### O'Haire Appointed To Social Services Board

George V. O'Haire, former deputy supervisor of the Town of OYSTER Bay, was appointed by County Executive Eugene H. Nickerson to the Nassau County Board of Social Services.

A practicing attorney in Jericho, O'Haire served as deputy supervisor to the late Michael N. Petito from 1964 to 1969. Prior to that he was an Assistant United States Attorney in the Chief Civil Division, Eastern District of New York. During the period from 1962 to 1961, he worked for a Wall Street law firm (1962-63); served as trial counsel for an insurance company (1964-69); and from 1969-61, he was in private practice in Jamaica, Queens.

O'Haire is a graduate of Iona College, where he earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1949; Georgetown University, where he earned a L. B. in 1951 and the New York University Law Center, where he received a Master of Laws in 1958.

He is president of the Diocesan Union of Holy Name Societies, Diocese of Rockville Centre; Vice President of the Nassau County Annual Cerebral Palsy Fund Raising Campaign; and serves as a trustee of the Big Brothers of Nassau County and the Mid-Island Girl Scouts.

O'Haire is married and the father of four children. The O'Haires live at 16 Marilyn Lane in Hicksville.

Hicksville Against Drugs (HAD) has informed the Herald that "the ball is now rolling" in the organization.

## Hicksville Library NOTES

Forty five new titles are being added to the Hicksville Library Periodical Collection beginning January 1971.

This will be the largest number of additions we have ever made for any single year, despite the fact that the periodical collection has grown steadily over the last fifteen years.

One of the reasons we feel we can afford to be more expansive in our periodical policy is money. A perhaps even more important reason is the possibility of space.

The Hicksville Library has always attempted to maintain a good, if selective, collection of the best and most representative of the less highly specialized

periodicals in the various subject areas.

The collection has always been maintained with the conviction that its value as a reference source was fully as important as its value for current reading.

For this reason back issues of most periodicals have been retained and bound. To maintain back bound periodicals requires a great deal of stack space. Therefore, it has been deemed expedient in the past to keep a reasonable limitation on the number of new periodicals to be added each year.

However, the possibility of

overcoming this space problem has arrived with the advent of microfilmed periodicals at comparatively reasonable prices.

Although the Hicksville Library has not utilized this possibility of microfilmed periodicals to any great extent as

yet, it is with the knowledge that we can utilize them in the near future that has allowed us to be more expansive in our periodical policy.

As of January 1971, the total number of periodical titles immediately available to Hicksville patrons will be 328.

The Ladies Aux. of the Hicksville Fire Dept. won the State championship as best appearing unit at the State Firemen's Parade and Convention in Watertown, N.Y. The ladies also captured 2nd place in the 60 Anniversary Parade in Massapequa, N.Y. The men of the Hicksville Fire Dept. also won 2nd place best appearing unit and the Hicksville PBC Drum and Bugle Corp. took 2nd place at the Massapequa Parade. The drill team took a 4th place in the Bucket bridge contest.

## RESCUE SQUAD

The residents of the Hicksville Fire District aside from receiving fire protection are covered also by a rescue squad. The Rescue Squad, comprised of 35 members are trained in all methods of rescue and first aid problems. Emergency oxygen is available any time. Everyone of the six pumpers is equipped with oxygen and rescue equipment. In September the squad will receive a new rescue truck. The residents also have an ambulance to service the district. Due to State laws and also for insuring that the ambulance isn't tied up on minor calls, a set of regulations governing the use of the ambulance is imposed. The main rule being, a doctor only may request the ambulance.

The following are the regulations governing the ambulance.

One important point to remember in case of a heart attack, stroke, seizure, convulsions or serious bleeding or other serious injury, to wait or try to contact a doctor takes up valuable time. Just tell the Fire Dispatcher what type of emergency exists. He will sound the alarm and get the rescue personnel to the scene. Many times it takes too much time to get a doctor's clearance to order out the ambulance. After the squad is on the scene they will arrange the fastest transportation to the hospital possible.

## REGULATIONS GOVERNING AMBULANCE SERVICE

- WHO IS ENTITLED TO AMBULANCE SERVICE?**  
Any person in the Hicksville Fire District, who requires ambulance service to a hospital, who is not suffering from a contagious disease, or who is violent.  
Patient must be an EMERGENCY STRETCHER case.
- WHO MAY CALL THE AMBULANCE?**  
Doctor in attendance only - if doctor leaves following the call for service, his signed statement authorizing the removal of the patient is necessary.
- WHAT INFORMATION IS NECESSARY?**  
Name of patient, address, hospital of admittance, nature of illness, and name of doctor.
- HOW DO YOU CALL FOR AMBULANCE?**  
Requests for ambulance service are to be made by phone only. Ambulance will not respond to calls from fire box.
- WHAT TO DO ONCE AMBULANCE HAS BEEN CALLED:**  
A) Someone go outside to direct ambulance.  
B) In serious cases the doctor or nurse must travel with patient - be ready.  
C) Keep area clear so that access to the patient may be immediate.
- AREA INCLUDED FOR NORMAL CASES:**  
Hospitals within a 15 mile radius. Veterans will be transported to a V.A. hospital.
- WHO MAY ACCOMPANY PATIENT?**  
One member of the immediate family may accompany the patient to the hospital but, must provide their own return transportation.

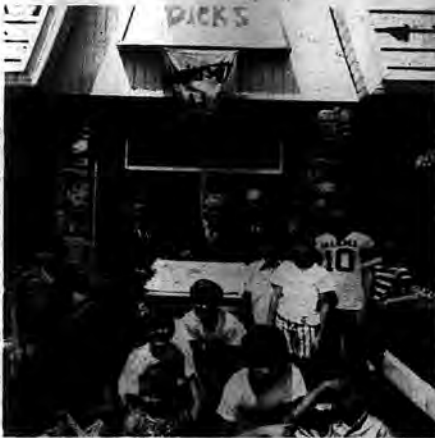

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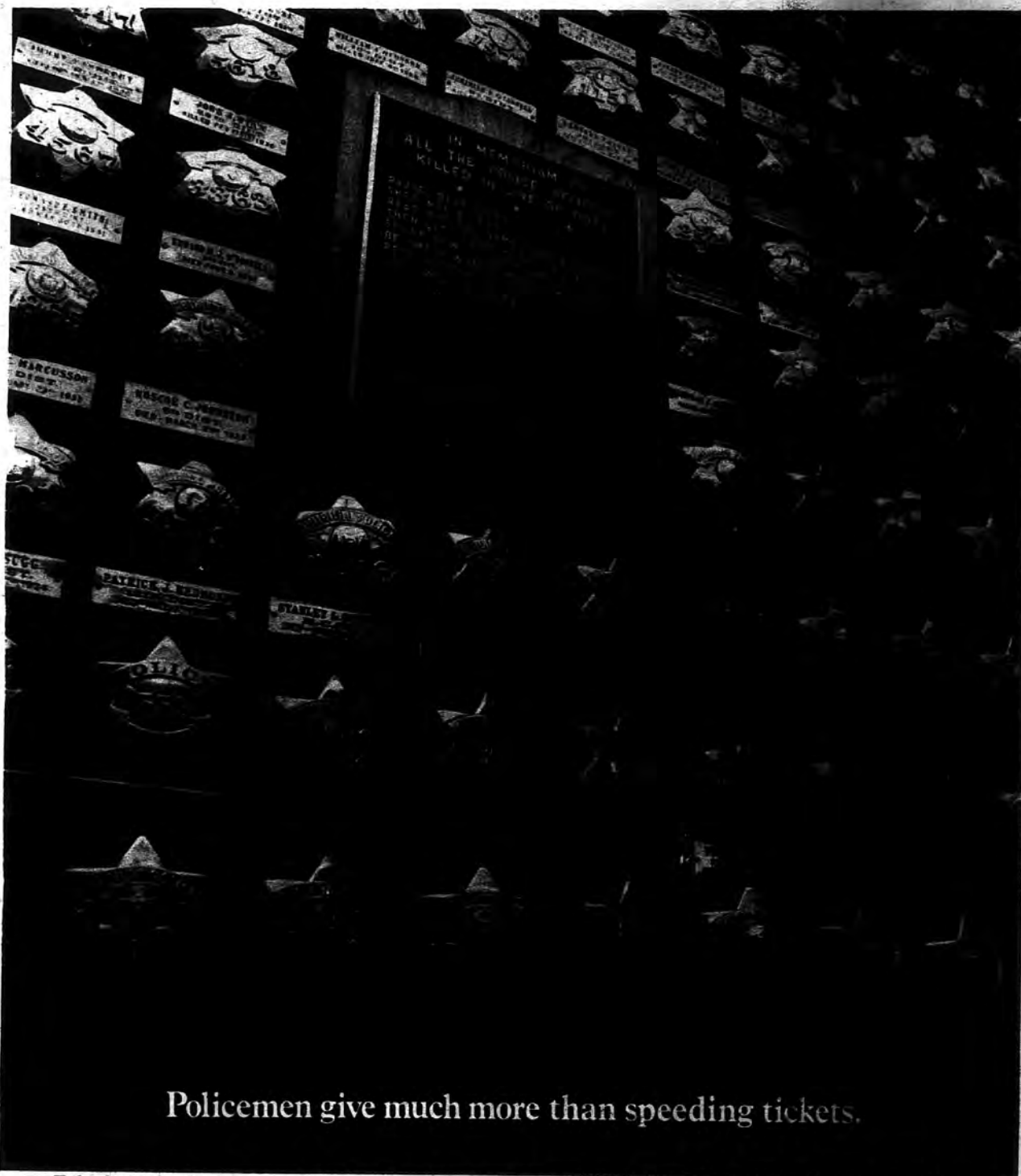
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
