Herald Report School District 17 Hicksville

The Junior High PTA has asked the School Board to consider resubmitting the referendum for additional cafeteria space which was defeated by Hicksville voters in June. In a letter read by Mrs. Ray Cahallan, president of the Junior High PTA, the Board was asked to try and find some means to alleviate the overcrowded lunch facilities as soon as possible. Slides were shown to those present at Tuesday's Board meeting—we saw the large numbers of students waiting in line for their lunch and those who must wait in the gym for their lunch period. Mr. Albert Glass, Junior High Principal, gave some background information on the student capacity of the school. In 1956 when 24 additional rooms were built (there were then 1800 students), the cafeteria capacity was 500. This capacity has not changed, but the school has 1000 more students now. To feed everyone, lunch hours must extend from 10:15 a.m. to 1:20 p.m. Students have only 22 minutes to go through the line and eat. Fourth through seventh periods the gym is filled with students waiting to have their lunch period.

The School Board will consider the PTA's request. If the Board decides not to resubmit the referendum, the Junior High PTA will have the alternative of circulating petitions—if 7000 signatures are secured, the Board may then be persuaded to consider another vote.

Information was presented to the Board regarding student accident insurance. Both voluntary and compulsory participation plans were discussed. This insurance would cover the child from the time he leaves home for school, until he returns. It will also cover him for school-sponsored activities. Summer school and summer recreation would be included, as well as the regular school year. There may be a number of legal problems involved in this type of insurance and the handling of it through the school district. Mr. George Jackson, Board president, directed the Superintendent and the district's insurance advisor, Seaman-Eiseman, to get more information about student insurance before the Board makes a final decision.

Alumni To Fete Lou Millevolte

Lou Millevolte, whose association with the storied athletic history of the Hicksville Community has been indelibly interwoven over a period of four decades will be honored by the Hicksville Alumni Association, this Saturday night at Carl Hoppl's Westbury Manor.

The testimonial dinner-dance was over subscribed at the time of its announcement more than three months ago.

(Ed. Note - An addition to the manor has been rushed to completion enabling the Association to make additional room for Mr. Millevoltes well wishes. Tickets may be had at Holden's stationery until noon on Saturday.) Millevolte retired as

Athletic Director in June ending a cycle of participation as player, coach and director in Block Athletics which started when he drop kicked the winning field goal in the schools first Football victory 44 years past.

He is a member of one of Long Island's premier athletic families widely respected for the character of its athletic ability, teaching and organizational accomplishments.

He attended Lacrosse College in Wisconsin and returned to Hicksville as assistant to athletic director E. Park Yutzler. He coached three varsity baseball championship clubs.

In 1942 he became

Athletic Director. He conducted seven health and physical education classes a day, coached four varsity sports (unpaid) and conducted an unsalaried competitive after school recreation program - both winter and summer.

In 1942 he coached Hicksville then the smallest competing school in Nassau - to its first undefeated football season. He compiled a record of 19 wins, 2 losses and four ties.

Symbolic of his leadership was the ability to analyze the opposition and translate it to his team at halftime. Four times in that undefeated Campaign his club rallied from behind in the second half.

In 1944 his team required very little of the dramatics. It swept unchecked to an undefeated, untied season.

His zenith in club athletics come in 1938. In those days of savage community pride his Hicksville Field Club trailed Westbury 19-0 at the half in Nassau's most

From Our Postmaster

The Hicksville Post Office Annex located at 260 Engineers Drive will cease operations on Sunday October 19.

Effective at 0800 on Monday October 20 all business formerly conducted at that address will be transacted at the New Post Office which is located at 185 West John Street, Hicksville.

We urge all patrons to mail Christmas parcels to members of the armed forces overseas during the following periods:

(1) Surface transportation - October 13 to November 8.

(2) SAM (space available parcel airlift) October 20 to November 22.

(3) PAL - October 27 to November 29.

(4) Airmail - December 1 to December 13.

Packages should be wrapped securely and addressed properly to insure prompt safe delivery.

The Post Office Department today revoked the post office box privileges of eight dealers in sexually oriented materials. Postmaster General Winton M. Blount said the action was taken under his administrative authority to deny the use of rental boxes to individuals who use them for immoral or improper purposes as determined by the Department's General Counsel.

Five of the affected firms have been using rental boxes in California post offices. They are: Collectors Publications, City of Industry; John Amslow & Associates, Culver City; G.&M Enterprises, Hollywood; Athens West and Athena Books, both of Los Angeles. The remaining boxes which were ordered closed include those rented by Central Sales, Baltimore, Md.; Marion John Shiflet, Detroit, Mich.; and Super Sales, York, Pa.

Safe Halloween

Nassau Police Commissioner Francis B. Looney today urged the parents and youth of the County to cooperate in making Halloween a safe, sensible and happy day for all.

Looney asked parents to safeguard their children during the Halloween festivities by warning them not to enter the homes of strangers, and not to eat any of the "treats" received until they first show them to their parents. If Halloween masks are worn, they should not obstruct ability to see approaching cars.

He suggested that parents get together and appoint at least one adult to supervise their children as they walk from house to house on their "trick or treat" excursions.

Commissioner Looney also advised parents to warn their children—especially teen-agers—that Halloween festivities do not include the wanton destruction of property. Anyone maliciously damaging property will be liable to arrest for criminal mischief, and if the malicious damage is against a mail box, the crime is a Federal offense.

He urged young people to participate in dances and parties Halloween night, and not to become involved in destructive pranks. "Continue your fine record of juvenile decency," Looney told the young people of the County. "Wanton and malicious destruction of property is completely unworthy of you, and those of you who commit such acts will feel the weight of the law. Help our county to be a better place to live in, and help the police do their job."

County police will more than double patrols on Halloween day and evening, and patrolmen and detectives of the Youth Division will intensify their operations in unmarked patrol cars.

ON TUESDAY, NOV. 11, beginning at 9 a.m. young people and adults of 12 Lutheran Churches and the LI Lutheran High School will join together on a Hunger Walk. Each church and organization has autonomy in its recruitment and organizational procedures, but the group will walk together for 18 miles through Hicksville, Bethpage, Plainedge, Levittown, East Meadow, Westbury and Bowling Green. The walkers will be accompanied by public officials and church leaders and will be escorted by police. The Walk is being held on Veterans' Day in hopes that many people who would normally have to work or attend school may participate. They will walk in support of some of the basic values for which American men have given their lives: freedom, justice, and the right to self-determination. The Walk will stop briefly at 11 a.m. for a Veteran's Day ceremony to be conducted by the Bethpage American Legion. The money raised by the Walk will be given to two projects: The Long Island Council of Churches and the Long Island Farm Workers' Service Center. It is felt that increasing the funds which these two organizations use, will help those in need and who are hungry, not just in far places, but here on Long Island where the plight of the migrant worker is known to many, but where few opportunities are available for those who wish to help.

This Hunger Walk is just such an opportunity.

The stunning play developed when second line quarterback Ricky Doolittle flipped to the regular quarter, Bob Daub, who had started at left halfback.

An apparent rush to the right drew in the defense and, almost Jropped, Daub passed 30 yards downfield to end Ray Walkowiak who had outdistanced the rest of the secondary.

Matlin put a score on the board with a 87-yard bomb with just 2:14 left on the scoreboard.

Jericho Board of Ed. Report

Concern for the future of the Robert Williams Elementary School was the major issue at the September Board Meeting.

The Board, in keeping with its established policy, authorized a Citizens' Advisory Committee on Elementary School Population and Housing Study. The committee, which will include a representative cross section of residents, will review all pertinent data and will recommend two or more alternate actions for student housing.

Residents at the public meeting were assured by the Board that no pre-determined or unilateral decisions will be made. The Board will not make a decision until the advisory committee presents its findings. A preliminary report in November and a final one in January, will be prepared by the committee. In developing its suggestions, the committee will consider equal educational programs, mutually beneficial organization, economic efficiency and population projections.

Students Represented at Board Meetings

The Board welcomed David Janover and Roger Green, as recognized representatives of the Senior High Student Council. The students will attend monthly Board meetings, with the intent to develop more direct participation by exchange of ideas, problems and expectations.

In turn, the Senior High Student-Faculty Committee has invited Board members to its regular meetings, in an extension of the district-wide goal of maintaining effective communication.

Student Teachers in the High School

The Board approved Miss Patricia Burton and Mr. Edward Vickers of C.W. Post College and Miss Laura Orticele of Adelphi University as student teachers in the Jericho Junior and Senior High Schools.

Miss Burton's assignment will be Junior High Math, with Mr. Joseph Vecchiarelli serving as

cooperating teacher. Mr. Vickers will teach under the supervision of Mr. Joel Brodsky of the Social Studies Department. Miss Orticele will be assigned to Mrs. Karen Schwartz in Senior High Physical Education.

Reports from the Superintendent

David Nydick, Superintendent, reviewed a report on community use of the High School swimming pool during 1968-69. A schedule of pool activities for 69-70 will soon be mailed to residents.

The pupil enrollment for September was 3078, a decrease of eleven students since June.

A report on Senior High "Pass-Fail" elective courses, initiated during the last half of '68-69, was presented. Instructors of the two "pass-fail" courses were divided in their reactions to the non-grading approach. Some students in the audience indicated a positive response to such courses, feeling that such electives deemphasize marks and the selection of "easy" courses. Additional "pass-fail" courses to be introduced during this school year are: "African History," "Black Man in America," "American 20th Century," and "Asian Studies."

The Board approved a continuation of the "Pass-Fail" electives, in order to secure a full evaluation of the concept.

District to Petition Governor, Legislature

The Board approved distribution of petitions to community organizations, urging Governor Rockefeller and the State Legislature "to enact in the 1970 Legislature alternate and more equitable ways of paying for the rising cost of our public schools."

Petitions have been forwarded to civic groups, as part of a Long Island drive of the Nassau-Suffolk School Boards Association. It is hoped that 100,000 Long Island property owners' signatures will produce action concerning the property tax.

 - b. Each Additional Vehicle 10.00
- Driver's or Helper's License 5.00
- Replacement or Substitution
 - a. Medallion and/or card 10.00
 - b. Driver's or Helper's card 2.00

Section 7.1 of Article VII. No Vehicle License under a. or b. of II above and no Replacement or Substitution under a. or b. of IV above shall be issued until a license is issued under a. or b. of I above and III above.

Section 10.2 of Article X. Towing and Storage Charges:

- Towing
 - a. First mile or part thereof \$15.00
 - Each additional mile or part thereof \$ 1.50
- Storage
 - Outside - each 24 hours or part thereof \$ 1.50
 - Inside - rates to be determined by agreement of the parties

The towing and storage charges set forth in this section 10.2 shall not apply to motor trucks having a capacity in excess of one and one-half ton nor to motor vehicles covered by a towing contract executed prior to the need for such towing.

Off Street Storage - All vehicles shall be stored on the premises of the Licensee, whether indoors or outdoors and shall not be permitted on any public highway.
