Plainview-Old Bethpage CSD No. 4 Board of Education Report

At the March 16 meeting of the Board of Education, the appeal presented by the students of Howard B. Mattlin Jr. High School to have an Open Campus Lunch Program was approved by the Board. All students from grades 7 through 9 attending either H. B. Mattlin Jr. High or Plainview-Old Bethpage Jr. High, who have parental permission will

be able to leave the school grounds for lunch starting April 6, on a trial basis for the balance of the year. The program will be evaluated over the summer. The Open Campus Lunch Program will also be extended to the 10th graders at both Senior High Schools so that all students from grades 7 through 12 will have the opportunity to participate

in this program.

The students of Kennedy High School agreed to have the Board table their request to sell magazines under the "Quality School Program" until the April 6 meeting of the Board of Education to allow the Board to investigate the possibility of providing budgetary monies to the students for their activities for the balance of the year.

A motion to place proposition on the ballot providing an alternate method of electing School Board members was defeated. The new method would eliminate the running for an individual vacant seat on the Board and would instead have the vacancies filled on the basis of those candidates receiving the greatest number of votes.

Panama has a completely different work schedule than in the United States. In Panama they would get up at 5:00 A.M., eat at 6:00 A.M., work from 7:00 A.M. until noon. After lunch he would take a siesta until 1:30 P.M. He then would work until 6:00 P.M.

Mr. Garabaldi said that the

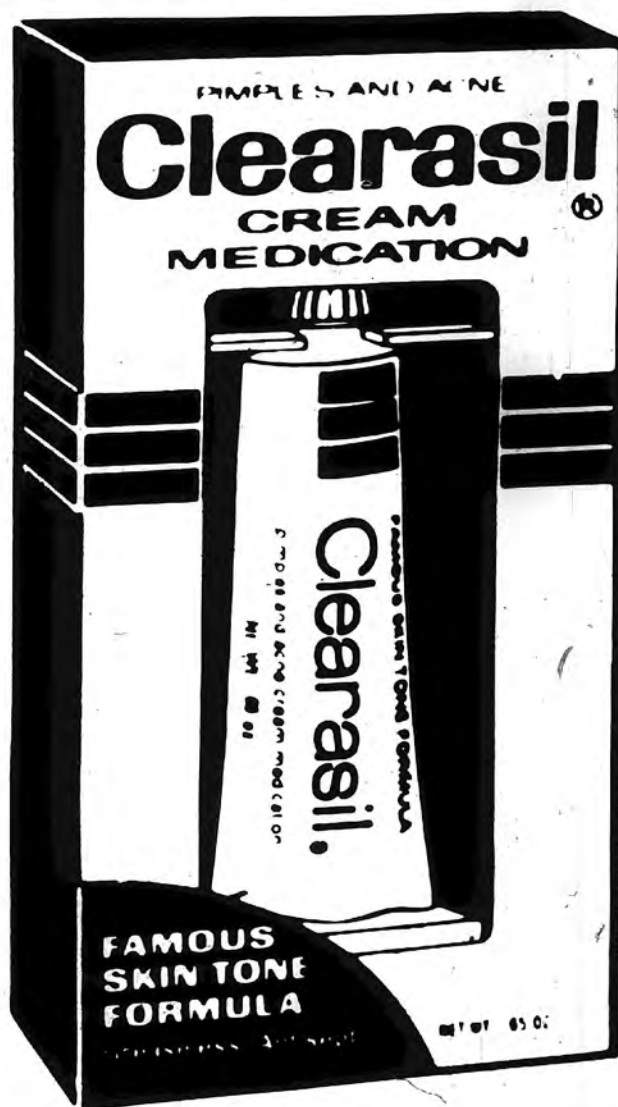
Torah Dedication

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Hicksville Threshold of Change

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Article III

This article is the third of series of eight articles based on the 49-page brochure, "Hicksville: A Framework for the Future", which is the work of the Hicksville Citizens Advisory Committee for Transportation and Development, working in cooperation with the Nassau County Planning Commission. A follow-up to the present brochure, which is a survey and analysis, will be published in May. Readers are invited to send in comments and queries regarding this series of articles.



LAND USE MAP shows a patchwork mixture of industrial, commercial and residential uses in Hicksville's downtown area.

It has been shown that Hicksville has proved a natural center for population, commuter use, roadways, commerce, retailing and other growth. It has also been shown that Hicksville's facilities are used by residents of many surrounding communities. As these communities grow and as Hicksville becomes increasingly commercialized, the pressures will be greatly felt in this Downtown area, which will be the focal point for dramatic growth, according to the Hicksville Citizen's Advisory Committee for Transportation

and Development.

For the purposes of planning proper development to accommodate the certain growth of the future, the Committee and the Planning Commission designated a special section of downtown, which it calls the "study sector," and which it feels is the area where planning is imperative. The study sector is bounded on

the south by Old Country Road; on the north by Mid-Island and Sears; on the east by Bay Avenue and the Long Island Rail Road; and on the west by Newbridge Road and a line west of Strong Street.

The area covers 206 acres of land. This influential sector is only five percent of Hicksville's total land, and only 1 per cent of the County's total. It is, however, a piece of real estate that will change radically to have overwhelming effects on the Town of Oyster Bay and on the county as a whole, according to planners.

Land Use and Zoning

This segment of Hicksville can be termed an "old" area in terms of the condition of its structures. There is a great deal of residential use of land which is commercially zoned, presumably because the residential structures predate zoning ordinances. Commercial development has sprung up side by side with residential uses in most areas, and there seem to be only two cohesive residential sections predominantly with buildings 40 years or older in good condition.

There is fair amount of "strip commercial" development; some industry; a number of two family residential buildings in with commercial uses; and a beginning trend to multi-story office buildings.

The disparity between existing land use and zoning becomes obvious at a glance. The land use diagram shows a patchwork of residential, public and semi-

Syosset Votes Down

School Bond Issue

Less than 4,000 voters turned out last Wednesday for the second School Bond vote in six months. But the opposition held and the 4 1/2 million proposition was defeated again. Final tabulations showed yes votes, 1745 and no, 2174. By districts the vote was:

The Bond would have provided an addition to the High School and a new school on Muttontown Road to accommodate elementary school children in the Split Rock area. The construction was considered mandatory if students were to receive full

advantage of their education.

Further plans to alleviate the overcrowding at the Split Rock School cannot be made, because the State Education Department has prohibited the addition of more portable classrooms at the school.

The \$4,452,190 proposition represented an estimated tax increase of .18 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation and was about half the total asked for by the School Board in an election last November. The November Bond would have provided the High School additions and a new Split Rock School, along with additions or improvements at nearly every facility in the district. It was defeated by an even greater margin than last Wednesday's vote.

public (post office, firehouse, churches, etc.); services; retail; industrial; with areas indicated for public parking. The zoning map, on the other hand, shows the southeast sector of the study area totally zoned for Business G use. The southwest sector is almost totally zoned Business F. The existing residential areas in the north part of the study area are in residential zoning, however.

Business G zoning provides for a "major" office building, among other businesses, allowing a height up to 50 feet. Business F, on the other hand, allows a height to 35 feet, and is called "neighborhood business" — retail, stores, service establishments, etc.

The committee's theory is that the residential structures, already described as "deficient" located in this important business-zoned area will be replaced within the next ten years. They will not, says the committee, be replaced with other single family residences, but with business development, as zoning allows.

Of the study sector, only 132 acres are zoned, the remainder taken up by roadways and the railroad right-of-way. In this sector, 24.2 acres are zoned residential. In actual use, 51.5 acres account for residential dwelling. Only 15.2 acres are in industrial or intensive commercial use, while these two categories, Industrial H and Business G, account for 84.2 acres in zoning. Something's got to give, and the committee states in its brochure that it is the residential that is expected to give way to commercial uses.

Pressures to Come

The widening of roads in the downtown area have already had their effect on the face of downtown. The roads which provide direct north-south and east-west access through the center of Hicksville have increased the traffic flow. Using the railroad station during rush hours, parking, just getting

around is difficult at the present time.

As the natural growth continues, and as more traffic flows into Hicksville to use its facilities, the pressures would be unbearable on downtown as it now stands. The planners envision a massive "transportation center" to handle the heavy traffic flow and parking as well as development in multi-family housing and commercial uses.
