The Distinguished Flying Cross (DFC) for heroism, the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service and 10 awards of the Air Medal have been presented to U.S. Air Force Captain Edward A. Osborne Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward A. Osborne, 129 Acre Lane, HICKSVILLE.

Captain Osborne, now an instructor in the department of engineering mechanics at the U.S. Air Force Academy, earned the decorations while serving with Pacific Air Forces' 37th Tactical Fighter Wing, Phu Cat AB, Vietnam.

The captain earned the DFC as an F-100 Super Sabre fighter-bomber pilot during a mission supporting allied ground forces under enemy attack. Despite poor weather and limited visibility, the captain made repeated passes over enemy emplacements, providing timely relief for the allies and preventing further casualties.

Captain Osborne served as assistant chief of the standardization and evaluation division which monitored procedural efficiency of aircrews of the 37th, and was awarded the Bronze Star for increasing wing combat capability through his professionalism and leadership.

While at Phu Cat, the captain completed numerous missions under constant threat of enemy fire to earn the Air Medals. He has a total of 11 Air Medals.

A 1956 graduate of Hicksville High School, Captain Osborne earned his B.S. degree and commission in 1960 upon graduation from the U.S. Military Academy. He also holds an M.S.E. degree from the University of Michigan.

Airman William E. Evanchik, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Anton Evanchik of 28 Ambry Ave., PLAINVIEW is serving aboard the aircraft carrier USS Franklin D. Roosevelt at Mayport, Fla.

**WASHINGTON REPORT**  
 The Senate Committee on Foreign Affairs: Subcommittee on National Security Policy and Scientific Developments began hearings on pending resolutions calling for North Vietnam to abide by the Geneva Convention in its treatment of American prisoners of war. On November

19, the subcommittee met in executive session and approved for full committee action H. Con. Res. 454, calling for the humane treatment and release of American prisoners of war held by North Vietnam and the National Liberation Front.

The Senate Committee on Finance: Subcommittee on Veterans Legislation held and concluded hearings on S. 3008, to increase the availability of guaranteed home loan financing for veterans and to increase the income of the NSLI fund. Frank Stover, V.F.W. Director, National Legislation Service testified at the hearings.

Senate Committee on Labor and Public Welfare: Subcommittee on Veterans Affairs began hearings on medical care for Vietnam veterans. Among those offering testimony were Donald Johnson, Administrator of Veterans Affairs and other V.A. officials.

Public Law 91-96: President Nixon, with little public fanfare, signed legislation that will increase Widows compensation checks. Under the new law payments are effective December 1st, but the increase won't start to show up in the benefit checks until January. The increase is automatic and no application is needed.

The House Veterans Affairs Committee remains stubborn and holding out to legislation approved by the House earlier which would raise GI Bill educational allowances by 27 per cent. Increases will become effective on enactment and not retroactive according to a member of the committee.

# Burke to Name Glazer Deputy Supervisor

Oyster Bay Supervisor-elect John W. Burke announced today that he plans to name Edward L. Glazer, a Massapequa lawyer, as the Town's Deputy Supervisor when he takes office in January.

Burke called Glazer "a superlative organizer and a tough, competent administrator who likes to get things done well and on time." Burke added, "I didn't even know Ed very well until the recent campaign, but I was singularly impressed by his organizational skills, his intelligence and his loyalty."

Glazer said he was "gratified by the confidence Supervisor Burke has shown in me." He added, "I consider the next few years crucial in Oyster Bay and I shall devote myself unsparingly to helping John Burke make them years of triumph and achievement for all the citizens of the Town."

Burke said "The Town of Oyster Bay is at a crossroad in several important fields, notably planning and waste disposal. I expect to address myself immediately to these problems and this points up the need for a Deputy Supervisor who can follow through and see that our programs are worked out quickly and in the minutest detail. Ed Glazer, who has wide experience

in government and whose organizational skills are attested to by the fact that he is a Colonel in the U.S. Army Reserve, has the ideal requirements for the job."

Burke, who won by a record 15,000-vote margin in the November 4 Town election, noted further that Glazer, as his campaign manager, "demonstrated in the campaign his superb organizational and intellectual talents."

Glazer, 44, is currently Counsel to the Town's Public Employees Relations Board. He was formerly counsel to the Town Housing Authority, the State Joint Legislative Committees on Motor Vehicles, Traffic and Highway Safety, and Unemployment Insurance. He also was a member of the Town's Suburban Town Law Committee and is a member of the Long Island Traffic Safety Council. A trial lawyer, Glazer is a Fellow of the International Academy of Law and Science and numerous Bar and Trial Lawyers Associations. He is a graduate of Brooklyn Law School. Glazer is married to the former Shirley Nagelberg. They live with their son, Andrew, 13, and daughter, Donna, 11, at 271 Hunter Ridge Road East, Massapequa.

## Public Intoxication

Francis B. Looney, President of the New York State Association of Chiefs of Police, today released a New York State Association of Chiefs of Police policy statement on public intoxication.

Noting that alcoholism is considered the number one social problem in the United States, President Looney recommends amending the law on public intoxication, taking it out of the criminal violation category, eliminating the usual mechanics of police arrest for the act, and mandating that persons intoxicated in public be taken by police to a public hospital or other suitable community facility for detention and treatment.

The full text of President Looney's statement reads: "In New York State, approximately 700,000 persons are afflicted with the serious illness of alcoholism. The unfortunates disturbed by this illness represent all strata of our society, and each one, because of this sickness, daily exposes himself or herself to arrest and incarceration."

"Recognizing that alcoholism is a sickness, that its sufferers are experiencing medical and psychological problems whose cure requires long term therapy, the New York State Association of Chiefs of Police propose that the legislature amend the Penal Law statute on Public Intoxication, eliminating it as a criminal violation, and empowering police to deal with persons so afflicted as they do aided persons. "Therefore, the police arrest process of booking, detention, court presentation, trial and possibly further penal detention would be eliminated, and the stigma of arrest would also be removed for such behavior. "Persons intoxicated in public, unable to care for themselves and likely to cause injury to themselves or others, would henceforth be removed by police and delivered forthwith to a public hospital or other suitable community facility, for their immediate safety

and eventual treatment." Editors Note: Francis B. Looney, President of the New York State Association of Chiefs of Police, is the Commissioner of Police of Nassau County, Mineola, New York 11501 (516 - Pioneer 6-1000).

NEWS ABOUT THE OLD COURTHOUSE: at a meeting held on Nov. 24 at the Gregory Museum, the museum's legal advisor, Mr. Joseph Catalano reported that Councilman Grunwald had indicated that present TOB plans call for a 25-year lease, between the TOB and the museum for the Old Court House building and land. It is anticipated that this lease will be completed within the next few weeks. As we reported last week, at this same meeting Mrs. Hugh Conover, Mr. Herbert Johnson and Mr. Jerome Zettler were appointed as co-chairmen of the museum's fund-raising committee. The drive which will be county wide, is scheduled to begin after the first of the year. Then, no doubt, plans which have already been drawn up to modernize the interior of the old courthouse, while preserving the exterior as a historic landmark, will go forward. We are certainly in favor of this move, which will not only preserve our Hicksville courthouse but will enable our Gregory museum to make use of the interior, while serving the innumerable groups of school children, scouts, church groups and others, who study and learn from this fine museum.

The work of the Rev. Edward Visscher, headmaster and basketball coach at Long Island Lutheran High School, is featured in a cover story of the current issue of Correspondent, nationally circulated magazine.

Pastor Visscher's 1968-69 team was named the No. 1 high school squad in New York. The team traditionally plans the toughest schedule it can put together and many of its members have gone on to play with some of the best college basketball teams in the country.

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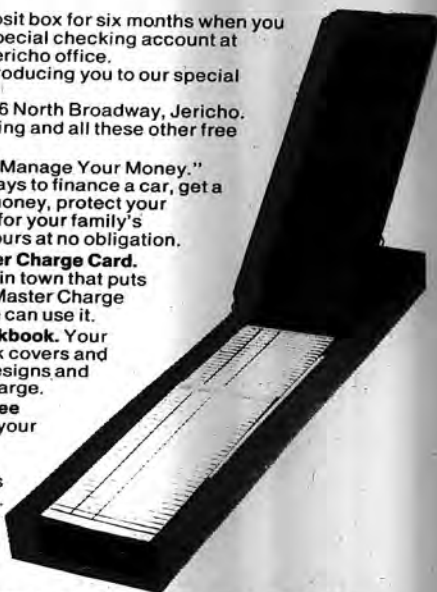

## Reflections On Education

By Robert F. Savitt Supt. of Schools, CSD #4

We would like to call the attention to our citizens to the General Statement of Educational Philosophy in the Plainview-Old Bethpage School District. This philosophy was developed a number of years ago based on suggestions of parents, staff members and students. Over the years, this philosophy has guided us as we plan our educational programs and develop our school budgets to assist us in implementing our educational objectives.

"Our democratically-organized schools should provide a desirable environment, where the children of all the people are given countless opportunities to grow at their own rate in their individual way - physically, emotionally, mentally and socially."

**DEMOCRATICALLY-ORGANIZED** - Our schools must be based on the assumption that, in the democratic tradition, pupils, staff members, school committee representatives, and the public have certain rights, not the least of which is to share in the development of matters that affect each group. However, with rights come responsibilities, not the least of which is to follow policies and regulations established by those authorities who have the legal or professional responsibility for so doing.

**WHERE THE CHILDREN OF ALL THE PEOPLE** - In America, our public schools are not restricted in any sense. Plainview-Old Bethpage schools are truly the people's schools and the only social agency that has contact with all the future citizens of our country. Such schools, then, must be geared to take care of a tremendous assortment of children from many different cultural and economic backgrounds, and must educate all or our children - the bright, the average, and the slow-learning.

**COUNTLESS OPPORTUNITIES** - Our children have a right to expect that an interested citizenry will provide them with the best schools, teachers, and items of instruction that can be afforded. Once these facilities and personnel are provided, they should be efficiently utilized to furnish the children with learning experiences of many valuable varieties.

**GROW AT THEIR OWN RATE IN THEIR INDIVIDUAL WAY** - No two children are alike in ability or personality traits. The modern school must be built on that precept. No single standard of achievement can be set up for all pupils. Each must be challenged to work to his greatest capacity. Each child must be regarded as a separate, important individual. Instruction and learning situations must be geared to provide success, through effort, for children at all levels. Every provision for individual differences must be made, and this involves class sizes small enough to be handled efficiently.

**PHYSICALLY, EMOTIONALLY, MENTALLY AND SOCIALLY** - The development and growth of the whole child must be a primary objective of our schools. To develop the mental aspect of the child without consideration for the other vital factors in the total growth pattern would be insufficient. The crying need today is for well-rounded individuals rather than mental giants or beautiful physical specimens. It is the job of our Plainview-Old Bethpage public schools to see that the child grows in all ways.
