107 Widening

Businessmen Cite Parking, Tax Loss

The proposed widening on the west side of Route 107 between Hempstead Turnpike and Lewis Avenue by the New York State Highway department is the cause of a gathering storm of opposition on the part of owners of commercial properties along the one-and-a-half mile strip in question.

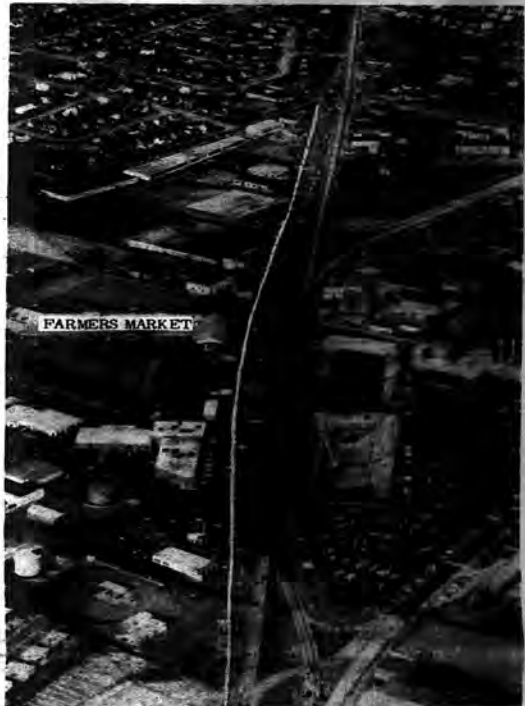
The public hearing notice on the widening appeared in the Newsday and the Press in 1964, according to Mr. Richard Holloweg, Metropolitan Regional Director of Transportation for New York State, whose office is in Babylon. The notice was not noted or acted upon by anyone at that time. In view of the time elapsed, Mr. Holloweg said, another hearing is contemplated by the Bureau of Public Roads.

Jerry Spiegel Associates, Real Estate, who is also owner of the Farmer's Market and Charlie Brown's in this location, has gathered with several other owners and tenants of commercial property to form the "Broadway Vocal Taxpayers Association." The Association has a petition signed by sixty persons, and hopes to rally to its support civic associations and "any interested parties" contrary to this widening.

The Bethpage School District has expressed opposition to the widening in view of the loss of tax revenue from the condemned land, Mr. Spiegel said.

The position of both the commercial property owners, many of whom would lose their front parking facilities, and the school district, he said, is that the widening should be done on the east side of Route 107 rather than the west, cutting into tax-exempt Grumman property, which, says Mr. Spiegel, contains only two sumps.

According to Mr. Holloweg's office, construction on the widening, which is partly in the



Town of Oyster Bay and partly in Hempstead Town, is tentatively scheduled to start in 1972. Frontage to be cut off would range from 42 feet on the south end to 75 feet on the north.

Mr. Holloweg gave several reasons why the property was not taken from Grumman's side of

the street. He said that the widening would interfere with the building where the LEM project was undertaken. He said also that there is some Navy-owned property involved, and it is "very hard" to get property away from the Federal Government.

Chamber Of Commerce Sees New Era For Hicksville

Right now, as Herald readers know because of the 8 article series on this subject, within a four mile radius of the Hicksville R. R. Station, is a complex containing the largest concentration of Commercial, Industrial and Residential land-use on Long Island. At the present projected rate of growth, this area will require added capacity for more than two million sq. ft. of office space, an equal or greater amount for industrial, retail and commercial services. All of which means many new jobs, large number of new dwelling units, more of everything that goes with this kind of evolution, adding up to a tremendous volume of new business.

Hicksville has the potential to capitalize on this expansion as well as to realize a generous gain for our business community, in the opinion of Stan Turner, Executive Director of the Chamber of Commerce. Thru proper planning, the Downtown section can be rehabilitated or redeveloped in a manner befitting this most important geological and physical locality on Long Island.

The Hicksville Jr. High PTA regular meeting to be held on Monday, April 13 at 8:15 pm in Cafeteria "A" will be of vital concern to every parent of a student in the Jr. High and parents of 6th graders who will enter in the fall. It concerns their health.

You've probably heard about the lunch problem here - and after giving it a few minutes thought have dismissed it from your mind - you shouldn't. If it concerns your child it concerns you.

Our lunch situation is a disgrace. Eating facilities are woefully inadequate and have been for a very long time.

Just imagine yourself being given 40 minutes for lunch. Fair enough. Now imagine spending 20 minutes of that time, sitting outside the restaurant waiting for your turn to go inside. Your children sit in the bleachers of the gym for 20 minutes tying up that space for 3 hours every day while waiting for their turn to eat.

Finally you're inside, half your lunch time is over, now you stand in line for 10-12 minutes more waiting for your food and beverage. We've now 8-10 minutes left to find a place to sit down and finally to eat. Within minutes you must clean up and rush out to allow the next group in. Nothing much left over for washing your hands etc. is there?

This is not an isolated example. This is the routine for all students every day of the week.

Twenty-nine hundred students are using facilities built in 1955 for 1900 students. This is the largest Jr. High in the country under one roof. We're bulging at the seams.

We're not asking for a huge, expensive chrome and glass addition or a building program stretched out to 1980.

The answer is simply in flexible modular units which will immediately solve the problem giving the children a decent amount of time in which to eat. It's putting first thing first, isn't it?

Come to the meeting Monday April 13. Principal Albert Glass will be there to talk about it and answer your questions.

Caso Opposes TOB Bridge

Concerned over recurrent reports that the Metropolitan Transportation Authority plans to move ahead with construction of the controversial bridge linking Oyster Bay and Rye, Hempstead Town Presiding Supervisor Ralph G. Caso today reaffirmed his opposition to the project and demanded that it be halted, "even on the drawing board."

Caso, vice chairman of the Nassau Board of Supervisors, said he plans to call on Gov. Rockefeller while in Rochester

for a political convention, to order the MTA to discontinue planning for the Long Island Sound span until completion next year of a study of the feasibility of a bridge further east linking Suffolk County with Connecticut.

"A Long Island Sound span should be put where it's needed most and, in my opinion, that need is clearly further east in Suffolk," Caso said.

Caso, who has publicly opposed the Oyster Bay - to - Rye bridge since the plan was conceived, noted that the state Department of Transportation has failed to hold promised public hearings on the approach routes to the bridge.

"This bridge project must not be advanced because it will virtually destroy the graceful beauty of Nassau's North Shore," Caso said. "The huge columns of steel and concrete would cause irreparable damage to the ecology of 5,000 acres of wetlands, rich in vegetable and animal life, along the shoreline."

The bridge would make a shambles of Oyster Bay Town's program of preservation and maintenance of its wetlands in their natural state, Caso said.

He noted also that hundreds of residents would lose their homes to make way for the approach roads and bridgehead.

Town Pool Membership

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Warren M. Doolittle announced recently that the strong economic guidelines set down by the Town Board will enable the Parks Division to hold the line against increasing the fees it will charge for 1970 membership in Oyster Bay's four community pools.

"The Park Division will mail out more than 43,000 applications to residents of the four park districts later this month," Doolittle said, "and I think those who receive them will be in for a pleasant surprise."

"Despite spiraling costs everywhere we turn, the Town Board has managed to retain the low membership costs of last year."

Doolittle also praised Gerard Trotta, the Town's Superintendent of Parks, for implementing various procedures suggested by the Board in its attempt to reduce the cost factor.

"All residents in the park districts (Bethpage, Massapequa, Plainview-Old Bethpage, Syosset-Woodbury) will receive applications late this month," Doolittle explained. Those who do not can obtain an application at the community pool in their respective district. If further information on swimming pool applications is required, please call GE 3-8030."

Doolittle said that any unsold pool memberships offered to park district residents will be made available to all Oyster Bay Town residents after May 15. No non-resident applications will be considered prior to that date.

The pools at Bethpage Community Park, Marjorie R. Post (Massapequa) Community Park, Plainview-Old Bethpage Community Park and Syosset-Woodbury Community Park will officially open May 30 and close the day after Labor Day, September 8.

Doolittle added that despite the fact the Town is holding the line against increasing fees it will still offer its senior citizens a reduced rate.

Senior Citizens, 65 years and over, and their mates (regardless of age) will be permitted membership in any of the four community pools at the discount rate of \$15.00 each for residents of the particular park district and \$20.00 each for non-residents of the park district.

Guest fees for individuals accompanying pool members are \$3.00 daily for those 16 and over and \$2.00 daily for those under 16.

Build, Don't Burn

In this day of turbulence, protests, and destruction, we find the Plainview-Old Bethpage High School Building Trades class dedicated to the task of building a better future for themselves and the community.

A program was introduced 2 years ago and expanded in this school year, with students from Hicksville High School, both of which have greatly benefited. The basic concept of this educational endeavor includes the application of trade theory to a practical, functional building project within the standards of the building code.

Upon receiving a request from Building and Grounds or any other department within the district, the following procedure is put into effect. A selected

group of students are sent to the origin of the job, where the students perform a comprehensive survey which includes necessary measurements, site layout, and necessary building code information. This information is returned to class and results in the production of drawing and blueprints for the job. A materials and cost list is assembled and submitted to the department requesting the work. The necessary funds for the purchasing of materials must be approved and set aside.

Under the direction and supervision of Mr. Polistina, Building Trades Instructor, the students are given their job assignments. The Building Trades Work Program has been granted a schedule that allows

for 6 periods of on the job training to assure that the students will receive the necessary practical experience. The remaining periods of the program are devoted to class theory and those trainable skills that can best be acquired within the school shop.

The success of this program may be measured in terms of eager, highly motivated students that are performing high quality trade accepted work comparable to the Building Industry.

This program has been made possible through the cooperation of supervisors, administrators and Board of Education. Its effect has produced those necessary skills for the student that will enable him to obtain gainful employment in today's highly complex society.

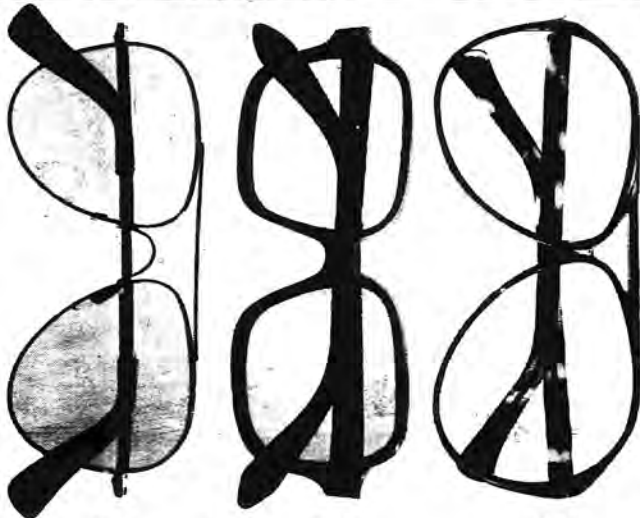

Tobay Drops Theatre Appeal

By a majority (6-1) decision of the Town Board at its executive session on Tuesday, March 31, the Town will not pursue the appeal of the New York State Supreme Court Decision to allow the RKO Theatre to operate a 1,000 seat theater in the Plainview Shopping Center.

At a public hearing on May 23, 1967, at which much opposition was voiced, the Town Board denied RKO the special permit use for the theatre, which at that time was designed for 1,500 seats. The applicants took the matter to the New York State Supreme Court, and on November 27, 1967, the court directed the Town of Oyster Bay to issue the special permit to the theatre.

The basis for Tuesday's decision, according to Town

Clerk William "Bud" O'Keefe, was that all legal grounds for an appeal on the decision have been negated by the applicants' compliance with requirements established for such an operation. Also figuring in the question is the matter of \$600,000 back rent for which the owners of the shopping center are holding RKO liable, Mr. O'Keefe said.

A letter explaining Tuesday's decision has been mailed to residents in the area who signed petitions opposing the application at the time of the public hearing. The letter says in part: "After a lengthy deliberation, the majority of the Town Board has decided that an appeal on this matter would be futile and may be damaging."
