicksville has not survived the scrimmages with two of Suffolk County's—West Islip and Brentwood—in the best of physical condition.

No less than John McDermott, Ed O'Reilly, Fred Ehle and Kirk Jurgelevich suffered injuries in the West Islip fray and were held out of the Brentwood match. For the first three it was precautionary but for Jurgelevich it was acute. He smashed his finger and knuckle and will be lost for at least a month.

He was regarded by the coaching staff as the best lineman in pre-season drills and his loss is not damaging.

We at THE HERALD will be most loyal in our support Saturday but feel reality must be faced. It would be unfair to pick Hicksville as the favorite. Our first selection of the season is: Levittown Division 22, Hicksville 8

The cat and mouse techniques of arrest, trumped up charges, "confessions", and purge trials is explored. Since nearly all the victims were innocent, at least of the specific charges, nearly all of those directly responsible for the purges were themselves executed in order to cover Stalin's tracks. The most appalling and fascinating sections of the book deal with the fate of the Old Bolsheviks who largely instrumental in fostering the Revolution and running the country. They were largely eliminated, generally in a most diabolical manner. The one sure sign was a transference of duties to a minor post while awaiting the inevitable arrest.

### WHY A WELFARE FUND

Any non-profit organization needs a certain amount of money to meet operating expenses. The Jericho Volunteer Fire Department is no different, and for this reason, is presently in the midst of its annual Welfare Fund Drive. Although the Jericho Fire District is supported by revenue from the Town of Oyster Bay, the Jericho Volunteer Fire Department receives only a small portion of these funds for internal operations. The rest of the necessary operating funds are attained through contributions from the residents of the fire district.

One may ask why does a volunteer fire department need operating capital when the fire district purchases all firematic equipment such as fire apparatus, turnout gear, hose, ladders, etc. and pays for the maintenance of fire district property. The answer is that there are many expenses incurred that are not supported by taxation, and for this reason the Jericho Volunteer Fire Department turns to the community for its financial aid.

No member of the Jericho Volunteer Fire Department receives any compensation for his time either in the form of money or tax reimbursement. All volunteer firemen are covered by the New York State Workmen's Compensation Law. This coverage and the supplementary policy carried by the Jericho Fire District are the basic coverages

provided in the event of injury or death to a volunteer fireman in the performance of his duty. Additional accident and life insurance is a major expense. The premiums for these policies are derived from Welfare Fund contributions.

Last year, as in previous years, the Jericho Volunteer Fire Department played host to thousands of residents and souvenirs mainly paid for out of the department's Welfare Fund. On the 5th of October, the department once again plans to hold its Annual Open House and is expecting a sizeable turnout. Throughout the year, the Department supports other community activities through contributions to scholarship awards, charitable organizations, public and school demonstrations, etc.

In order to maintain the Jericho Volunteer Fire Department's high standards and proficiency, membership in numerous firematic associations is necessary so as to keep abreast of the latest techniques of fire prevention and firefighting. The Department maintains subscriptions to various training publications, pays memberships dues and provides representation at State Firematic Conventions.

It is necessary to maintain a supply of emergency provisions for use during extended firematic operations and in the event of natural catastrophes such as the blizzard this past February. Through these emergency supplies, the Department was able to feed and house many stranded persons who came to the Jericho Fire House for shelter. The Welfare Fund provides the money to maintain these emergency supplies.

Although only a few of the major expenses incurred by the Welfare Fund revenues have been mentioned, there are numerous additional areas requiring financial support by the Department such as competitive teams, fire jackets and administrative expenses.

A vast amount of time and effort is expended by the members of the Jericho Volunteer Fire Department to provide the Community with first class fire protection. In order to support the Welfare Fund, a mailing has been made to all residents asking for their contribution to the Department's Welfare Fund. This support is greatly appreciated and helps to maintain the high standards of the Jericho Volunteer Fire Department.

"This will be an opportunity for our teachers to explore new ideas and to stimulate thinking about different avenues of education," stated David Nydick, Superintendent of Jericho Public Schools, as he reviewed final arrangements for the upcoming Jericho District Conference Day with Rudolph Cesarini, President of the Jericho Teachers Association.

In a joint effort of the Jericho Teachers Association and the Office of the Superintendent, with full support of the Board of Education, Jericho teachers have planned an original series of conference workshops, to be held on October 1 at the Jericho High School (Cedar Swamp Road, Jericho, Long Island).

Teachers will have the opportunity to participate in a series of eleven workshops. Leading educational authorities from the State Education Department, Hofstra University, other colleges and school districts will lead the workshop sessions. 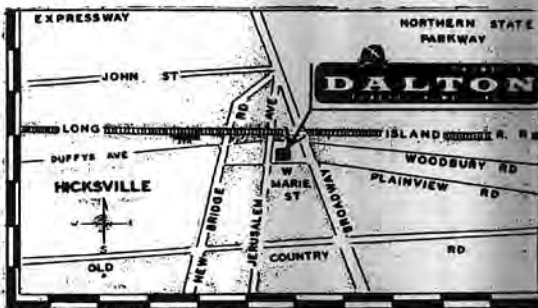
