DEAR FRIENDS....

As we mentioned in our lead story last week, the complete elimination of the \$200,000 contingency fund from the newly proposed and reduced School District 17 budget, is controversial. Perhaps we should have said, "it is not wise". Actually it is a gamble, which, if nothing happens may not cost the district more but if something unforeseen does occur, will push budget costs up considerably next year due to the fact that not only will such costs have to be paid, but money will have to be borrowed to do so, with interest charges, of course. So, to put it mildly, it is a calculated risk, which the Board of Education and the District voters may decide to take. We asked our Supt. of schools, Mr. Abt, to give us some examples of what might come under such "contingencies". Here are six of them:

- (1) Roof damage (saggy roof like Burns Ave)
- (2) Cesspool overflow and need of immediate replacement because of health problems etc.
- (3) Gym floors or classroom floors may present hazards.
- (4) Payment of unanticipated increased bills, such as to BOCES.

(5) Change of student plans during the summer. For example, if all the students go to Voc. Ed. next year, district funds could be short.

(6) Unfinished negotiations.

Remember, these are only examples of what could happen and Mr. Abt was kind enough to give me these so that we can all understand clearly what type of expenses this fund is for.

One of our residents phoned over the weekend to question the item in this new proposed budget of \$3,000 for intra-mural sports which represented a cut from \$6,000. This item was \$6,000 in the budget which was defeated by 146 votes in June. This is what we stated in our article. However, if you wish to compare this figure with last year's budget, this of course, would not be so. At no place in our article were we comparing this budget with any budget except the one which was recently defeated. We only mention this so that you may all clearly understand the point.

And speaking of points, an important one is this.... don't forget the public hearing on this new reduced budget which has been scheduled by the Board of Education of School District 17 for this coming Tuesday, August 4th, at 8 p.m. in the Hicksville High School auditorium. This is the place to bring your questions about this proposed budget. It may help you to decide what your vote will be on August 19th. Certainly it concerns all those who are concerned about the education of the school children of District 17. See you there.

At The Town Board Meeting

(Exclusive To The Herald)

At The Town Meeting
No one was present to oppose the petition of Charles J. Andromidas, et al, doing business as A.G.O. Associates (Mineola) for a special use permit for a retail nursery and allied products on an Industrial H-zoned parcel on the south side of West John Street, and east side of Charlotte Avenue, Hicksville. It is A.G.O.'s intention to sell two-acres of land to Agway for use as a garden center. The Town Board reserved

decision.
Agway was the center of interest at the Zoning Board of Appeals earlier this year, when it requested a special use permit to continue to use property now owned by Frank Wettreanu on Newbridge Road as a garden center. After great opposition from the Parish Council of the adjacent Holy Family Church, Agway withdrew its request.

Three Denied
The Town Board of Tuesday

also denied two rezoning petitions and one application for a special permit in Hicksville and Plainview. The petition by Theodore Fastook for a change of zone from Residence D. to Business F district on the west side of South Oyster Bay Road north of Garden Street was denied. A dedicated handful of residents, primarily from East End Avenue and Hunter Place, appeared at the first hearing date on March 30th to oppose. An adjournment due to the mail strike was requested by attorney Eric A. Roedel. Those who were present spoke their opposition and were told they did not have to return at the continuation of the public hearing on April 28th.

Tobay also denied the petition of LWRK for a rezoning to erect a three-story office building on Old Country Road east of Plainview Road. 125 persons, led by the Greater Plainview Community Association, protested the petition at the public hearing on May 19th.

The Town Board also resolved to deny the application of Arthur H. Herman for a special permit use to maintain a medical building in Hicksville on the south side of Millwood Gate between Broadway and Woodbine Drive East. Two residents appeared in opposition at the hearing on July 29, 1969.

HAD To Meet

Hicksville Against Drugs (HAD), the action group formed to combat drug abuse effectively in Hicksville, is again calling all parents and youth.

All citizens are urged to attend the next community meeting. It will be on Monday night, August 3rd at 8:00 in the Hicksville Public Library, Jerusalem Avenue.

Through the cooperative channel that exists between HAD and our county Drug Abuse & Addiction Commission, the

county agency will provide guest speakers. The guests will be residents of Topic House, the Nassau County rehabilitation center. These people were in trouble and danger, but sought help, are now doing outstanding work by relating to others just what it's like to become psychologically and physically dependant on drugs.

"This meeting is a golden opportunity to gain insight into the Drug Abuse Problem. Plan to attend," a spokesman for HAD urged.

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On-The-Job Training Program

Governor Rockefeller announced today that the State Labor Department's Division of Employment has developed three new on-the-job training programs, under the State Manpower Training Act, to train 52 Nassau and Suffolk counties persons in skilled occupations. Eighteen will be hired from the ranks of the unemployed.

One Nassau firm is T.O.D. Manufacturing Company Inc., Hicksville, plans to upgrade 16 present employees in four different occupations: tool machine set-up operator, set-up man, plater, and heli arc welder. Training will be for a 26-week period in each occupation.

Geraldine Conlon of Plainview, a nursing student at Nassau Community College has been awarded a \$400 scholarship by the Women's Club of Great Neck, it was announced by the Office of Financial Aid at the college.

New Postage Stamp Focuses On Pollution

Hicksville Postmaster General Winton M. Blount announced today that a postage stamp will be issued to focus attention on one of the nation's mounting problems - pollution of the land, of the water, and of the air.

Design and date of issuance of the Anti-Pollution stamp will be made public later.

President Nixon noted this despoliation when he said, "The great question of the 70's is, shall we surrender to our surroundings, or shall we make peace with nature and begin to make reparations for the damage we have done to our air, to our land, and to our water."

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Town Helps School District

The summer recreation program run by Hicksville School District No. 17 is off to a late start, but it might not be in operation at all if it were not for funds provided by the Town of Oyster Bay.

Town Councilman Warren M. Doolittle said that the Town has allocated \$15,000 to the district to enable it to continue the vacation recreation programs it has conducted in the past.

Previously all school districts in Oyster Bay have received funds from the Town to help implement various recreation programs. However, school districts operating under austerity budgets are prohibited from spending funds on recreation programs.

"Ordinarily the district would be contributing some of its funds toward the program," explained Doolittle, "In the case of austerity, however, they are

prohibited from doing so. But the fact that the district cannot expend funds does not prevent the Town from providing the district with the funds it had allocated."

James Arvanitis, Director of Recreation and Community Activities for the Town, said that when district 17 failed to pass its budget he received a call from Doolittle with the request that Arvanitis investigate to see if the Town could still continue to offer its funds. Arvanitis said that inquiries with the State showed that this would be permissible.

The School Board then voted to accept the Town money and to operate its summer program on a smaller scale. "Instead of six weeks we will be operating a four-week program," said Joe Madden, Director of Recreation for the school district. "Without the Town's aid there would be no program."

Tobay Construction Figures Reach 2.4 Million Mark

Figures collected by the Town of Oyster Bay Building Department indicate that more than \$2.4 million was expended on construction in the Town in June.

Town Councilman Ralph Diamond said that the Building Department figures, which are based on the estimates of cost attached to various permits, indicate \$2,436,461 would be spent to complete construction on 220

permits issued.

Diamond noted that the number of one-family dwelling units constructed in the Town was 28, the high monthly figure for the year. Thirteen commercial permits accounted for a \$930,096 of the estimated costs.

To keep on top of all this construction activity the Town Building Department recorded 1896 on-site inspections.

LILCO Announces Increase Rates

Long Island Lighting Company today filed with the New York Public Service Commission adjustments to its gas rates which would increase the Company's gas revenues by 10.6 per cent, or \$3 million on an annual basis. Proposed to become effective on September 1, the new rates would represent the first LILCO gas rate increase since 1967.

LILCO Chairman of the Board John J. Tuohy said that the rate adjustment was prompted by today's severe inflationary conditions. Current cost pressures are such, Mr. Tuohy explained, as to have effectively cancelled out LILCO's past and present achievements in efficiency improvement, which had up to now allowed the Company to hold the line on gas rates.

Greater productivity and optimum utilization of facilities, Mr. Tuohy pointed out, enabled LILCO to keep the cost of gas to customers stable in recent years, in contrast with the rising prices of most other consumer items. In the last ten years, the price of LILCO gas has gone up just 1 per cent, while oil, a competing energy source, rose 26 per cent, and the Consumer Price Index went up 29 per cent.

If the proposed new rates go into effect, a typical LILCO residential customer who uses gas for cooking alone will have his average monthly bill raised

by 87 cents. The average monthly bill for a residential customer who uses gas for cooking and water heating will rise by \$1.15, and for a residential customer who, in addition, uses gas for space heating by \$2.41. LILCO serves a total of 385,877 customers with gas in Nassau-Suffolk Counties and the Rockaway Peninsula of Queens.

Chairman Tuohy indicated that one of the fastest growing cost items that LILCO has had to absorb in recent years is taxes. Taxes paid by LILCO totaled \$69 million in 1969, up from \$34 million in 1969. The gas portion of

these totals more than doubled from \$7 million to \$15 million during this time. Labor costs, too, he said, have been rising steadily and are up by 80 per cent in the last 10 years. In addition, operating costs in gas transmission and distribution jumped 150 per cent between 1959 and 1969. The dollars spent by the Company per customer on operating costs, as an example, rose from \$8.80 to \$18.60 during the ten years.

LILCO also has pending before the Public Service Commission its first electric rate increase since 1958, following five electric rate reductions put into effect between 1960 and 1968. The Company's electric rate increase was filed last October 3rd and if approved would raise the average residential customer's monthly bill by 83 cents.

- 6) Must be sponsored by one member of the company he desires to join.
- 7) In order to insure the good faith of all applicants an investigation committee reviews the application.

From Congress

It becomes more and more apparent with each passing day that President Nixon has in his possession a most potent issue for the November election. And that is, very simply, that this Congress, whose every vote and every committee is under the control of the Democratic Party, simply has not performed.

The 1970 calendar passed its halfway point earlier this month

and the entire impression is one of a concerned administration, having offered a variety of badly needed programs and being ignored by Democratic Congressional leaders who appear more interested in fault-finding than in accomplishment. We Republicans, outnumbered 244 - 188 in the House of Representatives, are reduced to what I am doing in this

newsletter. We are forced to open criticism in the hope that the lawmakers across the aisle can be pressured into some sort of action. We don't have the committee control, we don't have the votes - but we do have the very potent weapon of public opinion.

When we reached the halfway mark in this year, we found that only two of the 63 major legislative programs proposed by President Nixon had been processed through Congress. These two already - approved programs are Voting Rights and Airport Development.

Appropriations bills - 14 of them - had not been approved, although we entered a new fiscal year on July 1. Postal Reform was still stalled, crime bills were being held up, action on environment protection was delayed. Social Security program improvements were awaiting consideration, unemployment insurance extension was still awaiting final approval, education bills had not yet been passed by either house and a wide range of other bills were in limbo. Believe it or not, many of these programs were sent to us for consideration more than a year ago.

It is this lack of drive and interest which cost the majority party many seats in 1966 and again in 1968. If the American voter will give the President a Republican - controlled Congress in the 1970 voting, rest assured that the Nixon programs to get this country back on the right track will be promptly considered and that action will replace rhetoric in the halls of Congress.

From Our Postmaster...

Three billion more pieces of mail were delivered in the fiscal year ending June 30-the increase alone equal to Australia's mail volume for an entire year-without significantly increasing the number of postal workers, Postmaster General Winton M. Blount announced today.

Unlike the previous five years in mail volume, in fiscal 1970 we increased productivity substantially through more effective use of mail-processing equipment and better scheduling of employees.

"Without the productivity

increases achieved in the past two years," Mr. Blount said, "we would have been forced to hire some 12,000 more clerks and our costs could have climbed by \$75 million."

In the past year, mail volume climbed 85 billion pieces-an increase of 3.7 percent-while the number of clerks sorting mail reached 342,000, an increase of only 1.5 per cent.

Americans continued to send more letters, and get more bills, with the total number of letters reaching 48.5 billions-a gain of 4.5 percent.

On a beautiful summer morning last week, the Hicksville Fine Arts Committee held a meeting in the Hicksville Library. Committees were formed, different fund raising suggestions were presented, unique publicity approaches were discussed and the entire group reached a perfect work rapport. At the same meeting Mr. Leonard London, who was elected Trustee by District voters at the May 6th election took the oath of office.

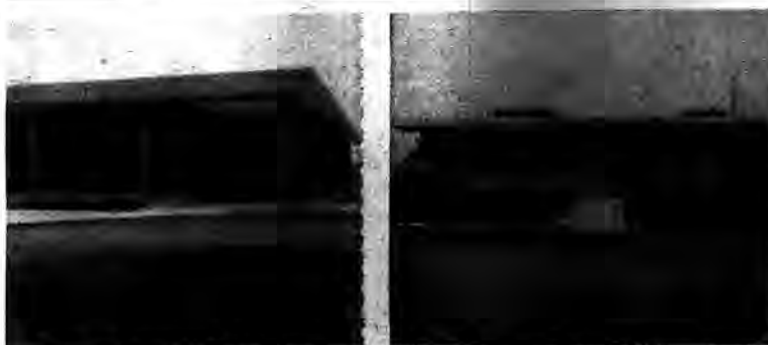

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Villager Public Service Feature

Evaluating Parents Of Little Leaguers In Our Area

Little League play in our area has been concluded for this year and champions and final standings have been established to the satisfaction of some of the players, to the chagrin of others. But, what about the parents of the players? How did they rate in comportment insofar as the Little League is concerned?

We have selected the following passages from the booklet "Role of the Parent in Little League" and each Birchwood Park parent can judge his or her performance or non-performance accordingly. "As a public image Little League Baseball has become synonymous with the high standards of beneficial discipline, training, integrity, physical fitness and will to win that every parent hopefully desires to ingrain in the growing up period of youth.

"The wholesome aspects of a million youngsters taking part in a program that cultivates beneficial experiences of coordinated teamwork and good sportsmanship is a highly complimentary reflection on the spirit and contagious enthusiasm of the parent.

"Every parent of the boy who plays Little League Baseball has a responsibility to do his or her part. Ideally, who but the parent has more at stake and is more acutely motivated?

"Primarily, the parents should know Little League Baseball well and be fully aware of what exposure to Little League means to the boy. They should take an active and discerning interest in the unique appeal of Little League which sets it apart from all other youth programs of its kind, and be knowledgeable of the potential beneficial experience to the boy. It is essential to become informed and learn about the policies, practices and the rules by which Little League functions.

"The challenge of the future is directed to the parent; his or her willingness to exchange time and effort helpfully and correctly for the benefits of Little League to their child.

"Too few parents avail

themselves of literature and material about Little League which can be obtained through local league sources or directly from Little League Headquarters. Regular meetings of the local league are important sources of information. It is always a satisfaction for the active personnel of the league to occasion get-togethers with parents, who should make a point of attending meetings.

"Parents should turn out for Little League games and support the league's activities. Youngsters who play Little League are at an impressionable age and sensitive to parental reaction.

"Some parents find it easy to excuse non-participation. It is an erroneous notion that unless a parent has qualifications as a coach, a manager, an umpire or for some kind of administrative capacity, he cannot be accommodated in the constructed membership of the league.

"For every new Little Leaguer there must be resources and volunteer help to carry him forward. Little League offers a beneficial climate that extends not only to the children, but to parents, families and communities as well.

"Little League should be a happy family experience. Making it that way, through intelligent and unselfish participation, best defines the role of the parent.

"In the broad sense Little League is a training activity for adults, as well as for boys, and it can not be emphasized too strongly that parents who usually comprise a majority of spectators have a responsibility to respect the volunteer status of other adults whose willingness to help makes Little League possible. It is always in order to applaud a good player or an outstanding feat of baseball skills. But it is a deplorable exhibition of incivility or plain ignorance to boo a youngster who is learning to play the game or his league leaders who are trying to help him."

Jim Berkholz, who was the classiest—if not the most talented—basketball player in the history of Hicksville High, was always able to transfer the balance and agility from the basketball court to the baseball diamond.

He was recently signed into the Detroit baseball organization the completion of his Junior year in College. He was attending Kings College in upper Westchester County.

Jim is another in a growing list of players who performed under coach Dick Hogan at Hicksville High that have been signed by a major league organization.

The total signing of those boys has gone over the \$300,000 mark in cool hard cash. That is the amount of money the major leagues have forked out in various degrees to Hicksville baseball players.

Berkholz's superb fielding attracted many a scout in his high school days and the Detroit Tigers kept a careful book on him as he progressed in three college seasons.

He was actually picked in what is termed a secondary draft. Detroit had selected him a year previously in the free agent draft. Berkholz did not care to sign at that time and Detroit had to reaffirm its selection this year to gain his services.
