Herald Report of School Board Dist. 17 Hicksville

The School Board is going to be in on "ground floor" budget formation this year. Between now and the Christmas recess, Board members will visit each district school. They will meet with the staff and inspect all school facilities. The purpose will be to tour, evaluate needs and elicit suggestions regarding budget problems. Budget discussions and formulations will begin in January.

Members of the Burns Avenue PTA were assured by the School Board that the streets which have been closed off from the Mid-Island Plaza will remain closed, even with the addition of S. Klein to the shopping center. These streets—Windsor, York and Prose—intersect Burns Avenue and were closed in agreement with Stackler and Frank when the Plaza opened. This is a contractual agreement and in the opinion of Joseph Catalano, School Board attorney, must remain so even if the Mid-Island Plaza property is sold.

The Nassau-Suffolk

School Boards Association is circulating petitions requesting the Governor and State Legislature to increase the state aid to schools. Copies of these petitions will be sent to all district schools, PTA units and various civic organizations for signatures. They will be presented at the State School Boards Association meeting the latter part of October.

The School Board approved \$50 for newspaper space in the two local newspapers. The space will be used this school year as a calendar of events for district activities.

Welcome, Dr. Hill! Dr. Frederick Hill is the new Assistant Superintendent for Administration for the district. He replaces Mr. Charles Aherne who left this summer to become Supt. of Schools in Oswego. Dr. Hill was formerly with administrative staff of the New York City Schools and comes to the district with an impressive record. He will be paid an annual salary of \$30,000, effective Sept. 15.

School Join-up Night meetings begin at 8:00 P.M. and conclude at 9:30 P.M. Parents or guardians must attend with their sons and remain during the entire program. Volunteers have been assigned to each school building to coordinate the activities of units within the building and to assure the registration of all boys who wish to belong. New Scout units will be organized where there is a need.

The Nassau County Council serves 33,335 boys in 850 scout units.

A great deal grayer, a lot older and many much heavier the members of the Sgt. Robt. O. Bicyclists' Rules

Motorists were cautioned to be very careful when approaching a bicycle with more than one rider. Bicyclists were warned that the practice of having more than one person on a bike is not only dangerous, but also unlawful, unless the bicycle is specifically designed to carry two or more riders.

The Commissioner also advised motorists that bicyclists and pedestrians have the right of way when crossing with the traffic light at intersections.

Commissioner Looney concluded by warning bicyclists that the New York State Vehicle and Traffic Law requires them to obey all traffic control signs and signals.

Hicksville Woman On Panel

Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller will greet more than one thousand delegates attending the 72nd annual convention of the New York State Congress of Parents and Teachers at the Statler Hilton Hotel in New York City, Monday, October 20, at 8:00 p.m. The Governor's greeting will open officially the three-day convention of the statewide parent-teacher organization.

A keynote address entitled "Education in a Demanding Society" will be delivered Monday evening by Senator D. Clinton Dominick of Newburgh, chairman of the Education Committee of the New York State Senate. He is also chairman of the Joint Legislative Committee to Revise and Simplify the Education Law. Mrs. Oscar Willett, Syosset, President of the 511,000 member PTA, will preside.

Commenting on the keynote for the convention, Mrs. Willett said, "Living as we do in a time of great social change and conflict, turmoil seems to be the normal condition. The current revolution in education calls not for less but rather a greater degree of PTA participation. It also calls for greater commitment both from PTA leadership and PTA membership."

Ronald F. Dutcher, Assistant Superintendent of Schools of Newburgh, will moderate a Tuesday evening panel discussion, "Conflict in Rights and Responsibilities in a Demanding Society". The panel will consist of John Skawski, Superintendent of Schools in Canandaigua and President of the New York State Council of School District Administrators; Mrs. Catharine O'C. Barrett, Syracuse teacher and President of the New York State Teachers Association; E. Milton Johnson of Jamestown, President of the New York State School Boards Association and Mrs. Simeon Wittenberg of HICKSVILLE who will represent the point of view of parents.

Following the panel presentation the delegates will attend Speak-Out sessions to react and discuss the topic in depth. According to Mrs. John Currier of Tonawanda, convention program chairman, the discussion will put emphasis on "how we can all work together to bring good education to all children".

The highlight at the Wednesday evening banquet will be the address by Mrs. J. M. Herndon of Columbia, S. C., newly elected

secretary of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers. Mrs. Herndon was previously a National Vice-President, and had also served as President of the South Carolina State Congress of Parents and Teachers. Her address is entitled, "Individual Responsibilities in a Demanding Society".

Other highlights of the convention include the Tuesday morning business session, the Tuesday afternoon workshops covering all phases of PTA activity and the Wednesday morning and afternoon legislative discussions leading to the adoption of the 1970 legislative program.

The annual election of officers also takes place on Wednesday. In addition to President Willett, the other officers now serving are: First Vice-President, Mrs. Douglas Gormly, Fredonia; Second Vice-President, Ronald F. Dutcher, Newburgh; Vice-Presidents Mrs. John Merrill, Valois; Dr. Thomas R. 3,400 fans saw Hicksville High lose its 1969 grid opener to Levittown Division, on the home field, Saturday, 14-8.

Coach Jim Grantham's young club battled the favored Division team to a standstill in the line but a circus pass catch and a 38-yard return of a punt led to two touchdowns and the Comets defeat.

While the defensive line was holding Division to a net of 74 yards in 30 running plays Hicksville's offensive blocking was in disarray and only the barest semblance of an attack

was mounted during the contest.

The Comets defended within their own 30-yard line six times in the first half. Late in the second period Ed O'Reilly picked off a Levittown aerial and with the aid of a deceiving fake raced the ball 73-yards for a Hicksville Touchdown.

The placement attempt was wide and Hicksville lead 6-0.

Hicksville hopes heightened as the Comets took heart and crossed the 50 for the first and only time in the game. O'Reilly, Chuck Arnone, John McDermott

and Dennis Meddis moved the ball to the Division 31a before the drive ended.

Levittown scored in the third. Hicksville had three players trap the Division passer on his own 24 but he squirmed loose and tossed downfield to the Hicksville 31. The defense batted the ball up instead of down and it landed in the arms of the Levittown receiver as he was falling flat on his back.

Division's second and only other completion of the day followed to the five and it was a TD in two plays. A running attempt for the two point play failed and it was tied 6-6.

In the fourth Levittown set a wall down the right side and a punt return to the Hicksville 11 paved the way for the second TD.

Hicksville only gained 55 yards in its first 22 rushes but O'Reilly picked up 33 in 6 as the Comets tried to come back. They were

always buried within the Shadow of their own goal.

With 33 seconds remaining the Levittown line carried Meddis into the endzone and it was ruled a safety for the final 14-6 count.

Syosset, has already sold six busloads of tickets for Saturday's football visit to Hicksville. The Trojans won in the last 14 seconds of the game in 1968 and earned a share with the Comets for the Section One championship.

Hicksville eliminated Syosset from the 1967 title with an equally thrilling victory in the final 14 seconds of the game.

Syosset fans are convinced that there will be no last minute heroics. They expect their club, which opened with an impressive 26-22 win over Port Washington, will pull away fast and the crowd can start to disperse before the final minutes.

We do not. Hicksville has had a share of the league championship

for three seasons in a row. The Hicksville players still have much to shoot for in 1969. The Hicksville spirit will assert itself Saturday.

Hicksville's Junior Varsity Football team extended its unbeaten streak into a third year, at Levittown, as it defeated Division, 12-0, for its sixteenth straight game without a defeat.

Comprised of most of the players from last year's 1 win and 7 lost Junior High team, Coach Bill Meyer's crew scored on a swing pass from quarterback Tom McAuley to Tony Esposito the right half back. The play converted 30-yards and came late in the second period.

In the second half Esposito went 55-yards of tackle for a touchdown and assured the Hicksville victory.

LIBRARY NOTES

Businesses and Libraries Can Work Together

For many businesses the matter of maintaining adequate sources of information is a problem.

They may subscribe to business periodicals and services, but unless special provisions are made, the pertinent information and material has a way of not being findable when needed.

Its probably in the bottom drawer of somebody's desk or on the coffee table in his living room.

What kind of special provisions need to be taken if this is to be avoided?

Some businesses designate a clerical employee to be responsible for maintaining the collection.

The trouble with this is that the designated person probably lacks two things: technical knowledge and authority.

Without technical knowledge he doesn't know how to catalog and classify the material so that it will be immediately accessible; without authority he can't say "no" when Mr. Big hoards one of the business services in his private office.

Very large businesses often solve this problem by hiring an accredited librarian and giving him the authority to keep the materials in decent order.

Smaller businesses may feel

that they can't afford this type of operation, or that, at any rate, it isn't worth the expense. In this case they may depend on other sources.

Probably the most obvious "other source" is the business section of the public library.

It often happens that businessmen, on first turning to their library for information, are surprised by how much it has to offer.

The quality of public library business resources varies greatly, of course, from community to community. To a great extent this quality is determined by business demand.

Active interest in and use of their public library by business acts as a spur to strengthening the business collection.

In many communities businesses cooperate to encourage this type of library development.

They find it less expensive and more efficient to have the material available in the Public library than to own and handle it themselves.

This kind of support sometimes extends to such measures as cooperative business purchasing of expensive business services that the public library can't afford but is ideally situated to house and maintain.

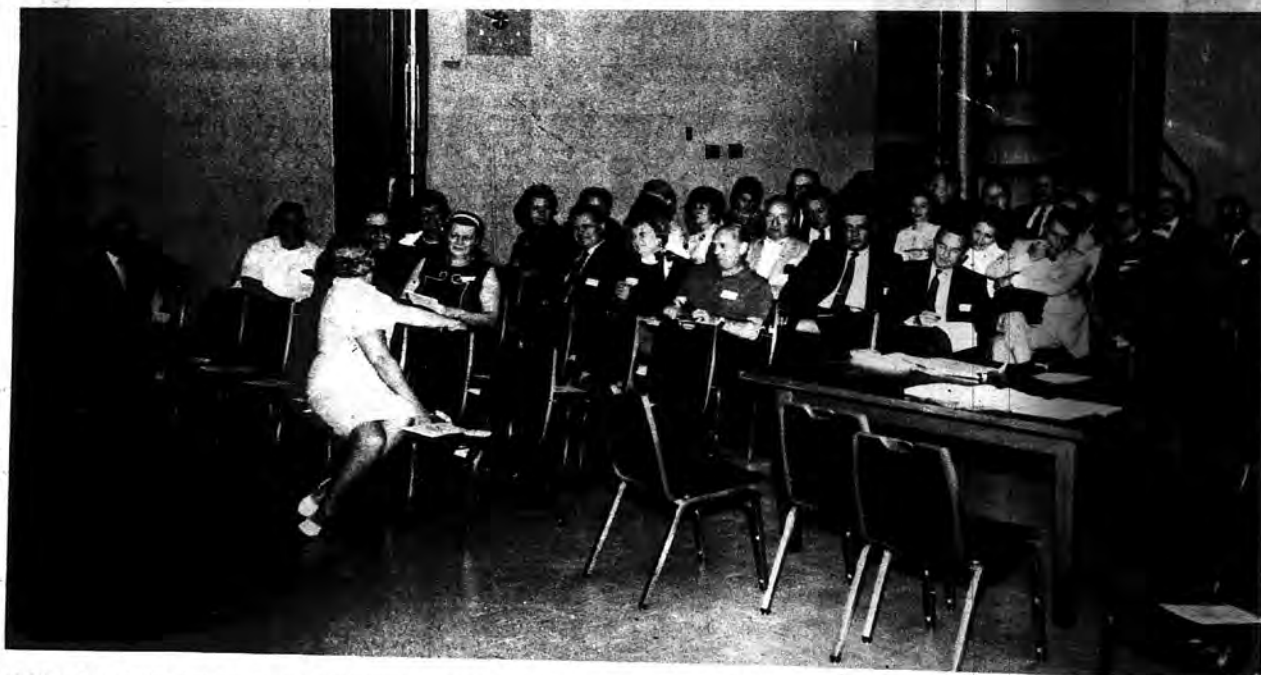

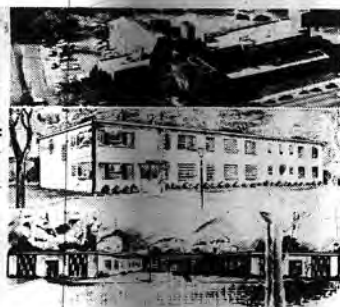

Village Drive Expressway Planting

Through the efforts of our Committee and the Jericho Beautification Committee of the Oyster Bay Town Board, we have finally secured some planting by N.Y. State between the Expressway roadway and the wire fence on Village Drive.

Evergreens have been planted, principally at the point where cars travel from the Expressway on a clover leaf into Northern State Parkway - where incidentally it was most urgently needed. But the large fallen trees and the standing dead trees were not removed nor did they spot plant the rest of the area which is badly needed to screen the traffic noise and the noxious car fumes.

We have contacted the County of Nassau - who we understand has jurisdiction for the area between the Village Drive roadway and the wire fence on Village Drive for a planting to screen the unsightly fence and to help screen noise and car fumes. We will continue our efforts to bring about these additional improvements.

Planned Highway From Old Westbury State U. Into Route 107, Near Jericho High, and Junior School

The University of the State of N.Y. at Old Westbury has a plan to build a road from the University to Route 107 near our High and Junior High School. The Brookville Taxpayers Assn. held a meeting recently on the issue of the SUNY road to 107 and all the local groups, including civic associations, were invited. The meeting heard Mr. Burtis, Director of Nassau County Planning Committee present a suggested preliminary plan for the three universities in the area (C. W. Post, SUNY-Old Westbury, and N.Y. Institute of Technology) to meet the traffic problems of the area.
