Hicksville Future And The Future Of Hicksville's Children

As we stand within the sanctity of the voting booth next Tuesday, each one of us who cares enough to vote in the important school elections will be exercising the highest privilege of citizenship in a democracy. Our form of government cannot long survive unless informed citizens make intelligent choices about the public issues which confront them at the polling place.

In the school elections voters will be asked to choose among six candidates for two seats on the school board. We think service on the Board of Education is a position of great responsibility and public trust, and that voters should select those candidates of demonstrated integrity who place the interests of our children and our community above the promises and pressures of any self-appointed selfish groups.

Voters will also be asked to approve a \$1.41 increase in the tax rate when they okay the new \$21,177,771 school budget. We believe that the Board's request for an increase of only 24 cents for all budget purposes other than negotiations shows commendable restraint and fiscal responsibility. We think the \$1.17 requested for the settlement costs of the new teachers contract and related raises to other employees will provide Hicksville with good teachers at salaries which are in line with those of our neighboring districts. We think our kids and schools benefit from the stability of continued service by good, competent and experienced personnel, who should be paid as well as their colleagues nearby. To pay them excessively would not be fair to the hard-pressed Hicksville taxpayers. To pay them less would be unfair to them and in the long run would be detrimental to our children. Moreover, since all but about 6 percent of the school budget is involved with fixed costs which are unavoidable, we must face the fact that those things which would be out if the budget is turned down, are the "extras" which make schools most appealing to our youngsters. Sure, we could run schools without athletics or interscholastic academic competitions. Of course, we could do away with intramurals and new library books. Parents could buy their kids' own textbooks and furnish much of the transportation beyond state mandated minimums. We could cut out most adult education and cafeteria operations, and we could once again forego equipment and proper maintenance on our buildings. Perhaps in doing this, we might "save" a few dollars on our tax bill—but the price to our children would be too great. Therefore on Tuesday, when you stand in that voting booth, remember that you will be making some important decisions about the future of Hicksville and its children, as well as decisions about your own tax burdens. Because taxes are your "dues payment" for democracy, you must get the best bargain you can find in these high pressure economic days. Vote YES on the School and Library Budgets and the Proposition.

We think also, that the Board showed good judgment in opening the polls another day for additional registrants, and we hope that all 10,848 previously registered voters, plus additional new ones, will go to the polls and vote.

With the Summer season coming up, we would like to caution our residents to use care when using the charcoal lighter fluid to start the Bar-b-que fire. Improper use of this handy liquid can cause serious burns. Please follow instructions on the can and never use it after the fire has started. We would also like to remind our residents to use caution when working with chlorine, either in the powder form or tablets, for use in the backyard swimming pools. Follow instructions on the package, store in a cool, dry place out of the sun. Don't store large quantities. Any water coming in contact with a container of chlorine causes a chemical reaction, which often results in an explosion and fire. Many injuries occur each year from the improper use of this chemical. We also wish to remind you that open burning is against the county anti-pollution law. The Police Department is enforcing this law.

The Hicksville F.D. Drill team "Hicks" have been out training to improve their efficiency.
