Supervisor Burke Announces

New Modern Parking Facility In Hicksville

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor John W. Burke today (Tuesday, June 9) announced the scheduling of a public hearing to consider a dynamic new parking program that will provide 1,270 commuter parking stalls within a short walking distance of the heavily used Long Island Railroad Station in Hicksville. Burke said the program was developed as a result of a recent study of parking conditions in the area.

Burke said the hearing would be held at a Board meeting on Tuesday, July 14. The Board would have to authorize \$4,434,000 in serial bonds if construction of this 3½-level parking structure at the Town's existing parking field on Duffy Avenue is approved.

"This multi-level facility would increase the number of existing stalls at this location by 850 and raise the total number of Hicksville parking spots provided by the Town to 2,356," Burke said.

The Supervisor added that the proposed parking facility, first of its kind in Oyster Bay, would be constructed on Town-owned land and would be of precast, prestressed concrete to achieve maximum economy.

The Supervisor explained that the Town will realize a savings of 1.75 million dollars (\$1,750,000) if it utilizes this modern multi-level construction concept. He explained that the purchase of approximately seven acres of land would have to be made to park the same amount of cars in the conventional fashion and the Town and School Districts would also lose the tax revenue from that acreage.

Councilman Warren M. Doolittle, who worked closely with Burke and the consulting engineers, Sidney B. Bowne & Son, on the study, said the additional parking stalls were necessary to meet anticipated parking needs which will be created when the Hicksville line, which already has the greatest ridership in the LIRR system, is electrified.

Doolittle said the parking proposal had the full support of

John Calbreath Burdis, Director of Planning for the Nassau County Planning Commission.

"The location of this site and its need is in keeping with the findings the Commission staff has made in its studies of Hicksville," Doolittle said.

"The present plan being developed could easily support additional parking as the future development of Hicksville as a major transportation center continues," Doolittle added.

Burke said the survey showed that 4,700 commuters presently use the Hicksville station each day and that approximately 46 per cent park cars.

"We feel that as many as forty (40) per cent of these pre-7:15 AM commuters will be able to take later trains if the additional parking locations are made available," Burke commented.

Burke said this project is only the first of many steps the Town will be taking in Hicksville. "We are also looking into the possibility

of similar multi-level sits in the area of this and other commuter centers and are advocating construction of additional parking facilities by other interested organizations such as the Metropolitan Transportation Authority.

Burke went on to say that he thought the new parking facility would relieve nearby residential areas of some of the all-day parkers they must contend with, open up the local business district for short-term parkers and save valuable time for commuters who will not have to take an early train just to be assured of a parking space.

Burke said that the construction phase would take 10 months and the Town hoped to have the project completed in December, 1971, if it is approved. Temporary parking arrangements will be made during the construction period with the possibility of buses transporting commuters from more distant locations.

This past week has been a fairly good fire safe week we are happy to say. One fire, the second in 3 weeks, did minor damage to a locker room and office in the parts department of Eiseman Buick. A heavy smoke problem was incurred at this fire, but was extinguished without much problem. On May 20th a 4-Alarm fire gutted one room of the parts department on the 2nd floor. The Fire Marshalls office is investigating. No injuries were reported.

Help your firemen help you.

"I want to report a fire. My Address....!"

Whether by telephone or by use of the fire alarm box on the corner, the sounding of the fire horns immediately sends your Hicksville Volunteer Fire Department into action. The response to any of the 3 fire stations by the men and the dispatching of the equipment to the scene, all takes place in a matter of minutes. But all this could be in vain. The reasons are simple. The first rule of safe and efficient fire suppression is early discovery and the rapid alert of the Fire Department.

It is in this respect that the average home owner is sometimes negligent. It is quite understandable that our first actions are those of self-preservation of both our family and property. We feel we must do something, so we fight the fire. This is all well and good. The home owner can help in the first early minutes of discovery of fire, BUT ONLY AFTER:

- (1) Removal of his family to safety.
 - (2) Immediate notification of the Fire Department.
- Then, the home owner can ask himself "What can I do until the Fire Department arrives?" The best thing to do at this point is to be sure doors are not left open. This should be done as you are leaving. It is not advisable to re-enter the fire to do so. Another thing to do is NOT to break the windows. There seems to be popular belief that if you break the windows to let out the smoke you help the firemen. This idea is wrong. You only give more air to feed and push the fire further.

Planner Postponed 2 Weeks

About 20 civic leaders representing residents from Plainview to the Hamlet of Oyster Bay appeared at the Tobay public meeting on Tuesday, June 9th, to question the hiring of the planning firm Raymond, May, Parish & Pine, which was on the stated agenda for the executive session of the Town Board meeting that day.

As a result the Town Board decided to postpone the resolution to approve the appointment until its next meeting, on June 23rd, while Town Councilmen had a change to study the contract. Each was given a copy.

Among those who spoke at the meeting was Mr. William Ellis, of the Central Syosset Civic Association, who had checked into the results this firm had achieved in other communities. It was shown that the plan did not take effect in other communities until three to five years had passed, largely because the advisory board was very loosely joined, met rarely, and was hard to get to for approval which would hasten progress. Mr. Ellis recommended a paid advisory board to work a specified number of hours per week at Town Hall. Tobay's goal in implementing a plan has been set at 18 months.

Mr. William Shames, a member of the Executive Board of the Greater Woodbury Civic Association, read a letter to Supervisor Burke urging a residential solution to the Town's planning problems.

Mrs. Shirley Lang, secretary of the Joint Civic Council, read a letter requesting to know the philosophy of the proposed planning firm; asking for an advisory board; and asking that zone changes be held in abeyance until the master plan can be implemented.

Oscar Summers, of the hamlet of Oyster Bay, spoke in behalf of the conservative party, which believes that working through the American Institute of Architects, the Town could get this plan done at less expense. The services of the planning firm would cost the town \$197,000.

Also present from Syosset-Woodbury were Leonard London, of the Central Syosset Civic Association, and Dr. Gerard E. Bomse, of the Greater Woodbury Civic Association.

Two Plainview civic associations represented were the Greater Plainview Community Association, by Mrs. Carol Fishman; and the Morton Village Association, by Mrs. Helen Carbola.

Present Proposed Plans For Garden Apartment

SPOT ON June 8, 1970 held a public meeting at the Hicksville Junior High School. The purpose of the meeting was to provide Jerry Spiegel Associates with an opportunity to present their proposed plans.

At a previous February meeting it was decided that SPOT would oppose the building of garden apartments on the Giese property on Lee Avenue. Subsequent to the meeting the Executive Committee received a request from Jerry Spiegel Associates for an opportunity to present their side of the proposal. The Committee met with Jerry Spiegel Associates. As a result of these meetings it was felt that it would be in the best interest of Hicksville and SPOT members to receive the same information that the Executive Committee received. As a result the Committee decided to hold this meeting on June 8. This meeting was attended by Jerry Spiegel, Charles Cronin, his attorney and

Sidney Lipsky, in addition to the members of the Executive Committee. The meeting was attended by approximately 100 people.

A movie was shown of the Jericho Town House development that was erected by Jerry Spiegel Associates and purportedly would be substantially similar or identical to the one proposed for the Lee Avenue area. The film was narrated by Jerry Spiegel. In addition to the film a sheet prepared by Spiegel Associates was distributed to the people in the audience which compared tax revenues between construction of one family homes and the town houses proposed by the builder.

Following the film there was a question and answer period responded to by Mr. Cronin and Jerry Spiegel. The reaction to the proposal will be made on ballots previously distributed to SPOT members.

HHS Valedictorian's Message

Jonathan Swift, the brilliant English satirist, was an embittered soul, some will say a confirmed misanthrope. Yet he rose from his state of natural depression to offer one of history's wisest and most beautiful toasts: "May you live all the days of your life."

Roll the words on your tongue, repeat them softly: they are delicious. It is not even the compactness, the felicitous wording, which lends the toast its great beauty, but surprisingly enough its seemingly unfinished nature; it is this quality which causes the reader to pause and slowly think the words over. Most importantly, the thought expressed, the concept of living each day to its fullest, is itself

beautiful, one might say holy.

At times what seems like a matter of semantics, a silly argument over words, may actually bring out an important distinction from which much may be learned. Rollo May, a famous psychologist and author, did just that when he wrote of the difference between the words "joy" and "happiness". The latter is a temporary state, he explained, a a fleeting emotion which is a most unworthy goal in life. Joy, however, can be experienced anytime, whether we be happy or sad, whether things are going well or the sky seems to be falling in. It is simply our consciousness of being alive, and having control over our life: in the words of Rollo May, joy is the recognition of oneself as a "being of worth and dignity...."

This feeling of joy brings with it certain demands and responsibilities. We must not only be conscious of life, but truly respectful of it. Even our attempts to preserve and maintain life upon this earth are insufficient. It is incumbent upon us to sanctify life by thanking God for having endowed us with this most miraculous - and, yes, joyful - substance. There is no better way to express our gratitude than by heeding Swift's words, and truly living all the days of our lives.
