Herald Report School District 17 Hicksville by Shirley Smith

The School Board has received a number of letters requesting summer transportation for handicapped children to summer camps. This transportation was provided by the district last summer and many parents are interested in finding out whether it will again be available. Our transportation contract expires the end of June and no decision has as yet been made regarding transportation for next year (bids on a new bus contract were just received this week and the Board has not had time to examine them and make a decision.) Therefore, the Board will not be able to give an answer to those concerned parents for a couple of weeks. As soon as the transportation question has been settled for the 1970-71 school year, all parents of handicapped children attending summer camp will be notified of the Board's decision.

The Board of Education has received an offer from Kennedy Associates, Public Relations Counsel, Rockville Centre, to handle public relations for our school district. No action was taken on this proposal at Tuesday's meeting.

The Board will consider requests of the Hicksville Educational Secretaries' Association and members of CSEA, Buildings and Grounds Department for vacation days on May 8 and 11. If there is no need to use any of the scheduled snow days, Hicksville schools will be closed on these days.

The Board of Education authorized the purchase of ear phones and two additional audiometers for use at the Senior High and Holy Family School. Authorization was also given to rent two Xerox dry copying machines, as replacements for other copiers now being used in the Administration Building and the Senior High Guidance Department.

The Board of Cooperative Educational Services 1970 Annual Meeting will be held Monday, April 6, 8:30 P.M. in the auditorium of the Westbury Senior High School (Post Ave. and Jericho Turnpike.) The tentative BOCES Administrative budget for 1970-71 will be presented and four members of the Board will be elected. Our school district will be allowed five voting delegates (School Board members.) One candidate from Hicksville, Arthur Eirich, has offered his name for nomination and election to the BOCES Board. Mr. Eirich is a former Hicksville School Board member. After much discussion, the Board of Education decided that the voting delegates in attendance at Monday's meeting will make up their own minds as to which candidates they will vote for. The Hicksville School Board will not formally back any candidate.

April 22, 23, 24 will be "Environment Days" in the Hicksville schools. During these three days the schools will present materials and programs designed to encourage a continuing awareness on the part of our children of the importance of improving, preserving and protecting our environment. Stress will be placed on keeping our schools, grounds and our community clean. Preserving nature's beauty, too, will be part of this program.

The School Board approved the BOCES Contract for 1970-71 Data Processing Services for \$98,800. The contract for 1969-70 was for \$123,000 and in an initial series of negotiations BOCES was asking \$135,000 for these same services. Through the efforts of Administration this figure was reduced to the \$98,800 approved by the Board - plus additional services which were not provided in the 1969-70 contract. Our district receives state aid for these BOCES services, at least a 50 per cent reimbursement.

Thomas Muratore submitted a policy revision for Policy 2.7 (selection of textbooks, book, periodicals, etc.) Mr. Muratore's prior suggestion of a book review committee was incorporated in this change.

The Community Book Screening Committee, suggested by Mr. Muratore, would be composed of the following ten people:

- 7 lay people, one appointed by each Board member
- 1 designee of the Principal of the school involved
- 1 designee of the Superintendent
- 1 designee of the Hicksville Library

The list of suggested materials would be submitted to this committee, after the materials had been reviewed by the appropriate supervisors or heads of departments. The list would then be submitted to the Board for approval.

There was a great deal of confusion and controversy over the proposed policy change. Thomas Nagle said that, according to the way the policy change was written, final approval of textbooks, etc. was up to the Board. The Board could approve something even if the Community Book Screening Committee turned it down. Superin-

Hearing to be continued

Business Zone Wanted To Keep Business Use?

A handful of residents with two children included appeared in opposition to the petition of Theodore Fastook for a change of zone from Residence D to Business F District for a 75 by 124 foot parcel of land fronting on the west side of South Oyster Bay Road, about 315 feet north of Garden Street.

Attorney Eric A. Roeckl, of Hicksville, who was present in behalf of the applicant, requested an adjournment of the hearing in view of the recent mail strike, which, he said, might have prohibited all those involved from receiving notices of the hearing.

At this point, those present in opposition affirmed that they had received their notices. It was

determined that 30 to 40 notices had been mailed out in connection with the petition, and only six persons were present.

Presiding Supervisor John Burke stated that since these residents had taken the trouble to come to Town Hall, the hearing would be held as scheduled, with a continuation set for April 28th, at which time Mr. Roeckl might present further testimony, and those who might not have received notices would have an opportunity to speak.

Continue Present Use

Mr. Roeckl said that Mr. Fastook, who lives on Remsen Street, Brooklyn, wished to continue the present use of the building on the land, which includes two offices, one for a combination real estate insurance business and the other for a law

office. He said he realized the law office use was illegal, but that this use dated from before Mr. Fastook took title to the property which was through an estate.

Mr. Roeckl said that if the zoning were granted, there would be a paved area in the front of the building to provide for seven or eight parking spaces. Apparently, those opposed felt the request for the change in zone was to secure parking around the building. Mr. Roeckl said that this parking provision was given only because it was a requirement when requesting a change to a Business F zone, and that if the parking could be done away with, his client would be glad not to provide this parking space. He said he avoided providing parking in the rear because of the adjacent residential properties.

It was established that the present business on the premises employed at least four employees, which would take care of half the parking area.

Doolittle Presents Petition

After the Town Clerk read routine correspondence from the building department about the plot, Councilman Warren Doolittle submitted a petition signed by 106 residents in the area opposed to the zoning change delivered to his home by John McFadden, a resident of the area.

A letter read by Mrs. Frank Matassa from the Northeast Civic Association, signed by George M. Johnson, President, said that this zone change would make South Oyster Bay Road look like Hempstead Turnpike with a "hodge podge of signs." Mrs. Matassa said the building is a small ranch house with no one living in it. She also said that the professional permits granted to nearby residents might be in violation with more than one doctor using the office. According to the special permits granted, the professional person is supposed to be in residence at the address.

Mr. George Erminian spoke saying the rezoning would make South Oyster Bay Road into "Coney Island," with fears that it would go further. Joseph Kalen voiced concern over the property values in the area. Charles Werder showed photographs of objectionable commercial development on South Oyster Bay Road.

tendent Abt brought out the point that the method suggested was cumbersome - all the lists of books would have to be sent to the members of the committee and there would still be the problem of the members seeing and studying the actual material proposed for use in the district.

(Board members receive lists of textbooks, periodicals, films, etc. before approving the purchase of these proposed materials. However, since the lists of proposed library books are so long, the actual lists are not sent to Board members before meetings - they are available for inspection in the Administration Building during normal office hours. At one time, the Board did receive these lists, but the procedure was changed to what is now being done.)

Mr. Muratore felt that members of the Screening Committee would have more opportunity to see the lists of library books than the Board members, since it is difficult for Board members to get to the Administration Building during their own normal work hours.

There was no motion to accept or reject the proposed policy revision. The matter may be discussed at a later date.

The School Board approved the 1969-70 contract with the Hicksville Educational Secretaries' Association.

Agway Withdraws

Hicksville High football followers have been jolted by the appointment of assistant gridiron coach, Joe Umbria, to the head job at Friends Academy in Locust Valley.

While everyone is pleased for Mr. Umbria his departure from the Orange and Black coaching ranks leaves a void bigger than usual to fill.

He, along with coach Wayne Bryan, has worked as an associate of Hicksville coach Jim Grantham during the past four seasons. In that time Hicksville has achieved a record of 26 victories, 5 defeats and one tie. The 1966 team won the designation of the best team in Nassau County and was a strong contender for the title on two other occasions.

Aside from his strong technical contribution to the training and organization of the teams Mr. Umbria has demonstrated a constant pursuing of a better spirit for the players and students at the school.

His genuine influence in creating an atmosphere in which the student-athlete-scholar-citizen could thrive will not be easily replaced.

His importance in touting the Hicksville athlete to colleges for

scholarships, a phase in which he worked very very hard, just cannot be underestimated.

It was not an easy decision but the opportunity could not be turned down.
