### Dr. Erie H. LeBarron

Service for Dr. Erie H. LeBarron, former Superintendent of Hicksville Public Schools from 1936 until his retirement in 1955, will be held Friday at 1 P.M. in the United Methodist Church, Hicksville, N.Y., under the Direction of the Vernon C. Wagner Funeral Home, Inc., with the Rev. James Jay Benson Officiating. Burial will be in Nassau Knolls Cemetery, Port Washington, N.Y.

Mr. LeBarron died on May 19, 1970 after an illness of several months.

He was born in Fredonia, N.Y., the son of the late Lynn W. LeBarron and Ida Phillips LeBarron. He was graduated from South Dayton High School, Albany State Teacher's College, Columbia University and received his Doctorate from New York University.

Dr. LeBarron was active in many Community, Civic and Professional organizations including: The United Methodist Church of Hicksville, Fredonia Masonic Lodge, Knights Templar, Hicksville Alumni Association and Phi Delta Kappa. He had served as President of Nassau County School Administrators, New York State Club of Columbia University, Alumni Association of School of Education New York University, L.I. Zone New York State Retired Teachers Assoc., Hicksville Kiwanis Club. He has also served as Commander of

American Legion Harold Tierney and Charles Wagner Posts as well as Lieut. Governor of Kiwanis, L.I. Zone.

He was an avid and skilled golfer and had the distinction of having made a hole-in-one in 1938 which earned him a membership in Walter Hagen's "Hole-in-One Club."

Dr. LeBarron's first wife, the former Coralyn Remington, predeceased him in 1947.

He leaves his widow, the former Ruth Shepard; his son The Rev. Bruce E. LeBarron of Bethany, Conn.; a sister, Mrs. William Herrington, Tonawanda, N.Y., and three grandchildren.

## Qualifications Of Voters

### A Voter Must Be Registered In

### Order To Vote On Tuesday, June 9

The qualifications of voters are as follows:  
**VOTERS MUST BE**

1. Citizens of the United States.
2. At least 21 years of age.
3. Resident within the district for a period of at least 30 days next preceding the meeting which he or she offers to vote.

A qualified voter need not register if he had voted at an annual or special school meeting within the past two years and just prior to this registration of May 23. If you have not voted at a school referendum at any time during 1969 and 1970, you must register on May 23.

If you are not registered and do meet the qualifications for a voter, you will have an opportunity to register on Saturday, May 23, between 10 A.M. and 5 P.M. in the central administration building on Division Avenue, Hicksville.

## At Town Hall

# Strong Protests Staged to Office Bldg., Health Facility

The agenda for public hearings by the Oyster Bay Town Board at Town Hall Tuesday was well occupied with two Plainview matters, and residents were out to protest both. Both on Old Country Road, one was for a health related facility to be operated in conjunction with Central General Hospital, and the other for a three-story office building on a tract of land east of the Waidbaum's shopping center, part of much vacant land which developers have had their eyes on for quite some time.

About 125 Plainview residents came to Town Hall in Oyster Bay on Tuesday to protest the petition of L.R.W.K. Co. for a change of zone from Residence D, to Business F District for a three-acre parcel on the South Side of Old Country Road East of Plainview Road. Petitioner, who is the contract vendee of the two joining pieces of property owned by Mr. and Mrs. Henry Zimmer and Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Zukowski.

The hearing began at 10 A.M. and was continued at 8 P.M. that even on the basis of a petition for request submitted by Arnold Fishman, 6 Cranford Road, President of the Greater Plainview Civic Association.

This tract of land, or parcels adjacent to it, have been under consideration several time in recent months by the Town Board for zone changes. Mr. Fishman, his wife, Carol, the Association's lawyer, Charles Mattingly, Jr., of Old Bethpage, and many of the residents present at the night hearing had been at Town Hall on these applications no less than three times in the last three months.

L.W.R.K. originally proposed to erect a three-story office building on the parcel, but said it would make a more sprawling, one-story edifice, if this plan were more suitable to residents. Parking is provided for 240 cars.

### Traffic Concerns

Many in the opposition voiced concern for increased traffic feeding into Old Country Road from the proposed building and the danger to children from nearby schools who are permitted to leave the school grounds during lunch hours. This stretch in the vicinity of the junction of Manetto Hill Road and Old Country Road shows a high accident rate, according to testimony of Charles Mattingly, of 48 accidents and 21 serious injuries in a period of three years. Councilman Edmund Ocker said the Town Board is working with the state to see what can be done about this dangerous area.

A letter in opposition from the Plainview School Board signed by Jack D. Tillham, President, giving the same reasons, was read into the record by the Town Clerk, Wm., (Bud) O'Keefe.

Councilman Ralph Diamond expressed concern over cars making left turns out of the building when the building's employees were beginning and ending the day's work.

Attorney Stanley Amelkin of Jericho presented the application for the zoning change. He showed a letter from Grace Wicks, who owns the only one-family house in the vicinity, approving the change of zone. He said the building would be in character with the medical center directly to the east of it, and that it would have a 50-foot set-back from Old Country Road, with no front-of-building parking. Landscaping and fencing would provide buffers between the subject parcel and surrounding property; mushroom lights on the parking field would illuminate only the field and not the surrounding

area, and no other nuisance factors, such as garbage, noise, etc. would be present.

Real Estate expert Bernard Goodman, speaking in behalf of the petitioner, said the property was not suited for residential use, and that this part of Old Country Road was definitely in a commercial trend.

### Pro-Residential

Lou Silverman, representing the Greater Plainview Civic

Association, showed pictures of the area indicating that it is still very residential. Mrs. Carol Fishman asked why this building could not be put in one of the two industrial parks provided by the Town Board in Plainview.

Michael Cook, of 7 Devonshire Court, a lawyer, quoted from section 263 of the Town Law Book, in opposition.

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## From the kitchen of JOAN AMUNDSEN

Now that Memorial Day is almost upon us, how 'bout a cook-out? It's just about that time of year again to sweep out the patio and clean off the grill or even christen that new one you just bought. At any rate, the kids are always quite anxious for the first bar-b-que of the season. It's always a big occasion and a big feast. There's potato salad and macaroni salad and the last jar of September's home made pickles. Of course there's always sun-

shine salad and pickled beets and maybe some marinated tomatoes. It wouldn't be complete without corn on the cob and chicken.

Nothing in this world can compare with home made potato salad. Try using half sour cream and half mayonnaise. I don't have a recipe for this yet as it's still a pinch of this and a handful of that, but I'm working on it.

I think everyone knows how to make sunshine salad, but in case

you don't, here it is:

Prepare one 3 oz. package of lemon jello as directed on the package. Add 2 tbsp. vinegar and a dash of salt. Drain one large can of crushed pineapple and add pineapple. Dice about 1 cup of celery and grate 3 large carrots. Add to jello. Place in ring mold in refrigerator to set. When set, unmold on lettuce leaves and serve with:

### Creamy Lemon Mayonnaise

In bowl place  
1 cup mayonnaise  
3tbsp. lemon juice  
1 teasp. grated lemon peel  
Mix Well.  
Whip  
1/3 cup heavy cream  
Beat in  
3 tbsp. conf. sugar

Fold the whipped cream into the lemon mayonnaise. Place in small bowl in center of gelatin ring.

The pickles, beets, and tomatoes I'll save for another time, but I must tell you about the chicken. Some years ago I went for a lesson on how to give a luau. The chicken dish was out of this world. I've made a few changes for the home grill, but it's still delicious.

### Mo'a Fala Chicken

Combine 3 tbsp. cornstarch, 1/4 cup white vinegar, 1 cup chicken stock, 1 cup sugar.

Cook until clear. Add dash of tabasco, 1 tbsp. prepared mustard, 1 tbsp. worcestershire sauce, 2 green peppers (cut up), 1 small jar pimientos (cut up), 1

13 1/2 oz. can crushed pineapple. Sprinkle chickens with salt and pepper and bar-b-que as usual basting often with the sauce.

We were also served a salad with a dressing called Bonnie Brier Salad Dressing. I have never come across this dressing in any local supermarkets. If anyone knows where to buy it or how to make it from scratch please let me know as I think we would all enjoy it.

## 10% Increase, Fringe Benefits For Plainview Teachers

After negotiations which have been in progress since January, but which came to a head with a threatened teachers strike as of midnight, Sunday, May 10, the Board of Education of the Plainview Schools and the Plainview Teachers Association came to an agreement at about 6:00 A.M. on Monday morning, according to Dr. Robert F. Savitt, Superintendent of Schools.

The agreement was ratified by the Association, and school went on as usual last Monday. The two-year agreement provides for a 10 per cent across-the-board increase with some fringe benefits. This is consistent with the salary scales on Long Island, Dr. Savitt said, and lower than the 14 to 15 per cent increase in earlier demands by the Teachers Association.

In the second year of the next salary schedule will

be adjusted to place the teachers in the 67th percentile in Nassau County, or in the upper third in the pay scale.

Fringe benefits include an increase in the amount of insurance the district will pay; 10 per cent increase for coaches and other supervisors of extra-curricular activities; and establishment of a welfare fund.

The Board of Education has made an estimate as to how this increase will be reflected in taxes, but is not at liberty to disclose this estimate, as it takes in groups, custodians, for instance, with which the Board has not yet settled.
