After Withdrawal

Spiegel As "Not" To Meet Re Best Lee Use. Land Use

Although the petition of Jerry Spiegel Associates to construct a 112-unit garden apartment complex has been withdrawn, members of SPOT (Society to Preserve our Town) will be on the alert for new developments, according to Emil T. Immesberger, Jr., chairman.

Charles J. Cronin, attorney for the petitioner, appeared at the Town of Oyster Bay public hearing on Tuesday to formally withdraw the petition, with permission to resubmit it at a later date. Joseph Giordano of Hicksville, attorney for SPOT, was also present. According to Mr. Giordano, Mr. Cronin expressed the desire in behalf of his client to meet with SPOT to find a common ground on the best use of the subject property.

A letter was prepared on the subject at a Tuesday night meeting of SPOT's executive committee for all members of

SPOT, whose continuously swelling ranks now include about 300 Hicksville residents, according to Lee Dell Hughes, corresponding secretary.

The letter reads:
Dear SPOT Member:

On February 17th at 10 A.M. at Town Hall the attorney for Jerry Spiegel, Charles J. Cronin, requested permission to withdraw the application for a change of zone from residence D to residential E-1 without prejudice to the right of the applicant to resubmit a revised application at some future date. The Board, on motion of Councilman Warren Doolittle granted to applicant Jerry Spiegel permission to withdraw. Mr. Joseph Giordano, attorney for SPOT, also attended the hearing. Mr. Giordano thanked Mr. Spiegel through his counsel for his decision to withdraw the application and taking into consideration the best interests of the community.

Mr. Cronin stated that Mr.

Spiegel would like to meet with the executive committee of SPOT at some future date to discuss other possible proposals for use of the land. Mr. Giordano said in his opinion the executive committee would be willing to meet with Mr. Spiegel and his associates.

The next move is for Mr. Spiegel to contact SPOT. We hope that his future proposal will be one that we can present to the membership of our organization for its consideration.

It has become evident that SPOT was able to influence Mr. Spiegel's decision. If your neighbors have not joined, urge them to do so. It is imperative that we continue to have a strong, united front of the entire community of Hicksville."

The letter is signed by the executive committee of SPOT, including Mr. Immesberger; Thomas Costa, Vice Chairman; Anthony Cannizzaro, Treasurer, and Lee Dell Hughes, Corresponding Secretary.

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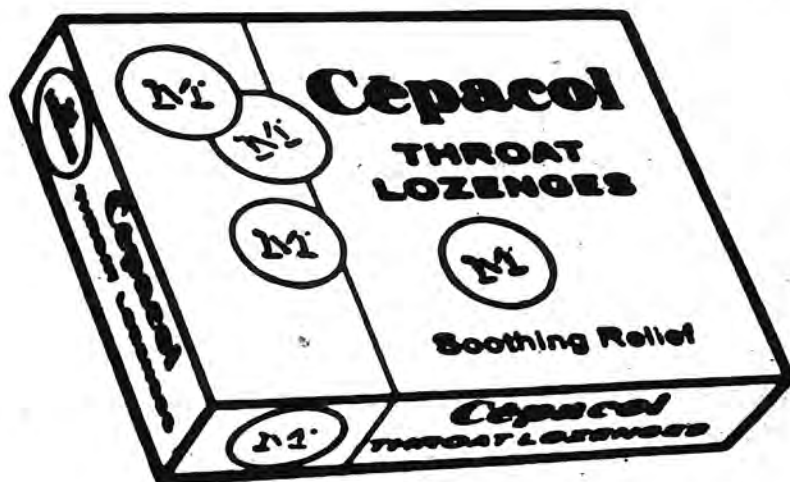

SYOSSET'S UNDEFEATED 15-GAME WINNING STREAK AND EXALTED POSITION AS THE NUMBER ONE TEAM IN NASSAU COUNTY CRUMBLING TO DUST ON THE HICKSVILLE BOARDS, 59-46, AS THE COMET STARTERS—DON MASSEY, JOE SCHRIEBER, RICH BERG, RICH MIRACOLA AND JOE ZUCKERMAN—ALL ATTAINED FULL STATUE THE SAME EVENING.

Coach Wayne Bryan's team achieved the awesome victory before 1,400 screaming fans. It matched in importance the severing of Oyster Bay's 38-game streak by Chet Jaworski's Orange and Black in 1952. And it was as good for Hicksville's prestige as the 17-16 win Lou Millevalte's team uncorked in 1946 to end Westbury's 34-game rampage and role as Long Island champion.

Syosset went out smoothly to a 6-0 when Bryan and his assistant Nick Monfredo switched to a man-for-man defense during a timeout.

As both Massey and Zuckerman moved into the left corner—and hit consistently from there—Hicksville rolled to a 17-12 quarter margin.

When the Braves moved to counter the two Hicksville big men, Rich Miracola zipped from the right side. A few sharp drives by Berg sustained the Hicksville attack and the Comets moved to a 31-19 lead with three minutes left in the half.

It was a sturdy Hicksville defense that keyed the win. And that was the hour of Don Massey. He played a superb physical game and commanded the backboards. He snared 21 rebounds on the night and added 19 points in the book. His mark was 9 for 17 from the floor.

Hicksville had a 50-35 edge in rebounds and Joe Zuckerman never let up in the second half. As he and Massey held Syosset's Chris Kupec and Dom Mattina to two points he picked off a dozen rebounds.

Joe Schreiber took the assignment against guard Larry Levane with zeal. He blanketed the Syosset and County scoring ace with an ever-pressing defense. Levane was contained to a small operating area and was consistently frustrated.

He did show his class in the second period as he rapped in 8 points to close the halftime gap to 32-27. Thereafter he was throttled

by Schreiber and was held to 14 points on the night.

The rousing but well behaved crowd was spared a head to head match going for the finish line as Hicksville, so often stung in the Syosset late stages, extended its lead.

An account of the first meeting from the Syosset student paper helped spur the Comets. It persisted to pick apart the individual Hicksville players and detailing their faults.

It hung prominently on the Hicksville Locker Room Bulletin board as the Comets took the court.

On the practice side it was the 10th Hicksville win against 5 losses. It gained a 8-3 standing in league play and fanned the Comet's once listless playoff hopes.

Massey was high for Hicksville with his 19 points. Miracola had 15. Zuckerman 14. Berg 10 and Schreiber 1. Hicksville scored 19 times from the foul line to 12 for Syosset. In field goals it was Hicksville 20-17.

Hicksville solidified its playoff position with a 50-45 harrowing victory over Clark at South Westbury, Tuesday night.

The Rams presented the Comets with the usual agony and after trailing by 12 points crept back to 40-42 with under two minutes left. At that point Miracola clunked in two from the corner. Massey spun around from the post and dunked one and Schreiber added a foul for a 7-point string.

Massey was required to haul down two crucial rebounds and intercepted a pass to hold the hosts off. Clark had upset Hicksville in the first meeting of the year.

Hicksville now stands at 11 wins and 5 losses. The Comets could secure second place by beating MacArthur and Plainedge at Hicksville this coming Friday and Tuesday nights.

A second play finish provides a more playable position in the playoffs and usually a better draw in the opening rounds.

From Our Postmaster

Ralph G. Cascardo, our Postmaster, in an attempt to curb the alarming increase in the amount of sexually-offensive materials flooding the mails,

reminds customers they can take steps to curb the flow of offensive advertising into their homes under the provisions of the Pandering Advertisement Statute.

Under the law, each addressee has the sole right to decide for himself whether an ad is offensive. If a person receives an advertisement which is, in his opinion, "erotically arousing or sexually provocative", he should send the ad, its envelope and a proper notice to the Postmaster

with the words, "Request for Prohibitory Order", on the face of the envelope.

Pamphlets (POD No. 123) which contains a request form that a customer can use in sending the complaint are available at your local post office stations, advised Postmaster Cascardo. The notice also may include the names of all children under 19 years of age residing at the same address.

Mr. Cascardo, further stated that customers receiving the objectionable material, must note the date received on the envelope with their signature, if no date appears thereon.

Ginsberg Would Permit Regents Scholarship Use Throughout Country

Assemblyman Martin Ginsberg (R-Plainview) announced that he will seek to eliminate a major restriction of the New York State Regents scholarship program requiring that recipients attend only colleges and universities located within the state.

In a bill now before the Assembly Committee on Education, Ginsberg has proposed an amendment to the State Education law which would

permit attendance by recipients of regents scholarships and fellowships at approved institutions of higher learning anywhere in the United States.

Ginsberg pointed out that hundreds of regents scholarships wind up going unused every year because students, for varying reasons, choose colleges and universities outside the state.

The amending legislation would permit out of state attendance not only in institutions offering a general program but to New York State Department of Education approved schools of dentistry, nursing, medicine, engineering and to business, professional, vocational, technical and trade schools.

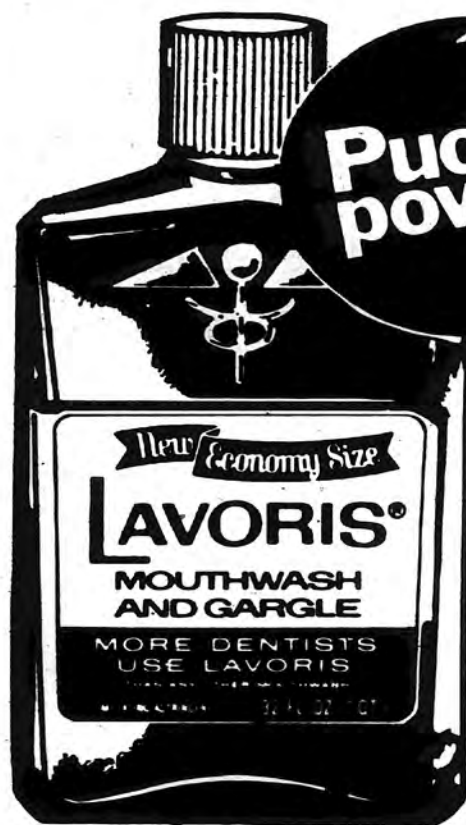

2. How should suburban Christian and Jewish congregations confront the crucial social issues of our times such as racism, war and more specifically, the problems of zoning and welfare locally?
3. How should Christians view the State of Israel? In the light of the birth of the state of Israel and the whole problem of Arab Jewish relations, what should be the Christian point of view?
4. Is the family disintegrating in the modern world? Do we have a generation gap? Why are so many young people disenchanted with institutional religion? Is this in any way connected with the drug scene?

The respective congregations will worship together. Following the services, there will be a collation at which time questions will be entertained. The public is cordially invited to attend.

BCA Involved In Jericho Education

In addition to its many other benefits, membership in the BCA helps keep you abreast of the latest happenings in Jericho Education. A report of the Jericho Education Committee is given at each BCA Board meeting, and BCA members are advised of the news via articles in the Villager, and direct mailings when necessary.

The BCA always had at least two representatives on the Budget Review Panel each year. This panel, which is composed of interested citizens and organizations, meets with the Board of Education in Study Sessions, to review Budget proposals prior to Board adoption. They have an opportunity to go over every item of the proposed budget, ask questions, and recommend changes. In addition, the Jericho Education Committee may invite the Superintendent and business manager to a BCA Board meeting to answer questions the Board may have, prior to voting on support or non-support of the Jericho School Budget. After this vote, a mailing is sent to the

community, stating the Board's position and reasons.

The Jericho Education Committee also arranges to have candidates for the Board of Education interviewed by the BCA Board, and advises the community of their support of the chosen candidates.

The BCA is represented on the Citizens Advisory Committee on Elementary Housing. The final report and recommendations of this committee will be presented to the Board of Education at its Feb. 26 meeting.

Representatives of the BCA attend Board of Education meetings throughout the year, keeping an eye out for community interests, and reporting back to the BCA.

Jericho Education Committee works in conjunction with other community groups on legislative matters, affecting education in general and Jericho in particular.

Thus, belonging to the BCA is not just belonging to a Civic Association—it's becoming a vital part of the Jericho School System as well.

Syosset To Assist In Hospital Drug Program

Central School District No. 2, Syosset, will be working in cooperation with Meadowbrook Hospital to learn more about drug problems and attitudes about drugs which may affect the children in our community, it was announced by Dr. Edward J. Murphy, Superintendent of Schools. The Board of Education has authorized Dr. Mark Klein, a member of the staff at Meadowbrook Hospital and director of the study, to distribute a questionnaire to all eighth and ninth grade students who volunteer to participate and whose parents have given their consent for them to do so.

Since the answers to many of these questions are very personal and sensitive to the student, the replies will be seen only by the researchers at Meadowbrook Hospital. No student reply will be revealed to the school in any form

which could possibly identify the student. At the end of the study, the Syosset district will receive a statistical summary of their data. This information will be used to develop more effective and meaningful programs for Syosset students.

"Once again," Dr. Murphy said, "let me reinforce the point that the study is entirely voluntary. Both the student and his parents must consent. There is no reward for participating or penalty for refusing."
