## Herald Report School District 17 Hicksville by Shirley Smith

It was back to school for School Board members Tuesday night, when Mrs. Vera Galante, Supervisor of the Foreign Language Department for the Hicksville Schools, presented a program of Spanish, French and Italian.

To explain the Foreign Language curriculum used in the Hicksville schools, Mrs. Galante and her staff demonstrated actual class situations to the Board and others present at the School Board meeting.

Members of the Board willingly (maybe not too willingly) posed as first graders, as Mrs. Galante spoke to them only in Spanish, attempting to have them respond. Perhaps more inhibited and less boisterous than actual first graders, the audience enjoyed their efforts, anyway.

We were then treated to a third grade French class from Lee Avenue, enthusiastically taught by Mrs. Suzanne Bach. As with the not-too-eager "first graders," Mrs. Bach concentrated on the audio-lingual aspects of the language. It is not until after the third grade that reading and writing are brought into the foreign language program. Rhythm games and songs are frequently used to aid the children in achieving good pronunciation—without an English accent.

The sixth grade class of Mrs. Renee Lesetz (East Street School) demonstrated the children's reading ability and recognition of various verb forms and parts of speech. Although understanding very little Italian, we were able to pick out a few interesting tidbits about Arturo Toscanini and Enrico Caruso.

There are 1,368 students of Spanish, French and Italian in the FLES program in Hicksville. Although children are picked for this program in the first grade, there is an opportunity for others to join in the seventh grade. The regular language program begins in the ninth grade.

Following the foreign language presentation, Mrs. Rachel Johnson explained the Language Arts curriculum. Mrs. Johnson is Supervisor of Language Arts, Kndg. through sixth grade.

There are two reasons why English (or Language Arts) is taught, says Mrs. Johnson: because it is desirable and necessary. We need to know how to communicate in this complex society and English teaches us how.

English is now being taught in new ways—in the study of sentence structure and sound-

symbol relationships. It is being taught through its function; through the language that is emerging from usage.

Mrs. Johnson, who is also Supervisor of Reading, explained that spelling and reading are part of Language Arts. These are all integrated and part of all the subjects taught in our schools.

The School Board voted to offer student accident insurance to all district students next year. This will be done on a voluntary basis—literature will be distributed by the district, but the choice will be up to the individual parent. All funds will be handled by the insurance broker, not by the district. Parents will be receiving more information on this matter next September.

## To Discuss Budget

Mr. Thomas Nagel, member of the Hicksville Board of Education will discuss the proposed 1971 school budget at the Lee Avenue PTA meeting Thursday May 21, at 8:00 P.M. at the Lee Avenue School, Lee Avenue, Hicksville, N.Y.

## Tobay Considers Parking Land

No residents were present to speak for or against the matter of considering the acquisition of a property in Hicksville on behalf of the Town of Oyster Bay Public Parking district at a maximum estimated cost of \$75,000, which was on Tuesday's agenda at the Oyster Bay Town Board meeting. Decision was reserved on the matter, which concerns a piece of property on the corner of Broadway and Mineola Avenue, fronting about 300 feet on Broadway and 200 feet on Mineola. The parcel will be used for parking purposes if the decision is made to acquire this property.

# Msgr. George M. Bittermann

Msgr. George M. Bittermann, pastor emeritus of St. Ignatius Loyola Catholic Church died on Sunday, May 10th, in Syosset Hospital.

Msgr. Bittermann was born on July 11, 1885 in Brooklyn. He graduated from All Saints Parish School and graduated in 1904 from St. Vincent's College in Latrobe, Penn. He was ordained on May 21, 1910.

Msgr. became pastor of Queen of the Most Holy Rosary Parish in Bridgehampton in 1928. Three years later he became assistant to St. Ignatius Loyola Parish and served here until Jan. 30, 1969, when he became Pastor Emeritus.

Msgr. was also dean of the East

Central Nassau Deanery. He had been dean of several Catholic parishes since 1952. He was a member of the Diocese of Rockville Centre Board of Consultors and its Commission on Parish Boundaries.

A mass will be offered at 8 p.m. today at St. Ignatius and a celebrated Mass of the Resurrection will be offered at 11 a.m. Friday, May 15th, with burial following at Holy Rood Cemetery in Westbury.

## Plainview Rezoning On Coming Town Board Agendas

May 19th, May 26th and June 9th are dates to remember for Plainview and Jericho residents interested in their community. These are dates when rezoning applications for parcels in Plainview will be heard by the Oyster Bay Town Board at their public hearings, which start at 10 A.M. on these Tuesdays.

### Day-Night Hearing

A day-night hearing has been set for Tuesday, May 19th on the application of L.W.R.K. Co. for a change of zone from Residence D to Business F District for an irregular parcel fronting about 150 feet on the south side of Old Country Road 617 feet east of Plainview Road, and running approximately 400 feet deep. The night hearing was granted after submission of a request by Arnold Fishman, president of the Greater Plainview Civic Association. The last time Mr. Fishman was granted a night hearing on a nearby parcel on the corner of Palo Alto Drive and Old Country Road, about 300 persons showed up in opposition. That date was March 24th, and that application, a petition by M. & L. Development Corporation to build apartment houses, was denied this week.

LWRK proposes to build a three-story, 10,400 square-foot office building with parking for 240 cars. The property is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Zukowski and Mr. and Mrs. Henry Zimmer. L.W.R.K. is the contract vendee of the property, which is adjacent to the Crossroads at Plainview Shopping Center.

### Health Facility

Also on May 19th, the Town Board will hear the application of PHRF Realty for a special permit use to erect and maintain a health-related facility for a Business F parcel located on the northeast corner of Old Country Road and Kaldi Lane. The

property fronts 152 feet on Old Country Road and runs 393 feet deep.

Applicants propose to erect a 25,280 square-foot, three story building and will provide parking for 125 cars. Called the Central Island Health Related Facility, it is to be used in conjunction with Central General Hospital, but not exclusively. It will take care of persons requiring medical attention, but not to the extent required in a nursing home.

### Major Office Building

On May 26th, the Town Board will hear the petition of David J. Larry and Alan Greene; Jack Parker, Harold Liebman and the Young Men's Christian Association of Nassau and Suffolk, Inc. for change of zone from Residence A to Business G for a parcel fronting on the north service road of the Long Island Expressway in Jericho for the purpose of constructing a 197,240 square foot office building with parking for 1,000 cars. On the east is a Business F parcel owned by the First National City Bank, which the petitioner believes will be used for an office building and as a computer center for other banking facilities.

According to the petition filed at the Town Clerk's office, the Y.M.C.A., which is the owner of the property, wants the change of zone because it no longer needs the property and believes it couldn't get the proper price for it as residential property in this location. The Y.M.C.A. is in contract of sale on the property with Ainkasef Corp., 11510 Jericho Turnpike, New Hyde Park.

### Business F Request

On June 9th, a petition for a change of zone from Residence D to Business F in Plainview will be heard. Further details will be given later on the application, which is being filed by Harold and Helen Walsh, Mark Lazarovic, Barry Levine, et al.

First of all, the State University College at Cortland is not closed. This has not been the aim of the strikers. Students have the option of either continuing to go to classes as usual, or arranging their grades with their instructors. This change in the grading policy for the remainder of the semester was voted on unanimously by the Cortland College faculty and approved by its president, Richard Jones. In either case, under this plan a student may consider himself on strike depending on how he feels he can best support the effort.

Second, the purpose of the strike by the students (which has the endorsement of the faculty) is to allow each individual student the opportunity to examine the issues pertaining to the war in Indochina, our government's policies regarding domestic matters, and the role of the university.

Third, the strike activities for this campus include such programs as seminars and workshops with faculty members and students, canvassing in the community, sending letters and telegrams to legislators, and independent research.

I would like your readers to know that a most sincere effort has been made to maintain an atmosphere of respect for individual rights among all members of the college community and the local public.

## Hicksville Historial Day

Wednesday, May 20th is known as Hicksville Historical Day. A day set aside for celebrating the founding of Hicksville.

Some three hundred years ago Roger Williams purchased land from the Indians on Long Island. Part of this purchase was later named Hicksville, probably after Valentine Hicks who was related to the famous Quaker preacher Elias Hicks. Much of the land remained unsettled during the early years of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. As a matter of fact, a census of the entire Township of Oyster Bay in 1835 showed a total of 5,083 people. Compare this to the 1969 census of 362,888 of which Hicksville claims 52,482 residents.

Farming became a thriving occupation and it was not long before Hicksville became one of the leading centers of the potato industry. But farms gave way to houses. The population boom that followed World War II saw Hicksville develop at a rapid pace. Today, it is a well balanced community having diversified industry, suitable business and excellent shopping facilities. In spite of this development, the atmosphere remains suburban.

Now Hicksville is again on the verge of considerable growth and change in the downtown area, which will, if wisely planned, add to its current history and set the stage for future progress of this town.

## Social Security News

You probably think social security is only for older people. But that's not the whole social security picture - not by a long shot.

Social security can mean a lot to younger people. It can mean monthly cash benefits to disabled workers; men and women who may be in their twenties or thirties.

If you've worked long enough under social security - and most workers have - you can count on a continuing cash income for yourself and your family for as long as you are disabled.

A disabled worker with two minor children may receive as much as \$434.40 a month.

A person is considered "disabled" if he cannot work because of a severe physical or mental impairment that has lasted (or is expected to last) for 12 months or longer.

It is important to apply for benefits promptly when it appears that your disability will last 12 months or longer. A delay could cause you to lose some of your benefits.

Disability payments can also be made, under certain conditions, to disabled widows and widowers age 50 or older, and to persons who have been continuously disabled since before reaching age 18.

## From Our Postmaster...

Post offices will observe normal service schedules on Friday, May 29 - a holiday for federal employees generally - Postmaster General Winton M. Blount said today, it was reported by our Postmaster Ralph Cascardo.

Regular city and rural deliveries will be provided; normal weekday mail collections will be made, and regular window services will be available as well as other regular services.

Under law, federal employees are given the preceding Friday off when a holiday occurs on a Saturday - as in the case of Memorial Day, Saturday, May 30. However, post offices will maintain regular schedules on Friday, the 29th, to prevent a 3-day closing over the Memorial Day weekend. Suitable adjustments will be made in pay or compensatory schedules for employees.

On Memorial Day itself - Saturday, May 30 - post offices will observe regular holiday schedules, with no normal deliveries or window services. Mail will be picked up from collection points on the less-frequent holiday schedules and special delivery will be available.

## Bureau Of Fire Prevention And Inspection



### Hicksville Fire Department

The general public is urged to follow the following instructions for the safe storage, use and handling of calcium hypochlorite around the home:

1. Read the container label of the product being used and carefully follow directions.
2. Store original container in cool, clean, dry areas, away from steam pipes or other sources of heat. Separate container from all organic or oxidizable materials and any other possible contaminants. DO NOT USE MILK BOTTLES. Keep covered with original closure and out of reach of children. Avoid out-of-season carry-over storage of unused stock supplies.
3. Use only clean, dry and noncombustible scoops, such as porcelain or enamel cups, glass containers, or clean metal spoons, for transferring the chemical from the drum to the mixing container or to the pool. Use of the plastic scoop supplied with the chemical is permissible. DO NOT USE dirty containers such as beer cans, coffee cans, etc.
4. Never dissolve the chemical in other than plain water. NEVER POUR WATER OVER THE CHEMICAL. Always pour the chemical into water, with constant stirring.
5. Dispose of spilled material immediately by flushing with large amounts of water. Rinse empty containers thoroughly with water before discarding.
6. Keep hands clean and wash hands after handling. Gloves should not be worn because they may become impregnated with the chemical resulting in spontaneous combustion.
7. Avoid contact of salt or solution with the eyes or skin. When contact occurs, wash involved area immediately with free flowing water, for rapid and thorough dilution. When eye irritation or skin burns occur, obtain medical assistance at once.
8. Avoid inhalation of escaping chlorine gas. Move anyone overcome by chlorine gas to an open area and call the Fire Department for oxygen.
9. In Fires involving calcium hypochlorite (chlorine) call the Fire Department. Immediately "DELUGE" with water only. Do not use dry chemical or vaporizing liquid (carbon-tetrachloride) Fire Extinguishers.

- (b) The election of one member to the Board of Education for a three-year term commencing July 1, 1970 to June 30, 1973. The present incumbent is Thomas F. Nagle.
- (c) The election of one member to the Board of Trustees to the Hicksville Free Public Library for a full term of five (5) years commencing July 1, 1970 and expiring June 30, 1975. The present incumbent is Elery Bean.
