Hicksville: Threshold of Change

Old Buildings Will Yield to Business, Apartments

This article is the sixth of a series of eight articles based on the 45-page brochure, "Hicksville: A Framework for the Future," which is the work of the Hicksville Citizens Advisory Committee for Transportation and Development, working in cooperation with the Nassau County Planning Commission. A follow-up to the present brochure, which is a survey and analysis, will be published in May. Readers are invited to send in comments and queries regarding this series.

The type of structures which will be in increasing demand as Hicksville grows, and the condition and type of structures presently in the downtown sector of Hicksville are key considerations to planners who are putting their best knowledge and experience toward preparing for certain and great growth.

As noted, the Hicksville Citizens Advisory Committee for Transportation and Development, appointed by the Town Board, selected the downtown sector as the focal area of Hicksville which will feel the pressures and, if not adequately planned, the burden of this growth.

The study area as described is bounded by Old Country Road, Bay Avenue, Sears & the Mid-Island Plaza, and a line west of Strong Street.

Apartment and commercial complexes will be the most needed structures as Hicksville grows, say the planners. With the coming of the massive transportation facility planned by the Metropolitan Transit Authority, more business and more residents are expected to gravitate to Hicksville.

Apartment units will be needed to meet a growing demand, according to the Nassau County Planning Commission. Presently, only 7 percent of the housing stock in the county is in apartment units. By 1985, says the Commission, 20 per cent of all dwelling units in Nassau County will be apartments.

The planners envision that a sizable percentage of the "new downtown" will consist of apartment units. Some are suggested north of the railroad adjacent to the centrally located proposed transportation facility; the remainder and largest

number covers the major portion of the land north of Old Country Road south of the Rail Road between Route 107 and Newbridge Road. Proposed apartments, say the planners, will answer the needs of Hicksville residents as well as newcomers.

Commercial Development
Economic forces now and to come presage not only an increase in demand for apartment units, but also for commercial expansion. Considerations include the decentralization of several New York companies to Long Island and the needs of a growing population to have its services conveniently located.

More office jobs, particularly in the business and service areas, are expected. If Hicksville maintains its present development of comparatively high level of employment in this area, it is expected that job availability in these categories in Hicksville could easily triple by 1985.

This means a need for improvement of facilities along with the commercial expansion to provide for the increased number of office workers expected to gravitate to Hicksville commercial buildings.

Present Structures
The study shows that the major percentage of structures in the downtown sector is residential, indicative of Hicksville's development as a low density suburb. Most of the buildings were built before 1940 and many before zoning.

When zoning came in, much of the land in the downtown sector was zoned for commercial or industrial use, even though residences were on the land at the time.

The residential structures in the northern portions of the study

sector are shown to be in sound condition, although they are not new, as a rule. Residential building has been on the down trend, while commercial building continues upward. Only a small percentage of houses has been built since 1960, and all of these in the Northeast sector, which is solidly residential.

The residential structures south of the railroad, originally intended for one family residence, have since to a great extent been altered to accommodate 2, 3 and sometimes 4 families. These buildings are termed in "declining, deteriorating and dilapidated" condition in the study.

These substandard buildings will probably not last more than another ten years, and will most likely be replaced with commercial or industrial development. Since the zoning so designates the land,

Tax Loss
With the downtown sector in its present state, it is not generating the tax dollars it should. With development along the lines that planners suggest, the tax volume will increase to a more realistic figure considering the land involved.

At present, one-third of the assessed valuation of commercial property in the study sector is accounted for by the Telephone Company. Sears and Mid-Island Plaza, just to the north of the study sector, surpass the total downtown sector in assessed valuation, upon which taxes are based. At present, the downtown sector produces only 12 per cent of the tax volume needed to support the Hicksville School District. A densely commercial area such as this should produce much more in taxes.

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

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

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

Jericho Board Of Ed. Report

The March meeting of the Jericho Board of Education was held in the Robert Williams School auditorium. Approximately two hundred residents attended the meeting and participated in discussions of three major topics:

Family Life education, the proposed 1970 - 71 Budget, and elementary housing and zoning. Family Life Education Program

The Board approved a charge to the Superintendent to review the present K - 12 curriculum as it relates to Family Life Education, including sex education. The review of the present programs in science, social studies, physical education and health will lead to recommendations which may be needed to strengthen the total offering. Any new or modified parts involving students, staff and community may be offered on a preliminary voluntary basis.

David Nydick, Superintendent of Schools, stressed that the Family Life Education Program is only intended to provide for the needs of students appropriate to the grade level. There is intent to develop a broad program involving clergy, physicians, parents and staff members, with further help from experts in the field as needed. This is not only in the development but in the actual implementation of the program.

As indicated in the recent Jericho School News, the Board has adopted seventeen Guiding Principles which will serve as the criteria for review of concepts, content, materials and methods to be used in reviewing and modifying the Family Life Program during the 1970 - 71

school years.

Adoption of Proposed Budget for 1970 - 71

The Board adopted a proposed budget for school year 1970 - 71. The budget, a result of careful study during the past months by the Board and the Citizens' Budget Review Panel, includes a net reduction of more than \$160,000 made by the Board and Superintendent. The annual Budget Issue of School News has been mailed to each resident. Detailed budgets including each item will be available at each school office.

The following dates were announced:

(a) Public Hearing on Annual School Budget Thursday, April 16 8:15 p.m. Speech and Drama Room - Jericho High School

(b) "Meet the Candidate Night" Wednesday, April 22 8:15 p.m. Speech and Drama Room - Jericho High School

(c) Regular Monthly Board Meeting Thursday, April 30 8:15 p.m. Speech and Drama Room - Jericho High School

(d) Annual Meeting Tuesday, May 5 8:00 p.m. Auditorium - Jericho High School

(e) Annual Election and Budget Vote Wednesday, May 6 2:00 - 10:00 p.m. Gymnasium - Jericho High School

Elementary School Housing Study

The Board approved the following recommendations regarding elementary school housing:

1). maintain the operation of the Robert Williams School for a minimum of three

years. Further consideration to housing as it relates to the closing of any elementary school shall be given in accordance with the recommendations of the Citizens Advisory Committee.

2) re-zone the area north of Jericho Turnpike and east of route 106 to attend the George A. Jackson School instead of the present assignment to the Robert Seaman School.

3) assign the two district-wide special classes now at the Seaman School to the Jackson School.

4) further re-zoning can be considered if any major changes occur in the enrollment which cause concern for the school program.

Mr. Nydick commented that the Citizens Advisory Committee "has provided a thorough, well-documented report with sound recommendations. The plan approved by the Board provides for reasonable flexibility which considers present and future enrollment. It divides the potential growth area into two schools rather than one. Further, these recommendations provide for better balanced class sizes and also for such facilities as media centers in each elementary school."

It was also pointed out that the committee, a representative cross section of the community held a substantially unanimous opinion that the Williams School should be kept operational. Members of the Citizens Advisory Committee received the appreciation of the Board for the conscientious study.

Tax Rate Advance

The Office of the Superintendent of Schools of the Jericho School District advises that the new estimates of income from State aid have reduced the estimated increase in the tax rate from \$2.46 to \$1.13.

With this latest information, the projected tax rate will be \$10.38 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

BE IT ORDAINED, that the
Town Board of the Town of
Oyster Bay, County of Nassau,
State of New York, does hereby
enact the following ordinance to
be known and designated as the
"WATERWAYS ORDINANCE
OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER
BAY REGULATING THE USE
OF WATERWAYS".

Section 1. - SHORT TITLE
This ordinance shall be known
as the "Waterways Ordinance of
the Town of Oyster Bay."

**Section 2. - LEGISLATIVE
FINDINGS**
It is hereby declared and found
that water sports and the
operation of boats in the waters
or waterways of the Town of
Oyster Bay are matters affecting
the public interest and con-
sequently should be subject to the
supervision and administrative
control of municipal authority for
the purpose of safeguarding the
public.

Section 3. - AREAS COVERED
(a) The following rules and
regulations, except when
prohibited by the laws of the
United States or the State of New
York, apply to all waters or
waterways under control of the
Town of Oyster Bay.

(b) All provisions of the
Navigation Law of this State, of

the inland rules enacted by Congress and governing the navigation for United States inland waters, applicable to Channel Systems relative to the rules for vessels passing each other, as to lights on vessels and other matters consistent with the proper use of the Channel Systems, the Federal Motor Boat Act of 1940 and the Federal Boating Act of 1958, shall be complied with by all vessels.

Section 4 - DEFINITIONS

(a) The term "boat" or "vessel" includes every description of water craft or other contrivance used on or capable of being used as a means of transportation in water and in air, and shall be deemed to include any airplane

capable of landing on water.

(b) The term "Channel" as used in this ordinance shall mean main channels and cross channels connecting with them as delineated by navigation buoys (placed by the U. S. Coast Guard or the Town of Oyster Bay.)

(c) The term "owner" shall include the person under whose name the vessel was last registered with the United States Coast Guard or with the Division of Motor Boats, Conservation Department, Department, State of New York, or documented, and in any other case the last known owner, or the person who claims lawful possession of such vessel by virtue of legal title or equitable interest therein which entitles him to such possession.

(d) The term "skin diving" shall include any person swim-

ming with the intent to explore or photograph in local waters or to hunt fish therein, including any person using any self-contained underwater breathing apparatus commonly known as an Aqua Lung, but shall not include bona fide salvage or other commercial operations displaying proper signals.

(e) The term "anchor" or "anchoring" shall mean the attachment of, or to attach, a vessel to the ground by means of tackle so designed that, when such attachment is terminated, the tackle in its entirety is removed from the ground and taken under the control of the vessel.

(f) The term "moor" or "mooring" (when used as a verb), shall mean the attachment of, or to attach, a vessel to a pier or dock or other structure; or the

attachment of, or to attach, a vessel to the ground by means of tackle so designed that, when such attachment is terminated, some portion of the tackle remains attached to the ground and is not taken under the control of the vessel.

Section 5 - SANITATION

(a) Discharging of toilets is prohibited in areas designated or which may hereafter be designated as boat basin, dock, bathing areas or mooring areas or with 500 feet of such areas.

(b) Dumping or discharging of oil, chemicals, refuse garbage or waste or any pollutant in any waters or waterways from any boat or vessel or dock facility is prohibited.

(c) All boats or vessels operating within the waters of the Town shall fully comply with all Laws of the State of New York

and the rules and regulations of the New York State Conservation Commission.

Section 6 - MOORING AND ANCHORING

(a) No person shall moor or anchor a boat in any channel and in no case shall any person moor or anchor a boat within 50 feet of any public beach, nor shall any person moor or anchor a boat within the distance designated on any sign duly authorized by the Town Board, unless specific authority is granted by the Town Board.

(b) No person shall moor or anchor any boat so as to endanger the safety of, or cause damage to, any boat previously anchored or previously laid down. Nor shall any boat be tied up or made fast to a public dock

or float or to property of the Town for a continuous period in excess of the time indicated by sign. Any boats so moored, anchored or tied up shall be removed by the owner or person in charge thereof on order of the Town Board or Harbor Master or agent thereof or Marine Division of Nassau County Police Department. If said boat is not removed after notice to so remove it, it may be removed by or at the direction of the Town Board or Harbor Master or agent thereof or the Marine Division of Nassau County Police Department at the expense of the owner or person in charge of said boat, to be enforced by civil suit, such expense to be in addition to such penalties as may be prescribed by or imposed under this and other ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay and the laws of the State of New York.

(c) The location of mooring facilities, the use thereof, and the types of mooring shall be under the supervision of and regulated by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay.

(d) All floats shall be moored in such a way as to be secure at all times and under all conditions, and such mooring shall be subject to supervision by the Harbor Master.

(e) Any vessel or float so moored in violation of any part of this Section or Sections 7 or 14 of this ordinance, or the Rules and Regulations adopted by the Town Board pursuant to this ordinance shall be removed by the owner or person in charge thereof on order of the Town Board or Harbor Master assisted by the Marine Division of the Nassau County Police Department. If said vessel or float is not removed after notice to so remove it, the same may be removed by or at the direction of 1) the Town Board, 2) Harbor Master, 3) or agent thereof, assisted by the Marine

Division of the Nassau County Police Department at the expense of the owner or person in charge of said vessel or float to be enforced by civil suit, such expense to be in addition to such penalties as may be prescribed by or imposed under this and other ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay and the laws of the State of New York.

(f) No person shall moor or anchor any boat occupied as living or sleeping quarters within 1500 feet from the shore for more than 72 hours without first obtaining permission from the Town Board or their duly constituted representatives.

Section 7 - HAZARDS TO NAVIGATION

Any vessel which becomes a menace to navigation or sinks, grounds or becomes otherwise disabled, shall be removed by the owner or person in charge thereof on notice of the Town Board or Harbor Master or agent thereof, or by the Marine Division of the Nassau County Police Department. If said boat is not removed after notice to so remove it, it may be removed by or at the direction of the Town Board or Harbor Master or Agent thereof, or by the Marine Division of the Nassau County Police Department at the expense of the owner or person in charge of said boat, and the Town or Nassau County shall not be responsible for any damage that may occur to such vessel in the course of removing same.

Section 8 - WATER SKIING

(a) No person shall operate a boat for purposes of towing a person on water skis, a surfboard or similar device unless there is in such a boat a person over the age of 10 years in addition to the operator and in a position to observe the progress of the person being towed.

(b) No person shall ride on water skis, a surfboard or similar device, or use or operate a boat or vessel to tow a person thereon during the period from sunset to one hour after sunrise.

(c) No person shall ride on water skis, a surfboard or similar device, or use or operate a boat or vessel to tow a person thereon within 150 feet of the lifeline markers of any public or semi-public bathing area or public dock or mooring area or in other areas as so marked, or within 150 feet of any swimmer or bather, or within any channel or 50 feet from any such channel.

Section 9 - SPEED AND OPERATION OF BOATS

(a) It shall be unlawful to operate a boat at a greater speed than five (5) miles per hour in any area used as a boat basin, anchorage or mooring area, nor within 100 feet of the shore line, a dock, raft, float, or moored vessel.

(b) Every person operating a boat shall at all times operate the same in a careful and prudent manner and at such a rate of speed as not to disturb the reasonable comfort of occupants of other boats, or endanger the property of another or the life or limb of any person, or so as to interfere with the free and proper use of the waters.

(c) No boat shall be operated in such a manner as to cause a wake which is dangerous to life or limb of a person or to other boats or other property.

(d) No person shall operate a boat or vessel within the water's and waterways of the Town of Oyster Bay while in an intoxicated condition. Upon the trial of any action or proceeding arising out of facts alleged to have been committed by any person arrested for operating a boat or vessel while in an intoxicated condition the court may admit evidence of the amount of alcohol in the defendant's blood taken within two hours of the time of arrest, as shown by a medical or chemical analysis of his breath, blood, urine or saliva.

(e) For the purposes of this section (a) evidence that there was, at the time, five-hundredths of one per centum, or less, by weight of alcohol in his blood, is prima

facie evidence that the defendant was not in an intoxicated condition; (b) evidence that there was, at the time, more than five-hundredths of one per centum by weight of alcohol in his blood is relevant evidence, but it is not to be given prima facie effect in indicating whether or not the defendant was in an intoxicated condition; (c) evidence that there was, at the time, fifteen-hundredths of one per centum, or more, by weight of alcohol in his blood, may be admitted as prima facie evidence that the defendant was in an intoxicated condition.

Section 10 - MUFFLERS

No person shall operate a boat propelled wholly or partly by an engine operated by gas, gasoline, naphtha, diesel oil or other fuel without having the exhaust from the engine run through a muffler or controlled by the introduction of water into the exhaust pipe or line.

Section 11 - SKIN DIVING

(a) No "skin diving" shall be undertaken in any channel or in any waters where the same may interfere with reasonable and proper operation of boats or within 150 feet of any public or semi-public beach used for bathing and swimming or within 150 feet of any person bathing or swimming within an area designated for bathing or swimming.

(b) No person shall use, operate or discharge under water any spear gun or similar apparatus within 200 feet of any public or semi-public beach used for bathing or swimming or within 150 feet of any bather or swimmer.

(c) Any person engaged in skin diving shall maintain a visible red flag with a diagonal white bar on the boat or on the surface of the water in the area of the skin diving operations.

Section 12 - AQUATIC EVENTS

Nothing herein contained shall prohibit the Town Board from issuing special permits through the Superintendent of the Beach Division for aquatic events, boat races or otherwise render proper supervision and in limited areas for limited periods, after prior approval by the United States Coast Guard or the Division of Motor Boats as required.

Section 13 - LOSS, DAMAGE OR THEFT

The Town will not be responsible for loss, damage or theft to boats and their contents or to any other private property.

Section 14 - ADOPTION OF RULES AND REGULATIONS AND DESIGNATION OF MOORING AREAS

The Town Board is hereby authorized to adopt rules and regulations governing the operation of boats in the waterways under the control of the Town of Oyster Bay, subject to obtaining the written approval of the Conservation Commission of the State of New York. The Town Board may, from time to time, designate, by resolution, the authorized mooring areas wherein the mooring or standing of boats shall be permitted as hereinafter provided. All such mooring areas to be marked and indicated by suitable buoys or markings.

Section 15 - PERMITS

Any person may obtain a permit for mooring in any of the designated mooring areas by making application to the Superintendent of Beaches on a form approved by the Town Board.

Section 16 - PEDDLERS

No person shall enter upon or engage in the business of selling, hawking, peddling or vending any property, article, product, goods or thing from any boat or vessel on the waterways of the Town of Oyster Bay without having first obtained permission of the Town Board through the Superintendent of Beaches.

Section 17 - ENFORCEMENT

The Harbor Master, or any person duly authorized by the Town Board, or any member of the Marine Division of the

Nassau County Police Department is hereby empowered to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance and any such person shall have the right to stop any boat for the purpose of enforcing this Ordinance.

Section 18 - SEVERABILITY

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part of this Ordinance shall be adjudged by any Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not effect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part thereto directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered.

Section 19 - PROMULGATION OF RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Town Board is hereby granted the power to promulgate reasonable rules and regulations, from time to time, as it may determine for the administration and enforcement of this Ordinance, such regulations to be made public by posting in a conspicuous place in or about the bathing and bathing areas, and filed with the Superintendent of Beaches for inspection by licensees during regular business hours.

Section 20 - SUMMONS

A summons issued and served pursuant to this Ordinance shall be returnable in the District Court of the County of Nassau, Fourth District, Oyster Bay, and the form of such summons shall be substantially the same as the form of summons known as the "Uniform Navigation Summons" prescribed by the Rules and Regulations duly established by the Conservation Commissioner of the State of New York.

Section 21 - PENALTIES

(a) An offense of this Ordinance is hereby declared to be a violation and shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for a first offense; and by a fine not exceeding Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars or imprisonment not exceeding fifteen (15) days, or both such fine and imprisonment for a second or subsequent offenses. Each day on which any violation of any provision of this Ordinance continues shall constitute a separate offense.

(b) In addition, the Town Board may maintain an action or proceeding in the name of the Town in a Court of competent jurisdiction to compel compliance or to restrain by injunction the violation of this Ordinance.

Section 22 - This Ordinance shall take effect immediately.
