Hicksville Jr. High Students Attend Title I Program

Thirty Hicksville Junior High School students attending a Title I funded summer program in art and social studies took a journey

into Long Island's past, recently. The students, seventh and eighth graders in the Hicksville schools, and their teachers visited the

newly opened Old Bethpage Village Restoration during the last week of their program.

Among the features of the walking tour were visits to several 19th century, pre-Civil War Long Island houses completely furnished with authentic furniture and utensils of our rural forefathers. The students enjoyed sipping glasses of birch beer and munching on pretzels in the Noon Tavern after paying for the refreshments with special "Old Bethpage Village" script exchanged for their money. Of much interest to the boys and girls reared in a world of supermarkets and shopping centers were two stores of old Long Island, the Layton Store and the bulk goods Layston store. The teachers and students, some of whom have seen country stores in Old Sturbridge Village, at Mystic Seaport and the Village Crossroads at Cooperstown were impressed by the wide variety and abundance of the authentic, packaged and manufactured goods once available at the Layton Store.

The tour included visits to the old Bach Blacksmith Shop which stood for a century at the corner of Hicksville's Duffy Avenue and Old Country Road. The homes and working rooms of a tailor, a carpenter and a seamstress gave the youngsters a glimpse of how handicrafts were carried on in a country village of the last century.

The students found relief from their long summer stroll through the recreated fields of Old Bethpage in various ways. Some of Mrs. Mannheim's art class sat under trees near a lovely pond. They sketched the rolling landscape, old farm buildings or horses grazing in scenes reminiscent of the America of Currier and Ives. Other youngsters ate lunch on lawns near the village store while Mr. Ever's social studies class found cool resting places on breeze-swept porches or relaxed for awhile in the quiet simplicity of the interior of the old Plainview Methodist Church which crowns a hill in the restored village.

All in all, the Hicksville youngsters were treated to an educational and culturally enriching experience.

Important Budget Discussion

BEST, the new Hicksville District 17 organization, whose name means "Better Education Starts Today", has scheduled a meeting for the discussion of the August 19th budget, for this Monday, August 10, starting at 8 p.m. at the Hicksville Library.

DEAR FRIENDS....

It was surprising to see how few people attended the public hearing on the new, reduced budget, held last Tuesday evening in the High School auditorium... there were less than 100 present. You have a report of what went on at this hearing in Shirley Smith's column on page one, so we won't take the space to duplicate.

Mr. Harry Kershon newly-elected board of education president who has been away for the month of July, chaired the meeting. It was encouraging to hear him instruct administration to work on and bring the Board figures for a long-range building program for District 17, which has been overcrowded for so many years. Even though we cannot wait for some relief for the present junior high school students who are so inadequately housed... at least we can also look forward to intelligent, district-wide planning.

It is a credit to students, teachers and administrators that, with completely inadequate facilities, they still accomplish results of which we can all be proud. But there is a limit to what can be accomplished. It is good to see that our new board president is going to push for action along these lines.

Of course, it is also understood that property taxes can no longer carry an increased school tax load... but there are alternate methods of taxation, which have a broader base, which we plan to discuss with you in the near future.

Anyway, don't forget, if you are not registered, next Wednesday, August 12th, from 10 to 10 in the Division Avenue Administration building, is the place to do this. And, of course, August 19th is the time to vote on the budget and the two propositions. **Sheila H. Noeth**

As the years go by, the Hicksville Fire Dept. stands ready to serve us, and does serve us, 24 hours a day, all year long.

By a surprising 4 to 3 vote, the School Board decided to resubmit the referendum for the Jr. High expansion and equipment for all schools. William O'Donnell moved to split the referendum into two separate propositions: one for \$300,000 for added space at the Jr. High, a second for \$200,000 for equipment for all schools. Those voting against the motion were: Thomas Muratore, Thomas Clark and Board President, Harry Kershon. Those voting for: Cornelius McCormack, William O'Donnell, John McManus with Frank Zindulka casting the deciding "Aye." Despite a request by Charles Fetta, president of L.I.F.E., to repel the Board members, the vote stands and the two propositions will appear on the ballot August 19.

"Stop-gap measure" was Harry Kershon's criticism of the proposed Jr. High addition. He feels the district should look into a long-range building program to alleviate the situation at the Jr. High—not just the over-crowded cafeteria. Mr. Kershon says he has faith in the Hicksville voters and he feels they would rather have a comprehensive building program than a piece-meal plan for expanding facilities. Mr. McCormack and Mr. O'Donnell agree with the need for a long-range study, but add there is a current need for enlarging cafeteria space—not only to give students a full lunch period, but to enable them to have a full physical education program. Only half the gym can be used now.

The referendum also provides for a choral room, thus freeing the auditorium for programs and assemblies. One of the possibilities was brought out by Mrs. Christine Cahalan—a comprehensive drug program could be offered to Jr. High students if space, like the auditorium, was available during the day.

The position of personnel director has been deleted from the proposed 70-71 budget. Following Harry Kershon's motion, the Board voted 5 to 2 to eliminate the position and its \$25,000 in salary and benefits. Mr. O'Donnell and Mr. McCormack voted against the elimination. They feel a district with 1000 employees needs a professional to handle negotiations, grievances and other problems which may arise. The other Board members disagree, stating that the Assistant Superintendents can handle these functions. With the deletion of the personnel director, the new budget figure is \$20,858,781.

Mr. Kershon's motion to eliminate the expansion of Project PLAN to additional first grades this fall failed to receive a second. It was also decided that \$60,000 for curriculum development be left in the proposed budget. However, the Board did advise Administration that they felt supervisors should not be paid extra for working on curriculum.

The public was informed that any reductions in the tax rate due to the increased assessed

Hunter Safety Training Courses

Hunter Safety Training courses will be conducted by county police at the Police Outdoor Pistol Range, Weir Street, Hempstead, New York on a pre-registered basis.

The New York State Conservation Law requires that new hunting license applicants take four hours of instruction in a certified hunter safety program before a hunting license can be issued. Persons showing proof that they previously held a hunting license are exempt from the requirement.

Hicksville Library NOTES

Is there a living Long Island author in your community? Two or more? The search is on for contemporary authors to be listed in a current compilation, Library Cadet Rosalind Alter, a participant in the Library Futures summer workshop program, is compiling a directory of Long Island authors. This list will be published after Miss Alter's summer employment at the Nassau Library System public relations office as a Library Cadet, and a copy will be available at each public library in Nassau County.

Miss Alter is compiling names of Nassau County residents who have had one or more full-length fiction or non-fiction books published. Any Nassau County resident, fulfilling these qualifications, may submit his or her name to his or her local library for inclusion in the research project. The last available study was made more than ten years ago. She will also interview several writers, recording their ideas and impressions on cassette tape. These tapes will be made available for library patron use.

Miss Alter, a resident of New Hyde Park, is a senior, majoring in Elementary Education, at Russell Sage College, Troy, New York. She is a member of the Athenians an academic honor society, and developed her initial interest in libraries by working

for two years in her own college library. She plans to go on to graduate school.

The Library Cadet Program is part of the federally-funded Librarian Recruitment Project known as Library Futures. Its aim is to promote interest in pursuing librarianship as a career. This summer, in Nassau County, fifteen college students are being introduced to all phases of library work, either in the member libraries or on special projects. Two cadets have been working on the Minimobile, a co-operative effort of the Library System and the Parks Department designed to bring library service to culturally deprived neighborhoods. A similar outreach type program is underway in Long Beach, where a cadet brings a small push cart with books and magazines to the broadwalk. Another cadet, working out of the Nassau Library System at Roosevelt Field, has been compiling a list of shut-ins in the county, in an effort to make library services available to them. Here in Hicksville, Cadet Stephen Duffy has been compiling the results of the Hofstra survey, made two years ago to find out what the community thought about the various services provided by the library. His work will enable the library to locate and remedy whatever weaknesses the local residents described.

We quote from a "Guest Editorial" of Pearl Spenser's, which we ran in the April 9th Herald. . . . "You've probably heard about the lunch problem here (in the Junior High School) and after giving it a few minutes thought have dismissed it from your mind—YOU SHOULDN'T! If it concerns your child—it concerns you."

Our lunch situation is a disgrace. Eating facilities are woefully inadequate and have been for a very long time.

Just imagine yourself being given 40 minutes for lunch. Fair enough. Now imagine spending 20 minutes of that time sitting outside the restaurant waiting for your turn to go inside. Your children sit in the bleachers of the gym for 20 minutes tying up that space for 3 hours every day while waiting for their turn to eat.

Finally you're inside, half your lunch time is over, now you stand in line for 10 to 12 minutes more waiting for your food and beverage. We've now 8 to 10 minutes left to find a place to sit down and finally to eat. Within minutes you must clean up and rush out to allow the next group in. Nothing much left over for washing your hands, etc. is there?

This is not an isolated example. This is the routine for all students every day of the week.

Twenty-nine hundred students are using facilities built in 1965 for 1900 students. THIS IS THE LARGEST JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL in the country UNDER ONE ROOF. We're bulging at the seams.

We're not asking for a huge, expensive chrome and glass addition or a building program stretched out to 1980.

The answer is simply in flexible modular units which will immediately solve the problem giving the children a decent amount of time in which to eat."

JERICHO FIRE BELL

WRITTEN MONTHLY BY THE MEMBERS OF THE JERICHO VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT IN THE INTEREST OF FURTHERING COMMUNITY RELATIONS.

Many people are not aware of the importance of having a fire extinguisher in the home for use as a "first aid" appliance in the event of a fire. The adage that "most fires start small" can easily be applied to fires in your home. Home fire extinguishers are designed for use on fires while they are still small and easily controlled.

There are three basic types of extinguishers that can readily be used in your home. The first, and probably the most common, is the dry chemical variety. This type of extinguisher should be placed in areas of your home where the possibility of flammable liquid or electrical fires exist such as the garage, automobile, workshop or at the top of the basement staircase. Best results are achieved by attacking the near edge of the fire and progressing forward, moving the nozzle rapidly with a side to side sweeping motion.

A second type of extinguisher is the carbon dioxide or CO₂ extinguisher containing a compressed non-flammable gas having the ability to smother a small fire. Because of the limited reach of this type of extinguisher, which is three to eight feet, it must be carried close to the fire before being discharged. The discharge should be directed at the base of the fire, progressively moving it forward and upward while moving the discharge horn from side to side. This type of extinguisher is used on fires such as those involving electrical equipment where the use of a non-conducting extinguisher is not advisable for use in a confined area since it could displace the oxygen necessary to sustain life. Great care should also be used when discharging this extinguisher since the gaseous carbon dioxide is emitted at a temperature of 110 degrees below zero.

The third and probably the

least common home type fire extinguisher is the pressurized water or soda-acid extinguisher. This type of extinguisher is not as versatile as the dry chemical or carbon dioxide types since it is only effective on combustible materials such as wood, paper, cardboard, rags, etc. It should not be used on flammable liquids or electrical fires.

There is another type of extinguisher that you may still have around the home which contains a vaporizing liquid called carbon tetrachloride. This is generally a pump type extinguisher similar to a grease gun. It has been found that once the carbon tetrachloride comes in contact with extreme heat, such as encountered in a fire, it produces a lethal gas called Phosgene. The use of this extinguisher has been discouraged by the fire service and the Coast Guard. If you still have an extinguisher of this type containing carbon tetrachloride it should be replaced by a more effective and safer extinguisher as mentioned above.

As a general rule in fighting small fires with home extinguishers, the attack on the fire should start at the lowest level and work upward. This will prevent the area already extinguished from becoming reinvolved by the rising heat. All extinguishers should be kept where they can be easily reached, day or night.

Remember, a fire extinguisher is only a first aid appliance and does not remove the necessity of calling the Jericho Volunteer Fire Department in the event of a fire, no matter how small, in your home.

According to neighborhood observers, the fire broke out in an upstairs bedroom in the front of the house and the firefighters were able to contain it so that while it did reach the other front

Observers also report that the maid and two children of Mr. & Mrs. Stephen Waldner, owners of the house, were in the residence when the fire started. The parents had left the house a short time earlier but were reached during the conflagration and arrived home as the firemen were in the last stages of extinguishing the fire.
