Oyster Bay Declares Week Of Mourning For Councilman Grunewald

The Town of Oyster Bay has dedicated this week as a period of official mourning in memory of Councilman A. Carl Grunewald of Hicksville, who died after an illness of several weeks on January 3 at Massapequa General Hospital.

Councilman Grunewald's death was termed "a serious loss to Town government and to all the people of the community" by Supervisor John W. Burke. Burke said that the Town Board would meet briefly at its regular Tuesday morning session to honor Grunewald but would then suspend all hearings and public business, continuing them at a later date. Burke also directed that all flags at Town facilities be flown at half mast during the week in Grunewald's honor.

Grunewald, 60, was first ap-

pointed to the Board in 1962. He won election to a four-year term in 1963 and was re-elected by a wide margin in 1967. He first entered Town service as a member of the Zoning Board of Appeals in 1955 and became Chairman of that body in 1958.

Grunewald devoted much of his time to Town affairs after retiring upon completion of 25 years of service as General Traffic Manager for the Lea and Perrin Company, food distributors, in New York and New Jersey. "Carl was constantly on the job, learning and helping to guide Town employees in their work," said Angelo D. Roncallo, former fellow-councilman and currently Town Republican Chairman. "I don't think anybody knew any more about what was going on in Oyster Bay. We shall all miss him deeply." Grunewald was head of the Town Safety Council and was responsible for numerous safety improvements at Town beaches, parks, roads and other facilities.

Grunewald was past president of the North Hicksville Civic Association, a member of the Hicksville School Board Advisory Committee, served on the Board of Directors of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce and was a member of the Hicksville Kiwanis Club. He was a former chairman of Red Cross drives and active in Boy Scout, Girl Scout, Heart Fund and Cancer Fund drives, as well as the Association for the Help of Retarded Children. Grunewald was a Republican Executive Committeeman from Hicksville.

Active in church affairs, Grunewald was past president of

the Men's Club of St. Stephen's Lutheran Church and of the Church Council. For five years, he was chairman of the church's Brotherhood Committee.

A Hicksville resident for 19 years, Grunewald was born in Ronkonkoma. He lived at 31 Violet Avenue, with his wife, the former Helen Kuebler. Other survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Andorin Gromus of Hicksville, his mother, Mrs. Ella May Wobbe, a sister, Mrs. Edna Olson and a grandson Richard C. Gromus.

Burial took place at Pine Lawn Memorial Park, following services at 10:30 A.M., Wednesday, January 7, at the Vernon C. Wagner Funeral Home, 125 Old Country Road, Hicksville. Services were conducted by The Reverend Roland Perez, pastor of St. Stephen's Lutheran Church.

Edward Morris, Democratic leader for the northern part of Oyster Bay Town, said, "The death of Councilman Grunewald represents a great loss to our town. He worked for programs that were best for the town, with party considerations second. His successor will have to be a man of great dedication and energy."

George O'Haire, of Wallis, O'Haire and Wallis, a Hicksville Democratic zone leader, noting that Councilman Grunewald had friends both in the Democratic and Republican parties, said "The town suffered a serious loss this week. Having sat next to him for six years when I was Deputy Supervisor, I can attest to his dedication. We all regret his passing."

Gerard A. Trotta, Superintendent of Parks, said "Carl Grunewald was a very personal friend of mine, a man whom I admired and respected for his dedication. His passing is a great loss to the town and to the party."

Nassau Police Puzzled

Nassau Police Commissioner Francis B. Looney announced that the department's Community Relations Bureau has contacted Armando Meneses, secretary of the Organization Hispano-Americana de Long Island, and will meet with him later this week.

Meneses charged last week that Spanish-speaking people were denied their rights by police because of language difficulties and the lack of interpreters.

"It's difficult to understand his complaint," Looney said, "because our Community Relations people have been in touch with him constantly for over a year, and there have been no incidents such as those he mentioned."

Looney went on to point out that 112 members of the department speak Spanish, including three detective sergeants, 15 detectives and four policemen. Sixteen others are currently studying Spanish on the college level.

"As a matter of fact," he added, "a total of 385 people in the department speak 29 different languages. I would conclude that the department is, for the indicated intent, not only bilingual but multilingual."

In addition, the department's training program includes sessions on the problems of Spanish-speaking people, and a pamphlet in preparation to advise Spanish-speaking people of police procedures.

PENALTIES:

The following scale of penalties is hereby prescribed for neglect to pay Armory & Court Expense, County, Town and Highway and Special District taxes after they have become due and payable:

If the first half is not paid on or before February 10, 1970, penalty will be added at the rate of one per centum per month from January 1, 1970 calculated to the end of the month during which payment is made.

Penalty on the second half will be added after August 10, 1970 at the rate of one per centum per month from July 1, 1970 calculated to the end of the month during which payment is made.

DISCOUNTS:

If the full year's tax is paid on or before February 10, 1970, discount will be allowed on the second half of the tax at the rate of one per centum of the second half. No discount allowed on payments made after February 10, 1970.

Taxes are payable by cash, check or money order. Uncertified checks will be accepted subject to collection and payment made therewith will not become official until collection has been effected.

When requesting tax bills, please state the School District location, Section, Block and Lot numbers in accordance with the Nassau County Tax Map.

After August 31, 1970, the 1970 Tax Roll will be turned over to the County Treasurer and all payments after that date should be made at the Office of the County Treasurer, Nassau County Office Building, 240 Old Country Road, Mineola, N. Y. 11501.

Hicksville Changes

The Town Board granted special permit use and zoning changes to two properties in Hicksville at its Executive Session on Tuesday, December 30.

Were Development Assoc. was granted a special permit use to erect and maintain an office building in an Industrial H. District on the north side of Duffy Avenue 494 feet from the westerly line of Jackson Place. The property has 402 feet frontage on Duffy Avenue, with a 320-foot depth and 376 foot rear width. The hearing on this petition was held on March 11, 1969.

David H. and Jack Youdelman were granted a zoning change from Business F. to Business G and a special permit use to erect and maintain a public garage and filling station on the southwest corner of West Nicholas St. and Newbridge Rd. Town records show that Walter J. Carrol, Hicksville attorney and others were present in opposition to this petition, which was heard on April 22, 1969.

In Plainview

Special permission was granted at the Executive Session of the Town Board on Tuesday, December 30th to Frank Miller, Leonard L. Ostreich, Daniel J. Mason, Charles B. Edinger and Leo Krauss to erect and maintain a medical and diagnostic center on a Residence D district in Plainview, located on the south side of Old Country road, about

200 feet west of Palo Alto Drive.

The hearing on this petition was held November 18th, 1969. Eleven people were opposed to it, and seven spoke in favor at the hearing. The Town Board placed restrictions on the special permit use for the 409-ft. deep property. These restrictions include prohibition of parking in front of the building, which must be set back 50 feet from Old Country Road. The Town Board also requires that six-and-four-foot cyclone fences be built on the southerly and westerly line of the property, and that a buffer of four-foot evergreens be provided on the southerly line. In addition, landscaping, lighting and parking plans must be submitted to the Town Board for approval.

Dobson denied

Permission was denied by the Town Board to Joseph Dobson for a zoning change from Residence D to Business F for a quarter-acre parcel of land on Sunnyside Boulevard and Manetto Hill Road, Plainview, for the purpose of erecting an office building.

A LITTLE PSYCHOLOGY GOES A LONG WAY: On the theory that a little bit of psychology can go a long way, girls at the Briarcliffe Secretarial Finishing Schools take Life Psychology courses, including dream interpretation, as part of their curriculum. They find themselves involved in role playing and weekly seminars designed to spur the art of conversation as well as the more standard fare of typing, shorthand, business math, correspondence, English literature and the less standard exposure to charm courses, diet and calisthenics.

"Given two girls with identical qualities and qualifications, the one who looks the part is going to get the job," says Dan Turan, director of the schools and of Adelphi Personnel, one of Long Island's largest chain placement agencies.

"New York firms are moving to Long Island at an increasing rate of speed and the demand for skilled secretaries is high. Some of the young girls who come to Adelphi for job placement have the necessary skills, but do not have the New York appearance. It's not just clothes, by the way...it's makeup, hair, how a girl carries herself, what she thinks of herself. It all totals up. The better her self-image, the better she looks to others and the more she will command in salary, responsibility and promotion."

Turan set up the Briarcliffe schools, one at 55 North Broadway, Hicksville; the other at 220 Old Country Road, Garden City, to provide self-confident, skillful and articulate executive secretaries for what he saw as the widening gap between job openings and job placements. Believing that high academic standings in high school do not necessarily guarantee success in the secretarial profession, each girl considering enrollment at Briarcliffe is given an in-depth interview, as are her parents. This helps determine her compatibility with other girls. Grades are not a determining factor at Briarcliffe, either, nor is competition as there are no tests or report cards at Briarcliffe. Instead, there is a progress report issued twice a year in order to re-evaluate each girl's course.

Students at Briarcliffe find that for the first time in their lives their parents are beginning to treat them as young adults. The average Briarcliffe girl reports a much greater rapport with her parents since attending Briarcliffe and a greater respect for themselves from their parents.

As Dan Turan says, "We have to be offering something special, otherwise we could never have justified opening just another secretarial school...and we're not just another secretarial school at all. We provide social activities in depth, have a class of girls full of school spirit comparable to the old-fashioned college campus, and give these girls a good look at courses they'd be hard-pressed to get elsewhere: merchandising, decorating, charm, personality, development, dancing. We do a very good job of helping a young lady accentuate her assets."

Ex Jericho Teacher Loses Court Test

Elvin Albaumb, a teacher dismissed from the Jericho School System, has lost a major round in his challenge of the constitutionality of the New York State law that permits the release of a non-tenure teacher without formal explanation.

A three-judge Federal panel in the U.S. District Court in Brooklyn unanimously rejected the teacher's claim that the state law failed to list standards for dismissal, noting the law listed the words competent, efficient and satisfactory as criteria for judging teachers.

Mr. Albaumb was fired by the district in 1967, when in his third year of teaching.

Tenure cannot be obtained until after three full years. Also rejected by the court was Albaumb's claim that he was dismissed because he was a negotiator for the local teachers' association.

The State Teachers Association and the National Educational Association, who have been financing his legal battle, reportedly are considering an appeal.

Brookhaven Expert Addresses Syosset Science Teachers

The latest research on radiation and its implication for secondary school science curriculums was outlined to Syosset science teachers at a special seminar recently by an official of Brookhaven National Laboratory.

Dr. Victor P. Bond, Associate Director of the Laboratory, spoke on radiation during a half-day seminar at Syosset High School which was attended by science teachers in the district.

Dr. Bond served as a medical officer in the U.S. Navy in 1945-1954. He currently holds the rank of captain in the Medical Corps, U.S. Naval Reserve. Dr. Bond joined the staff of Brookhaven National Laboratory in 1953 as a physician in the Medical Department. In 1957 he became head of the Division of Microbiology of the Medical Research Center. He continued his studies in radiobiology and on the kinetics of cell proliferation. He assumed the duties of

assistant chairman of the Medical Department in 1960, and in July 1962 he became chairman of the Medical Department. In April 1967 he was appointed Associate Director for Life Sciences, Chemistry and Safety.

Former Arab Knesset Member Speaks Jan. 16

Mr. Rustom Bastuni, who served in the Israeli Knesset—Parliament—from 1951 through 1955, will address members of Temple Or Elohim on Friday, January 16th, at the Oneg Shabbat. Mr. Bastuni recently arrived in the United States from Israel where he played an active role in the Arab community through his adult life. "Medical or diagnostic centers when authorized by the Town Board, as a special exception, after a public hearing, and subject to the following provisions:
