Hicksville Against Drug News

Hicksville Against Drugs, Inc., the community action group formed by concerned individuals to eradicate and prevent drug abuse in Hicksville, has recently chosen a Nominating Committee.

This committee was created during the July 6th meeting, held in the Hicksville Public Library, and was open to the entire community, regardless of age.

The persons that were nominated and accepted to serve on the Nominating Committee, under the Chairmanship of George V. O'Haire are: Leonard Kershaw, Joanne O'Dette, Thomas Nagle, Christine Cahalan, Thomas Weiss, and Mary Carlin.

A spokesman for the group said that he was certainly glad that the organization "is developing a definite direction." He also said that after the organizational formalities were completed, the number one priority would be to actually and directly deal with the goals of the organization, eradication and prevention of drug misuse.

The same spokesman also said, "It's unfortunate that things are going fairly slow. But we have to. We are trying not to overlook any important aspect that might be important enough to implement into the H.A.D. action group. To do so would be foolish, because an oversight just might limit our effective capabilities. Very direct contact with the drug situation will come on strongly as soon as information is gathered and snags are worked out by our dedicated members. Then the

organization will become a most valuable asset to our town."

Selection of qualified people to fill Board of Director posts is a strenuous task. The Nominating Committee has quite a job ahead of them. Board members have to be dedicated to the cause, knowledgeable in aspects of drug abuse and work well with other people.

People who are experienced in dealing with people, and do it well are needed. An ability in organizational matters would be beneficial. The Nominating Committee asks all members of the community to suggest to them the names of persons who would be capable to perform in the capacity of a Board member. The committee would then discuss the persons' abilities and experience. He or she would then be approached by a representative of the Committee.

The selection of qualified people is an important matter. If the community is seriously interested in doing something positive about the increasing Drug Problem, they will surely want to help by sending in recommendations.

These recommendations can be sent to Hicksville Against Drugs, Box 405, Hicksville, N.Y., 11802.

Community cooperation is vital in combating drug abuse. Any resident living in the Hicksville area can join H.A.D., by simply sending a request to the address above.

Six members of the Hicksville School Board, District 17, were present at the Board's annual reorganization meeting on Tuesday, July 7th in the Board Room of the Division Avenue Administration Building. In the absence of Harry Kirshon, Thomas Muratore conducted the meeting. About thirty-five people were in the audience.

The Board elected Harry Kirshon its president, Thomas Muratore its vice-president and newly-elected Thomas Clarke its secretary.

Mrs. May Blust was appointed District Clerk and Mr. Herbert Bachman was appointed District treasurer.

There was no appointment of the district auditor or attorney. However the present

auditor Sol Newborn and attorney, Joseph Catalano, Esq., agreed to remain until further notice.

The Board appointed the following persons as extra classroom activities treasurers: Charlotte Martin at HHS and Lorraine Eggerman at the JHS.

As is customary, the treasurer was bonded for \$400,000 and the clerk for \$50,000. The Long Island National Bank and the Hicksville office of the National Bank of North America were designated as official district banks.

The Board president, was authorized to sign official papers, documents, etc. or, in his absence, the vice-president was so authorized.

Mr. F. Ricker was designated as District Purchasing Agent.

Regular board meeting will be held on the second and last Tuesdays of each month. (However the July 14th meeting was cancelled as a public meeting, as the Board will be meeting in closed study session to work on a resubmittal of the budget).

The Board discussed possible voting dates for a changed budget which they may resubmit, as follows:

If the budget vote is to be held on August 11, public notices will run on July 16, 23, 30 and Aug. 6, registration on July 29th and a public hearing on August 4.

If a budget vote is to be held on August 18, public notices will run on July 23, July 30, August 6 and August 13, registration on August 4 and a public hearing on August 11.

If a budget vote is to be held on August 25, public notices will run on July 30, August 6, August 13 and August 20, registration on August 11 and a public hearing on August 18.


No Meeting

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Seek Plans On New High-Speed Transportation

Nassau County Executive Eugene H. Nickerson discussed plans to seek a federal demonstration grant to sponsor a high-speed water transportation system between Nassau County and New York City via Long Island Sound. If successful, the proposed commuter service from points on the North Shore to terminals at Wall Street and midtown Manhattan could lead to a network of water transportation throughout the metropolitan area.

Key to the system is a new vessel called the Hydro-Ski, manufactured by Hydro-Ski International, Inc. of Fort

Lauderdale, Florida. Designed by Lockheed Aviation Corp., the Hydro-Ski carries 70 passengers at a cruising speed of 45 MPH, even in 5-foot seas. The Hydro-Ski resembles a bus on skis. When activated by its gas turbine engines coupled to two water jet systems, the center hull is lifted 5 feet off the water, providing a smooth ride for passengers. The vessel requires only a two-man crew.

The County's plan, is to sponsor and coordinate a daily commuter service for approximately 900 passengers over a two-year period, to find out whether such

Austerity ... A Definition

At present Hicksville School District 17 is on a contingency budget, or what is known to most of us as "Austerity". In order to understand exactly what this means to the education system in District 17, we bring you this week, a definition of austerity AS IT APPLIES TO DISTRICT 17, according to the Legal Division of the New York State Education Department and Supt. of Schools of District 17, Donald Abt.

We print here Mr. Abt's letter to our request for a definition of austerity as it applies to District 17:

Dear Mrs. Noeth:

At your request I am providing what in my opinion represents an austerity budget to this community.

An austerity budget would delete from the proposed budget for 1970-71 the sum of \$1,449,277. The bulk of this money represents reductions as follows:

2 miles for K-8
3 miles for 9-12
10 miles for private and parochial schools
20 miles for handicapped.

service can become self-supporting. The question to be resolved is whether the speed and comfort of the ride (Glen Cove to Wall Street would take only 30 minutes) would induce commuters to pay fares of \$3.00 a trip or \$100 a month, which is substantially higher than current fares on the Long Island Railroad.

A proposal to operate the service has been made by Aquarius Lines, Inc., which

proposes to use six Hydro-Ski vessels on the daily run to Manhattan. The Aquarius firm, according to Nickerson, has expressed a willingness to pay the one-third share of the demonstration program (amounting to \$600,000) which would ordinarily be payable by the County. The federal share, which will be requested from the U.S. Department of Transportation, would be \$1,200,000. The Nassau Executive said that the proposed demonstration

program is aimed at relieving highway congestion by taking advantage of a "right of way" which is free and also capable of greater utilization. Trial runs on the Hydro-Ski has reported that the ride is quiet and comfortable and that the motors cannot be heard 100 feet from the vessel.

The Hydro-Ski has a draft of only 28 inches and has no underwater appendages such as rudders or propellers which could be damaged by ice or debris.

It should be understood that this is my interpretation of what the mandate is for a contingent budget under State rules and regulations.

It should be further understood that if these cuts are made although it will cut our estimated tax increase for 1970-71 of \$1.41 to approximately 7¢, it will actually increase our tax rate for 1971-72 by approximately 80¢ to 85¢ because of our loss of revenues during 1970-71.

If you have further questions about this definition and will send them to us, we'll ask Mr. abt to answer them and will print them in order to further clarify austerity in District 17.

Next week's article will be a report of a school district that has been on austerity for the past year and will include reactions from parents, children and district officials who have been through this experience.



Parents Warned About Permitting Children To Operate Minibikes

We are very grateful to David R. Lewis of 14 Montgomery Place, Jericho, for sending The Villager some very important data regarding the operation of minibikes. Dave took the following information out of one of the newspapers in New York last week and passed it on to us requesting that it be printed as a public service since Jericho is presently being overrun with

minibikes.

"Parents in New York State can lose their car-driving license and registration, Motor Vehicle Commissioner Vincent L. Tofany has warned, if they let their children operate minibikes - ultra-light motor scooters intended mainly for off-street use - on the public streets illegally.

He reminded them that the child must be at least 16 with a

valid junior motorcycle license and that the minibike must be covered with at least the minimum automobile liability insurance of \$10,000 to \$20,000 and \$5,000.

"A violation committed by the child could result in the suspension or revocation of the parent's license and registration," Mr. Tofany said.

Within the last five years, the incidence of fire in the Jericho Fire District has greatly increased and the nature of these fires has become more complex. While the Board of Fire Commissioners of the District and the Officers and men of your Fire Department have taken progressive action to insure that our high standards keep pace with growth within the District, such as increasing the manpower availability to protect you, intensive training through the use of the Nassau County Firemen's Training Center, which in the last year has provided us with approximately 5000 man hours of instruction, and are in the process of expanding the equipment available in fighting fires, we all must still face up to the fact that fire protection is a two sided coin.

In the past the District and the Department have only requested aid from you in one way, and that was monetarily. We still need this aid to continue our growth, but now we must ask additional aid from you in your undertaking your own fire safety program.

Fire protection begins with fire prevention. We all should remember basic fire prevention taught us in elementary school. We all learned that to have a fire you need a combination of fuel, heat and oxygen. If you remember this you may be able to prevent potential fire by eliminating one or more of the necessary ingredients. Fuel such as waste paper, rags and gasoline should be kept in safe containers and away from all sources of heat. Any unnecessary fuels should be disposed of as soon as possible. Sources of heat like electricity, barbecues, portable heaters, ovens and ranges, and matches should only be used in safe areas or when safely insulated from any fuels. In addition, any sources of heat and fuel should be stored out of the reach of inquisitive children.

Two of the greatest sources of fire in the home are dirty exhaust fans above kitchen stoves and faulty or inadequate wiring. Your electrical system should be inspected by a licensed electrician, especially if you have changed the electrical requirements or specifications of your home through the addition of appliances.

Just as each home should have a first aid kit for medical emergencies so should it have first aid appliances for fires, such

as the proper type fire extinguisher. Although each type of fire has a specific extinguisher made for its extinguishment, in general dry chemical extinguishers will handle most home emergencies. These extinguishers should be placed readily about the home in accessible areas. However, it must be remembered that these are just first aid appliances and in all cases, the fire department should be called. Also, due to size of these extinguishers, they will only put out the smallest fires. One should not attempt to extinguish any larger fire since it generally results in the person using the extinguisher being injured and gives the fire more time to grow.

Some residents in Jericho have even installed sprinkler systems, heat detectors and smoke detectors connected to alarm bells. In addition, devices are now available from fire supply companies that will call the fire or police departments automatically if you have an emergency.

In the event of a fire, the entire family should be evacuated from the house and meet at a specified point outside the house. The fire department should be notified as quickly as possible. Try to close all doors as you leave the house. Tell the Officer of the fire department when he arrives that everyone is out of the house. Once you leave the house DO NOT GO BACK IN. Nothing is as valuable as a human life. If there is something that you especially want, tell the fire officer about it and he will try to get it for you if possible.

REMEMBER, to call the fire department you dial either "0" and tell the operator that you have an emergency and want the JERICHO FIRE DEPARTMENT, and give her all the information she requests or dial WE 1-0898 which is the direct line to the fire-house to call in an emergency. In no circumstance should you call WE 1-0898 unless you have an emergency since you may be delaying an emergency call for help. Our information number is WE 1-3546. THINK... is your house number visible from a vehicle in the road?

Just as we call upon you for your help in fire prevention, please call upon us if you have any problems or questions that concern your fire prevention job or your fire safety.


