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Further Cuts And Increased Valuation Reduce District 17 School Tax Rate

The School District 17 school budget upon which registered residents of this District will vote on Wednesday, August 19th from 10 to 10 in local schools, is now \$318,990 less than the budget originally presented on June 9th. Based upon a new total assessed valuation of \$110,557,157

the tax increase now proposed is for \$1.06 per \$100 of assessed valuation. A savings of 35 cents per \$100 over the June 9th proposals which would have brought about an increase of \$1.41 at that time.

The Board of Education has mailed into every home in District 17 a

small, four-page brochure, with detailed information on the new budget, (Proposition One) on the ballot, plus information on Proposition Two which is for \$300,000 for additional facilities at the Hicksville Junior High School which will cause the tax rate to go up a total of no more than 1½ cents per \$100 of assessed valuation for ten years plus information on Proposition No. 3, \$200,000 for Instructional Equipment which will cause the tax rate to go up approximately 2½ cents per year per \$100 of assessed valuation for ten years.

The Board of Education also held a public hearing on August 4th at which time residents' opinions were expressed, their questions answered and further cuts, made to the budget as indicated in the Board Brochure, which cuts were reported in THE HERALD last week on page one.

Through their informational brochure, small tough it must be because of costs, through the public hearing, through the public press, and the legal notices, the Board has made every effort to explain and clarify the budget and the reasons for the costs of the two propositions. Best For Budget

At a meeting held Monday night, members of Better Education Starts Today (B.E.S.T.) voted to support the Hicksville school budget of July 27 (including the changes of August 4), rather than accept austerity. They also voted to support the \$300,000 referendum for added space at the Junior High and the \$200,000 referendum for equipment and supplies for all schools.

B.E.S.T. is a newly-formed organization concerned with education in the Hicksville schools.

The State's public schools. The Commissioner noted that a student was not required to participate in the recitation of the pledge, stating that a pledge of allegiance that is not voluntary serves no purpose and, in fact, dishonors the flag. However, by refusing to stand or leave the room, the student becomes distracting and tends to intrude on the educational experience of others. Part of the educational process, the Commissioner observed, is to teach respect for the rights and opinions of others. In order to do this and to teach good citizenship, it is necessary for the schools to have the ability - to require within a classroom setting while instruction is being conducted, compliance with rules designed to foster such practices (of respect for others' rights).

"The rationale behind the Commissioner's ruling is applicable to the present case. It is apparent that plaintiff's actions in his classroom have had a decided effect of distracting his fellow students and the teacher.

This is a pure and simple case of a young man's refusing to obey his teacher's proper request which was aimed at preventing him from being a conspicuous and distracting force in the classroom. Plaintiff was not asked to mouth the words of the Pledge of Allegiance or the National Anthem; he was not asked to place his hand over his heart; in fact he was not asked to participate in any way. He was only asked to stand quietly and nonobtrusively while others participated in the school's educational program.

"Plaintiff has shown no grounds for his Constitutional claims and injunctive relief must be denied. Accordingly, it is ordered that plaintiff's motion for injunctive relief is denied, and it is further ordered that defendant's motion to dismiss the action is granted. The Clerk is directed to enter a judgment dismissing the complaint.

"Student's Constitutional Rights Not Violated"...Court Rules

Although an appeal may still be taken, the case of a Hicksville Junior High School student who refused, either "to stand silently or leave the room", during the pledge of allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and thereby disrupted the classroom, was decided in favor of the Hicksville Board of Education, HJHS principal Albert Glass and Hicksville Supt. of Schools Donald Abt, who were defendants in this case.

From a transcript of the Court Case, which was defended by the Board's attorney Joseph C. Catalano, Esq., "the plaintiff's refusal to stand was based on his vague and confused feelings: 'Well, I told them that I didn't feel that there is liberty and justice for all in this country, so I felt that it is a non-existent thing and I didn't feel that I was pledging to ideals, I felt - although I do believe in those ideals - I felt that I was pledging to a thing that is written, or that is believed by many people, which is a fallacy.' The court transcript also stated: "Plaintiff's homeroom teacher, Mr. Stephen Wagner and other school officials, Mr. Joseph Giambalvo, Assistant Principal, Mr. Erwin Rozran, Administrative Assistant of the Board of Education, testified that plaintiff had actually sat down in class during the homeroom opening exercises three times, twice while substitute teachers were present and once, the date of his suspension, while Mr. Wagner was present. On at least one additional occasion plaintiff agreed with Mr. Wagner that, rather than disturb the class, he would wait outside the room during the opening exercises. This was apparently carried out without any difficulty. Each time after plaintiff's failure to with Mr. Wagner that, rather than disturb the class, he would wait outside the room during the opening exercises. This was apparently carried out without any difficulty. Each time after plaintiff's failure to stand silently, meetings were held with various school officials, plaintiff and his parents. The result of these meetings was that plaintiff was directed to stand during the exercises and Mr. Wagner was directed to refer him to Mr. Giambalvo for insubordination if there was a refusal to stand after a specific direction. On May 12, 1970 rha oxxuered and Mr. Giambalvo suspended plaintiff for insubordination for five days pursuant to NY Education Law 3214 & 66 (a) (1), (b).

Further in the transcript we find: "Under the New York Education Law (802 (1), the Commissioner of Education must provide a program of instruction regarding the flag, including a salute and pledge and instruction

in the correct use of the flag...by resolution 2.5 of the School Board acting under the authority of the State statutes and regulations, the school day is required to open with the voluntary recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance, a silent period of meditation and the singing of the Star Spangled Banner.

"There is no question here of the right of the Board of Education and the school to conduct the opening exercises, or whether plaintiff could properly be offered a choice of leaving the room as an alternative to standing quietly during otherwise improper exercises...The Tinker Court ruled that its holding that students might peacefully protest in schools was subject to an exception based upon the need of the school to conduct its educative processes in an orderly atmosphere in the classroom.

"The present case falls within this exception to the Tinker doctrine. Mr. Wagner, the teacher, testified that the homeroom period, during which the opening exercises of Pledge, silent moment of meditation and singing of the National Anthem occur, lasts about ten minutes.

The opening exercises take up about three minutes of this time, leaving the teacher, at most, seven minutes to dispose of numerous administrative matters including the taking of attendance. Frequently, he testified, he barely has time to finish the administrative work during this short period. Mr. Wagner testified that he and the students in the class had been distracted from their homeroom responsibilities by plaintiff's actions. The controlled atmosphere of the classroom, he stated, as set off balance by the conspicuous failure of plaintiff to stand while the rest of the class did so, and there was a smoldering tension of strained emotions observed by the teacher from unfriendly facial motions of other students. On at least two occasions that Mr. Wagner particularly remembered, the distraction of the class was marked by derogatory comments made to plaintiff by other students. One remark recalled by Mr. Wagner was that plaintiff should 'leave America'. To quell the incipient disturbance, Mr. Wagner was required momentarily to put aside his work and tell the class 'that's enough!'

Further along in the court transcript: "A recent decision of Ewald B. Nyquist, Commissioner of Education of the State of New York held that a student had the choice either to stand silently or to leave the room during opening exercises in

Wants Vest Pocket Local County Parks

Mayor-Supervisor Andrew J. DiPaola of Glen Cove, Chairman of the Nassau County Board of Supervisors Committee on Parks and Recreation, proposed this week a network of vest pocket neighborhood parks, located on county-owned property in every community in Nassau.

An initial project of 25 sites including Hicksville could be constructed for a total of \$15,000 of already budgeted park maintenance funds. Di Paola announced the plan he has proposed to County Executive Eugene H. Nickerson.

DiPaola declared: "There is a real need in this County to

develop areas within neighborhood walking distance so that all citizens can pause a moment, sit down, rest and contemplate in a 'green belt'. Fortunately, Nassau County owns some land along side most of its major arteries, which is presently lying fallow, or being used for drainage purposes, which can serve this need.

"The areas would be no greater than 30 feet by 20 feet containing some trees, stone benches and minimal plantings. The cost would not exceed \$600 a location and the project would add a suburban touch to our present concrete atmosphere. Because of

their small size, maintenance should fit into the present routine of Park Maintenance of the Department of Public Works, and since the sites will be located on major arteries, no special security personnel should be needed."

"A communication has been sent to the Commissioner of Public Works for his confirmation of potential sites and costs. I am asking County Executive Nickerson, with whom I have consulted, and who is enthusiastic about the idea, to immediately direct the initiation of this project," Di Paola declared.

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In a world accustomed to crisis, this nation's alarming crime problem stands out. None are so blind as those who will not see and, after Congress finally began to approve the President's crime control program last month, we are still under siege from the Great Society libertarians who still maintain that those who urge "law and order" are racists.

Under the eight years of the Great Society, the crime rate in this nation increased 88 per cent, nine times as fast as the population. Crime knows no race, color or creed and no nationality has any monopoly on wrongdoing. But most certainly minority group members and ghetto dwellers have suffered more under the upsurge of crime in proportion to their numbers.

Soon after the President took office, he put before Congress a body of anti-crime legislation. This legislation is not repressive or punitive but it is designed to discourage the commission of crime and to give law enforcement officials the tools needed to apprehend criminals and to give judges the means to more appropriately punish and detain offenders. Last month, crime legislation dealing with the District of Columbia won final Congressional approval. Twelve more major measures still await

action, but those whose hearts bleed for the misunderstood criminal rather than for the victim have already begun to wail.

The D. D. C. bill does the following: It allows judges to

detain suspects considered likely to commit further violations pending court action once the power to enter premises without warning in order to prevent destruction of evidence such as

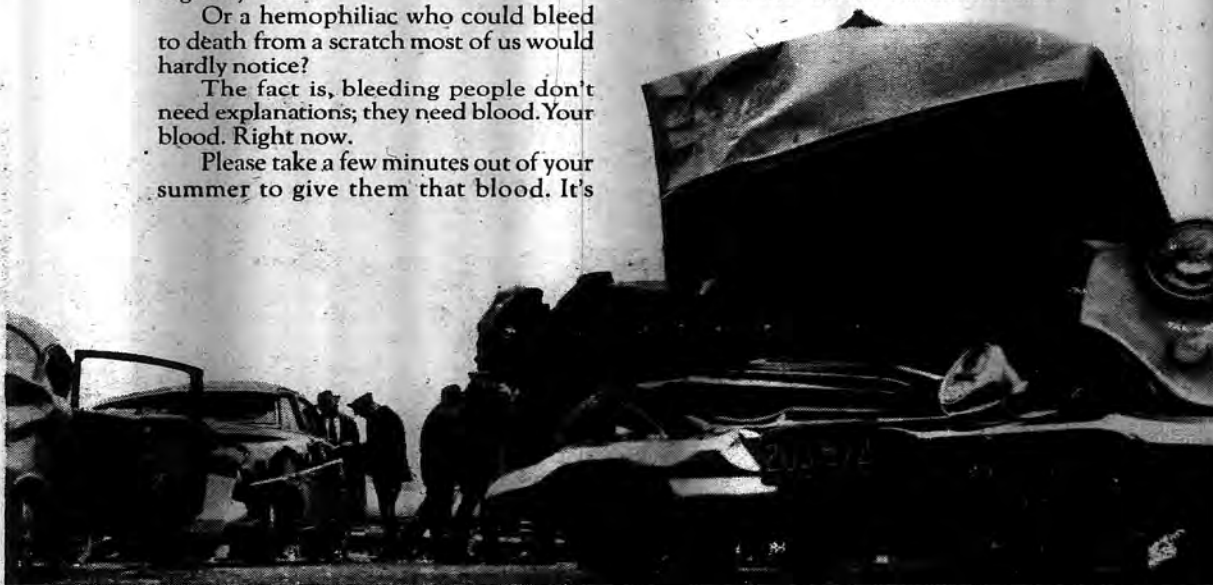

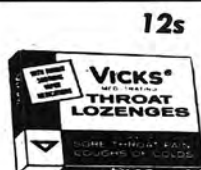

Jericho Air Among Cleanest

New York State Department of Health reports filed with the Nassau County Department of Health indicate that Jericho is among those areas rated as having the cleanest air in Nassau County. This is indeed good news for our Jericho residents. It is my intention and those of my fellow members of the Town of Oyster Bay Board to keep it that way.

The State Department of Health measures the purity of air and rates their findings into five categories. Level No. 1 is the highest rating and is found in areas where very few residents reside and industry is not developed to any degree. Level No. 5 is found in areas which are densely populated such as New York City and areas which have

heavy industry.

Our Jericho air is rated No. 2 and is in the same rating as those in the rest of the north shore of Oyster Bay. The balance of our Town is in category No. 3. It would appear that the closer a town is to the City of New York, the worse its air pollution. For example, the bulk of Hempstead is in the No. 4 level.

The report is concrete evidence that population density and economic development greatly determine the amount of contaminants emitted into the atmosphere. Our Town Board shall continue to develop our Town with these factors in mind, and not only seek to maintain our clean air, but strive to improve it.

Still pending in Congress are measures to increase sentences of "three-time losers" and persons recognized as professional criminals, moves to increase federal financial aid to local law enforcement agencies, major bomb control legislation and easing of restrictions on means which police can use to obtain evidence. Much of the crime control legislation will probably die in committees headed by liberal Congressmen.

At the moment, Congressional liberals are weeping bitter tears for the impending "loss of rights" by criminal suspects. When they are done with their emasculation of this crime control program, I fear that the vast majority of this nation will continue to weep for the growing number of victims of our growing number of criminals.

I know we must continue to research the root causes of crime. I am aware that our prison systems need improvement and that generally our rehabilitation methods need upgrading.

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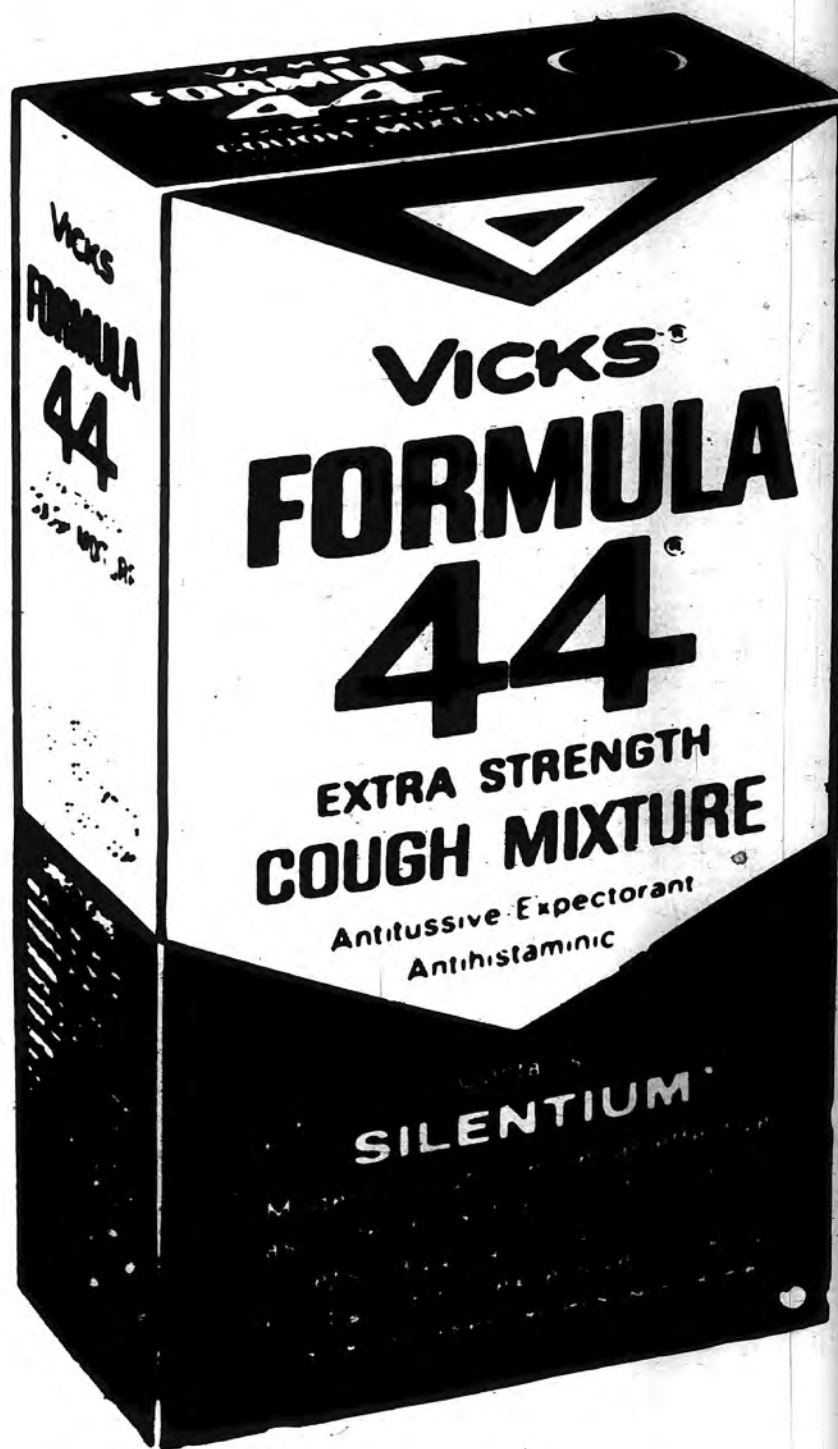
