

A Message From Your Library

The Hicksville Public Library budget will be submitted to the voters on June 9th along with the school budget. The budget for 1970-71 (otals \$373,638.28 less \$12,100.00 estimated income from \$12,100,00 estimated income from fines and fees. The tax rate, based on the latest assessed valuation figures is estimated at &1.1 cents per \$100.00, a cost to most borrowers of \$15.00 - \$18.00 a vear

It is not difficult to see that one visit to the library will return your tax dollars for the year at prevailing book prices. However, the Trustees urge passage of the library budget because of per-lormance rather than economy. Consider the following: The library has nearly 30,000 registered borrowers, or per cent of the population of the District.

Mr. Nagle sup-ports the 1970-71 proposed school budget because it "represents continued in progress our educational system with the least possible cost to the individual taxpayer,

Emil T. Immesberger Chairman of The Society to Preserve Our Town (SPOT) has called a membership meeting to be held June 8, 1970 at the Junior High School on Jerusalem Avenue at 8:00 P.M. As you may be aware, Jerry Spiegel Associates plans to build garden apartments on a plot of land on Lee Avenue in Hicksville now occupied by Giese Florist, Inc. Mg. Spiegel because of great pressures brought to bear by SPOT previously withdrew his petition to the Town of Oyster Bay seeking a rickoning of the land from Residential "D" to Apartment House District "E-1".

Hicksville Future And The Future Of Hicksville's Children

As we stand within the sanctity of the voting booth next Tuesday, each one of us who cares enough to vote in the important school elections will be exercising the nighest privilege of citizenship in a democracy. Our form of government cannot long survive unless informed citizens make intelligent choices about the public issues which congront them at the polling place.

In the school elections voters will be asked to choose among six candidates for two seats on the school board. We think service on the Board of Education is a position of great responsibility and public trust, and that voters should select those candidates of demonstrated integrity who place the interests of our children and our community above the promises and pressures of any self-appointed selfish groups.

Voters will also be asked to approve a \$1.41 increase in the tax rate when they okay the new \$21,177,771 school budget. We believe that the Board's request for an increase of only 24 cents for all budget purposes other than negotiations shows commendable restraint and fiscal responsibility. We think the \$1.17 requested for the settlement costs of the new teachers contract and related raises to other employees will provide Hicksville with good teachers at salaries which are in line with those of our neighboring districts. We think our kids and schools benefit from the stability of continued service by good, competent and experienced personnel, who should be paid as well as their colleagues nearby. To pay them excessively would not be fair to the hard-pressed Hicksville taxpayers. To pay them less would be unfair to them and in the long run would be detrimental to our children. Moreover, since all but about 6 percent of the school budget is involved with fixed costs which are unavoidable, we must face the fact that those things which would be out if the budget is turned down, are the "extras" which make schools most appealing to our youngsters. Sure, we could run schools without athletics or interscholastic academic competitions. Of course, we could do away with intramurals and new library books. Parents could buy their kids' own textbooks and furnish much of the transportation beyond state mandated minimums. We could cut out most adult education and cafeteria operations, and we could once again forego equipment and proper maintenance on our buildings. Perhaps in doing this, we might "save" a few dollars on our tax bill-but the price to our children would be too great. Therefore on Tuesday, when you stand in that voting booth, remember that you will be making some important decisions about the future of Hicksville and its children, as well as decisions about your own tax burdens. Because taxes are your "dues payment" for democracy, you must get the best bargain you can find in these high pressure economic days. Vote YES on the School and Library Budgets and the Proposition.

We think also, that theBoard showed good judgment in opening the polls another day for additional registrants, and we hope that all 10,848 previously registered voters, plus additional new ones, will go to the polls and vote.


