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HHS Students Win 1970 Regents Scholarships

Mr. Raymond L. Rusch, principal of Hicksville High School, announces today that the State Education Department had released the names of 18,847 winners of Regents Scholarships of the 1970 series. Of a total of 2374 Nassau County winners and 1733 designated alternates, Hicksville had 46 and 43 respectively. The basis for awarding scholarships is the score in the six-hour Regents Scholarship and College Qualification Test administered to approximately 180,000 candidates throughout the State on October 8, 1969.

Each Regents college scholarship entitles the recipient to an award of \$250 to \$1,000 a year, depending on family income, for up to five years of study at a college, or at a hospital school of professional nursing, in New York State. Scholarship winners may also receive scholar incentive assistance of up to \$600 a year.

Out of a maximum possible score of 300, the highest score in the State was 292, achieved by a boy. The highest score by a girl was 288. Minimum winning scores vary from county to county. Lowest winning score in Nassau was 226, third highest in the State. The score of the lowest ranking alternate in Nassau

County was 209. Highest score in Hicksville High School was 271, achieved by Robert L. Kleinmann, whose twin brother Richard, ranked third with 267, behind David Satran's 269.

Each such scholarship entitles the recipient to an award of \$200 to \$500 a year, depending on family income, for up to five years of nursing study at a college, or at a hospital school of professional nursing, in New York State. Winners may also receive scholar incentive assistance of up to \$600 a year. Winners of Regents college scholarships have automatically been removed from the competition for a Regents nursing scholarship since the former carries a higher stipend.

Miss Wessell's German Club, Bob McMenamin president, arranged and set the tables. In charge of serving the food was the Italian Club, whose advisor is Mr. Ferraro and president Robin Garfinkel. The Latin Club, under Mr. Goldberg's direction and Ed Rosenblatt's leadership, handled the preparation, sale, and collection of tickets and the financial accounting. Mrs. Kozma's Spanish Club, led by Leslie Johnson, coordinated the entertainment.

The entertainment, presented between courses with Beth De

Domenico as M. C., consisted of a Spanish folk dance, a German songfest, and two solo singers. The impressive ceremony, arranged by Miss Biasi of the Junior High School, of inducting Latin students of the Junior and Senior High Schools into the American Junior Classical League, followed the entertainment.

The menu, with all food secured and prepared by students, included the eggs to apples typical of a Roman banquet. MEDIA CENTER (from Page 1) in terms of square footage. An office shared by the psychologist, speech, and reading teachers (who came on alternate days) was included in available library space, and these consultants were relocated in downstairs offices without detriment to their services.

The next year's anticipated budget was due at the central office the following day, so the assistant principal did some special homework, scaling a floor plan to accompany the library budget request. The school board superintendent endorsed our plan, even phoning board members for quick approval. There was only one proviso: expenses must be kept to \$100.

A new stumbling block arose: how to get the work done, since the maintenance department was scheduled through the end of the summer. By chance, maintenance was suddenly able to spare some men for the next two weeks, simply because an anticipated snowfall had not arrived. Of course, after these two weeks, the men would be committed elsewhere.

Having no alternative, we took our chances against the unpredictable weather. The children were moved to the principals office, desks and all, for the few days that their classroom was converted. Teachers signed up to come to the library in 15-minute intervals to

collect the library materials they'd need during this period.

The \$100 was sparingly meted out for paint, shellac, shelf boards, lumber, refinishing for the opened walls, replacement of ceiling tile, plywood, nails and spackle. The children chose soft blue-green paint for walls and rough wood areas, and Chinese red for the free-standing shelves. There was no master plan, no time for continuity; everything happened at once.

Many children benefited from a high level of creative participation. During a math lesson, they planned the new floor space. They helped to assign and arrange sections of the book collection in the most convenient and appropriate positions. With an abrupt flash of energy, they rolled up their sleeves and moved a mass of materials from the center of the floor to their newly assigned spaces. Order and pattern became more understandable as the idea of the materials center became clear to the children (and their teachers).

This conversion from library to IMC was more fun for the children even than roll-playing. This was a living corporate experience, in which everyone had to benefit, because everyone gave himself to the game of space education.

Jericho CC Downzoning Hearing Set For Jan. 13

10 A.M., Tuesday, January 13 is the time set for the hearing before the Town Board of Oyster Bay of the downzoning request made by the owners of the property know as the Jericho Country Club. All interested parties are welcome, and in fact encouraged by the Town Board to attend.

In November, the Board of Directors of the Birchwood Civic Association voted to oppose this downzoning, basing their position on four points: (1) the practicality of developing the property successfully within the current "Residential C" zoning; (2) the inevitable destruction of the attractive Jericho Turnpike "green belt"; (3) the aesthetic loss to more than twenty-five

Jericho home owners, and subsequent lessening of the value of their homes; and (4) the aggravation of already bad traffic conditions.

Current zoning limits this property to one-family detached homes occupying a minimum of one-quarter acre. Developed within these zoning structures, a local real estate executive estimates that 36 homes could be constructed on the property's 12-plus acres.

The property owners have requested downzoning to make possible the construction of a major office building, described by the builder's representative as having 200,000 square feet of office space and parking for 1500 cars.

Herman Lubitz Dies, Former Head of JJC

Herman Lubitz of 20 Maytime Drive, one of the founders of the Jericho Jewish Center in 1955, died of a heart attack on Friday, December 19th. He had served as president of the Jewish Center from 1961 to 1963 and was an original member of the Board of Directors of the Birchwood Civic Association.

On March 1st of this year, Lubitz was the guest of honor at the Jericho United Jewish Appeal Fund Raising Dinner. This was the culmination of his many years of participating in fund raising drives, serving Judaism,

his temple and the community. Lubitz, 57, was president of a paper and twine company in New York City with which he was associated for 25 years. He is survived by his wife, Adele, a son and daughter and two grandchildren. His brother, Sam, also a resident of East Birchwood, served as a Board member of the BCA for many years and is a former Editor of The Villager.

Services were held on Sunday morning, December 21st, at the Jericho Jewish Center and interment followed at Montefiore Cemetery, St. Albans.
