HERALD REPORT SCHOOL DISTRICT 17 HICKSVILLE

There will be no austerity. Hicksville voters passed all three propositions - school budget, Jr. High construction and instructional equipment. After accepting the vote Wednesday night, the School Board set the new tax rate at \$10.94 per \$100 A.V. Voting on each proposition was:

No. 1 School Budget: Yes-3038; No-1653

No. 2 Jr. High Const.: Yes-2429; No-2246

No. 3 Instruct. Equip.: Yes-2449; No-2218

The Hicksville School District has received \$1535.73 in rebates on library books. Legal action had been taken against the publishing company for overcharging school districts for these books.

HAD (Hicksville Against Drugs) presented an interim progress report to the Board. This organization was formulated this spring and is in its final stages of incorporation.

After approving the transfer of John Maher to Principal of Fork

Lane, John Mateer was appointed Principal of Willett Avenue School. Mr. Mateer was formerly Assistant Principal of East Street.

Harry Goebel has been appointed District Attorney for 1970/71 school year, effective September 1, at a salary of \$8000 per year. Mr. Goebel will serve as the legal representative of School District 17. This is a contractual position, and the Board was assured Mr. Goebel would receive no credit on his pension fund (as would an employee.) Those voting against the appointment: Neil McCormack and John McManus. Voting for: Thomas Muratore, Thomas Clark, Frank Zindulka, Harry Kershen, William O'Donnell was out of town on business and unable to attend Wednesday night's Board meeting.

Post Combat Servicemen To Receive Assignments Near Home

Congressman Lester L. Wolff, in a continuing effort to provide the nation's servicemen with maximum consideration, last week filed legislation which would give servicemen, returning from Vietnam duty maximum entitlement for post-combat assignments near their homes.

Wolff, in filing this bill said: "Servicemen returning from Vietnam duty, are of course, anxious to be assigned a tour, frequently a final tour near their homes. However, it is often the case that these men receive immediate post-combat assignments which may separate them from their families by many hundred of miles.

"It is of course impossible to place every combat veteran near his home in an appropriate installation. Yet, the present system is far from being adequate for the returning serviceman.

"In order to end some of their hardship, I have introduced legislation which would entitle a returning combat veteran maximum consideration for assignment at a station near his legal residence.

"The nation's servicemen deserve every possible consideration. This is a long-overdue and important means by which we can partly end a problem faced by the returning serviceman."

Let's Get On With The Job

We are pleased with the results of the Hicksville School District 17 vote. The District is no longer on austerity, for one thing. And, with the propositions covering a small addition to the Junior High School, and some additional funds for instructional equipment, also passed, the Board and the Administration can get on with its most important job...that of giving our children the best possible education within the expenditures OK'd by the voters of the District.

The Next Step

It is good to hear that the administration is also taking steps to survey the districts long term needs. This was the reason given by Board President H. Kirshen for opposing the small addition to the Junior High and, as reported by the HERALD three weeks ago, he instructed the administration to bring the Board figures for a long-range building program for District 17 which has been overcrowded for so many years.

We Are All Taxpayers

This is not to say that the tax situation itself should not come under intelligent scrutiny. It should. The burden on ALL taxes that are put upon the property owner has become completely out of line. Anti-Litter Ordinance

Town Supervisor John W. Burke said that the Town Board has unanimously enacted a new 'Anti-Litter Ordinance' providing for strong measures which will subject violators to a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

Burke said that the new law deals with the disposal of litter in public places, on private property, or even cases where a moving vehicle or truck causes electrical alterations, and auxiliary air conditioning. Estimated cost of this project is \$20 thousand.

litter to be blown or deposited on any street, public place or private property. The new law will augment the Town's beautification procedures in continuing effort to provide a better environment for all Town residents.

The ordinance prohibits the sweeping of litter into gutters, at a residence or place of business, or Town park, except in public receptacles.

Persons found placing litter in any body of water or bay within the Town will be considered violators under the new Town law.

Hicksville Library NOTES

"Live there a man (or woman) with soul so dead who never to himself has said 'that he'd like to quit his job, his town, everything - and sail off into the sunset?'"

A good many people have actually done it - single, married, young and not so young, even whole families - most of them came back and wrote a book about it - this is not only an enjoyable way to prolong the fun but, in many cases, profitable, too. It also has another virtue - it provides an escape valve for those of us who never quite made it.

Earle Reynolds, an American working in Japan, dreamed of building his own boat and sailing around the world. He had the boat built (with some difficulty) near Hiroshima and set out with his wife, two children and three Japanese on a voyage that lasted 5 years and 10 months, covering about 62,000 miles. They educated the children, adjusted to seven personalities and two languages on board. Earle and Barbara Reynolds tell all in "ALL IN THE SAME BOAT", 1962.

In June 1966 two British paratroopers got an even more unusual urge and set out from Cape Cod to row (yes ROW) across the Atlantic to Kilronan, in the Aran Islands of Western Ireland in ninety-two days. Crazy? maybe, but John Ridgway and Chay Blyth give directions, actual compass readings, detailed list of clothing, food, medicine and water carried in the twenty foot boat - so you can try it yourself - see "A FIGHTING CHANCE" by Ridgway & Blyth.

You might think a man from Yankee's with six children would feel tied down - not at all - (where

could you get a more loyal crew?) How Van Nes, a professional photographer, acquired a large (70 foot) schooner to accommodate his large family and sail up and down the Atlantic Coast. Mary Van Nes, who at first, didn't know a sloop from a ketch, became resigned and eventually enthusiastic enough to write about it in "INTO THE WIND", published in 1962. She tells of some exciting and even dangerous moments when the "Chauve-Souris" (designed for an experienced crew) almost proved too much for this bunch of novices.

A little less daring idea for you? Try "MORE TIME THAN MONEY" by Heddy Kraemer - the Kraemers, a retired couple traveled around the world for twenty months on freighters. They left New York in 1960, visited 30 countries, spent about \$25 a day for both of them on the traveling days - and less on the days in between ships. Mrs. Kraemer tells what to take and what shipping lines are best. All kinds of practical information is to be found in her book.

As far back as the 1830's the Irving Johnsons of Maine started sailing around the world in the schooner Yankee. They spent 25 adventurous and lucky years on Yankee with time out for Irving's war service (in the Navy, of course) and brought up two sons. Even good sailors age and the Johnsons decided to quit while they were ahead. Of course, they were quitting only OCEAN sailing so they built a new Yankee and traveled the canals & rivers of Europe.

We have "SAILING TO SEE", a picture cruise of the original Yankee, published in 1939 and "YANKEE SAILS ACROSS EUROPE", published in 1962.

Excerpts From August Meeting

Jericho Board Of Ed. Report

The Jericho Board of Education held its regular meeting on August 4, 1970. Jerome Greenberg, recently elected member, joined Howard Jankowitz, Samuel Springer, Hal-Curtis Felsler and William Mayhew.

The Board acted on the following matters:

Tax Rate for 1970-71 School Year was set at \$10.329 per \$100 of assessed valuation. The first half-year rate is thus \$5.1645. The tax rate is based upon approximately \$66,000,000 in assessments in the Jericho district.

Agreements with Employee Groups have been reached, with final contracts now in the printing stage. William Mayhew, as chairman and Ben Lang, former Board member served as Board representative in negotiations with the teachers has resulted in a starting salary of \$8300.

The outcome of negotiations with the Civil Service non-professional groups were similarly successful, and settlements have been considered among the best in the county and state. Samuel Springer, Board Vice-president, was chairman of the Board's team at the negotiating sessions.

The Jericho Educational Administrators Association also concluded its agreements. Howard Jankowitz, Board President, served as chairman of the Board's team.

The Jericho Supervisors Association, comprised of department chairmen completed agreements with the Board. Hal-Curtis Felsler was chairman of the Board's team.

Revised Policy on Attendance Zones:

The Board approved a previously revised policy on zoning. Areas of imminent new housing east of Route 106 and North of Jericho Turnpike (including the new "Lion Crest" development) are now zoned for attendance at the George A. Jackson School.

Present resident children living east of Route 106 will continue to attend the Robert Seaman School. The Westwood

Village garden apartments off Brush Hollow Road will also continue the zoning pattern to Robert Seaman.

"Project Link" Special ESEA Title 1 application for a federal grant of approximately \$18,000 to be used to assist the economically and educationally deprived pupils living in motel accommodations was described by David Nydick, Superintendent, and Robert Perna, Administrative Assistant. The funds will be used to supplement services at the Robert Seaman School by providing special assistance to children whose families are on welfare. Included in the proposal are the services of a school social worker, a tutor, a bi-lingual instructor, and provisions for after-school supplement experiences for the deprived children. "Project Link" is an extension of the Title 1 activities recently conducted during a three month summer program at the Seaman School.

Coaches Donate Gift: The Board accepted a gift of \$800 for gymnastic apparatus from the Jericho Coaches Association for use at the Junior and Senior High Schools. The "Universal Gladiator" contains several stations which make possible a variety of gymnastic exercises, stunts and practice by as many as fifteen students at one time.

Reports from the Superintendent:

New report cards for elementary Mr. Nydick presented the newly revised elementary progress reports to parents. Following a two year study by groups of teachers, parents and administrators, the new K-6 reporting procedure was recommended to the Board. They are designed to reflect the goals of individualized instruction and growth.

Edmund Tanzi, Director of Instruction, explained that the new progress report is based on the philosophy that all students learn at different rates. Therefore, the new reporting system will attempt to reduce the concept of failure and unhealthy competition. The new system,

including increased parent-teacher conferences as well as the progress reports, also itemizes the attainment in various learning, social and behavioral skills.

Outdoor Education Program Joseph Verdone, Principal of the Robert Williams School, presented an illustrated report on the pilot outdoor education experiences undertaken by William's sixth graders at Frost Valley in the Catskills. Slides showed the many scientific, mathematical, artistic, musical and recreational activities the children had during their week's trip in June. Mr. Verdone emphasized that the program was not a camping trip, but rather a coordinated series of blended learning activities prepared by the teachers and students prior to the outdoor classes. An expansion of the program is being planned.

Transportation and Safety Mr. Nydick presented a report on school bus procedures, including employment practices, operation, maintenance, inspections and safety factors. Details of the report will be published in a forthcoming issue of the district newsletter, Jericho School News.

ADMINISTRATION REVIEW OF BOARD STATEMENTS OF POLICY AND BYLAWS:

The Board of Education is currently studying the existing Board policies and bylaws and is considering making certain changes in both of these documents in order to keep them up to date with regard to changes in the Education Law during the last session of the Legislature, as well as to maintain a consistent relationship between the policies, bylaws, and the written agreements which have been concluded with the various communities of interest making up the school staff.

CURRENT STATUS OF TEACHING PERSONNEL:

The Superintendent is pleased to report that all but two teaching positions have been filled and it is expected that these will be filled within the next two weeks. The full complement of staff will be ready to start the school year when schools open on Wednesday, September 9th. Plans for orientation of teachers new to the District are being made and the program will cover a two-day

session of in-service training which will take place on Thursday, September 3rd and Friday, September 4th.

NEGOTIATIONS MANAGEMENT INSTITUTES:

The New York State School Boards Association will sponsor a series of nine Negotiations Management Institutes in September and October 1970. The continuing demands in this area of school administration indicate a need to continue to sponsor the Institutes which we initiated in 1967.

This series of Institutes will cover recent court interpretations of the Taylor Law, Public Employment Relations Board rulings, impasse procedures including the legislative hearings, and such timely subjects as agency shop, tenure hearings, and the role of school boards and administrators.

The Institutes will be directed by Stan Hinman, Director of Personnel Relations for our Association. An experienced faculty has been assembled.

Enrollment will be limited to 100 participants per Institute to

allow maximum participation by the attendees.

Two Institutes will be held in the Long Island area; one on Monday and Tuesday, October 12 and 13th; and the other on Tuesday and Wednesday, October 13th and 14th. Members of the Board of Education who would like to attend either of these Institutes are asked to contact the Superintendent's Office so that the necessary reservations may be made.

INSTRUCTION REPORT ON LEARNING PROBLEMS COMMITTEE:

The Superintendent has developed and sent to the members of the Board of Education a report on the activities of the Learning Problems Committee and the services provided to a pilot group of students at South Grove and at Robbins Lane during the past school year.

Plans for the coming school year are being formulated to expand upon this program. The Superintendent will review this matter in more detail with the

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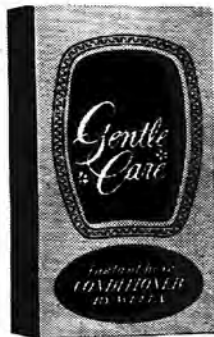

- "Authorized private receptacle" is a litter storage and collection receptacle not to exceed 30 gallons in volume capacity.
- "Town" is the Town of Oyster Bay.
- "Garbage" is putrescible animal and vegetable wastes resulting from the handling, preparation, cooking and consumption of food.
- "Litter" is "garbage", "refuse", and "rubbish" as defined herein and all other waste material which, if thrown or deposited as herein prohibited, tends to create a danger to public health, safety and welfare.
- "Park" is a park, reservation, playground, beach recreation center or any other public area in the Town, owned or used by the Town and devoted to active or passive recreation.
- "Person" is any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind.
- "Private Premises" is any dwelling, house, building or other structure, designed or used either wholly or in part for private residential purposes, whether inhabited or temporarily or continuously uninhabited or vacant, and shall include any yard, grounds, walk, driveway, parking areas, porch, steps, vestibule or mailbox belonging

The assessed valuation of the District as reported by the Department of Assessment is \$103,877,005. This figure represents \$422,995 less than was anticipated in the original budget. The figure reflects the general conditions of the economy and the factor that many large construction projects within the District were only given partial assessment as of August 1.

Assemblyman Martin Ginsberg, (R-Plainview), of the Eighth Assembly District, was then given the rostrum by Mr. Scaring. He addressed the hundred-odd people there, voting the great accomplishments of the recent legislative session, as well as Governor Rockefeller's twelve year administration of the Empire State.

The modification of the State's Tax Structure to permit the sharing with local government, more and better advocational opportunities for all of the citizens of New York, by the Regents Scholarship, Scholar-

incentives, Higher Education Loan, and fulfillment of the State University system dream. He also highlighted the decisions on Abortion reform, on narcotics control, and divorce reform. The decision by New York State to create the M.T.A. to control and coordinate transportation in the Metropolitan area, while other railways are going bankrupt, the Long Island Rail Road is IMPROVING, its service, and will have electrification out to Hicksville in a matter of weeks, permitting the use of the New Build Cars on the main line.

Assemblyman Ginsberg noted that New York State needs its Republican Governor, Assembly and Senate to insure future balanced, positive progress. He also urged a vote for all the Republican State in November to insure good government at the local, county, state and federal levels.

Superintendent, explained that approximately \$200,000 of this is encumbered expenses from the 1969-70 budget. For example, construction of cesspools at the Jr. High, fire safety construction at all schools and other approved projects which could not be completed before the end of the fiscal year (June 30.) Therefore, the applied surplus is as reported in the budget brochure recently mailed to all Hicksville residents - \$734,000.

Sol Newborn was appointed District Auditor for 1970-71, at a salary of \$4500. He will make quarterly reports to the Board. Senior Citizens Tax Relief was raised from \$3000 to \$5000 and it is

now necessary for only one person to be 65.

After a lengthy executive session, The Board unanimously approved the Health Education program for the 70-71 school year. At the first Board meeting in September (Sept. 8) the Health Department will present and explain the curriculum to the Board and public.

In our last column, we incorrectly reported the vote on a motion to delete the position of Personnel Director from the 1970-71 budget. It was reported that John McManus voted in favor of the deletion - Mr. McManus voted against the deletion.
